Noted defense attorney dies at age 52

George Salem Jr., a well-known Louisville attorney who grew up in Lebanon, died Friday morning, April 12, 1996, at Louisville's Jewish Hospital. He was 52.

He had battled prostate cancer for several years, which spread to his back, said his mother, Louise Salem, of Lebanon.

His death came almost a year after that of his longtime former associate Frank E. Haddad Jr.

"George was a widely respected criminal defense lawyer in Kentucky," said Scott Cox, a former assistant U.S. attorney who is now a defense lawyer. "He and Frank Haddad represented the defendants in all of the biggest criminal cases in Kentucky for at least the last 15 years."

Salem's clients included such well-known defendants as former Jefferson County Sheriff Jim Greene, who pleaded guilty to tax evasion. But he was known widely for his defense of several of those involved in Operation BOPTROT, the federal investigation of state and government corruption.

Salem and Haddad defended former gubernatorial aide Bruce Wilkinson. Salem also represented former state Sen. Helen Garrett.

He was also vice president of HMM Broadcasting Inc., which owns WVLK-AM and WVLK-FM in Lexington.

Although he left his hometown for college, law school and a successful legal career, Salem kept close ties with the Marion County community. In later years he returned for high school basketball games.

"He was really good about that," said a cousin, Elmer George, an attorney in Lebanon. "He never forgot where he came from."

After graduating from the University of Louisville and U of L law school, Salem ran unsuccessfully for state auditor. He began developing a law practice and it was his association with Haddad, his close friend and mentor, that shaped his career, George said.

Salem was deeply saddened by Haddad's death and left his law group to work with another close friend, personal injury lawyer Larry Franklin.

Salem belonged to many organizations and law groups, including the American, Kentucky and Louisville bar associations; Kentucky Academy of Trial Attorneys; the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers; the Southern Trial Lawyers Association; and Association of Trial Lawyers of America.

He served on the boards of the Adolph Rupp Committee, Kentucky Center for the Arts, and the Cerebral Palsy KIDS Center.

He was a member of St. Matthews Baptist Church.

His mother said he joined the Lebanon Baptist Church at age 11 and always remained close to the church family there.

The funeral service was Monday afternoon, April 15, 1996, at St. Matthews Baptist Church in Jefferson County. Dr. Leslie Hollon, pastor of the church, officiated. The Rev. Wesley Noss, pastor of Lebanon Baptist Church, also participated in the service.

Burial was in Cave Hill Cemetery in Louisville.

Besides his mother, he is survived by his wife, the former Patricia Teissler; a daughter, Ashley Salem; a son, Stephen Salem; two sisters, Sylvia Cherry and Gloria Hill; a brother, Ellis Salem; and a grandchild.

Sallee dies after shooting; man charged with murder

Robert Leo Sallee, 21, of Lebanon, was shot and killed in the parking lot of the Riverside Café in Bradfordsville at 7:50 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 22, Kentucky State Police reported.

Sallee was shot three times with a .22 caliber revolver at close range, said Detective Jody Greenwell who investigated the case. Greenwell said Sallee was dead before the ambulance arrived.

John Henry Clarkson, 50 of Gravel Switch, was arrested at the scene and charged with murder. The weapon was recovered, police said.

Greenwell said no motive for the shooting has been determined. He said witnesses said they saw no reason for the shooting.

Clarkson is being held on \$20,000 bond in Marion County Jail. Quarterly Court Judge Henry Smith has not set a trial date, yet, to allow Clarkson sufficient time to obtain counsel.

Sallee, a native of Marion County, lived at 110 Hamilton Heights in Lebanon.

He was the son of John Sallee and Ella Mae Fisher Sallee of Lebanon. Other survivors include his wife, Mary Lou Lucarelli Sallee of Lebanon; his son, Robert Leo Sallee Jr. of Campbellsville; two brothers, Ernest Sallee of Lebanon and Joe Sallee of Harrodsburg; and three sisters, Mrs. Rosie Dyer of Gravel Switch, Mrs. Clara Potts of Gravel Switch, and Mrs. Ruby Sallee of Lebanon.

Retired physician Dr. Duncan Salot, dies at age 88

Dr. Duncan G. Salot, a gregarious, colorful retired physician who had practiced for many years in Lebanon, died Monday, March 13, 1989 at Humana Hospital Audubon in Louisville. He was 88.

Salot died of complications from a stroke and a heart condition.

Salot lived at 502 Forrest Ave. in Campbellsville in recent years with his second wife, but was an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist on East Main in Lebanon from 1938 to 1980.

