Dies After Long Illness

Boldrick and Baute on Tuesday, March 17, the blood being supplied by her father.

Miss Hagan, who was a daughter of Joe and Dora Elliott Hagan, was born in this county September 19, 1909, and had spent all her life here. She was a lovely Christian girl, a consistent member of the Baptist church and before being stricken ill was a member of the junior class at the Lebanon High School and was a favorite with all her classmates. She possessed a sunny disposition which endeared her to a host of warm friends and her passing cast a gloom over the community in which she lived. Besides her parents, she is survived by one sister, Miss Pauline Hagan, who lives at home.

T.M. HAGAN, JR. DIES OF FEVER – Illness Fatal To Navy Youth At California Hospital Wednesday – RITES TO BE HELD HERE

Mr. and Mrs. Terry M. Hagan, Lebanon, at noon yesterday received word of the death of their son, Seaman 2cl. (R.M.) Terry M. Hagan, Jr., U.S. Navy, at a Navy hospital in Long Beach, California, where he had been under treatment a week for rheumatic fever.

First word of their son's illness was received by Mr. and Mrs. Hagan Tuesday morning, when a routine card giving a change of address was received. Since the card gave the hospital address and they had not heard from their son for two weeks, although he usually wrote each week, they wired authorities at the post, and in return received a wire Tuesday evening, telling the nature of the illness and stating that his condition was serious. Mr. and Mrs. Hagan were considering possibilities of a trip to their son's bedside, when news of his death was received yesterday. He was due to receive a furlough within a few days and was expected home next week.

Young Hagan was 19 years old on Mother's Day, May 13. He attended the Lebanon public schools and graduated at Lebanon High School last June. He entered Davidson College, Davidson, North Carolina, but came home for induction into the military service last October 18, and was assigned to the Navy. He spent the

customary leave at home following boot training of several weeks at Great Lakes Naval Training Station, and then was assigned to radio school at Long Beach, where he had been stationed.

He was a fine boy, lively, and cheerful, and was a favorite with both old and young. He was a member of the basketball team at the Lebanon High School. He was a member of the United Presbyterian Church here and active in young people's work of the church.

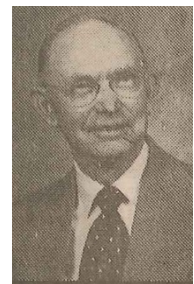

TWO YOUTHS FOUND DEAD NEAR TRACKS – Bodies of Lebanon Residents Discovered Along Railroad in Lincoln County – ROBBERY HELD MOTIVE – Section Foreman Expresses Belief Pair May Have Been Thrown From Train

Two youths identified as William Raley, 17 years old, and Chester Hamilton, 21, both of Lebanon, Ky., were found dead at 7 o'clock this morning near the Louisville & Nashville Railroad tracks a mile south of Shelby City, Lincoln County.

The bodies were discovered by William Maybrier while he was picking up coal along the tracks. Clothes of the youths, who were found under bushes, their bodies eight feet apart, were turned inside out, and officers, who were called by R.M. Roberts, railroad section foreman, notified of the discovery of Maybrier, said they believed the two had been robbed. The youths were fairly well-dressed.

Identification was made through a card found in a billfold in possession of Hamilton, containing \$1.05 which apparently had been overlooked by the persons who searched the youths' clothing.

With the exception of a slight wound on Hamilton's forehead, the bodies bore no marks of violence. Mr. Roberts said that it was possible that the pair might have been thrown from a train, judging from the positions of the bodies when found. He said one of the youths was found face downward, with his head toward the tracks, which the other was facing the other way.

An inquest was conducted by County Judge John N. Menefee, acting in the place of Coroner W.A. Carson, who is ill. The jury rendered a verdict of death from unknown cause, and placed the bodies in the custody of Mr. Roberts who had them sent to Lebanon.

At Lebanon, George R. Raley, brother of William, said the two youths had been seen together late last night. George said that he and Hamilton had been to a dance, and that at 10:30 o'clock his companion said he had lost his hat and left to look for it. He said the two boys had not been considering taking a trip, so far as he knew.

It is believed the two boys caught a southbound freight train which passes through Lebanon at 1 o'clock. This train would have passed the spot where the bodies were found at about 3 o'clock.

Inquiries in Lebanon revealed that the Hamilton youth had between \$20 and \$25 with him at the time he left the dance, and that his companion had \$4 or \$5.

Young Raley is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alex Raley; five brothers, George, Dan, J.A. Jr., Frank and Hugh, and two sisters, Nancy and Rosella. The other youth is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hamilton; a brother, Spencer, and a sister, Mrs. Ben D. Lockett. All live in Marion County.

