
Can you please provide me with the name of the minister and the address for the Pleasant Run Methodist Church which I believe is in the northern area of Marion County?

I am attempting to locate information about William Barbour and his wife Jane (?) who both died around 1837-39. I have not found wills for them in Washington County where their children became wards of the court. I understand, however, that the family lived not far from the Pleasant Run church and may be buried in the church yard. Are there any cemetery inscription lists for PR or other Marion County cemeteries?

Others that I am interested in are Elizabeth Hickman (wife of a James Hickman) who died between 1825 and 1843 at between 60 to 70 years of age.

CONSIDER THIS...

When I began this project, I made a family tree chart to put all of the names of my ancestors in. My first chart extended to my 3rd great grandparents, which meant that I had 32 slot in the extreme right column, one for each of my 32 3rd great grandparents. Then I found a few 4th great grandparents, and had to make a bigger chart, only this one had to be twice as big to accommodate each of my 64 4th great grandparents in the extreme right column. Then I found a few 5th greats, and realized that the chart would never stop doubling in size each time I went back another generation. With the use of a calculator, one can see that the numbers become astronomical within a few hundred years. Consider the following:

The amount of ancestors that are our 27th great grandparents exceed the entire amount of people that lived on the earth in the year 1275, and the amount of 31st great grandparents (8½ billion) not only exceed the amount of people on the earth in the year 1175, but it also is more than the present population of the earth, which is today higher than it has ever been at any previous time. If we continue this back to the time of Christ, we would have a number that exceeds 70 trillion billion, at a time when there were only about a hundred million people on the whole earth. Since we know that there were only 107 billion people ever to have lived on the earth in all of history put together, how can we explain these large numbers. The answer is simple, and when you learn it you will understand why every single person you come in contact with is no less than about your 18th cousin several thousands of times over.

To be a cousin to somebody, all you have to have is one common ancestor. We know that the ½ a billion people who were my 27th great grandparents were the entire population of the earth in the year 1275. So if I could travel backwards in time to the year 1275, would everybody I come in contact with be my ancestor? Almost, but keep in mind that not everyone living then would have decendants living today. For example, some would not get married and have children, while some would have children but no grandchildren, etc... And since most people didn't travel to different parts of the world, there was not likely much inbreeding going on. But also keep in mind that all we would have to have to be decended from the blacks in Africa is just one intermarriage out of a ½ a billion, and we are decended from that black person's millions of ancestors as well. So to answer the question, "are we decended from everyone living on the earth in the

year 1275 who has descendants living on the earth in the year 1987?", my answer is that at least one representative from every ethnic group on earth would have found his way into the  $\frac{1}{2}$  a billion people that represent our 27th great grandparents, and that we are in fact descendants from every person living in the year 1275 that has descendants living today. And since all the people living today had to descend from all of the people living at that time, this is the proof that we are related to every single person on earth millions and millions of times over. As you come forward in time from the year 1275, the common ancestors drop off. For example, my 2nd cousins share the same great grandparents with me, but they drop out there. They don't share my same grandparents. Bringing it closer, my first cousins share my grandparents, but not my same parents.

To explain how there are such large numbers of ancestors when there were so few people, consider the following: If I married my 2nd cousin, my son would have my great grandparents as his 2nd great grandparents twice. In other words, just two people would represent 4 ancestors. Similarly, if my son then married his second or third cousin, then my great grandparents would be my grandson's 3rd great grandparents three times over. So those two great grandparents of mine would represent 6 ancestors to my grandson. This has happened over and over throughout history. A third great grandparent from one line may be the 3rd, 5th, 10th, and 11th cousin to an ancestor of mine from another line. I have already found this to have happened in my family tree. William Winburn Jr and Sarah Gatling are my 5th great grandparents twice through two different lines. The people living at the time of Christ would be my 75th great grandparents millions of times over, and if you could trace your roots back to Adam, or whomever the first man was, then you would find that Adam was your 418th great grandfather a zillion times over, as every line would end up there.