He often told his many friends stories about his travels throughout the country as a physician for the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus, prior to his arrival here. Also before coming here, he had been a general practitioner in Michigan.

He was born in Dubuque, Iowa. He held a medical degree from Wayne State University in Detroit.

During the past 25 years of his life he traveled extensively – to Russia, Australia, New Zealand, Europe and Japan, and to China three times. He had also performed medical missionary work – fulfilled eye care needs of the poverty-stricken – in India.

He was a mason and a member of the Sons of the American Revolution.

He also owned a farm in Marion county where he maintained a gathering place for friends. The house was affectionately called “Duncan’s Pad.” Since the early 1950s, a large group of male friends met – religiously – on every Wednesday night of every week for a meal they took turns preparing. Men seeing political office eagerly sought at least a one-night invitation to the inner sanctum of “Duncan’s Pad” so they could campaign.

That large group of friends who met weekly served as Dr. Salot’s pallbearers and as honorary pallbearers.

“He was a very fine man,” said Dr. Joe Green, a close friend. “He was kind. Gentle. If we had any jewels, he was certainly one of them.”

Dr. Salot’s survivors include his wife, Beatrice T. Salot of Campbellsville.

He is also survived by a son, Dr. Roger Salot of Louisville, and two daughters, Mrs. Carol Carrico of Lebanon and Mr. Virginia Harmon of Lexington.

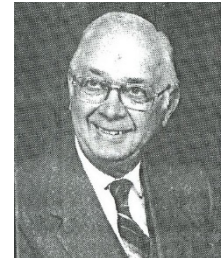

TWO LORETTO GIRLS VICTIMS – Fatally Hurt When Machines Sideswipe In Passing Sunday Night – DOUBLE FUNERAL HELD

Two girls, members of well known Loretto families, were fatally hurt and several other persons received minor injuries in an automobile accident on the Lebanon and Loretto road Sunday night at 9:30 o'clock. The victims were Miss Georgia Bickett, 16 years old, youngest daughter of Mrs. J. Ernest Bickett, and Miss Nancy Saltsman, 13-year-old daughter of Edgar Saltsman. Both died at Boldrick's Infirmary where they were brought after the accident. Miss Bickett succumbed Monday morning at 6:30 o'clock, and the Saltsman girl the same evening at 6 o'clock.

The two girls were on the running boards of a Chevrolet coupe driven by Malcolm Thompson, one on either side of the machine, when it and a Cadillac sedan owned by George Owens and driven by Aaron Russell, both of this city, sideswiped in passing. The coupe was going toward Loretto while the Owens car was coming toward Lebanon. The accident happened in front of the home of James Peterson, about half way between Lebanon and Loretto. In the coupe with Thompson were Miss Elnora Wetterer of Tunnel Hill, Ky., who was

visiting at the Bickett home, and Billy Fenwick of Loretto. The two boys and girl in the car escaped with minor hurts. In the Owens car, besides Owens and Russell, were Mack McCauley, an employee of the L.&N. Railroad Co.; Miss Louise Payne, Mrs. Cordia Wright and Mrs. Mack Ewing. All were unhurt except for bruises. Both machines were considerably damaged. The Cadillac, the heavier car, had the running board on the left side torn away, the rear fender demolished and the handles of both doors broken off. The left front fender of the coupe was torn away and the wheel under it broken and twisted.

The Bickett girl, riding on the left side of the coupe, was crushed between the machines. It is believed that the handles on the doors of the Owens car caused her the most serious injuries. The Saltsman girl was thrown into a ditch on the roadside by the impact of the collision. Miss Bickett's left leg was broken in two or three places, her left side badly torn and it is believed that her back was also broken. The Saltsman girl suffered a fractured skull and was otherwise badly hurt. She was unconscious when brought to the infirmary and remained in that condition until she died.

George Owens, proprietor of a store on North Proctor Knott avenue, said that he and those in the machine with him had been to Loretto. He said they left Lebanon between 6:30 and 7 o'clock that evening and that Russell did the driving. He denied there was any drinking by those in the machine and said the report that they were traveling at a high rate of speed was untrue. He said they stopped as quickly as possible after the accident, went back to render all possible assistance and were among the last to leave the scene after the crash. Owens said that he and those with him had driven to Loretto for the ride.

Thompson, who was at the wheel of the coupe, is a son of Pink Thompson. He said he was not driving fast when the accident happened. He said he saw the lights on the other car for some distance, and that as the machine approached he pulled to the side of the road. He was as far to the right as he could safely drive, he said, when the crash occurred.

