State's first liver transplant patient dies Saturday at 58

Joseph Stanley Ballard, 58, the first person in Kentucky to have a liver transplant died Saturday, Jan. 24, 1998, at his home in Loretto.

He received the liver and a kidney on May 21, 1990, at Jewish Hospital in Louisville.

Ballard and the family of a Marion County man who died after a car accident on May 20, believe that the liver and kidney that gave him life came from Tim Buckler.

The 36-year-old Buckler died on May 21 from injuries suffered in a car wreck the day before. After his death the family received a letter stating that the recipient of his organs was a Loretto man who was a former GE worker.

The Ballard and Buckler families' suspicions were never confirmed.

Ballard became ill in early 1989 and found out that he had Hepatitis C, which severely damaged his liver.

He along with three other patients were the first to be put on a list to receive a liver transplant. When the time came Ballard was the best match.

The transplant immediately improved his condition, according to an article in Montage in 1993. Two weeks after the surgery he was let out of ICU and began to recover.

Then his body rejected the liver and kidney. Doctors performed surgery and transplanted another liver into Ballard.

That organ helped to keep him alive for the next eight years.

Whenever someone in the family died, Willett said, "he always thought he'd be the next because of all his heart problems."

Ballard had undergone three heart by-pass surgeries and doctors had been trying to talk him into a fourth. Ballard had refused.

"He never did think he could survive a fourth," Willett said. "He had three heart bypasses and now he dies in an automobile wreck.

While battling his heart problems, Ballard worked hard, even after he'd retired from Barton Brands.

"He farmed, and he was well-read," Willett said. "He read all the time. He was a very fine person. He raised a big family."

According to State Police, Boone was driving the drump truck south on U.S. 31E about 10:35 a.m. when the accident happened. The truck is owned by Ritchie Excavating of Bardstown.

Boone drove around a curve and saw a motorcycle stopped in the road, waiting to turn left into the fairgrounds, where a motorcycle convention was going on.

Boone told police he applied his brakes, but they weren't operating properly. He then started downshifting to slow the truck and swerved into the oncoming lane.

Boone told police that he didn't swerve to the right because he saw people standing along the roadside and didn't want to hit them.

The dump truck smashing into Ballard's oncoming Chevrolet, crushing the front and part of its side and top.

The truck kept moving, pushing Ballard's car to the side.

Boone, 44, an attorney, was following Ballard's car in her Toyota Corolla.

The dump truck, which was carrying a full load of gravel, struck her head-on. The vehicles ended up in a ditch, the truck's engine resting on the front of Boone's car, up to the windshield.

On Sunday afternoon Boone was preparing to leave Flaget Memorial Hospital, where she was being treated for lacerations, brusies and a sprained ankle and knee.

"They say I'm going to be hobbling around for a couple of weeks," she said.

But Sue Boone was feeling fortunate. Guardian angels were looking over her, she said.

"It makes you realize every day is precious," she said.

She said she remembers that both she and the truck driver had almost stopped their vehicles before the dump truck rolled up on her car.

Boone said the last thing she remembered was hearing a loud noise.

New Haven Road was blocked off for nearly three hours while an accident reconstruction expert from Elizabethtown investigated.

The expert, Trooper Steve Pavey, said Sunday that there probably will be no charges filed.

"It's an accident," he said.

The teen-ager had a driver's license but no commercial driver's license.

Drivers must have a CDL if they drive a truck of more than 26,000 pounds, Pavey said.

The truck's weight certification is listed at 26,000 he said, but the truck weighed 27,700 when the wreck happened. Pavey said he was going to check records to see if the CDL covers declared for actual weight.