BARBOUR FAMILY LINE

ELIAS BARBER.....Proven great grandfather to Correne Barbour.

According to the 1850 census of Bath county, KY, Elias Barber was born in Stafford county, VA. in 1809. Sometime before 1833 he migrated to Fleming county, KY. It is not known who his father was, but there is a John Barber living in Fleming county, KY in the 1840 census who is old enough to be Elias' father, and he is the only Barber listed. There are several Barber families living in Bath county (the border county) in 1850, and I believe that these are Elias' brothers' families as they are all approximately the same age and are all listed as having been born in VA. (although the counties of their births are not given). In 1833 Elias married our grandmother, Amanda (Atha) Wright (see marriage certificate). I have searched extensively, but have not been able to find who Amanda's father was. The 1850 census shows that she was born in Fleming county in 1817, so at least we know where her parents lived. Elias and Amanda had several children early in their marriage, and in 1856 they had GEORGE WASHINGTON BARBER, our ancestor.

GEORGE W. BARBOUR...Grandfather to Correne Barbour. At this point the

Barbers started spelling their name "Barbour". George was probably born in Bath county, KY, although he could have been born in Franklin county as I have not been able to locate his whereabouts in any of the censuses. We do know from his death certificate, however, that Elias and Amanda were his parents. We also know that he married our grandmother, Mary Jane Webster, in Franklin county. Mary Jane was the daughter of James Webster and Mary Ann Hayden (see both the WEBSTER and the HAYDEN sections). George Barbour and Mary Jane Webster had 12 children. He dropped dead while sitting on the toilet one fine day in 1936. She died in 1940. They both are buried in the Choatesville churchyard cemetery, just outside of Frankfort.

# ANCESTRY OF CORRENE BARBOUR

JAMES BARBOUR.....Father of Correne Barbour. James Barbour was born in 1890 in Frankfort, KY, and was named for his grandfather, James Webster. (James Webster was also named for his grandfather, James Vincent.) In 1913, James Barbour married Stella Goins, the daughter of Charlie Goins and Sarah Ann Brawner. James worked several jobs during his life, among them, operating a trolley car in Louisville and serving as a guard at the KY State Penitentiary in Frankfort. Several sources told me that James was one of the cleanest and best dressed men around, often taking money that should have gone for groceries and purchasing a dozen shirts at a time in Louisville. At one point James and Stella were divorced, although they later remarried. It was because of James' irresponsibility that his father-in-law, Charlie Goins, disinherited his daughter, Stella. James died in 1973 at the age of 83 and is buried in the Frankfort, KY cemetery. He left a son, Nelson, and a daughter Correne, grandmother of the author.

CORRENE BARBOUR.....This is my grandmother. Correne was born on June 12, 1914. By the time she was 14 years old she married my grandfather, Woodie Walden Jr.. They were married for 52 years before Woodie died in 1981. Correne and Woodie spent almost 30 years in Vanceburg, KY where Woodie served as lockmaster at dam #32 on the Ohio River. In the 1960's they moved to Felicity, Ohio where Correne still lives today (1987). They had 3 children, James Kelly Walden, Betty Lou Danner Secoy, and Bradley Nelson Walden. Their son, JAMES, is my father (see Walden section).

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Le Compt funeral home in Frankfort, with burial there.

WEBSTER-VINCENT-SMITHER FAMILY LINES

ANDREW WEBSTER.....Proven 3rd great grandfather to Correne Barbour. Andrew Webster was born before 1768 in Virginia, and married our grandmother, Ursila Smither, on July 22, 1788 in Orange county, VA. . Andrew brought his family to Kentucky sometime after 1800, and may have resided in Gallatin county before moving to Franklin county, KY. Andrew died in 1805, and his widow remarried to a man named Sims. Andrew and Urily had the following children:

