### **Injury Fatal to Veteran, 91 – C.B. McCauley of Raywick Dies as a Result of a Fall, Hip Fracture, Life Spent in County.**

Charles Browning McCauley, 91 years old, for many years a well known resident of the Raywick community, died Saturday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at the Boldrick Infirmary in this city, as the result of a fall at his home of June 19th in which he suffered a fractured hip. He had been seated in a chair on the porch and fell as he attempted to rise. Members of the family rushed to his aid, a physician was summoned and he was brought to the hospital here. On account of his advanced age, however, little hope was held for his recovery and the end did not come unexpectedly.

Mr. McCauley, who was known to his friends as "Uncle Jack" McCauley, was a veteran of the Civil War, having served three years in the Kentucky Regiment under Capt. John T. Milburn and was one of the last survivors.

He was born in this county February 20, 1840, a son of Pius and Elinora Bowling McCauley, and all his life, with the exception of his army service, was spent in and around the Raywick section. His wife, Mrs. Jemima Mattingly McCauley, preceded him to the grave twenty-one years ago.

Eight children survive, six daughters and two sons. They are Lavel and Aloysius McCauley of Raywick. (1931)

### **Louisville man's body found in river, buried in Lebanon**

The body of Thomas E. McCauley, Louisville, was recovered from the Ohio River at approximately 6 p.m. on April 10 in Louisville.

McCauley, 40, was found inside of his automobile at the bottom of the boat ramp which leads to the Ohio River next to the McAlpine Locks and Dam, according to the Louisville police report.

McCauley was buried Monday at Ryder Cemetery beside his parents, Robert L. McCauley Sr. and Phoebe Mayes Glazebrook McCauley, who lived in Lebanon.

An autopsy was performed on McCauley's body on April 11 and cause of death was consistent to drowning.

McCauley lived in Portland which is outside of Louisville. He was an employee of Louisville Stagehands Union.

The automobile was spotted by a worker in the area. The employee of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers saw the trunk lid bobbing in the water.

A spokesman from the police department said when the locks of an automobile are open, it causes the water level to drop which caused the trunk lid to open.

McCauley is survived by a sister, Janice M. Meyer; brothers Robert L., Joseph G. and Stephen B. McCauley; and his girlfriend, Deborah D. Newton.

The Louisville police does not suspect any foul play but continue to investigate the incident.

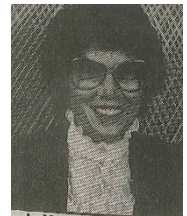

### **Deaths**

Died, at his residence, in Springfield, Ky., at 8:45 o'clock a.m., Sept. 25, 1886, Mr. Anthony McElroy. A general break down of his health occurred which developed into a case of senile pneumonia. All the members of the family had been present with him in the old home for about two weeks except the son, Hugh, who is in Europe. Thus surrounded by his loved ones the father of ten children, forty-two grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren, quietly, peacefully and almost painlessly passed away.

A. McElroy was born March 17, 1797, and had been a citizen of this town since early youth and was thus the oldest citizen in years and by residence. His father, John McElroy, named the town. The first county court was organized in his father's house. An order of the first court ever held in the county is, "The negro cabin opposite Mr. McElroy's brick kitchen shall be the county jail until further ordered." This was in 1792, only 5 years before the birth of Anthony and 3 before the birth of his brother, Hugh. These two boys began an active business career in the early morning of the country's history, and for half a century were the leading business men of the county. During all this time they knew almost no individual property interests. Everything was bought, sold and held as H. & A. McElroy. Their success was almost as remarkable as their brotherly devotion. Sober and industrious, vigilant in business, always honest, as a matter of consequence they were soon found in the lead of every enterprise that built upon society. Mr. Anthony McElroy was one of the charter members of the Masonic Lodge of this place. He was initiated on St. Patrick's Day, March 17, 1818, and was at his death probably the oldest Mason in the United States. He helped organize the first Sabbath-school in the county, assisted Messrs. Elias Davidson and Nathan Hall as Presbyterian elders and Rev. Barnaba McHenry of the M.E. Church to organize the Washington County Bible Society, which the records show to be the first auxiliary to the parent society at Philadelphia. He was elected an Elder in the Presbyterian Church Christmas Day, 1828, along with John Hughes and Steven C. Browne. Thus Mr. McElroy was identified actively with all the early history of this place. His death serves the last link that binds us to the past century. A complete review of his relations to the social, religious and commercial world would involve a history of the town. It will be but a few years until the honest recital of the life and labors of such a merchant as he actually was will sound stranger than any romance. Mr. Anthony McElroy was married to Miss Nancy Garland Rice. She was a lovely Christian woman of universally good and tender spirit. Of this marriage eleven children were born, and except the death of one infant no death has occurred in the family except that of the mother, October 23, 1864, until his own. He was

buried from the Presbyterian Church on last Sunday morning. The church was draped in mourning for its oldest member and officer. The Elders of Springfield and Pleasant Grove churches and some special friends were the pall bearers. Rev. Miles Saunders, D.D., preached an elegant sermon. The large crowd, the profound silence and the generally solemn bearing of all present combined to pay a high tribute of respect to the venerable father to express the sympathy felt for his family.