Miss Bickett's father died last December. He was for many years cashier of the Bank of Loretto, and at one time represented Marion county in the Kentucky Legislature. He was also at one time engaged in the distilling business, having for years been associated with George R. Burks, now of Louisville, who owned the Burks Spring Distillery near Loretto. Sapp – Near New Market, on Thursday, Oct. 30, 1879, Mr. Franklin Sapp, of consumption; age 50 years.

TWO KILLED IN CAR CRASH HERE – BOTH VICTIMS STUDENTS AT CITY SCHOOLS – Auto Leaves Road at Curve on Springfield Pike Near City Limits – LIGHT POLE SNAPPED OFF

Russell Edward Cooper, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam J. Cooper of New Market, and Howard G. Sapp, Jr., 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard G. Sapp of this city, were fatally hurt Saturday night at 9:30 o'clock when the machine in which they were riding left the road at the curve on the Springfield pike at the city limits, ran for fifty feet on the walk next to the fence in front of the home of Chester Rowe and then crashed into an electric light pole. The pole was snapped off, and the demolished car was carried by momentum a distance of fifty feet further down the street before coming to a stop. Miss Dixie Sapp, 14 years old, sister of the boy fatally hurt, was the third occupant of the machine. She was in the front seat with Cooper, who was driving, while young Sapp, who was known to his companions as "Buster" Sapp, was in the rear seat. The car was a Model A Ford coach, the property of Cooper's father.

Persons living near the scene heard the crash and went to the assistance of the victims. All three of the motorists were thrown out of the car. Cooper was picked up unconscious across the street, twenty-five feet from the machine, while Sapp, also unconscious, was in the street some ten or twelve from the auto. The girl is thought to have been thrown through the windshield. She landed on the sidewalk. The three were taken to Elizabeth's Hospital in an ambulance summoned soon after the accident. Both boys died without regaining consciousness, Cooper passing away at 11 o'clock and Sapp at 1 o'clock. Examination disclosed that the girl was

not seriously hurt. She was bruised and cut about the face and body and four teeth were knocked out. She was removed to the home of her parents on Forest street the next day and is rapidly recovering. She is a member of the Freshman class at the local High School.

Just what caused the machine to leave the road is not known. The curve is a gradual one, and it is believed that the car was traveling at a high rate of speed. It was coming toward town. The driver after leaving the road had evidently tried to get back on the highway. The front of the car did not strike the pole head-on and was the least damaged part of the auto. The top was torn off and the whole of the left side was a caved in tangled mass of twisted steel. All the glass was shattered, and just how the girl escaped death is difficult to understand after viewing the wreck. The print of one's teeth marks the windshield frame, and it is thought she was thrown against it before being hurled to the ground. Following the accident, it was said that Cooper had recently been heard to say that one of the rear tires was in weak condition and the fact that the left rear tire was off the wheel after the crash led some believe that it may have blown out and caused the driver to lose control. The demolished car was removed to a local garage where it was viewed by very large crowds. The electric light pole broken off was one that had been set a short time ago, having replaced an older one. A section of the town was in darkness for several hours after the incident.

Cooper, son of Sam and Virgie Wise Cooper, was born September 20, 1912. He, too, was a member of the Freshman class at the High School in this city, although he lived with his parents at New Market. Funeral services for him were held at Muldraugh's Hill Baptist church Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. W.C. Hundley. Burial was in the church cemetery. The pallbearers were Willard Sapp, Thomas Harmon, Harold Graham, Freeman Parrott, Thomas Avritt, Stanley Richards and Lloyd Henderson. 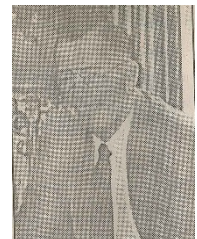

Rosenwald's longtime principal dies

Nettie Lee Smith, the First Lady of Education at Lebanon Rosenwald School for three decades, came home last week. And many of her students, who have grown to midlife and senior-citizen age, said goodbye and thanks Friday to their 93-year-old principal, teacher and friend.

Mrs. Smith, "a truly classy lady," died Tuesday, Aug. 1, 1995, at Hillcreek Manor in Louisville. Her funeral was Friday, Aug. 4, at 1 p.m., in Lebanon's Bosley Funeral Home. Burial was in Ryder Cemetery.

She was an educator, who certainly knew, firsthand, that education requires extra effort.