HENRY WEBSTER.....2nd great grandfather to Correne Barbour. Henry was born in 1789 in Virginia. On July 7, 1815, Henry married Mary (Polly) Vincent, the daughter of James Vincent in Fayette county, KY. . Henry and Mary moved to Franklin county where they resided for over 20 years. They lived in Owen county prior to 1840, and then to Henry county just before the 1850 census was taken. The census of 1850 indicated that he owned no property. Henry served in the War of 1812. Henry and Mary had the following children:

- 4) JAMES WEBSTER b. 1841
- 5) George Webster b. 1846

Webster was born in 1841, probably in Owen county, KY. In 1862 he married Mary Ann Hayden at the home of the bride's parents, Thomas Hayden and Dolly Ann Wallace. There is a discrepancy as to how many children they had. One source claims that there were 4 children; Annah b. 1863; Mary Jane (our grandmother) b. 1865; George H. and John T., both born in 1873; however everyone who remembers claims that their daughter, Mary Jane, was an only child, and Jim Webster left everything he owned to her. Perhaps the other children died in childhood. Jim Webster owned the farm in Franklin county on the Indian Gap Road which is now owned by Clifton Rice. B.F. Fannin lives across the street from this farm, and his wife's grandfather was Jim Webster's first cousin. When Jim Webster died in 1922, Mrs. Fannin attended the funeral and has verified that he was buried on his farm under a large Cedar tree which stands in the middle of the cow's pasture. My great uncle Nelson Barbour and I visited this gravesite, and there is a large stone knocked over out there, although there's no inscription on it. Mrs. Fannin also said that Jim's wife, Mary Ann Hayden, died first and is also buried on the same site. (See the picture of Jim Webster and family.) Their daughter, MARY JANE WEBSTER, is our ancestor.

MARY JANE WEBSTER.....Grandmother to Correne Barbour. Mary Jane Webster was born in 1865 and married George Washington Barbour at the age of 13. She had 12 children, including James Barbour, the father of Correne Barbour. When her father died, he left her the farm he owned on the Indian Gap Road outside of Frankfort. Mary died on March 21, 1940, at the age of 80, and is buried in the Choatesville churchyard cemetery with her husband.

\*William Haydon, born about 1740 in Spotsylvania County, Virginia, married Ann Ballard. Their marriage was prior to 1760. In 1776 he preempted 1000 acres of land on the Kentucky River, two miles above Lees Town (now in Franklin County). Early History shows that he and two of his sons, Benjamin and James, settled in the town of Lexington, Ky. in 1779. Old records in Fayette County, Ky. show that around the years of 1780-81 he was active in trading lots in Lexington.

†On Nov. 15, 1783 he sold to George Marshall the inlot assigned to his son Benjamin, at the corner of High and Broadway, then called Main Cross Street. He received as part payment a watch or a horse.

Jervey married Mary; Ezekiel married Polly, William married Ann Ballard; Sara Ann married Millican; Elizabeth married Nelson and Mildred married Leavell.

WILLIAM HAYDEN.....4th great grandfather to Correne Barbour.

William Hayden was born in 1740 in Spotsylvania county, VA. . Just prior to 1760 he married Ann Ballard, the daughter of Bland Ballard Sr. and Francis Shiftlett. William moved his family to Lexington, KY in 1779, and then to Leestown (first settlement of what is now Frankfort) in 1783. His will named the following children:

William and Ann's son JAMES HAYDEN is our ancestor.

JAMES HAYDEN.....3rd great grandfather to Correne Barbour.

James Hayden was born in Spotsylvania county, VA in 1763. On June 14, 1792, James married Susannah Gore (b. 7-1-1775) the daughter of William Gore. I have included the pension application that was filed for James's service with the government as an Indian spy. This gives a detailed biographical sketch. James and Susannah had the following children's names recorded in their family Bible:

When asked when he came to Kentucky, William Haydon replied that he had come and landed at Leestown (first settlement of what is now Frankfort) in 1776 and made place of abode until the following June, then went back to his home in Spottsylvania County, Virginia. He stated that he was with Willis Lee and others in the month of June at Lee's Spring on branch of Elkhorn Creek, starting from Leestown and traveling along Big Buffalo Road.

