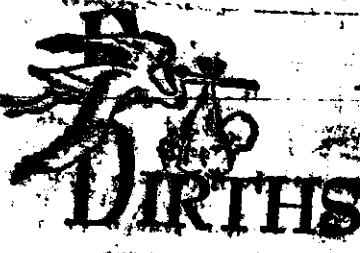

Mr. Bagwell was a native of this county, having been born January 21, 1864, a son of the late H. O. and Cassie James Bagwell. He was a resident of the county practically all of his life and had since he was a young man been engaged in farming. He was a member of the Baptist church and a splendid citizen. Just and honorable in all his dealings, he enjoyed the confidence of every one and will be greatly missed not only in the family circle but by a large number of warm friends.

Surviving him are his wife, who was Miss Hattie Dorsey; two daughters, Miss Mary Bagwell and Mrs. Jesse Taylor, both of this county; two sons, Edgar Bagwell and Will Bagwell, both of Louisville; three brothers, John Bagwell, Will Bagwell and Tom Bagwell, all of this county, and five sisters, Mrs. George Mosher, Mrs. John Chatham and Mrs. Walter Haley, all of this county, and Mrs. John Shoup of Perryville and Mrs. Nelson Hays of Washington county.

Funeral services, conducted by the Rev. T. J. Porter, were held at the Hayville Baptist church Wednesday afternoon at 2:45 o'clock. Burial was in the church cemetery.

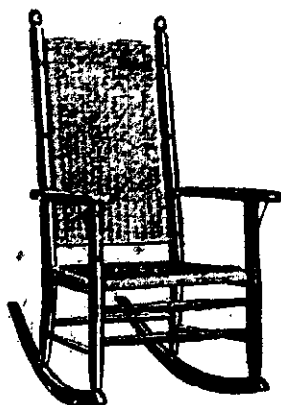
It is generally understood that Mr. Cooper, who was born and educated in this county, will make the race for County Attorney next year.

Miss Regina O'Daniel, daughter of H. E. O'Daniel, who lives on the St. Mary's pike about three miles from town, was painfully burned about the hands and arms at her home Sunday morning, in attempting to extinguish a blaze that was caused by the explosion of a can of gasoline. A sister, Miss Alma O'Daniel, had gone into a closet for something and in the darkness struck a match which incidentally ignited a can of gasoline. The explosion set fire to the room, and in attempting to extinguish the flames Miss Regina received her injuries.

Miss Sallie Bagwell, aged 42 years, daughter of the late Henderson Bagwell, a well known and highly esteemed woman of the eastern end of the county, died at the home of her sister, Mrs. John Cheatum, near Gravel Switch, Friday morning following a long illness of dropsy. The funeral services were held at Haysville Saturday morning, conducted by Rev. Atkins, of Perryville, and the burial was in the Haysville cemetery. Miss Bagwell was possessed of many admirable traits of character which endeared her to a large circle of friends, who express sorrow