While growing up in western Kentucky at Marion, when it was time to attend high school, she had to leave her family and home state because Crittenden County had no high school for black students.

Throughout her high school years, she lived with relatives in Cape Girardeau, Mo., a small town at the edge of the Mississippi River. She was an outstanding student.

After high school, she attended Lane College in Jackson, Tenn., then transferred to Kentucky State College in Frankfort where she earned a bachelor's degree in education.

She found a teaching job in Lebanon, and a new Kentucky home, where she stayed until 1989 when bad health compelled her to move to Louisville.

Early in her education career, however, while working on her master's degree in summer months, she had to leave Kentucky again. There was no state college where a black student could enroll to obtain an advanced degree.

So Nettie Lee Smith, during her summer breaks from school, traveled to Illinois and lived temporarily at her brother's residence until she earned her master's degree from the University of Chicago.

"She was an icon, a truly classy lady," said Mary Lewis, a history teacher at Marion County High School, who attended Mrs. Smith's funeral. "She was purely professional – as an educator and in everything she did. She always handled herself in a most dignified way."

Mrs. Smith also taught Lewis' mother, Florine Hart, and was extremely instrumental in getting Lewis, "A poor tenant farmer's daughter," enrolled at Kentucky State University where she received her bachelor's degree in history and political science. Lewis went on to obtain her master's degree at Western Kentucky University and has taught 26 years at MCHS.

"I found her always very pleasant," Lewis said. "But she was a strict disciplinarian as principal at Rosenwald. She ran an orderly school and had no problem controlling even the largest of guys."

Lewis attended Rosenwald through her sophomore year, then, after integration, finished at Lebanon High in 1963. Lewis said she never had to go to the principal's office at Rosenwald, "but everyone knew a trip to Mrs. Smith's office was no picnic. It wasn't a time for chitchat and 'just sit over here for a while.' It was serious business."

"It meant bend over and hold your ankles," recalled Walter Cowherd, frowning briefly, then laughing, at Saturday's Banks Chapel AME Zion Church Picnic in Belltown. "Oh, how well I remember the sting of Mrs. Smith's paddle. It had holes in it."

He frowns again.

"Her discipline helped me in life," said Cowherd, RHS Class of 1957, who now lives in Louisville. "I've never gotten in any trouble with the law, and she's the reason. I had the utmost respect for her, and loved her.

"I wish she could be here for the kids today. I wish my grandchildren could have her."

Ann Simpson, a 1958 Rosenwald graduate who, through the years, remained close friends with Mrs. Smith, said, "If ever there was anyone who was a hero or mentor, Mrs. Smith was mine. She was phenomenal.

"She was a gifted woman who could talk intellectually on any subject.

"I could go and talk with her when I felt I had a problem. And that problem never seemed quite as big after being with her awhile. She wouldn't tell you how to solve your problem, but by the time you finished talking with her, you knew you could solve the problem yourself.

"She was everything to me."

J.D. Bell, an outstanding football and basketball player at RHS, said Mrs. Smith always stayed after him to work harder in the classroom.

"I was always pretty mischievous and a good-sized guy," said Bell, a pallbearer at her funeral. "She corrected me with a stern hand just like everybody else. But when she did, you could still feel the love and concern that she had for you.

"Mrs. Smith always reminded us that it wasn't where we came from that was most important, but where we wanted to go in life. She always encouraged us to study hard, to go on to higher education, and to be all we could be."

Another close friend, Willie Mae Mattingly, said Mrs. Smith was a beautiful person with a sweet personality.

"She was a very good friend, and really good friends are hard to find," said Mrs. Mattingly. "You could talk to her about anything and things always stayed put."

Mrs. Smith's only child, daughter Edythe L. Smith, of Louisville, was the Class of 1959 valedictorian at Rosenwald High.

She remembers the "walking single file in the hallway, and the no talking, no running, and no gum-chewing rules."

Elementary students were required to use one particular door at school, and the high school students used another door.

Once when Edythe was in grade school, she and several friends were caught by a teacher using the high school door. All the students but Edythe were spanked, and when the principal heard that her daughter had been spared from punishment, she wasn't happy. The teacher received a stern message to never do that again, and Edythe was spanked.

"At home, she was my mother," said Edythe. "And at school, she was my principal. I had to show her the same respect as the other students."

Edythe said her mother would frequently go out in the neighborhood and knock on doors when children didn't show up for school.

"She would get students out of bed and tell them to get to school," Edythe said.

