DEATH TAKES GOOD WOMAN – Mrs. W.I. Caldwell Succumbs Following Stroke Suffered Week Before – Funeral at Calvary

Mrs. Elizabeth Ellen Caldwell, 65 years old, wife of W.I. Caldwell, passed away at her home near Calvary Wednesday morning at 1:45 o'clock. Death was due to a stroke of paralysis which she suffered a week before. Her condition since she was stricken had been such as to cause her family and friends much uneasiness and little hope was held for her recovery.

Mrs. Caldwell was a daughter of the late Mark and Louise Abell Thomas and was born in the Calvary section of the county November 10, 1864. She had spent all of her long and useful life in the community where she died and where she had many relatives and friends who were grieved to learn of her death. She was a good Christian woman, a devoted wife and mother and was a consistent member of the Catholic church.

Besides her husband, she is survived by six children, two daughters, Mrs. Len Abell and Miss Elizabeth Caldwell, both of this county, and four sons, Herman, Mark and Ivo Caldwell of this county and Viella Caldwell of Dayton, Ohio. She is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. James R. Wathen and Mrs. Annie Lou Spalding of this county and Mrs. Janie Lockett of Cincinnati and three brothers, Mark and Alfred Thomas of this county and Oscar Thomas of Graves County.

DEATH CLAIMS MAGISTRATE – James E. Caldwell Succumbs To Brain Trouble At Local Hospital – BURIAL THIS MORNING

James E. Caldwell, member of the Marion Fiscal Court and prominent Bradfordsville Pike farmer, succumbed to a brain malady at Elizabeth's Hospital Wednesday evening shortly before 7:00 o'clock. Although he had shown symptoms of the ailment for about a month, he had only been under the care of physicians at the hospital for slightly more than two weeks, during which time he had improved continuously. His recovery was expected until Monday evening when he suffered a recurrence of the trouble and afterward declined rapidly until the end.

Mr. Caldwell was born in this county January 4, 1871, a son of the late James and Emily Jane Abell Caldwell and had spent practically all of his life in the community where he resided at the time of his demise. His elementary education was obtained at the St. Augustine's Parochial School in this city and he later attended the school conducted by the Trappist monks at Gethsemane. When but a youth he became interested in farming and since then had followed that vocation.

On November 24, 1892, he was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth May Lockett, daughter of Blue and Josephine Lockett of Calvary, the ceremony having been performed at Holy Mary's Church there by the Rev. Lynch. His wife survives, along with three daughters and six sons, as follows: Mrs. Phillip Mudd of this county, Mrs. Emmett Spalding of Washington County and Mrs. W. F. Spalding of Dayton, Ohio, and John B., James A. and Lockett Caldwell of this county, Joseph A. and Louis Caldwell of Dayton, Ohio, and Leo Caldwell of New Haven. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Kate Mouser of Perry, Okla.

In 1933, Mr. Caldwell was chosen a member of the Marion Fiscal Court, succeeding John Ryan, and has represented admirably the residents of the Sixth Magisterial District, always seeking to promote the welfare of the largest number of people when he cast his votes on matters pertaining to the county's business. He was a member of the court which authorized the construction of the new Court House.

Mr. Caldwell was an ardent member of the Catholic Church and its teachings were reflected in his high moral character, his fairness in his dealings and his generosity with those less fortunate than himself. Widely known, many learned with regret of his passing.

Funeral services will be conducted this morning at Holy Mary's Catholic Church at Calvary at 9:00 o'clock by the Rev. J.P. Welsh, after which burial will take place in Holy Mary Cemetery.

Death Takes W.I. Caldwell – Well Known Farmer of County Succumbs At His Home Near Calvary MEMBER OF FISCAL COURT

W.I. Caldwell, 64 years old, prominent farmer, died at his home near Calvary Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Death was due to complicated troubles from which he had been suffering for some time. Because of his critical illness for several days prior to his death, the end did not come unexpectedly.

