Mr. Doody was a member of the City Council at one time, and made a splendid official. He was a good business man; was progressive and always stood with those who favored the things that were best for the town and county. His passing is a distinct loss for the community, and he is certain to be missed. He was a consistent member of the Catholic church, and a former Grand Knight of the local Knights of Columbus Council.
