YEAR ILLNESS ENDS IN DEATH

**Mrs. Mary E. Buckler Expires
At Residence In Lebanon
Monday Morning.**

MEADE COUNTY NATIVE

Terminating an illness of a complication of troubles which had confined her to bed for the past twelve months, Mrs. Mary E. Buckler, 62 widow of E. J. Buckler, died at her home on South Preston Park Avenue Monday morning at about 11 o'clock. Although she had been in bed for a number of years her condition was not such as to cause members of her family concern until the spring of 1936. Since that time she had gradually declined until her death.

Mrs. Buckler was a daughter of the late Charles Marcellus and Sarah Jones Hardesty and was born in Meade County near Elizabethtown where she spent her girlhood and where she obtained her education. On January 29, 1903 she was united in marriage to Mr. Buckler, a prominent farmer and stockman of this county. The ceremony was performed at the funeral of the Assumption church by Rev. James J. [unclear] pastor of St. Charles church. Following the funeral Mrs. Buckler was buried in the [unclear] cemetery.

Miss Borgia Thompson and Spencer Buckler, both of whom live in the Loretto section, were united in marriage at the Cathedral in Louisville Tuesday morning.

Following the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Buckler left on a bridal trip to Owensboro and points South. They expect to be gone about two weeks. Upon their return they will make their home on a farm near Loretto.

The bride is a daughter of Mrs. Bridget Thompson and is 20 years of age. The groom is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Buckler and is 22 years old. Both are well known and have many friends in the section where they live.

When Tommy and Wanda Buckler purchased the "Old Lawrence Thomas Farm" in 1975, they were disappointed to discover that the original ownership could not be found. The house dates back before 1863. Records preceding this year were destroyed in the Marion County Courthouse fire. They only hope to someday find the person who can answer all of their questions about the original home.

The Bucklers have worked hard to resurface the special qualities of the original construction and have uncovered several little surprises along the way.

Upon entering their charming kitchen, you will understand why Wanda enjoys showing their home to the many visitors who come to sample the food and warm hospitality. Tommy made the beautiful oak cabinets in the kitchen. The leaded glass in the cabinet doors was obtained from Tommy's childhood home. Around the top of the cabinets are several interesting collectibles. Wanda's favorite is her grandmother's butter churn that her grandmother churned butter in as a child. Another favorite is a bale of cotton that was given to Wanda as a gift from her sister, Lisa, who now lives in Mississippi.

Antiques mingle in harmony with the traditional furnishings throughout the house. The kitchen table was purchased for \$15.00 by Wanda at an auction and was painted green and white and several other colors too. Wanda and Tommy worked their magic and transformed it into a beautiful addition to their kitchen.

When the home was purchased, it sported a screened side porch. Out of modern necessity, the space had to be relinquished for a closet, bath and utility area.

In the remodeling process, the Bucklers uncovered the den's fireplace and ceiling beams. They scraped the walls, drywalled the ceilings and refinished the floors to complete the cozy background for their sitting area.

A few of the dear possessions in the den include the pie safe, which was a gift from the five sons of Mr. and Mrs. Deward Cox of Jessetown. Hanging over the door is a quilt which was sewn for Wanda by her grandmother when Wanda was only 5 years old. The red and white print "bonnet" hanging on the door to the pie safe was made by Wanda's great-grandmother. Wanda bought the floor lamp at Mrs. Nettie Smith's estate auction. Mrs. Smith was Wanda's 7th grade teacher. On the mantle is a gold pocket watch that belonged to Tommy's grandfather, Bertrand Buckler.

In the dining room is a beautiful table that has seven leaves. It belonged to Tommy's grandmother, Aileen Ferrell. Tommy made the china cabinet while he was a student at Marion County High School, and he surprised Wanda with the corner cupboard on Christmas 1990. On the child's table by the fireplace is a tea set which was handpainted by Wanda. There are several different chairs sitting throughout the home that were given to Tommy and Wanda that belonged to the late Dr. Bernard J. Baute, Tommy's grandfather.

Across the foyer is the living room where the "Blue Boy" print hangs, another loved, family hand-me-down. Marble was added around the fireplace and the mantle has been refinished.

Much satisfaction resulted from the great effort it took to restore the beautiful staircase that leads to the family's sleeping quarters.

Upstairs on the landing is a wardrobe that belonged to Wanda's great-grandmother. Wanda delights in her little-girl memories of the secret hiding place in the bottom of the wardrobe. Hanging on the front of this piece is the suit Wanda's father wore on his wedding day in 1954. Wanda has placed a red lantern next to the wardrobe in remembrance of Mrs. Yaste, a former occupant of the home. She visited the home once after the Buckler's purchased it and made the remark that she "remembered many a night coming down the stairs with a baby in one arm and a lantern in her other hand.

Daughter, Beth, occupies the pretty pink bedroom. Interesting old love letters, dating back to the early 1900's, were found behind the mantle during the remodeling process. Wanda has since returned the letters to the original recipient. Beth's elegant iron bed is a \$2.00 trash-to-treasure, and Tommy made her doll house, cabinet and crib. In the doll cabinet, Beth keeps a pair of her mother's little patent leather shoes. The shoes were purchased at the long gone King's Department Store in Lebanon for \$.99.

Opposite Beth's room is brother B.J.'s bedroom. Behind the mantle in this room were found an old shotgun and tobacco pouches. The baby bed, rocking horse, wooden train and chest were all made by Tommy. The teddy bear on the shelf is a "Roosevelt". Tommy's Aunt Jane Baute Sinner, first lady of North Dakota, designed the bear and sent one to each of her Kentucky families.

To the back of the foyer is the master bedroom. This room has been the hardest part of the renovation process. Wanda was told that this room was originally used for storage because it was directly over the kitchen area and warmer than the rest of the upstairs. For this reason, there were times in the winter months that this room was used to nurse runt pigs, raise pullet hens and store fruit. A closet and bath have been added. The tub came from Gene Brady's mother's home on High Street in Lebanon.

The very back room upstairs is now used as a guest bedroom. Located here is a "Button" bed which came from what was formerly Nazareth College in Bardstown.

The back stairway leads back down to the kitchen where wonderful aromas will stir anticipation for the scrumptious meal soon to be served. Feel free to stop Wanda and ask her about anything you've seen. She will even tell you about things you haven't seen!