### **Heart Attack Is Fatal to H.S. McElroy – Circuit Judge, Centre Trustee, Stricken At Office In Lebanon**

Circuit Judge Henry S. McElroy died at his home here shortly after 10 o'clock tonight. He was stricken suddenly by a heart attack before noon while at his office.

Judge McElroy was able to walk to an adjoining office, where a doctor was summoned, who took his patient to the Judge's home.

Prominent in Democratic politics of Kentucky, Judge McElroy, who was 57 years old, held public office most of his active life. He was active in Masonic affairs of the State, holding various official positions within that lodge, and was a member of the board of trustees of Centre College.

He was also an active member of the Presbyterian Church, being a member of the Board of Deacons of the church at Lebanon.

#### **Successor to Thurman**

When stricken today, Judge McElroy was preparing to leave for Greensburg to close the business of the Circuit Court session there. His judicial district, the eleventh, embraced the counties of Marion, Washington, Taylor and Green. He was elected Circuit Judge in November, 1927, succeeding the late I.H. Thurman, of Springfield, who died several weeks ago.

Judge McElroy was born near Bowling Green in 1873, the son of Samuel G. McElroy and Ellen Skiles McElroy. While he was a boy, his parents moved to a farm near Lebanon. He was graduated from Ogden College at Bowling Green in 1893, received his liberal arts degree from Centre College in 1895, and his law degree from the same institution in 1897.

#### **Member of the State Senate**

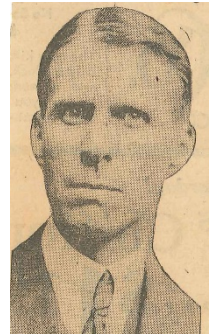
Soon after his graduation he began the practice of law in Lebanon, was city attorney several years, and served as county attorney of Marion for fourteen years. From 1924 to 1926 he served as a member of the Kentucky Senate.

He was a past grand master of the Kentucky Grand Lodge of Masons, past commander of the Marion Commandery of Knights Templar, trustee of the Old Masons Home, near Shelbyville, and past director of the Masonic Widows and Orphans' Home, Louisville.

In October, 1897, he married Miss Annie Bruce, who survives him. They had no children. He is also survived by two brothers, Samuel G. McElroy and Hervey McElroy, both of St. Augustine, Fla., and six sisters, Mrs. G. Bruce Edelen and Mrs. Cleaver Crawford, both of Lebanon; Mrs. Samuel Gregory and Mrs. Elnora Smith, both of Chicago; Mrs. B.A. Bolton, Gainesville, Fla., and Mrs. B. L. Lambert, Plant City, Fla.

Although funeral arrangements have not been completed services probably will be held here Sunday afternoon.

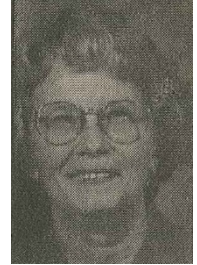

### **Child Killed at Jessetown – Joseph K. Mann, 2 ½ Years Old, Dies Instantly When Hit By Lumber Truck**

In an effort to avoid the accident, Updyke steered the conveyance into a ditch on the right side of the road and, although it was not traveling at a rapid rate of speed, eleven panels of fence were mowed down before the heavy load could be brought to a halt. The truck was badly damaged. The protruding rack of the machine knocked the little fellow to the ground and he suffered a crushed skull and a broken left leg. He was dead when Mr. Mann rushed to him and carried him from the highway. The truck was one of a motorcade en route from Columbia to Frankfort with the lumber.

Updyke, who with Ray McAllister, a helper, was in the cab of the vehicle at the time, was exonerated of any responsibility for the tragedy by the children's father, it was learned after Coroner Kobert Borders conducted an investigation and pronounced death due to an unavoidable accident.

### **Sr. Albina survived by many friends**

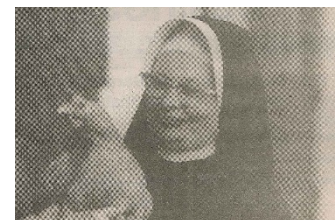
On nights when the temperature dipped below 40 degree, basement rooms of the motherhouse became cathouses.

Sister Albina tried to work secretly at night. But most residents knew what she was doing. She was finding shelter and rounding up blankets for her beloved cats.

Sister Albina Martowlos, often called the St. Francis of Assisi of the Loretto Motherhouse because of her affection and care for animals, died on Wednesday of last week at the age of 79.