Well Known Citizen Is Killed By Falling Limb – INJURIES FATAL TO W.B. BEAVEN – Loretto Farmer, Stockman, Former Banker Suffers Fractured Skull – LIVES ONLY FEW HOURS

W.B. Beaven, one of the county's most substantial citizens, was injured so badly when struck by a falling tree limb at his home in the Loretto section last Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, that he succumbed two hours later at Boldrick's Infirmary in this city where he was brought following the accident. Examination disclosed that he had suffered a fractured skull, and practically no hope for his recovery was held by the surgeons who attended him. He became unconscious soon after he was struck and passed away without regaining consciousness. News of the deplorable accident caused widespread sorrow throughout the community.

Mr. Beaven, with George Mattingly employed on his farm, was cutting a tree a few hundred yards from his home. In falling it caught in another tree a short distance away and hung there. The men were trimming some limbs from the tree to allow it to come to rest on the ground when one of these suddenly gave way. In falling it struck Mr. Beaven, who was on the ground almost directly under it, on the head. Mattingly hurriedly summoned help and Mr. Beaven was removed to the house. Two physicians were called and were soon at the Beaven home. The injured man was brought to Lebanon in an ambulance arriving at 5 o'clock. He died at 6:45 o'clock.

Mr. Beaven, who was 60 years old, was for many years a director of the Marion National Bank, this city, and was one of the vice presidents of the institution. He tendered his resignation, however, a short time ago as vice president and director. He was prominent in agricultural affairs, and a leader in Boys and Girls 4-H Club work, always being ready to promote projects that were of interest to the younger farm people. He was also prominent in live stock circles, specializing in saddle horses and Hereford cattle. Few farmers in the community were better known and none held in higher regard by friends. He was an excellent citizen – progressive, charitable and kind – and the community as a whole loses heavily by his death. He was a consistent member of the Catholic church and was faithful to its teaching. Mr. Beaven was a son of William and Eliza Couch Beaven and was born in this county September 26, 1870. He was the last surviving member of his family, a brother, Francis K. Beaven, who was a rural mail carrier, having passes away on March 18, 1929.

The youth had been shot in the head and also suffered several broken ribs, which may have indicated he was stamped upon.

The dead boy's parents moved to Louisville from Lebanon 15 years ago. He was a nephew of Mrs. Cliff Brockman, Lebanon, and of Clarence Benningfield, Route 1, Finley.

Second Body Found

The body of another Louisville youth was found near the Benningfield boy's body. The second victim, who had also been missing 10 days, was Spencer Impellizzeri, 14. He also had been found shot in the head.

The dead youths were found 932 feet apart, off a gravel road five mouth south of the Jefferson-Bullitt County line.

The two boys had been reported missing since June 23. Mrs. Anne Benningfield told police that her son had left home to attend a Saturday night party in a wooded area near Fairdale. The area is not far from where the bodies were found.

Benningfield's father's second car, which the boy drove, had been found earlier - stripped of accessories and abandoned – on a private road off Grade Lane near the Outer Loop, Louisville.

The Benningfield's six other children range from 9 to 20. The oldest, a daughter, remains at home to help supervise the younger children while both parents are working.



TWO LORETTO GIRLS VICTIMS – Fatally Hurt When Machines Sideswipe In Passing Sunday Night – DOUBLE FUNERAL HELD

Two girls, members of well known Loretto families, were fatally hurt and several other persons received minor injuries in an automobile accident on the Lebanon and Loretto road Sunday night at 9:30 o'clock. The victims were Miss Georgia Bickett, 16 years old, youngest daughter of Mrs. J. Ernest Bickett, and Miss Nancy Saltsman, 13-year-old daughter of Edgar Saltsman. Both died at Boldrick's Infirmary where they were brought after the accident. Miss Bickett succumbed Monday morning at 6:30 o'clock, and the Saltsman girl the same evening at 6 o'clock.