"In 1780, I made an entry for land in the name of Benjamin Haydon, which entry I called Lee's Stamping Ground. Joseph Lindsay and I made claims at Bryant's Station on east branch of north fork of Licking, near Mayslick. I moved my family to Kentucky in 1779, Lexington, and having been a

James Haydon, son of William and Ann [Ballard] Haydon, was born in Spottsylvania Co., Virginia, (St. George Parish). When very young he came to Kentucky with his father.†

At the age of fourteen years he enlisted in the army and while residing in Lexington, Kentucky, served at various times from 1790 to 1796 as an Indian spy and ranger under Captains Robert Patterson, William McConnell and William Steele, Colonels John and Levi Todd and General George Rogers Clark.‡ He was also an Indian spy in 1790.§

He married Susannah Gore, in Franklin Co., (then Woodford Co.) Kentucky.†† She was the daughter of William Gore, soldier.

ANCESTRY OF CORRENE BARBOUR

THOMAS HAYDEN.....2nd great grandfather to Correne Barbour.

Thomas Hayden was born in Franklin county, KY on October 13, 1795. In 1813 Tom married Sarah Hawkins, the daughter of William Hawkins. They had several children, but Sarah Hawkins died and Thomas remarried. His second wife was Dollie Ann Wallace, the daughter of G.C. Wallace and Mary Jane. This information was obtained from the Hayden surname file in the KY Historical Society. I have searched the early marriage records of Franklin county, and the only "Wallace" marriage I could find was one of a Caleb Wallace marrying a Mary Brown. Could this be the G.C. Wallace and Mary Jane that are our ancestors? Thomas Hayden and his second wife, Dollie Ann Wallace, had only one child, Mary Ann Hayden. Dollie is listed as living with her daughter Mary Ann and son-in-law Jim Webster in the 1880 census of Franklin county, KY. It is not known where Thomas and Dollie are buried, but they are possibly buried on the farm of Jim Webster. Thomas Hayden's daughter, MARY ANN, is our ancestor.

MARY ANN HAYDEN.....Great grandmother to Correne Barbour. Mary Ann was born in 1838, and married Jim Webster in 1862 (See Webster section). Her daughter, MARY JANE WEBSTER, is our ancestor (Correne's grandmother).

INDIAN SPY until 1790

State of Kentucky, Franklin county, June 18, 1838, age 75, states that in the month of April, 1780, that he entered the service as an Indian spy under the command of Capt. Patterson and Colonel John Todd. Said the he was sent to Lexington, where they had erected a fort, in search of some Indians who had killed some whites and had stolen and carried off some horses, said they had directed their course toward the Big Eagle Creek for the purpose of \_\_\_ overhauling a party of Indians who had killed one of the spies by the name of Jacob Werner, that he searched the hills and cliffs at great risk of his life in attempting to overtake the Indians and had to return to the fort without overtaking them. On order of Col. John Todd again he returned to the woods spying and he states that during the year, 1780, that he served 5 months as an Indian spy, that early in the month of March, 1781, that the Indians again commenced their aggressions by killing whites and stealing and carrying off their horses when he was again called into the service by Colonel Todd. He states that during the year 1781 that he served 3 months in the Spring in every direction of that country, Indians were in the habit of traveling, lying in between Lexington and the Ohio River, lying north of the Kentucky River, during the time he states that he had frequent skirmishes with the savages. That as soon as the Winter broke, and early in the Spring of 1782, that he was again ordered into the woods by Capt. Patterson and Col. John Todd in search of the Indians whose number had increased very much. He states that upon returning to the fort at Lexington, that news had reached the fort that the Indians had besieged a fort known as Bryant Station, and some more of the spies were sent to relieve the fort under the command of Lieutenant McMullen, that in getting to the fort for its relief, had to pass at great risk through the Indians and with the loss of one of the spies, whom they shot and killed by the name of James McConnell, after the re-inforcements from Lexington had gotten into the forts he states that a special engagement took place which lasted about one day and one-half during which time he states that there in the fort, two killed and one wounded. The names of the killed were John Adkins and Fredericks Mitchell. He also states that the Indians were headed by one Simon Gearty, a white man who demanded the surrender of the fort, saying that upon surrender that their lives could be spared, but otherwise they should be put to death. After failing in these attempts to get the fort, they with their leader, Simon Gearty, proceeded to the Blue Licks where the Indians in a battle killed over 80 of our men, among whom was Colonel John Todd, the Indians then left the south side of the river and went to their towns called the Pickaway towns, states that he returned to the fort at Lexington after