Music was one of Nettie Lee Smith's special talents.

"She had a glorious, operatic voice," said Edythe. "Without any effort, her voice soared. She had taken voice lessons when she was young."

Besides her devotion to education, she was a longtime faithful member of Miles Chapel Christian Methodist Episcopal Church in Lebanon at the corner of East Main Street and Woodlawn Avenue.

She played the piano there, donated a piano to the church, and served as minister of music. She was also a Sunday School teacher, stewardess, and member of the Women's Missionary Council.

The Rev. C. William Parker Sr. conducted the funeral service.

Nettie Lee Smith was the wife of the late Walter Robert Smith, who died Dec. 19, 1980, and was a longtime employee of the Lebanon Post Office. They lived on Chandler Street in Lebanon.

She was born in Marion, Ky., on July 27, 1902. She was the daughter of the late Mayfield and Ada Rice Hughes.

In addition to daughter Edythe Smith, she is survived by one granddaughter, Lisa Carol Smith, of Louisville.

She was principal of Rosenwald School for 30 years. She also taught English there. She was employed by Lebanon City Schools from 1925 until 1961. Then after Rosenwald School closed, she taught at Lebanon Elementary School until 1971.

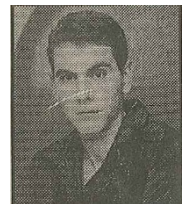

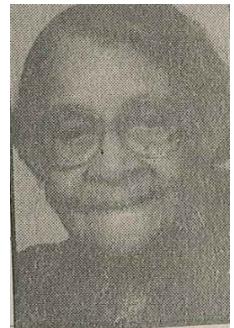
Mrs. Spalding was a member of St. Augustine Catholic Church in Lebanon and the Legion of Mary. She was born on Sept. 18, 1900.

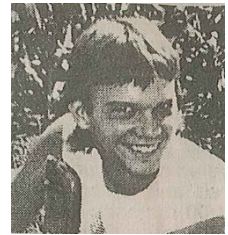

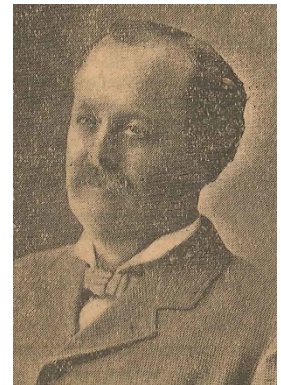
The boy is said to have been despondent for some time, a condition believed to have been brought about by a blow he received on the head in an accident.

DEATH CLAIMS W.M. SPALDING – Former County Judge Passes Away Unexpectedly At Home Here – FUNERAL THIS MORNING

Judge William M. Spalding, 70 years old, former Judge of the Marion County Court and one of the community's widely known citizens, died at his home on South Proctor Knott avenue Wednesday night shortly after 9 o'clock. Death was due to cerebral hemorrhage and came unexpectedly. Judge Spalding suffered a stroke on December 24, 1925, and for some time afterward his condition was critical. Hope for his recovery at that time was all but abandoned. However, later he improved and while he was able to be about his home on crutches he never recovered from the attack. Recently he was seemingly as well as he had been at any time in recent months. He became suddenly ill Wednesday night and a physician was hurriedly summoned, but before he arrived the end had come. A second stroke was given as the cause of death.



Judge Spalding was born at the old family home on the Miller pike in the St. Mary section on December 16, 1858. He was a son of William and Catherine McAtee Spalding. For many years he was one of the county's prominent farmers and stock traders. Some ten or fifteen years ago purchased the property owned by Carl E. Litsey and South Proctor Knott avenue and moved to this city with his family to reside. He had since lived there. He was a Democrat in politics and for many years took an active interest in the party's affairs. He was at one time a member of the County Committee and served as its chairman, successfully directing a number of campaigns. Afterward Judge Spalding was elected County Judge, holding the office two terms. He was elected a third term, but when his health failed to improve tendered his resignation. Judge John T. Burdette was appointed to succeed him.