The two girls were on the running boards of a Chevrolet coupe driven by Malcolm Thompson, one on either side of the machine, when it and a Cadillac sedan owned by George Owens and driven by Aaron Russell, both of this city, sideswiped in passing. The coupe was going toward Loretto while the Owens car was coming toward Lebanon. The accident happened in front of the home of James Peterson, about half way between Lebanon and Loretto. In the coupe with Thompson were Miss Elnora Wetterer of Tunnel Hill, Ky., who was visiting at the Bickett home, and Billy Fenwick of Loretto. The two boys and girl in the car escaped with minor hurts. In the Owens car, besides Owens and Russell, were Mack McCauley, an employee of the L.&N. Railroad Co.; Miss Louise Payne, Mrs. Cordia Wright and Mrs. Mack Ewing. All were unhurt except for bruises. Both machines were considerably damaged. The Cadillac, the heavier car, had the running board on the left side torn away, the rear fender demolished and the handles of both doors broken off. The left front fender of the coupe was torn away and the wheel under it broken and twisted.

The Bickett girl, riding on the left side of the coupe, was crushed between the machines. It is believed that the handles on the doors of the Owens car caused her the most serious injuries. The Saltsman girl was thrown into a ditch on the roadside by the impact of the collision. Miss Bickett's left leg was broken in two or three places, her left side badly torn and it is believed that her back was also broken. The Saltsman girl suffered a fractured skull and was otherwise badly hurt. She was unconscious when brought to the infirmary and remained in that condition until she died.

George Owens, proprietor of a store on North Proctor Knott avenue, said that he and those in the machine with him had been to Loretto. He said they left Lebanon between 6:30 and 7 o'clock that evening and that Russell did the driving. He denied there was any drinking by those in the machine and said the report that they were traveling at a high rate of speed was untrue. He said they stopped as quickly as possible after the accident, went back to render all possible assistance and were among the last to leave the scene after the crash. Owens said that he and those with him had driven to Loretto for the ride.

Thompson, who was at the wheel of the coupe, is a son of Pink Thompson. He said he was not driving fast when the accident happened. He said he saw the lights on the other car for some distance, and that as the machine approached he pulled to the side of the road. He was as far to the right as he could safely drive, he said, when the crash occurred.

Miss Bickett's father died last December. He was for many years cashier of the Bank of Loretto, and at one time represented Marion county in the Kentucky Legislature. He was also at one time engaged in the distilling business, having for years been associated with George R. Burks, now of Louisville, who owned the Burks Spring Distillery near Loretto. Surviving her are her mother, who before her marriage was Miss Anna Belle Lanham of this city; three brothers, Ores, Harold and Frank Bickett, and six sisters, Mrs. Kendrick Mills, Mrs. Dick Blair, Mrs. Hubert Hamilton, Mrs. Alton Thompson, Miss Emily Bickett and Miss Louise Bickett, the latter a nurse at St. Joseph's Infirmary in Louisville.

The Saltsman child was a daughter of John Edgar and Leona Barry Saltsman, the former a merchant at Loretto. She was a student at Mt. Joseph's Academy last year. She is survived by her parents; four brothers, Jack, Dan, John and Bruce Saltsman, and three sisters, Misses Shirley, Rita and Martha Lillian Saltsman.

A double funeral for the two girls was held at St. Francis' Catholic church at Chicago Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock, with a Solemn High Mass. Rev. N. Werner, assisted by Frank Jaglowicz of St. Mary and Rev. A.L. O'Shea of New Hope, conducted the services in the presence of an unusually large number of friends. The body of Miss Bickett was brought to this city and buried in St. Augustine's cemetery, while that of Miss Saltsman was taken to New Hope for burial in the Catholic cemetery there.

Besides serving as a magistrate, Bickett was a farmer, a self-made geologist, a broom maker, a fan maker, a car salesman, a grocery store owner, and a heavy equipment operator.

"He was an extraordinary individual," said George. "I never heard J.E. talk negatively about a person or a situation, personally or from a professional standpoint."

His wife, Coletta Kirkpatrick Bickett, agreed.

"He didn't like to fuss," said Mrs. Bickett. "He wouldn't say a negative word about anyone. He never complained about his leg. I wish I could be more like him."

Former magistrate L.V. "Phil" Caldwell, who served 20 years with Bickett on the fiscal court, said, "J.E. was just like a brother to me. And he was very intelligent."

