WELL KNOWN CITIZEN DIES – Complications After Removal Of Eye Are Fatal To Theo. Jagloqicz – END SHOCK TO FRIENDS

Theodore Jaglowicz, 53 years old, for more than twenty-five years engaged in the merchant tailoring business in this city, died Monday afternoon at 4:20 o'clock at the Baptist Hospital in Louisville where he had been undergoing treatment for an eye trouble for about two weeks. Although it was known for several days before he passed away that his condition was dangerous, news of his death came as a shock to his friends and was received with sorrow by everyone who knew him. Mr. Jaglowicz's right eye became infected last April, but for a while following the trouble was not thought to be serious. It was not known what caused the infection. Some time later, when the eye did not get better, the physician who was treating it suggested that a Louisville specialist be consulted. This was done. The specialist informed Mr. Jaglowicz that the treatment he was receiving from his local physical was, in his opinion, the proper one and he returned home. For a while afterward the eye seemed to improve, but later it again became worse. Mr. Jaglowicz went to Louisville on February 15 where he placed himself under the care of a specialist. On Monday of last week the eye was removed and two days later he became seriously ill from erysipelas. Afterward pneumonia developed which hastened the end.

The body was brought home Monday night and taken to the residence on East Chandler street. Funeral services were held at St. Augustine's church Wednesday morning with Solemn High Mass, Mr. Jaglowicz's brother, the Rev. Father Michael Jaglowicz of Chicago, Ill., being the celebrant.
