Will L. Burrice, 59, Is Buried At New Market

Following a protracted illness of complications, William Louis Burrice, 59, formerly of Lebanon, died Saturday morning at the General Hospital in Louisville. He had been under treatment there for about six weeks, and for some time previously had been in bad health.

The remains were brought to the Bosley Funeral Home and were there until the funeral services, which were conducted at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Muldraugh's Hill Baptist Church by the Rev. H. F. Rawlett. Interment was in the New Market Cemetery. Pallbearers were W. M. and Raymond Newcome, Howard, Willard and Ray Sapp, and Herbert Clark, Jr.
