Mr. and Mrs. Chas. C. Boldrick will sail June 21 from New York on "The Roma" for Naples where they will be present at the ordination to priesthood of their son, Charles C. Young Boldrick has been studying in Rome for about five years. Following his ordination he will have one more year of study before returning home.

While abroad Mr. and Mrs. Boldrick expect to see the "Passion Play" at Oberammergau in Bavaria, and will visit places of interest in Europe. Their son will accompany them on the trip to the various cities and countries.

The Rev. Charles Carter Boldrick, Jr., who has been studying in Rome, Italy, for the past six years, arrived in New York Monday and is expected home today. He will say his first Solemn High Mass at St. Augustine's church Sunday morning at ten o'clock. Father Boldrick will be celebrant; Rev. J. A. Hogarty will be arch-priest and will deliver the sermon; Rev. Joseph J. Rives of Cloverport will be deacon; Rev. T. P. Kelly, a schoolmate of Father Boldrick and now an instructor at St. Charles Seminary, near Philadelphia, sub-deacon; Rev. Felix Johnson of this county, master of ceremonies. Quite a number of priests from this, the Louisville diocese, will be present in the sanctuary and will assist in the ceremonies. The mass by Van Bree will be sung by St. Augustine's male choir under the direction of Miss Cordelia Spalding.

Afterwards he went to Rome to take up his ecclesiastical studies and completed his work at the College of the Propaganda last June, where he finished with high honors, being awarded his Doctors Degree.

Father Boldrick has made a splendid record throughout his entire course and those who know him predict for him a future of great usefulness in his chosen profession.
