Richard Bradshaw

Traveling with his wife and their five children, none yet 10 years of age, Richard Bradshaw came by covered wagon from Kentucky in 1877 to make a home near Osage Mission. **KS**

Richard and his wife, Mary Elizabeth Jarboe, were both from Calvary, Kentucky. They were married in St. Stephan's Catholic Church on April 30, 1867, in Lebanon, Marion County, Kentucky. Richard (b. 2/4/1847) was the son of Claibourn Bradshaw (b. 1812) and Elizabeth Raley (b. 1824).

During their early years in Kentucky, Richard and Mary had three sons, James William (b. 3/13/1869), John Thomas (b. 8/22/1870), George Wilson (b. 6/25/1877) and two daughters, Sarah Catherine (b. 3/6/1868) and Mary Ellen (b. 4/5/1872). After establishing a farmstead three and one half miles north of St. Francis Church, the couple had six more children: Elizabeth (b. 9/11/1881), Ola May "Ollie" (b. 3/17/1883), Joseph Francis (b. 3/6/1885), Benjamin Bernard (b. 8/9/1887), Anna Lenora "Midge" (b. 11/5/1889) and Thomas Richard (5/21/1892-6/4/1892).

On Feb. 5, 1906, tragedy struck the Bradshaw family when Mary Elizabeth died at the age of 59. The following year, Richard returned to Kentucky and married a 41-year-old widow, Mary Ellen "Molly" Warden Jarboe (b. 10/3/1868) on Jan. 24, 1907. Molly's late husband, John Jarboe, had been a distant relative of Bradshaw's first wife.

Richard and his new wife, Molly, returned after their marriage to his Kansas farm home, accompanied by her four children, Henry John (b. 11/5/1892), Guy Bernard (b. 8/19/1894), Joseph Aaron (b. 1/12/1896) and Catherine Ann (b. 12/3/1898). Two years later, Richard and Molly had a child of their own, a daughter, Rachel Ursula (b. 11/10/1909).

During his lifetime Richard was an accomplished fiddler and played for wedding and other social gatherings. Richard died May 11, 1927, at the age of 80.

Of the Bradshaw children: James William married Rose Emily Scott; John Thomas married Anna Jeanette Marlow;

George Wilson married Euphemia Agnes Thompson and lived in California; Sarah Catherine married William Fager and lived in St. Paul; Mary Ellen married Laurence Eugene Whelan; Ola May "Ollie" married Owen Fowler and lived in California; Joseph Francis married Frances George; Benjamin Bernard married Caroline Philomena Schoenhofer and lived in St. Paul; Anna Lenora "Midge" married Joseph Ernest Coomes and moved to California; Rachel Ursula married John Henry Beachner and they lived in St. Paul, 45

Benjamin Bernard Bradshaw (8/9/1887-1/5/1954), son of Richard and Mary Elizabeth Jarboe Bradshaw, married Caroline Schoenhofer (1890-1975), daughter of John (1861-1946) and Mary Sommers (1865-1909) Schoenhofer, on June 9, 1908. The Schoenhofers migrated from Missouri to Eudora, Kansas, and later settled in the St. Paul area on a farm one and one-half miles north of St. Francis Church.

Benjamin and Caroline lived and farmed in the Erie-St. Paul-Walnut area. They were also in the feed, poultry and livestock business.

They had ten children: Mary Adeline, who married George Burkhart and after his death Cyril Heck, lived in St. Paul; Leland, who married Regina Westhoff, lived in the St. Paul-Walnut area; Irene Marie (died in infancy); Laurence James "Pete", who married Pauline Nunnink, lived in St. Paul; Ruth Elizabeth (died in infancy); Ernest Eugene, who married Clea Havely, lives in Salina; Cleo Marie, who married Tom Kavanagh, lived in Pittsburg; Joseph Eugene, who married Irene Boucher, lives in St. Joseph, Missouri; Rita Ann lived in rural Walnut and in St. Paul and presently resides at Prairie Mission Retirement Village in St. Paul; Benjamin Joseph, who married Marilyn Kavanagh, lives in the rural St. Paul-Walnut area.

He and Marilyn still reside at the original Bradshaw homestead five miles east of St. Francis Church in St. Paul, two miles north and one-half mile west on the south side of the road.

James and Bob live in St. Paul.



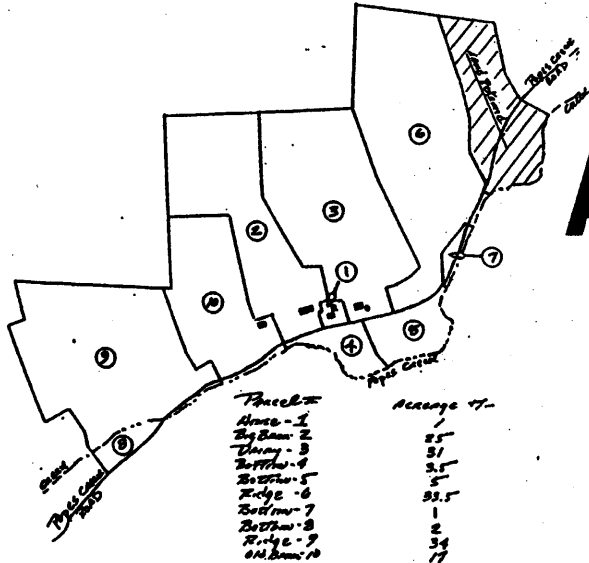



A WORD TO TOBACCO GROWERS.

As the season for opening our tobacco
market is near at hand, we desire to
place the following statement before
you:

In the last 60 days we have made our
best efforts to ascertain as far as possi-
ble all the facts likely to affect prices
for the 1912 crop of tobacco. We find
the average quality of the crop through-
out the Burley section probably the
finest in years, but very light in weight,
as is always characteristic of thin, colory
tobacco. The weight of this crop has
suffered further through the loss of a
large per cent. of the bottom leaves
from rust and excessive heat during the
cutting season.

The marked shortage in weight, con-
sidered with the unusual excellence of
quality in this crop, necessarily means,
in the opinion of the best authorities in
the tobacco trade, high prices. In fact,
many crops have already been bought
in this district and elsewhere by specu-
lators at prices ranging from 12 to 16
cents with some sales reported even
higher.

four large sales warehouses, all equipped
with every facility needed and with
ample capacity to handle the entire crop
of the district. Back of these ware-
houses, and perhaps the most valuable
and vital feature of our market, is the
array of live, energetic, wide-awake
buyers, each of whom represents one or
more of the largest tobacco factories in
the world, and back of these good buyers
are their immense handling plants,
drying machines, hydraulic presses and
modern equipment for taking care of
large quantities of tobacco.

Could you ask better market condi-
tions? Can you afford, with such a
market at hand, to put your judgment
against that of the experienced specu-
lators who are even now riding over the
country? Certainly not. Put your
tobacco on the open market where you
will be sure of the competition of all
legitimate buyers.

A year ago the Planters House,
through our local newspapers, predicted
high prices for tobacco and tried to
sound a note of warning to those grow-
ers inclined to sell at the barn, but
many of them did sell and at heavy
losses to themselves. We hope that the
growers will not again make this mis-
take, as we believe the man who grows
the crop earns and is entitled to every
dollar there is in it.