Born in Newark, N.J., on April 18, 1917, Albina was the second oldest in a family of four girls.

When she was five, the family moved to a small rural community in upstate New York.

Her mother died when she was 16 and, as the oldest child still living at home, she had the most responsibility for the home and her younger sisters,

Albina served in the Waves of the U.S. Navy during World War II. She wanted to travel to Rome and Lourdes.

But in the service, she was trained to be a beautician and sent to California where she stayed.

The first thing she did after being discharged from the service was travel to Lourdes and Rome. She wanted to live it up before entering the convent.

She moved to Detroit where she met a priest, Father Mark, who directed her to the Sisters of Loretto. Sister Albina entered the novitiate in February 1951 and was professed on Aug. 15, 1953.

She had devotion to The Blessed Mother Mary, and was faithful in praying the rosary.

Friday, following a 7 p.m. wake service in the motherhouse church, friends gathered to celebrate Sister Albina's life.

Soft drinks and cookies, pretzels, peanuts and caramel popcorn were served.

Sister Albina, in her black habit, which she never relinquished, had a little toy kitten resting beside her in her white coffin.

Most of the reminiscing in the room centered around cat stories.

Sister Carol Ann, a nurse who was with her when she died, read "The Prayer of the Cat" from the book, *Prayers from the Ark*.

She also read a letter of appreciation from "26 feline friends."

"We appreciated you salvaging the old posts and building us a fenced-in area to play in so we could stay out of Mother Superior's hair," the letter said.

"We thank you for taking us to the veterinarian for our shots and giving us medicine when we were sick. We thank you for giving us pellets and fresh water every day, and twice on the real hot days.

"Sister Albina, we especially appreciated you going beyond the call of duty as our caretaker, when you would sneak us some good people food of the cafeteria when the other nosey sisters were not looking. We all know you put your life on the line when you brought us all those goodies.

"We know God had a reason for you to stay in the habit because of the big pockets they had in them.

"Sister Albina, at your funeral, do you care if we all meow together to the hymn, 'How Great Thou Art' for you? Only we will sing our own verse of 'How Great Sister Albina Was.'"

She had more than 26 feline friends. In the last week of her life, Sister Albina counted her cats for the first time. There were 39. One died the day she died.

In April 1992, she wrote, "Being in good health and of sound mind, I will all my cats and ducks to Susan Scott."

"She was crazy, just like me," said Susan, Friday evening. "We were similar in many, many ways. That's why we connected. But we had our ups and downs, too."

"Her relationship with people was not the same as it was with animals. But in the last few months, I saw a real change. She was the most compassionate sister I've ever seen in those last few months."

Sister Albina worried about the baby ducklings, and tried to keep them out of the water until they were two weeks old.

Hearing complaints about the mess the ducks were making on the picnic table, Sister Albina accepted the responsibility of keeping a bucket of water nearby to swab the deck.

She tried to keep all the grasshoppers alive, and she carefully carried bugs out of the church so they continue you live.

In a letter to Linda Peeno, a friend from Louisville, Sister Albina talked about heaven being divided into two sections: one for those who love animals and one for those who do not. And of course, the animal-lovers side is the place God stays, Sister Albina explained.

After all, we are all God's creatures, and God would want to be with those who most loved us all," said Linda, on the Saturday morning of Sister Albina's funeral. "So I imagine that out Sister Albina is there now, already at work in some heavenly task with God."

Her life is a great metaphor for each of us, said Linda.

"God gives us all unique and important work to do. Often it is difficult to accomplish, and many around us do not understand. We may even be irritant to the persons who must tolerate the tasks we assume. Yet, if it is God's work, the God finds the ways for us to endure."

"Sister Albina took her love of cats, and her call to care for them, as God's command," she continued. "Whatever one may think about the merits of this, she did it with great attention and devotion... My last memory of her is a night last fall when small cries were coming from some place where a cat had gotten trapped. Sister Albina was working in the dark and the cold to rescue it."

She would go several times daily, "through cold, snow, rain, wind and heat," to give them food and water, Linda said.

"I am certain God has welcomed Sister Albina," said Linda. "And if the spirits of God's creatures go to heaven, she has many friends with her there now. Meanwhile, for those of us who remain here, we must go about God's work with as much love and vigor as I have been shown by Sister Albina."

"From quarks to cats, we are all God's creatures. And I believe God loves each of us in the same way Sister Albina loved her cats."