He was born in Raywick on April 16, 1923. He died at 11:48 a.m. on Oct. 17, 1996.

Raywick Man Ends Own Life, Louis David Bickett, 31, Fires Rifle Charge Into Head At Home Monday Morning. Family of Six Survives

END IS SHOCK TO COMMUNITY – Well Known Physician Passes Away Yesterday Soon After Stricken – FUNERAL ON SATURDAY

Dr. John T. Boldrick, 47 years old, widely known physician, died at his home on North Spalding avenue in this city yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock, the result of a paralytic stroke which he suffered at 1:30 o'clock, eight hours before. He became unconscious immediately after he was stricken and passed away without regaining consciousness. He was as well as usual when he retired the night before, and the news of his sudden

death came as a profound shock to everyone. However, Dr. Boldrick had known for the past few years that he might be stricken at any time.

Funeral Tomorrow Morning

Funeral services have been arranged for tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock at St Augustine's church. Rev. J.A. Hogarty, pastor, will conduct the services, assisted by the Rev. Joseph Rives of Cloverport and the Rev. Charles C. Boldrick of Louisville. Burial will follow in the cemetery at Loretto Academy in accordance with a recently expressed wish.

Was Progressive Citizen

The death of Dr. Boldrick takes from the community one of its best citizens – one who will be missed not only by his family circle but by the people of the city and county. Few men have been more interested in the welfare or the community, and every worth-while movement had his active and whole-hearted support. For several years he had been president of the Lebanon Water Company, and during the time many improvements were made in the plant which is generally recognized as one of the best in the State. Since he became head of the company its indebtedness, outstanding at the time he assumed his duties, has all been paid, and its financial affairs are in better condition than they have been at any time in years.

Born in Lebanon

Dr. Boldrick was a son of George D. and Kate Tobin Boldrick and was born in this city on February 8, 1885. His father, a prominent business man of Lebanon, died in 1904. Dr. Boldrick received his early education in St. Augustine's parochial school, this city, after which he attended St. Mary's College, graduating from that institution in 1905. After completing his course there he entered the Louisville Hospital and Medical College and began the study of medicine and surgery. Three years later, on July 30, 1908, he was graduated from that college and soon afterward was admitted to practice, having successfully passed the examination required by physicians of the State.

Practiced in Lexington

Dr. Boldrick served an internship of one year at St. Joseph's Hospital, Lexington, and later went to New York where he was an assistant physician at the New York Post Graduate Hospital for several months. Upon his return to Kentucky he opened an office in Lexington and began the practice of his profession there. However, he remained in that city for only a few months, returning to Lebanon where he had since made his home.

Established Boldick's Infirmary

The success with which Dr. Boldrick met after he began his practice here was outstanding, and four years later he purchased the large brick residence on South Proctor Knott avenue belonging to Dr. L.D. Knott, now deceased, and converted it into an infirmary. Numerous changes and improvements, including an addition, were made, and the hospital today is regarded one of the most complete to be found anywhere in a town the size of Lebanon. His splendid practice was not confined to his home town and county, but many of his patients came here from other parts of the State that they might be under his surgical or medical care. Dr. Boldrick did a great deal of charity practice which, frequently, took him on long trips to various parts of the county. The unfortunate in need of medical aid who applied to him were never turned away; on the other hand they received the same care given others. He was a loyal and active member of the Catholic church, willingly giving of his time and means wherever its welfare might be promoted. Seldom does a man more stolidly affix himself to his Christian ideals than did he.

Surviving Dr. Boldrick are his wife, who was Miss Allie Rives, daughter of the late Judge H.W. Rives, to whom he was married at St. Augustine's church in this city on November 27, 1914, by Rev. J.A. Hogarty, and by

one child, a son, John T. Boldrick, Jr. Another boy, Leslie Downs, has for many years been making his home with Dr. and Mrs. Boldrick and is being educated by them. Dr. Boldrick is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Kate T. Boldrick; three brothers, William, Lawrence and Cambron Boldrick; three sisters, Misses Mary, Katie and Lucy Boldrick, and three half-brothers, Judge Samuel J. Boldrick of Louisville, Ralph Boldrick of Springfield and Charles C. Boldrick of this city.