Mr. Caldwell was born in this county on April 30, 1866, the son of James and Emily Abell Caldwell and spent practically all of his active life in the section in which he died. He was a consistent member of the Catholic church and a citizen much interested in the welfare of his community. After having served four years as magistrate of the county, he was re-elected for four additional years. He had served approximately one year of his second term.

On September 24, 1930, his wife, who before her marriage to Mr. Caldwell was Miss Elizabeth Ellen Thomas, passed away of a stroke of apoplexy, and since that time his health had rapidly declined.

Surviving him are two daughters, Miss Elizabeth Caldwell and Mrs. Len Abell of this county, and four sons, Herman, Mark and Ivo Caldwell of this county and Viella Caldwell of Dayton, Ohio.

Funeral services were conducted at Holy Mary's church at Calvary by Rev. Paul Greenwell at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. Interment was in Holy Mary's cemetery.

CALVARY MAN DIED ON LEYTE – Pvt. William Thomas Caldwell, U.S. Army, Killed In Action November 28 – 2 BROTHERS IN SERVICE

Sheriff J.H. Caldwell and Mrs. Caldwell, of Calvary, on Sunday received a wire from the War Department stating that their son, Pvt. William Thomas Caldwell, 24. U.S. Army Infantry, was killed in action on Leyte Island in the Philippines on November 28. The telegram, which did not give details of the soldier's death, said a letter would follow.

Pvt. Caldwell, who was a member of General MacArthur's Thirty-Second Division, went overseas April 20, 1942, and took part in the fighting in New Guinea before being transferred to Leyte. He had never been wounded, but a tropical fever had caused him to be confined to a hospital three times. His parents last had a letter from him five weeks ago, and friends and relatives received Christmas cards sent by V-Mail.

Pvt. Caldwell, born at Calvary January 7, 1920, attended Holy Mary School there. He entered the Army November 27, 1941, and took his basic training at Camp Wolters, Texas, and Fort Devens, Mass. He was never given furlough after his induction, at Fort Benjamin Harrison.

Besides his parents, he is survived by two brothers, both in the service, Pfc. J.H. Caldwell, Jr., U.S. Army Engineers, stationed in Paris, France, and Pfc. James Smith Caldwell, who volunteered for the Army when 17 years old, and who is serving on Leyte. The two brothers there saw each other several times, they wrote their parents. Mrs. Caldwell is the former Miss Myrtle Robinson. The family have the sympathy of all who know them.

A Requiem High Mass for the deceased soldier will be held in Holy Mary Church at Calvary at eight o'clock Friday morning, January 5, by the pastor, the Rev. Father C. Leo Smith.

Motor Wreck Injuries Fatal To City Youth – OTHERS HURT IN COLLISION – Thomas Campbell, 22, Victim Of Accident Sunday Night On Springfield Pike – BURIAL THIS AFTERNOON

Thomas Campbell, 22, son of Dr. T.I. Campbell and Mrs. Campbell and assistant athletic coach at the Lebanon High School the past year, died at 10:05 o'clock Tuesday evening at Elizabeth's Hospital, to which he was admitted shortly before midnight Sunday following a motor accident on the Springfield Pike near that city.

The youth, driving his Plymouth sedan toward Lebanon, was attempting to pass another machine in which four young men from Springfield were returning to their homes, when the cars sideswiped, severing Campbell's left arm which had been resting on the window sill. Both of the vehicles were overturned several times by the impact and were demolished. The crash occurred near the home of Greg Edelen.

Campbell's death, physicians said, was the result of an injury to the brain and from shock. Since the accident he had been mentally normal only at intervals, remaining most of the time in a state of unconsciousness. Dr. Virgil Simpson of Louisville, brain specialist, was called here for consultation with other medical men on the case.