Joint funeral services have been arranged for 9 o'clock Tuesday morning at St. Charles Church, St. Mary's, Ky., about five miles from Lebanon, at which Father A.J. Tompkins is to officiate. Hamilton will be buried in St. Charles Cemetery at St. Mary's, while Raley's body will be returned to Lebanon for burial in St. Augustine's cemetery.

"From the outside, you didn't know how much fun she could be," said Beverly Roby, assistant principal at MCHS. "She took me on my first trip to Atlanta, and Mollie was always on the move. It was a chore to keep up with her. She was motivated. You can't believe the energy she had."

Roby said there were never any problems in her classes.

"She was very strict in discipline," Roby said. "The students just knew the rules."

Hamilton started the entrepreneur program at the school, the Boutique.

"There are all kinds of people in the community who come here to buy from the Boutique," said Roby. "She was always looking for new programs for the school. She coordinated our School-to-Work program, which now has 60 kids. That's an outstanding number for something so new."

"We're going to miss her. She's done a lot for our school."

Roby said as a favor to the high school, "she agreed to teach the first semester. The second semester, she planned to take off and do some things she wanted to do, such as travel."

Lebanon Middle School teacher Peggy Martin, who worked as a substitute teacher at MCHS shortly after her college graduation, said Mollie “took me under her wing. Her classroom was right across from my door, and I remember her being so good, so nice.”

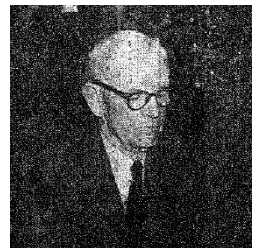
Will Hamilton Dies Saturday

William Hamilton, age 77, Marion County tax commissioner for 36 years, died Saturday afternoon at Mary Immaculate hospital here.

He was appointed deputy tax commissioner in 1918 and the same year was elected tax commissioner, a job he held until last year. Then a son, H. Louis Hamilton, became tax commissioner.

The grandson of William Hamilton, pioneer Marion County family who came here in the county's early settling years from Maryland, he is survived by his wife, Mrs. Martha Young Hamilton; second daughters, Mrs. Hugh Beaven, St. Mary; Miss Catherine Hamilton, Lebanon; Mrs. Marion J. Hefferson and Mrs. Joseph D. Raby, both of Louisville; Miss Virginia Hamilton, Washington; Mrs. Walter Leachman, Springfield; and Mrs. Einar Jacobson, Jr., Tulsa; two other sons, Richard and Joseph Hamilton, Lebanon, and a sister, Mrs. W.L. Cambron, all of Louisville. 21 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren also survive.

He was born in Marion County on the farm that was a part of that original land grant, settled by his grandparents from Maryland. That was on September 14, 1877. Part of that original 1200 acres was the farm of his father, who had received the farm as his share of the estate following the death of his father. That farm, on the St. Rose Pike, is now owned by Charley Shewmaker.

As a young man, Mr. Hamilton decided to follow his father's plow-tracks on the farm. He moved from that end of the county, and across Lebanon to a farm near the Grundy property on the Bradfordsville Highway. He stayed there five years.

Then he came to town. In the house that sits at the top of the tourist court on West Main street here, now occupied by the Hollyhill Inn, he raised his family, although only one, the youngest, Dorothy Mae, was born there. The family fixed the old house up, landscaped the yard, and lived there for 27 years. It was only in the last few years that the brick house on Chandler street was built. He received his schooling at St. Augustine High School and left there for studies at St. Mary's College at St. Mary. He had long been an active member of the Knights of Columbus.

Will Hamilton felt his health didn't permit his carrying on the hard work required on the farm. A job became available about that time with Tax Commissioner, or Collector, W.A. Hagan, then of Loretto, and the younger man moved in as Deputy Collector, learning the job from the ground up by acting as a clerk and just generally keeping the office. Mr. Hagan succeeded Bill Jack Spalding.

The building on the corner of Court Square and Main street, now occupied by The Marion Falcon, presented an unused, dimly-lit room that now is that newspaper's "front office" that was in 1917 used as the first tax commissioner's office. The newspaper was printed upstairs, with steps rising from Main street on the side of the building to its office and composing room above.

In 1921, Mr. Hamilton came into the job in his own right. Quarters have long since been established in the Marion county court house, where a staff of two girls and an assistant helped him carry on the job that had grown into an unbelievable dimension by the time of his retirement.

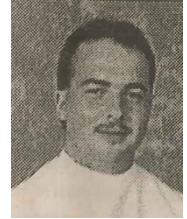

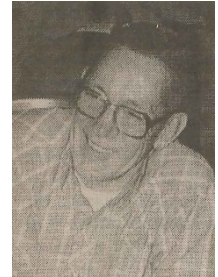

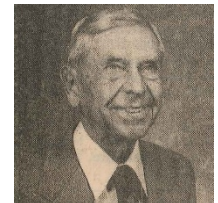