LONG ILLNESS ENDS IN DEATH – Mrs. John H. Boner Succumbs At Her Home Here Late Saturday Evening – PASSING WAS EXPECTED

Mrs. Wadelee Maret Boner, 50 years old, wife of John H. Boner, died at her home on Proctor Knott Avenue shortly after 11:30 o'clock Saturday evening of a complication of troubles with which she had suffered for slightly over a year. The termination of her life did not come unexpectedly as hope for her recovery had been abandoned several months ago. In September, 1932, Mrs. Boner underwent a serious operation at St. Joseph's Infirmary in Louisville, from which she recovered nicely, and was able to return home three weeks later. TRAIN KILLS CALVARY MAN – Body Of Ben Elder Brown Is Found Alongside Of Track – NO ONE SEES ACCIDENT

Ben Elder Brown, 34 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Brown of Calvary, was killed by a train near that place last Friday night. Just how the accident happened will probably never be known. His body, with the right arm severed at the shoulder, his neck broken and with several cuts about the head and body, was found

lying on the track between the bridge over the Rolling Fork and the first road crossing south of the bridge. Discovery of the body was made by John Franklin Malone, who was returning to his home from the home of his son-in-law. Mr. Malone did not stop to make a close investigation in the darkness, but went to the home of Brown's parents and asked for him. Told that he was not there, he informed his parents that he believed Brown was lying beside the railroad track beyond the bridge. Malone and Brown's brother-in-law, Robert Spalding, went to the scene and identified the body. The body was found at 9 o'clock, and the evening train for Greensburg passed Calvary for Greensburg about 8 o'clock. The train crew knew nothing of the accident, it is said, until sometime after it occurred.

The body was brought to Bosley's funeral parlors in this city where it was prepared for burial, and later was removed to his home. Funeral services, conducted by the Rev. J.P. Welsh, assisted by the Rev. Father McGee, were held at the Catholic church at Calvary Monday morning, and burial followed in the church cemetery.

Brown, who was unmarried, was for several years employed at the railroad station at Calvary. Afterward he worked for the L. and N. at Gethsemane, remaining there for two years. He was later transferred to Bowling Green and from that city to Clarksville, Tenn., remaining at the latter place for six or eight years. He returned to Calvary five or six months ago from Clarksville and had not since been employed. Brown's severed arm was found fifteen feet from his body. Nearby was a paper sack containing some cheese and crackers. The cheese and crackers were bought by Brown at Abell's store a short time before he met death. After making the purchase he rode in a buggy with a son of Mark Thomas, who happened to be passing, from the Abell store to a point near the Mark Thomas road crossing, a short distance from where he met death. Leaving the buggy he started walking up the track to Calvary. It is presumed that he sat down on the track and fell asleep. He is survived by his parents, a sister, Mrs. Robt. Spalding of Calvary and two brothers, Joe Brown of Louisville and Paul Brown of Calvary. His father, who is engineer for the Lebanon Water Co. at the Calvary pumping station, met with an accident a short time ago that resulted in the loss of an eye. He has been connected with the water company for nearly forty years.

Mrs. Brown was 23 years of age and a daughter of Thomas Hundley, of Casey County. She was married to Mr. Brown, who is also 23 years of age, a year or so ago. Mr. Brown has been living on Cleveland Isaacs' farm, and is highly regarded by all who live in the community.

Brown dies at 86

Mary Smith Brown, a long-time Marion County teacher whose classroom career spanned six decades, died Thursday, Jan. 4, at 8:10 p.m. at Spring View Nursing Home. She was 86 years old.

Brown was born March 15, 1909 in Marion County, daughter of Stanch Smith and Mary Margaret Chandler.