Albert Threlkeld, son of Mrs. Marguerite Threlkeld, and Sam Kirk Crawford, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. S.K. Crawford, were other occupants of the machine in which the three were returning from a trip to Lexington. Threlkeld suffered a lacerated lip, a broken tooth, injuries to his nose and other cuts and bruises but is not in serious condition. Crawford escaped with minor hurts.

The other car, a Hudson 8 coupe, was owned and driven by Kelly Mattingly and with him were Buck Smith, Jack Wiggington and Charles White, all of Springfield. White, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Will White, was the only one of that group whose wounds were of consequence. He sustained a double fracture of the jaw bone and possible injuries to his skull. His condition, however, was not regarded as serious until Tuesday afternoon when blood poisoning developed and he was threatened with lock jaw. He was taken to St. Joseph's Infirmary in Louisville where he was said to be in a critical condition yesterday.

After the collision, Threlkeld was given a ride to Springfield by a passing motorist and after seeking aid to the scene of the wreck received treatment from Dr. J.C. Mudd. Campbell was also removed to Springfield where Dr. H.T. Barnett rendered medical attention and summoned an ambulance from this city to rush him to the local hospital.

The tragic death of young Campbell has cast a pall of gloom over the entire community where he was unusually popular with those of his own age and his elders. He was born at Gravel Switch on April 12, 1913, but moved here with his parents when he was but a child. He attended the Lebanon Public Graded School and the Lebanon High School, finishing his education in this city with the class of 1931. Following his graduation he attended Georgia School of Technology at Atlanta but returned to Kentucky to further his studies at Western Kentucky Teachers College. During the past several summers he has held a position with the Kentucky Utilities Company, and the past Fall assisted Coach Roger F. Cundiff in the management of the L.H.S. football team.

Surviving, other than his parents, is one brother, Harold Drye Campbell.

Coroner Clarence Williams, who was called, held an inquest, the jury holding that death was due to a gunshot wound self-inflicted.

The young man was born April 23, 1905. Until a few months ago he was for several years employed in Louisville and since the death of his mother last December had made his home with his sister. Following the death of his mother he suffered a nervous breakdown and had since been in failing health. His father who died several years ago, was a well known farmer and stock trader. 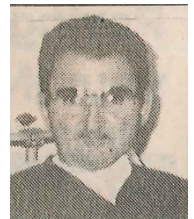

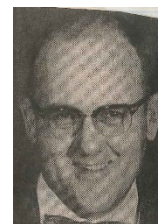

The only other case of the kind ever known in the county was at New Market between forty and fifty years ago when a citizen of that neighborhood died of the malady.

Three Months Developing

Three months ago a valuable collie dog belonging to the father of young Clark went mad. It bit several hogs on the place and also attacked two or three dogs in the neighborhood. It was finally caught and chained. Dr. W.R. Morgan, local veterinarian, was called and after an examination said the dog had the rabies. The hogs bitten were vaccinated and all of the dogs were killed. Mr. Clark's dog was destroyed by young Clark who, after killing it, dragged it by the chain around its neck to the place where it was buried. A slight cut on one of Clark's hands is believed to have become infected from saliva on the chain. The boy was not bitten by the dog. He said so several times shortly before he died, when asked about the matter. Clark, of course, did not know that the slight scratch on his hand had come in contact with saliva on the chain, and as the weeks passed into months the rabies scare on the farm was all but forgotten.

Couldn't Drink Water

Young Clark began to feel badly last Thursday and on Saturday he came to town and consulted a physician. He informed the physician that at times he suffered severe pains in the back of his head and about his spine. He said his throat hurt him and that it was with difficulty he swallowed liquids, especially water. That night the boy was in several business houses and in a number of them he asked for water. In each instance he would suffer a paroxysm when he attempted to swallow it. At one place he said he had not drunk any water for two or three days. He told his physician that he had not been able to sleep well for several nights and that his appetite was failing him.

