Friends bid farewell to Gaddie

An overflowing crowd in Raywick's St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church last Thursday morning showed how much Bobbi Lou Gaddie was loved.

"She was loved by everybody who ever met her," said Kathy Walls, an honorary pallbearer, after Bobbi Lou's funeral. "She and I were best friends. She was really outgoing and so easy to get along with. She was voted 'Most Outgoing' of the 1994 Senior Class. We're all going to miss her tremendously."



The 17-year-old Marion County High School senior died at 8 a.m., Tuesday, Jan. 11, 1994, in a one-car accident on KY 84, seven-tenths of a mile west of Raywick. She was pronounced dead at the accident scene by Marion County Coroner Junie Mattingly.

Gaddie, driving a 1979 Ford Mustang, was travelling east on KY 84 when the accident occurred. She reportedly lost control of her car on an icy bridge. The car ran off the road and struck a tree, according to the Kentucky State Police, who investigated. She was not wearing a seat belt.

"She wore a seat belt some of the time and she fussed at me to wear mine," said Kathy Walls, who rode to school with Bobbi Lou every day.

Gaddie was en route to Walls' residence when the accident happened. There were no passengers in the car, which was extensively damaged.

Bobbi Lou, daughter of Robert Louis and Connie Caldwell Gaddie, of Jed Gaddie Road, Raywick, was a member of the MCHS Student Council, the International Club, and TSA, a graphic arts club. She was also an employee of Henning's Restaurant in downtown Lebanon.

"She was an extremely bright student, one of the more capable students I've ever had," said Lesa Buckler, an accounting teacher at MCHS. "She always exhibited a very gentle spirit, yet was always very thoughtful with a special gift of insight. She had talent and she used it. Bobbi Lou was a beautiful girl. We're going to feel the loss of her all year at school."

Following high school graduation, Kathy Walls said she and Bobbi Lou had planned to attend either the University of Kentucky or Lexington Community College and room together.

Responding to the accident were Raywick Fire Department emergency medical technicians, the Marion County Rescue Squad, personnel from Marion County Emergency Medical Services and the KSP.

Bobbi Lou Gaddie was born in Marion County on July 21, 1976. She was preceded in death by a sister, Leslie Ann Gaddie.

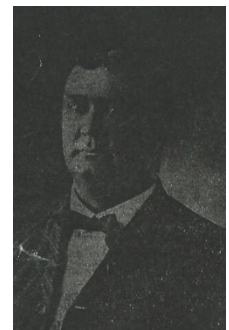

Henry Gartin Dies Suddenly White Home Seated in Chair, Former Sheriff Was In Fine Health Until Receiving Fatal Stroke, News Shocks Community

Henry C. Gartin, one of the county's most popular citizens, died suddenly at his home near Bradfordsville Monday afternoon soon after 12 o'clock. Death was due to apoplexy and came with tragic suddenness. He seemingly was in the best of health and the news that he was dead came as a profound shock to the entire community.

A few years ago Mr. Gartin was in bad health, and for a while his recovery was thought very improbable. He spent some time in Florida and also at Vossburg, Miss., and during the months following his return home he gradually improved. A year or so ago he had entirely recovered, and in recent months he seemed to enjoy unusually good health. Only a week or so ago while in town he spoke of his recovery, stating that it was difficult for him to understand. He said he had completely regained his former health and that he felt as well as he ever had at any time in his life.

Monday morning he was out on his farm looking after some sheep that he had shortly before sold and was preparing to deliver. He returned to the house about noon, and after eating a hearty dinner went into the

living room to look over a paper. The summons came while sitting in a chair, the first anyone knew of his illness being when he suddenly fell forward to the floor. Life was extinct when those who ran to his assistance reached him.

Mr. Gartin was a son of S.H. and Nancy Thornton Gartin, deceased, and was born on a farm in the Bradfordsville section 59 years ago. With the exception of about ten years he spent in Montgomery, Ala., he was all his life a resident of the county and practically all of the while was engaged in farming. When a young man he was associated with his father in handling mules for the Southern market, and during the time he lived in Montgomery he conducted a commission stable, dealing in mules on a large scale. He returned to this country from Montgomery in 1904.

