#### Will Write Political News.


Attorney Basil P. Cooper of this city will have a weekly article in the newspaper concerning the political news of the day. The first of these articles appears elsewhere in this issue.

election passed quietly. The different polls began to report soon after 6 o'clock and by 8 o'clock the winners were known. Judge L. H. Thurman for Circuit Judge carried the county over his opponent Clem Hill by a majority of 204 and Henry Spragens' majority over Joseph Pohl for Commonwealth's Attorney was 484. C. W. Cook defeated J. M. Knott for Circuit Clerk by a majority of 84.

In the race for Circuit Judge, Thurman carried all four counties in the district. His majority in Washington was 613, in Marion 204, in Taylor 197 and in Green 19. His majority over Hill in the district was 1,021. For Commonwealth's Attorney Polk carried Washington by 301 while Spragens carried the other three counties. His majority in Marion was 131, Taylor 251 and Green 340. His majority over Polk in the district was 324.