having spent 5 months in fatiguing service, against the Indians, and that early in September, 1782, that General Clark called upon Colonel Levi Todd, upon whom the command had fallen upon the death of Col. John Todd, for men to go against the Indians at their towns. States that he, under the command of Captain Patterson, left Lexington for Chillicothe campaign and joined general Clark's regiment at the mouth of Licking River, thence they proceeded across the Ohio River where Cincinnati now stands, thence to Chillicothe, thence to the Pickway towns where the Indians made battle and maintained the hard fight. They were, however, defeated with a loss of 25 or 30 of the men. He states that he stayed there sometime destroying their corn, and breaking up their huts, states they then returned to Kentucky at the mouth of Licking, where they were discharged by General Clark, having served 2 months on said campaign. That in the Spring of 1783, in March, that he was again sent out to spy by Colonel Levi Todd, and during that year he spied, he was constantly and actively employed, frequently meeting with the Indians, and having skirmishes with them, he continued to spy until the month of October, when they left the south side of the Ohio for their towns on the north, that during this last tour that he served 7 months as faithfully as it was in his power, during which time, he states, he suffered much from fatigue, and often from hunger.

States that he was born in Spotsylvania county, Virginia in 1763. States he does not have a record but that his age is recorded in the old Bible of his father's which is now in the possession of his brother. States he was living in Fayette county, KY when he entered the service, that he lived in Franklin county. He served under officers Levi Todd, John Todd, Capt. Patterson, Robert Johnson who was the father of Colonel (and later Vice President) Richard M. Johnson, and Capt. McConnell, and my tour to the north of the Ohio River was under the command of General Clark.

One John Mitchell said that he was also a pensioner and that he had personal knowledge of the service of said James Hayden. Affidavit of Benjamin Hayden, age 77, certify that I am well acquainted with James Hayden. States that he knows of each of the tours that he outlined in his above declaration and I know his statements to be correct about said tours. This statement was made in Henry county, KY., June 26, 1838. Shelby county, KY, affidavit of Bland W. Ballard, said he was well acquainted with James Hayden of Franklin county, KY. Said he was an Indian spy part of the time himself and has a personal knowledge of the services of said James Hayden. Shelby county, KY., James Ballard, age 76, states that he is well acquainted with James Hayden of Franklin county, KY., states that he has personal knowledge of his services in 1781 and 1782 as an Indian spy, having been with him a part of the time

himself.

In 1834, James Hayden made his application as follows: Said he served under Captain Robert Patterson, William McConnell was his Lieutenant, and Thomas McMullen his ensign, that they went from Fayette county, KY and marched against the Pickaway Indian towns and that in 1781 he was ordered by some of the commissioners under General Clark to hunt and kill Buffalo for the use of the troops under said Clark, in which service he killed, skinned, cleaned and delivered 4000 pounds of buffalo meat, which was received by the troops and which employed him nearly a month and for which he never received any compensation. Of said Hayden, the following notation is made, "The Pension Department will please forward the certificate in this case to James W Bacon or make any direct communications to him direct to Owen county, KY."