Soon after his return from Alabama Mr. Gartin entered politics. Possessing the happy faculty of easily making and retaining friends, he was successful. He made the race for Sheriff and was elected for four years. Later he was again elected to the position and served another term of four years. During the eight years he held the office he discharged his duties most efficiently and in a manner highly satisfactory to his constituency. He was elected Representative in the Legislature from this county in 1909, and it was after he had complete his term in the Legislature that he was elected Sheriff the second time. He had held no public office since completing his second term as Sheriff. Mr. Gartin was a staunch Democrat and always took an active interest in the welfare of the party. He was a true and loyal friend, and friends in need of assistance never called upon him in vain. No man in the community, perhaps, was more universally popular.

Big of stature and big of heart, with a jovial disposition, he stood out in any gathering of men. He spoke only good of his fellow man, and there is no one who knew him who did not like him and who were not grieved to learn of his sudden passing.

Mr. Gartin is survived by his wife who was Miss Elsie Minor, of Boyle County, to whom he was married on April 14, 1904, a short time after his return from Alabama. She has been in poor health for some time. No children were ever born to them. Two sisters, Mrs. C.C. Reynierson and Mrs. John J. Cozatt, of this city, also survive. George Gartin, a brother, died about seven years ago, while a sister, Mrs. Eliza Head, passed away about four years ago. One other sister, Mrs. Janie Dunn, died many years ago.

The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. James C. Rawlings, of Owensboro, a life-long friend of Mr. Gartin, conducting the services at the residence in the presence of a large number of friends. Burial was in Old Liberty cemetery. The pallbearers were: D.O. Burke, James T. Avritt, George Kirkland, James Kirkland, Sam E. Mills, Willis Shreve, James Purdom and Lee Rogers.

On Sunday morning last our people were startled by the announcement of the death of Stephen H. Gartin, of the Bradfordsville district. He had been a sufferer for some time with heart trouble and his death at any time for many months might have been reasonably expected, and yet it came as a shock to all.

There were few men more generally known and more generally respected and loved than was S.H. Gartin. He was a truly representative citizen, a kind and loving husband, an affectionate and indulgent father, and a faithful friend.

He was one of Marion County's most successful farmers and traders, and in his home was always glad to greet his friends with a cordiality and good cheer beyond description.

Col. Coburn Gayle Dies of Long Illness; Funeral Wednesday

Col. F. Coburn Gayle, Sr., (U.S. Army Ret.) died at the home of his mother, Mrs. Clarence Gayle, 514 Logan Street, last night at the age of 61 after several months illness.

Funeral services will be conducted Wednesday at 2 p.m. in Rogers Chapel by the Rev. James Shepherd, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

Col. Gayle owned and operated Frankfort's oldest business establishment, Geo. W. Gayle & Son, which manufactures precision parts for aircraft and airborne equipment. He assumed ownership of the business following the death of his father, Clarence Gayle, in 1948.

A graduate of Frankfort High School and Mississippi A&M (now University of Mississippi), Col. Gayle was aboard the first convoy to leave the United States for Europe during World War II. His tour of duty covered seven years and the African and European theatres of war.

Col. Gayle entered the National Guard in 1929 and was placed on active duty in 1941. He took part in six major invasions and was placed on Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's staff in the European operations.

At the end of World War II, Col. Gayle became Military Governor of Trieste, the central government for a large section of southeastern Europe. He later was named Claims Commissioner in Germany to handle restoration and damage claims.

On his return to the United States in 1949, Col. Gayle became Executive Officer of the Kentucky District while stationed at Fort Knox, and held the same post for the Pennsylvania District while stationed in Philadelphia. He retired from the Army in 1961, after 31 years services, with the rank of Colonel.

Col. Gayle became the fourth generation owner of Geo. W. Gayle & Son when he took over operation of the business in 1948. The business was established in 1855, some 20 years before any other business now in operation in Frankfort began.