### LONG ILLNESS ENDS IN DEATH – Heart Trouble Is Fatal To George Mattingly At Home Tuesday – WAS 78 YEARS OF AGE

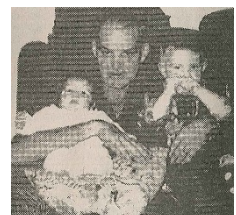

### **ONE KILLED IN FATAL CRASH – Joseph M. Mattingly Meets Tragic Death On Way to Employment – MACHINE CARRIED 60 FEET**

One man was fatally injured and another painfully hurt last Friday morning shortly before seven o'clock when the machine in which they were driving from their homes at Calvary to work at the Burley Tobacco Warehouse here, was struck by the fast L.&N. passenger train No. 24 at a crossing in the eastern part of town.

Joseph Martin Mattingly, 44 years old, who for the past six years has been weigher at the warehouse, suffered a broken neck and died Friday afternoon about five o'clock at Boldrick's Infirmary, where he was taken immediately following the accident. His companion, Joseph Bohannon, 35, owner and driver of the car, sustained a badly wrenched back and also suffered from shock, but his injuries are not believed to be of a serious nature.

Three other men, Allen Mattingly, James Brussells and Thomas Ryan, who were also on their way to work at the warehouse, found the victims and the bits of wreckage which had been the Ford touring car they were driving some distance from the crossing on the side street leading to the warehouse and the Lebanon Oak Flooring Co. The car had been carried about sixty feet down the track by the engine and then thrown to one side as it struck a switch light post and broke off.

According to Mr. Bohannon, he and Mr. Mattingly were watching the Greensburg train No. 48 as it slowed down, apparently to take the "Y," and failed to see the express, which is due in Lebanon at 5:41, and was running over an hour late. Several houses on the side street also prevented their seeing the oncoming train until too late.

Joseph Mattingly was a son of Thomas B. and Ella Jane Mattingly, both deceased. He was born in this county on March 26, 1884. On January 22, 1907, he was united in marriage to Miss Ethel Thomas, a daughter of Aloysius Thomas, who with one son, Thomas B. Mattingly, aged 14 years, survives. Formerly known to his friends as "Abb" Medley, he was a long resident of the Holy Cross vicinity but moved to Loretto nearly fourteen years ago when his advancing years made it impractical for him to continue farming. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Medley, both deceased.

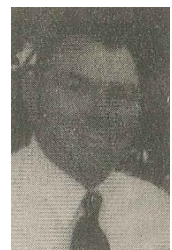

### **105-year-old woman dies, wed at St. Charles in 1888**

Mrs. Alice Dessie "Nana" Morton of 908 Grant, who was born at the end of the slave era and who spent more years in service to her church than most people do in a lifetime, died Saturday (Jan. 6, 1979) at age 105.

Mrs. Morton died at 3:25 a.m. at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Danville, Ill. She had been ill four years.

Mrs. Morton was the first child on her mother's side of the family to be born free. Her grandmother was a slave and her mother was the daughter of the master of the Tennessee plantation.

Mrs. Morton was born in Tracy City, Tenn., April 14, 1873, to James and Emma Cunningham Rutledge.

Mrs. Morton had a keen memory and frequently amazed acquaintances with her knowledge of the Bible and philosophies of life.

"When I delve into the midst of it, life is sad," she once told *The Commercial-News Danville, Ill.* "I know what suffering is, what segregation is, what sorrow is.

"But I also know what freedom is, what joy is. Life is beautiful. Old age is beautiful."

Although Mrs. Morton received only nine months of formal schooling, she taught several family members and friends how to read. Schooling was limited in those days, she said, because "black or while, if you were big enough to pull cotton balls and bale hay, you were out in that field."

She was involved in "God's work" since her early teens.

Mrs. Morton went into the missionary field for the Woodriver Baptist Missionary Association, the world's largest black missionary group, 78 years ago. She was president emeritus of the area district and was its first president.

She was president of the district's Baptist Woman's Congress and before retiring was named mother emeritus of the district.

She also served on the scholarship committee of the Woodriver Baptist Association.

Mrs. Morton was a member of Union Baptist Church for 53 years. She was a past president of the Missionary Society and organized the missionary youth department of which she became supervisor.

Her mission field at one time included 48 churches in Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana.

Union Baptist organized Dessie Morton Day in 1975 to honor her for her church service and for being the oldest member.

"I'm thankful I came to Christ when I was young – that I had the sense to recognize the truth of the Bible," she once told *The C-N.*

"We haven't yet been released from hypocrisy. But if we want a better world, we have to make a better 'me.' We climb in light like we climb a building, step by step."

Mrs. Morton was also a past president of the Golden Age Auxiliary at the Laura Lee Fellowship House.

She married Thomas J. Morton in St. Charles, Ky., in 1888. When she was 17, she and her husband moved to Danville, where he worked as a coal miner until becoming one of the city's first black firemen. He died in 1946. Two daughters and two sons also preceded her in death.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Nicholson and Mrs. Beatrice Thompson, both of Danville; five grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren; three great-great-grandchildren; and one great-great-great-grandchild.