Delirious At Times

From the time he returned home Saturday evening he grew steadily worse, although at times he was tranquil and seemed to be normal. During the night he aroused the household saying that someone was attempting to steal his car. He was assured he was mistaken, but was not convinced until after a trip to the garage. When delirious he was restrained from becoming destructive with difficulty. Later, after recovering from an attack he would apologize for his conduct and tell those about him he was unable to explain the reason for it. He told members of his family that he suffered intensely.

Monday morning several physicians held a consultation at the Clark home and all agreed that the youth had a fully developed case of hydrophobia. The boy arose that morning and went to the barn to help do the milking, but was persuaded to return to the house with a member of the family. It was only a few hours later that the consultation was held by the physicians and at its conclusion they announced that it was too late to administer the anti-hydrophobia serum. They said the boy would grow worse and die before another day. He passed away at 1:30 o'clock that night.

Members of the family who were with the boy much of the time before he died will take the Pasteur treatment at once as a precautionary measure.

Young Clark was a manly young fellow, of splendid physique and nice appearance. He became 19-years-old on Monday of last week. He was the only son of his parents and some time ago was a student at the local High School. He was a member of the Methodist Church and was very popular with all who knew him. Other than his parents, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. C. Glazebrook and Miss Elizabeth Clark.

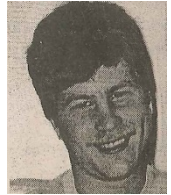

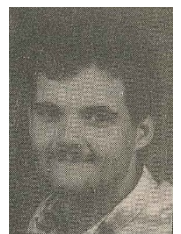

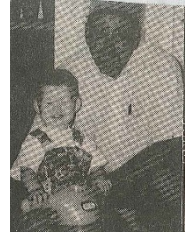

DEATH CLAIMS HUGH COOPER – Prominent Attorney, Formerly Mayor and Representative, Dies at Home Here – FUNERAL ON WEDNESDAY

Judge Hugh Philip Cooper, 71 years old, former State Representative, later Mayor of Lebanon and for more than forty years a prominent attorney at the local bar, died at 9:30 o’clock Monday night at his home on Walnut street, death being due to a combination of troubles. He had been in failing health for several years. Last spring he was stricken seriously ill and had been confined to his bed. His condition in recent weeks had been critical and it was believed that the end was near.

Mr. Cooper was born in this county March 25, 1858, a son of Philip and Cordelia Smith Cooper, both deceased. He received his early education at St. Mary’s College, later graduating from the law school of Notre Dame University, Notre Dame, Indiana. He was admitted to the Lebanon bar in 1882 and had since continuously practiced his profession here. A lifelong Democrat, he was always a leader in the councils of his party. In 1887 he was elected Representative from Marion county in the Kentucky Legislature, and his efficient service won him many friends both in the county and in the state. He served as mayor here for six years, 1920 to 1926, succeeding Martin J. Spalding, who resigned during his term of office to go to Lynch and reside. He had served as a Special Judge in the circuit court here.

Both as a public official and as a private citizen Judge Cooper was highly respected and could be counted upon as an ally in every progressive enterprise for the good of the community, lending his influence and his personal assistance wherever they were needed. He was a gifted speaker and was frequently called upon to champion a cause, his oratory being brought into play as a potent factor in more than one campaign.

In 1902 he was united in marriage to Miss Amelia Pearson, daughter of Isaac Pearson, deceased, and Mrs. Margaret Pearson, of Harrodsburg. She survives; also two sons born of the union, Basil P. Cooper, who is

TWO KILLED IN CAR CRASH HERE – BOTH VICTIMS STUDENTS AT CITY SCHOOLS – Auto Leaves Road at Curve on Springfield Pike Near City Limits – LIGHT POLE SNAPPED OFF

Russell Edward Cooper, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam J. Cooper of New Market, and Howard G. Sapp, Jr., 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard G. Sapp of this city, were fatally hurt Saturday night at 9:30 o'clock when the machine in which they were riding left the road at the curve on the Springfield pike at the city limits, ran for fifty feet on the walk next to the fence in front of the home of Chester Rowe and then crashed into an electric light pole. The pole was snapped off, and the demolished car was carried by momentum a distance of fifty feet further down the street before coming to a stop. Miss Dixie Sapp, 14 years old, sister of the boy fatally hurt, was the third occupant of the machine. She was in the front seat with Cooper, who was driving, while young Sapp, who was known to his companions as "Buster" Sapp, was in the rear seat. The car was a Model A Ford coach, the property of Cooper's father.