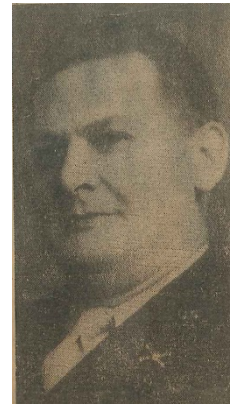
Geo. W. Gayle & Son started as a manufacturer of watches and fine fishing reels, some of the fishing reels made of silver and jewels selling as high as \$500 each.

In a quiet and efficient way, Geo. W. Gayle & Son has contributed vastly to the country's efforts during four wars. During World War II the plant manufactured highly secret precision parts for the first atomic bomb, the Norden Bomb Sight and for torpedoes.

When production on the first J-47 jet engine, used in the F-86 Sabre Jet, became bogged down during the Korean War, Geo W. Gayle & Son broke the bottleneck to help shorten that war. After all the major manufacturing companies in the United States had failed, Geo. W. Gayle & Son developed a small part for the engine which increased production over 1,000 per cent.

A lifelong member of the First Methodist Church of Frankfort, Col. Gayle was very active in church affairs and was chairman of the official board. He was a member of Frankfort Rotary Club.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Clarence Gayle; one son, F. Coburn Gayle, Jr.; three grandchildren, Dianna, Michael, and Sara Beth; two sisters, Mrs. Carl Norman of Frankfort and Mrs. John C. Fuss of Frankfort and Naples, Fla.; and one brother, H.K. Gayle of Frankfort.

Machine Leaves Road At Curve On Loretto Pike Early Wednesday Night – LOOSE ROCK IS BLAMED

Miss Mabel Gibson, 18 years old, was instantly killed Wednesday night shortly after 8 o'clock when the machine in which she was riding went off the Lebanon and Loretto pike a short distance from town, turned over and crashed into some locust trees. Four others in the car, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Ferrell who live on Bradfordsville pike near this city and Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Jarvis of Harrodsburg, were injured. Of these Mrs. Ferrell was the most seriously hurt. At Elizabeth's Hospital where the injured were taken after the accident it was said yesterday that she was resting easily. Dr. H.R. Wilber, the attending physician, stated that the seriousness of her hurts could not yet be determined. She sustained no broken bones, he said. Her injuries are about the body and limbs. She is a daughter of Tom Thompson, Raywick farmer.

The accident happened at the sharp curve near the home of W.A. Clark where the road leading to Loretto leaves the St. Mary's pike. Several wrecks have occurred there in the past but the one Wednesday night is the first in which a person has been killed. Loose rock on the road, which is thought to have been largely responsible for the fatal accident. According to Mrs. Clark, who happened to be at the front door of her home only a short distance away and saw the accident. The machine, which was driven by Mr. Ferrell, went off the road as it rounded the curve, turned over and landed against some trees. Mrs. Clark went to the scene and rendered what assistance she could. She called a physician and also ambulances and continued to minister to the injured until help arrived. The body of Miss Gibson was brought to Bosley's funeral home, which the other occupants of the wrecked car were taken to Elizabeth's Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis, neither of whom was badly hurt, were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Ferrell. They were on the rear seat with Miss Gibson. Mrs. Ferrell was in front with her husband. Mr. Ferrell received painful hurts about the body and arms, while the unfortunate girl suffered a skull fracture. The party were on their way to Raywick.

The machine, a practically new Chevrolet coach, was demolished.

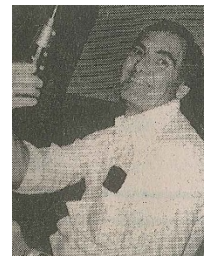

Farmer Ends Life Monday

Oscar Grayson, Despondent Over Ill Health, Hangs Self in Barn - Sons Discover Body

Oscar Grayson, 54-year-old Danville Pike farmer, ended his own life Monday afternoon about 2:30 o'clock by hanging himself from a rafter in a tobacco barn just across the Danville highway from his home at the junction of the Penick Road six miles from Lebanon. He was believed to have been dead approximately thirty minutes when the discovery was made by his two sons, Kermit and Ralph Grayson.

