
"Thanks again for the honor,"

Hinde. — Dr. Thomas Hinde born in Oxfordshire England, July, 1734, died in Clark County, Ky., in 1836. He served as surgeon mate during the French and Indian Wars, first at Louisburg and then on the staff of Gen. Wolfe, at Quebec, attending that General who fell into his arms, mortally wounded, soon after the fall of Quebec. He returned to England and served at the reduction of Bellisle. In 1765 he returned to Virginia, and settled at Hobb's Hole, Essex County. He was commissioned surgeon of the Continental Army by Gov. Patrick Henry and served throughout the war, receiving a military warrant for 20,000 acres of land in Kentucky. In 1797 he settled in Clark County, Dr. Hinde married September 24, 1767, Mary Todd Hubbard, daughter of Benjamin Hubbard, and left Essex. Children: 1. Elizabeth Clifford, born June 11, 1768; 2. It was the old Nathan Day home located near the mouth of Frozen in Breathitt County, Kentucky. Seven of my people are pictured in the above print made in 1906. My father, Thomas Sheridan Duncil, who was ten years old at the time is pictured at the top left side of the porch. He was the youngest of ten, all deceased. My grandfather and grandmother Stephen and Catherine (Burgess) Duncil are buried in the Lawson Cemetery on the other side of the river from the Day farm. It is of interest to know that my grandmother Catherine was a full-blooded Cherokee.

Editor's Note: In the mid-1930s, The Louisville Herald-Post conducted a genealogy column featuring materials sent in by its readers. We thought our readers would find the column interesting. We will reprint parts from this column each month. Because they were printed some 70 years ago, we do not have any other facts except those given below. We hope our readers enjoy the Kentucky Kinfolks column.

Calloway

My grandmother was Mary Calloway, a daughter of James Calloway and Sallie Bramlet. Their sons were Flanders, Dudley, Chelsey, James, Micajah, Edmund, and William. The daughters were Elizabeth, Susan, and Mary, my grandmother. Flanders Calloway married Jemima Boone, daughter of Daniel. Elizabeth was in the skiff with Frances Calloway and Jemima Boone when captured that fatal Sunday afternoon. They were rescued on Tuesday. I have heard my grandmother tell of their wonderful fortitude and presence of mind. Micajah and James Callloway were taken prisoners by the Indians at Blue Licks, Nicholas County, Kentucky. Micajah remained prisoner five years and was but 17 when he reached home.

Sanders-Saunders

Robert J. Sanders was born in Fairfax County, Virginia, January 22, 1803, and died August 12, 1899, at Chaplin, Kentucky. He had the following brothers and sisters: Lewis N. Sanders, born December 20, 1837; Evaline A. Sanders, born March 5, 1805, died young; Eliza A. Sanders, born June 10, 1806, married October 10, 1826, John Holsclaw of Bullitt County, Kentucky, and had issue: William H. Holsclaw, born July 21, 1827; Lewis Holsclaw, born February 15, 1829; B. Franklin Holsclaw, born March 16, 1831; and Eliza Sanders Holsclaw, born August 16, 1833. Robert J. Browning