Surviving Judge Spalding are his wife, who was Miss Sarah Mattingly of this county, and seven children, four sons and three daughters. 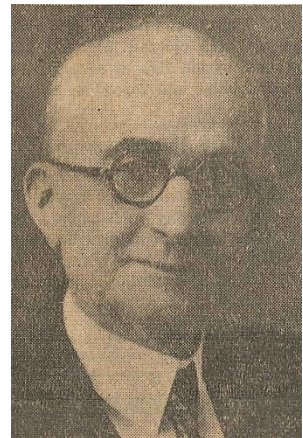
Prof. J. R. Sterrett Dies Unexpectedly At Home – HEART ATTACK BRINGS DEATH – City School Superintendent Succumbs After 4-Hour Illness Saturday – SERVED HERE 26 YEARS

Prof. James Reid Sterrett, for twenty-six years superintendent of the public schools of Lebanon and widely known in educational circles throughout the State, died unexpectedly about 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon at his home on South Proctor Knott Avenue. Death followed the third of three heart attacks with which he was stricken during the day.

Although he had been subject to cardiac trouble for some time and upon the advice of his physician had been confined to bed for several weeks last winter, he had been in fairly good health recently.

Saturday morning he became ill while in the business section of the city but walked home, arriving in a state of exhaustion and complaining of a severe pain in his chest. His doctor who was immediately summoned, treated him and within a half hour he was sufficiently relieved to go to his room on the second floor. About 1:30 o'clock he was again stricken and before he could fully respond to stimulants administered to him, he suffered a third attack which brought almost instant death. News of his passing stunned the entire community where his name has been all but synonymous with education for more than a score of years.

A sketch of Prof. Sterrett's life would be a review of school progress in Lebanon. During his superintendentship, public education here made tremendous strides. What were scarcely more than visions

when he arrived in 1909, have become realities. A handsome High School building and a modern school for Negroes have been erected; the schools are fully accredited and the High School so meets the every specification of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools that a field representative, recently in the city, was unable to recommend even a single improvement. Prof. Sterrett had seen the educational standard of the High School faculty rise steadily until now every member holds a college degree. He had seen an ever increasing number of students continue their learning in colleges and universities and had witnessed an entirely new attitude on the part of local residents toward the importance of schooling. In every instance, his sincere interest in school progress and his influence have been instrumental toward those ends.

A certainty it is that no man in Lebanon ever exerted a greater influence on youth than did Prof. Sterrett. He understood boys and girls, understood their manner of reasoning, understood their need for encouragement and recognized their weaknesses. He knew how to slyly laugh away the petty difficulties which loomed large in their minds and to make them see, instead, the really important matters which they had not considered. He talked to them not as an executive but as a friend, and he possessed the faculty of instilling into them confidence and ambition. Not infrequently has a student's life undergone a major change following a heart to heart talk with him. His time always belonged to his pupils and he never refused to listen to their problems when they wished to discuss them with him. His advice was a reflection of his years of experience with young people, and it was always good.

Prof. Sterrett's devotion to his work was but his devotion to youth and he had the pleasure of knowing that his students bore him deep affection as well as respect. A man of lofty ideals and Christian principles, coupled with personal charm, he was a school leader whose place will be a most difficult one to fill.

In church work, he was very active. For many years he was superintendent of the Presbyterian Sunday School and at the time of his death was teacher of the Men's Bible Class. He had long been an Elder in the church and represented the congregation upon innumerable occasions at meetings held in other cities and other States.

Prof. Sterrett was born in Lexington, Va., sixty-five years ago, a son of the late Samuel Wilson and Ida Burks Sterrett. In 1891 he was graduated from Virginia Military Institute and, anticipating a career in law, furthered his studies at Washington and Lee University. Although he was admitted to the bar in Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee and Missouri, he became interested in the teaching profession and held his first position with a military school in North Carolina. Later he taught in Mexico, Missouri, but surrendered his duties there to become a member of the faculty of the Central University Preparatory School in Middlesboro where he remained for three years. In 1900 he was chosen principal of the Augusta High School, a position which he held until he accepted the superintendentship of the public schools here which include the Lebanon High School, the Lebanon Graded School and the Rosenwald Colored School.

On December 30, 1897, Prof. Sterrett was united in marriage to Miss Mabel Rhorer, daughter of M.H. and Jane Rhorer, the ceremony taking place at Middlesboro. Of the union were born two sons, Prof. J.R. Sterrett, Jr., of the faculty of Western Kentucky Teachers College, Bowling Green, and Dr. Robert R. Sterrett of the University of Illinois at Urbana.

Surviving, in addition to his wife and two sons, are one half-sister, Miss Nannie Sterrett of Staunton, Va., and three half-brothers, Tate Sterrett and Prof. Robert Sterrett of Staunton and Felix Sterrett of Buena Vista, Va.

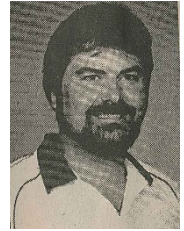