Her husband, John Will Brown, died Sept. 23, 1981. Besides her husband and parents, Brown was also preceded in death by a brother, Bill Chandler; a sister, Jane Chandler; and her stepfather, William Chandler Sr.

Brown is survived by several cousins, Georgia (Mrs. Joseph M.) Spalding, Lawrence Spalding, and John "Junior" Smith, all of Lebanon; and Elizabeth Johnson of Springfield.

She attended St. Monica School in Lebanon from 1915 until 1922, and then enrolled in Lincoln Institute, a segregated normal school, from 1922 until 1926. She then entered Kentucky State College in Frankfort, where she received a degree in 1936.

Brown began her teaching career at the segregated St. Mary's School in the 1927-28 school year. She remained at the one-room school until it closed when the Marion County public schools were finally integrated in the 1960s. After that, she was initially assigned to St. Charles Elementary School. She held other positions until her retirement in the 1970s.

"She was a great lady," remembered Lebanon resident Donnie Shockency, one of her students at the segregated St. Mary School. "She would have done anything in the world for (her students). She helped me make it through school," he said. Shockency recalled that when he finished eighth-grade in 1957 Brown encouraged him to enter the previously all-white St. Charles High School. "She really fought to get me into St. Charles," said Shockency. "I'd gone to her for eight grades. She told me, 'You're going! Somebody has to do it.' She helped me cope with it, through thick and thin. I'll never forget; without her doing this, I would never be where I am today."

Shockency said he faced threats and taunts from classmates and other students on the school bus. "I've seen Mary get on that bus many a morning and raise hell with them," Shockency said. "She stood up for her rights and ours, too! She was the one who helped make history here."

Because of the confrontations, he said, he came home crying many times. "She was pushing me. She stayed with me all the way."

Like Shockency, Georgia Spalding said Brown "never met a stranger. She was a very outgoing lady; she would do things for anybody. She was a very good person."

Until her admission to the nursing home last May, Brown enjoyed meeting her former students. "She remembered the kids she had taught; she never forget them. She was proud of how many kids she had touched," said Spalding.

In recent years, after her retirement from teacher, Brown "made this (Pickerill Motor Company) headquarters," said Sonny Pickerill. Her late husband, better known as "Poor Boy," was employed by the auto dealer in 1944 as clean-up person. Together, he and his wife cleaned two Lebanon banks.

"She always said she taught 47 years and five summers," said Pickerill.

"She was a giving person. Kids would come in here and she'd give them money. When she was teaching, she'd see a kid who needed shoes or clothes, and she'd buy them. If a kid needed a haircut, she sent him to the barber. She gave away more money than she saved."

The Lebanon Rotary Club recognized Brown for her years of community service by presenting her the Sam C. May Award.

A member of St. Augustine Church, Brown faithfully attended daily Mass until her recent illness.

practically alone since disposing of her farm fifteen years ago, and had steadfastly declined to make her home with any of her children. However, they visited her almost daily. She was in her usual health Friday and that afternoon spent some time with neighbors, remaining for quite awhile with one who had a sick child.

Her grandson, George Hardesty, following a custom, stopped at Mrs. Buckler's home Saturday morning about 9 o'clock and receiving no response to his known at the front door went to the door at the rear. Again there was no response. Both doors were found locked. Looking through a window he saw Mrs. Buckler sitting in the chair. He tapped on the glass and when she failed to look up he summoned neighbors. Eddie Mattingly pushed open a door and found Mrs. Buckler dead. It is thought she had been dead only a short time.

Mrs. Buckler was born in this county on May 25, 1850, and her marriage to J.W. Buckler, who died in 1898, took place at St. Charles church in 1870. Before her marriage she was Miss Susan V. Mattingly. Ten children were born to the union, four of whom survive. They are Robert Buckler and W.O. Buckler of Loretto, Charles Buckler of Louisville and Mrs. George E. Hardesty of St. Mary. Mrs. Buckler was a faithful member of the Catholic church and a most excellent Christian woman.