Persons living near the scene heard the crash and went to the assistance of the victims. All three of the motorists were thrown out of the car. Cooper was picked up unconscious across the street, twenty-five feet from the machine, while Sapp, also unconscious, was in the street some ten or twelve feet from the auto. The girl is thought to have been thrown through the windshield. She landed on the sidewalk. The three were taken to Elizabeth's Hospital in an ambulance summoned soon after the accident. Both boys died without regaining consciousness, Cooper passing away at 11 o'clock and Sapp at 1 o'clock. Examination disclosed that the girl was not seriously hurt. She was bruised and cut about the face and body and four teeth were knocked out. She was removed to the home of her parents on Forest street the next day and is rapidly recovering. She is a member of the Freshman class at the local High School.

Just what caused the machine to leave the road is not known. The curve is a gradual one, and it is believed that the car was traveling at a high rate of speed. It was coming toward town. The driver after leaving the road had evidently tried to get back on the highway. The front of the car did not strike the pole head-on and was the least damaged part of the auto. The top was torn off and the whole of the left side was a caved in tangled mass of twisted steel. All the glass was shattered, and just how the girl escaped death is difficult to understand after viewing the wreck. The print of one's teeth marks the windshield frame, and it is thought she was thrown against it before being hurled to the ground. Following the accident, it was said that Cooper had recently been heard to say that one of the rear tires was in weak condition and the fact that the left rear tire was off the wheel after the crash led some believe that it may have blown out and caused the driver to lose control. The demolished car was removed to a local garage where it was viewed by very large crowds. The electric light pole broken off was one that had been set a short time ago, having replaced an older one. A section of the town was in darkness for several hours after the incident.

Cooper, son of Sam and Virgie Wise Cooper, was born September 20, 1912. He, too, was a member of the Freshman class at the High School in this city, although he lived with his parents at New Market. Funeral services for him were held at Muldraugh's Hill Baptist church Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, conducted by

the Rev. W.C. Hundley. Burial was in the church cemetery. The pallbearers were Willard Sapp, Thomas Harmon, Harold Graham, Freeman Parrott, Thomas Avritt, Stanley Richards and Lloyd Henderson. Bradfordsville Boy Who Gave His Life for His Country

One of Marion County's sons who gave his life in battle was awarded one of the highest honors awarded by this country for extraordinary heroism in action.

The great honor was won by Private Edgar L. Cox, of Bradfordsville. The official citation by the war department reads:

"Private Edgar L. Cox, deceased, Machine Gun Company, 120 Infantry (A.S. 1930555) for extraordinary heroism in action near Bellicourt, France, September 29, 1918. With five other soldiers Private Cox succeeded in breaking up three machine gun nests, and capturing eight prisoners under heavy artillery and machine gun fire. After his platoon had reached its objective, he and four others volunteered and made a reconnaissance 660 yards in front of the line to make sure that the valley beyond was clear of the enemy. Private Cox has since been killed in action. Next of kin, Matthew Cox, father, Bradfordsville, Kentucky."

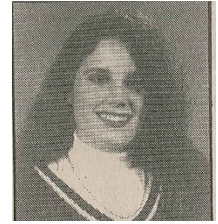

Jessica Craig loved animals. She wanted to be a veterinarian.