According to report, Mr. Grayson had been in ill health for nearly two years and had brooded considerably over his condition. On several occasions he had expressed his contemplation of suicide and is said to have made his most recent threat before his family Sunday. Because of his highly nervous state Monday, he had declined to assist in stripping tobacco as usual at noon and shortly before 2:00 o'clock had visited a small building near the residence where his sons and others were engaged in the leaf-stripping operation. He remained by a brief time and was not seen alive afterward.

Coroner Kobert Borders, who conducted an inquest and returned a verdict of suicide, stated that Mr. Grayson had apparently climbed to the fourth tier of the barn and had there attached the No. 10 wire rope to a rafter just over the driveway. His body was about ten feet from the floor when it was found.

A native of Clairfield, Tenn., Mr. Grayson was a son of I.C. Grayson and the late Mrs. Lucinda Teague Grayson, who expired in Kelso, Washington, in 1936. He obtained his education in Tennessee and twenty-six years ago was united in marriage to Miss Bertha Miller of Clairfield, who survives him. The family moved to Marion County in 1920 and had been making their home at the present location, known as the Burton property, owned by Mrs. Sam May, for the past fourteen years. Had Mr. Grayson lived until December 26, he would have celebrated another birthday anniversary.

Surviving other than his wife and two sons, Kermit and Ralph Grayson, are his father who resides at New Market; two daughters, Miss Thelma Grayson of this city and Miss Dorothy Grayson, who lives at home, and another son, Hubert Grayson of Ohio. CHARLES GREEN NOW DECEASED – Navy Gives Pronouncement Of Death Through Letter To Yeoman’s Mother

Charles Putnam Green, Y 2/c, U.S. Navy, has been officially pronounced dead by the Navy Department. Notification to his mother, Mrs. W.S. Green, arrived Monday in a letter signed by James Forrestal, Secretary of the Navy. He had been listed as missing in action since June 19, 1944, when the LST on which he served was engaged in invasion operations between England and the Normandy beaches.

Secretary Forrestal’s letter provides some information regarding the fate of Yeoman Green’s vessel. It states that weather conditions complicated the movement of the convoys across the English Channel and that small craft had difficulty in holding positions in the mine-swept lanes.

Vessel Struck Mine

“Your son was serving aboard LST-523 when that craft, acting as part of a shuttle force after the initial landing, struck a mine and sank shortly thereafter. Survivors were rescued by a nearby ship. Your son could not be accounted for among the survivors and in the absence of conclusive evidence of death, he was placed on the missing status... In view of the length of time that has elapsed without any indication that he survived, I am reluctantly forced to the conclusion that he is deceased,” the message said.

Yeoman Green was born in this city on December 20, 1915, a son of Mrs. Nell P. Green and the late Dr. W.S. Green, and was graduated from St. Augustine’s High School. He attended Western Teachers College and Business University at Bowling Green. For some time he was employed by the E.I. Dupont Co. in Louisville and afterward was transferred by the firm to Wilmington, Del., where he was clerical supervisor in the expediting department at the time he enlisted in the Navy on September 29, 1943.

Home In February, 1944

He took his basic training at Bainbridge, Md., and made his last visit home in February, 1944, shortly before going overseas. His wife, to whom he was married in May, 1943, is the former Miss Teresa Maguire, and the couple have one son, Charles, Jr., born in August, 1944. Both are visiting his mother here but will return tomorrow to Wilmington.

A memorial mass for Yeoman Green will be held at St. Augustine’s Church here next Thursday morning at 6:30 o’clock.

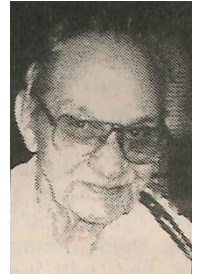