The widow Susannah Hayden states that she was born July 1, 1775, that her maiden name was Susannah Gore, her father's name was William Gore, that she was married June 14, 1792 by Rev. William Hickman. That they reared a large family, and that he (her husband) died April 13, 1840. Her son Fountain Hayden said that Rev. Hickman was a Baptist preacher, that his father died April 13, 1840, his mother died September 3, 1847. William Hayden, Thomas H. Hayden, Benjamin Hayden, John G. Hayden, Nancy Kendall, Fountain Hayden, Susan Ann Smither are their only surviving children. Affidavit of one, Edmond Poe, age 84, Franklin county, KY., states that he was well acquainted with James Hayden, deceased, who WAS A SOLDIER IN THE ARMY OF THE REVOLUTION\*\*\*, 1790, which was 2 years before his marriage, and remembers when he married and became acquainted with his wife, a few \_\_\_ after the marriage took place in 1792, in the county of Woodford, state of KY, and also recollects when the first child was born to them in 1793. Benjamin Long states that he was well acquainted with James Hayden, deceased, a soldier of the Revolutionary War and that he became acquainted with he and his widow, Susannah Hayden in 1818 and has lived as a neighbor up until the time of their death, often having heard James Hayden speak of his service in the Revolutionary War, and know them to be married. John Field served as a representative from Henry county, KY in the Legislature and prepared these pension papers. Susannah Hayden states that her husband always said he came to KY in the fall of 1779 with his father's family, although he was quite young, immediately engaged in the service of the country as an Indian spy, etc. That she can prove his service by Benjamin Hayden, his brother, and Lewis Vallandingham, both of whom she understands performed some service with him. This declaration made 9-8-1843. Susannah Hayden.

Deposition of Fountain T. Hayden, taken at the house of Susannah Hayden, Franklin, county, KY, 9-8-1843, states that he is 27; that he is the son of James Hayden and Susannah, that his father died April 13, 1840.

Deposition of Benjamin Hayden, taken in Henry county, KY, 8-17-1843, age 84, and a Revolutionary War pensioner, states that he was born in the state of VA. and moved to KY in the Spring of 1779, states that his brother, James Hayden, moved to KY in the Fall of 1779, and was at that time about 16 years of age, and when he came he brought with him his mother and the rest of the family that had been left behind and then settled at Lexington. This deponent states that soon after his brother James came to KY, as aforesaid, which was in the spring of 1779, that said James began acting as an Indian spy under Colonel John Todd and continued the same from the fall of 1779 for several years until after 1783. This deponent notes that James devoted the whole of his time from the period after said fall of 1779 to the conclusion of peace with Great Britain in 1783, to the acting as an Indian spy as aforesaid and this deponent himself was often in the company with him, in one of his tours when they marched against Vincennes. It was there he lost his horse, worth about \$80, for which he never received any compensation. His father's name was William Hayden and he was employed near his father's station as an Indian spy near the town of Frankfort. He moved from Leestown to Lexington in 1780. Said that he lived in Fayette, Woodford, and Franklin counties, about 6 miles from Frankfort.

This is one of the affidavits submitted along with the Civil War pension application that Noah Goin's wife, ANN E. (LERRY) GOINS submitted on behalf of her son, SANFORD GOINS, who was killed in the war.

On claim No. 222,451 of Ann E. Goins Mother of Sanford for Pension the affiant Samuel D. Stigora states that he has been a resident of Franklin county Kentucky about 20 years having <sup>before</sup> been a resident of the adjoining county of Shelby that for a period of about 30 years he was acquainted with Noah Goins, father of Sanford Goin and was one of his closest neighbors at the time of his death — living about 1/2 mile away. He was called in to watch or set up with his corpse soon after his death. He had no income neither had his wife from any source so far as affiant could see. At this time they lived on a small poor farm containing 47 1/2 acres which they had contracted for but never paid for. The land was pretty and poor and produced but little. Their daughter Katy Goins helped cultivate the land. This land was afterward sold for the purchase money and only brought \$300. Noah Goins left absolutely nothing except perhaps a few broken chairs, table and remains of a very old fashioned bed. I don't think he left any provision of any kind. They lived from March to month and very hard at that. I don't remember the exact date of Noah Goins death but think it was in Jan. 1874. I have no interest in this claim and not concerned in its prosecution in any way. c. J. Stigora