"She was crazy about cats and horses, especially Mustang Sally, a mustang that we got through an adoption program," said her father, Charles A. Craig Jr. of Lebanon.

"She had a ton of cats," said close friend Joni Shively, "and Penny, whom she found in the J.C. Penney parking lot in Campbellsville, was a special one."

"She loved Hank, the family dog," Joni said.

Joni's best friend, Jessica, a 14-year-old freshman at Marion County High School, died at 9:25 a.m. Saturday, April 12, in Kosair Children's Hospital in Louisville from injuries suffered in a highway accident last Wednesday afternoon.

It's the second highway fatality in Marion County this year.

Jessica, a pedestrian, was struck by a car in front of her home on Ky. 49 (Loretto Road), five-and-a-half miles north of Lebanon, around 4:35.

She was reportedly walking to the mailbox when the accident occurred.

A 1985 Cadillac, traveling north, was driven by Gloria O'Bryan, 48, of Loretto.

When the driver "observed a pedestrian step out into the road, she swerved to miss her and struck her," said a state police report.

Jessica suffered multiple injuries and was taken by ambulance to Columbia Spring View Hospital in Lebanon. Then she was flown by an emergency medical helicopter crew to Kosair Children's Hospital.

"I loved her so much," said Joni Shively, a sophomore at MCHS. "She had a personality that shined. She was such a happy person, and was always smiling.

"Jessica was really into music. She loved to talk. She liked art and reading."

Joni said she saw her about an hour before the accident happened, "and she was as cheerful as ever."

"Jessica was a beautiful person inside and out," said Mary Gardner, principal at St. Augustine School, who taught Jessica. "She was a good student, a cheerleader, a wonderful child, who would do whatever you asked her to do."

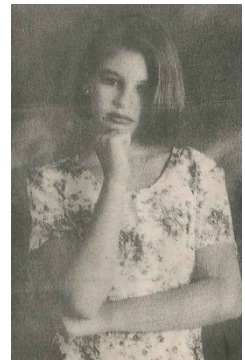

Woman and Child Die in Creek Near Raywick

Tying her fourteen-months old baby daughter, Virginia, securely to her waist, Mrs. Mary Cross, wife of Tom Cross, who lives a few miles from Raywick, jumped into the waters of Praters Creek Sunday night and the next morning their lifeless bodies were recovered by the husband and the 9-year-old son who had instituted a search for them. Worry over family affairs is said to have been responsible for the tragedy, which has caused much sorry throughout the section where the family lived and was well known.

Coroner T.G. McElroy, who was summoned, held an inquest the verdict of the jury being that the woman had committed suicide, first having tied the child to her own body with her apron that it might die with her.

The water where the woman took her life is said to have been only eighteen inches deep.

Early Sunday night, according to testimony given at the inquest, Mrs. Cross with her baby daughter left home. When she learned that her 9-year-old son was following her, she returned to the house. Later during the night she again left the house with the baby, but at just what time is not known. When it was learned that she was missing her husband and son began a search which lead to the discovery of the bodies in the creek, about 300 yards from the house.

Later in the day a note was found at the house, which evidently had been written by Mrs. Cross a short time before taking her life. It was read to the Coroner's jury. In it she gave instructions about the care of her children and expressed the hope that her husband would quit drinking. "I am going to take my own life, Tom dear, in order to save you from doing anything rash and to show you how much I love you," the note said in part. "You will find me by the water gate. I can't leave my baby. It is hard to leave the other children, bless their dear hearts, but they won't forget Mamma. Don't drink another drop of liquor of any kind, dear, and do all you can to help the children become good, honest useful citizens."

Mrs. Cross was about 40 years old and formerly lived in Hilldale, Ill. With her husband and children she moved to this county some two or three years ago purchasing a farm from Tom Thompson. Her marriage to Mr. Cross took place about sixteen years ago. Other than her husband she is survived by four children.

The body was taken to her old home at Hilldale, Ill., Tuesday for burial.
