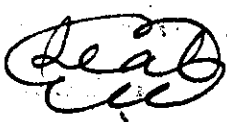

Burns and bounded as follows Beginning at a
Poplar in B. Cones line corner to Jack Burns, then
S. 18 E. to two Maples and a Beech cones corner
thence N. 80 E. 108 to two poplars and a beech
thence N. 224 to a Hickory and beech now
~~standing in Wm. Burns field~~ thence S. 80 E.
18 pp to Jack Burns corner (a stone) thence
with Jack Burns line to the Beginning
containing one hundred and twenty nine

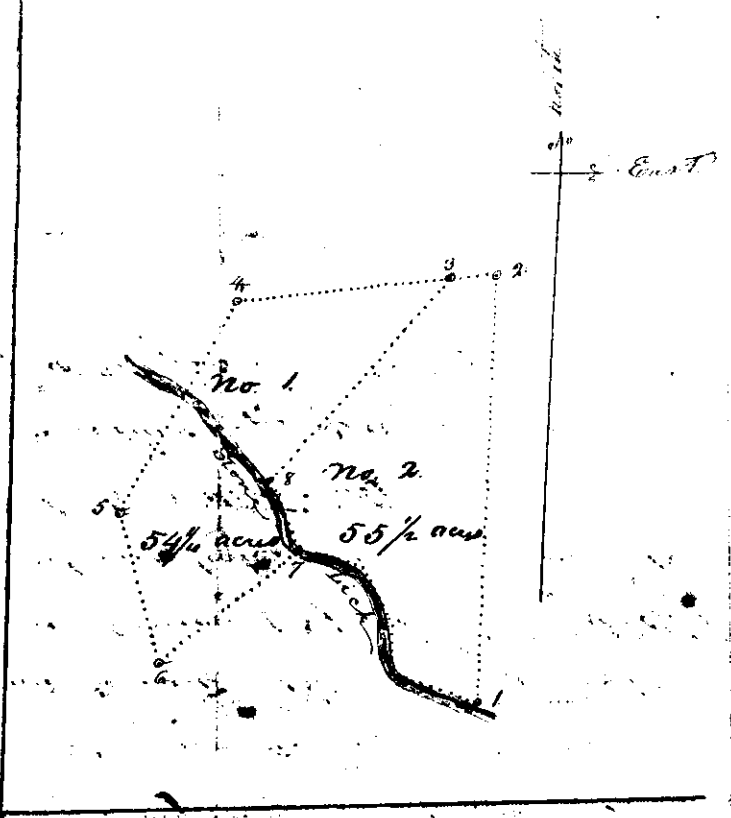

WALTER NOBLE BURNS.

Author, Former Newspaper Man and
Spanish War Veteran Dead.

CHICAGO, April 15.—Walter Noble Burns, author and former newspaper man, died today in Augustana Hospital after an emergency operation. He was 59 years old. He was best known as the author of "The Saga of Billy the Kid" and other stories of the Southwest.

Mr. Burns was born in Louisville and entered newspaper work there when he was 18. Later he made a whaling voyage out of San Francisco to the South Seas and the Arctic Ocean, on which he accumulated the material for his first book, "A Year With a Whaler," which was published in 1913. He served with the First Kentucky Infantry during the Porto Rican campaign of the Spanish-American War. He came to Chicago in 1910 and several years later joined the staff of The Chicago Tribune. He followed General Pershing's troops into Mexico in their pursuit of Pancho Villa in 1916 as a correspondent of The Tribune.

After the World War he was connected for a number of years with Vanderhof & Co., Chicago advertising agency. More recently he had spent his time gathering lore of the Southwest for his books. He made his home in San Antonio, Texas, until recently, returning to Chicago a few months ago.

He is survived by his widow.

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
