Just a note to ask for a little help.
Do you know a family of "Skinner"
not far from Bradfordville?

Price Skinner's will was dated 1876
Bk. 1 page 238 in Marion Co and recorded
June 15 - 1868. Don't ask me how!!
But the 1876 is on edge or margin of Book
and a date of June 15 1868 is above his
signature. I found it today in Marion Co
Price married Lydia Catlin, sister to
John W. Catlin & daughter of James, gr. daughter of
Seth Catlin. Rachel, Richard, Elizabeth (Price)
Esther & Nancy all married about 1816-1824
The girls' were signed for by mother Nancy.
I don't know the father but the family
came here after 1810 and after 1834 in Marion
Nancy married John W. Catlin.

In the will, I see he exempted the
family graveyard from the sale of his land.
It was $\frac{1}{4}$ acre. Did you ever hear
of it?

These are the ancestors of our tribe
of Arnolds near Texas this Co, and
in Boyle around Perryville.

I had to separate these from another
group distinctly not kin, but in Macksville
from Woodford Co: Ky early.

How are you doing? Today is
lovely - and I am enjoying my 83rd
Birthday.

Mary Jo is very busy with our 83rd
Centennial Celebration + our bulletin, and
she admits being "tired" and looks it!
Sylvia Taylor + her mother are moving
back to Detroit whenever they find a house.
The plan here did not work out well.

I apologize for the tardiness of this response. Our library has a backlog of requests. The local Historical Society has begun assisting in responding to queries.

Please find enclosed copies of the 1880, 1860 Census records. Have also enclosed a page from Washington Co Marriage Records. Also enclosed is a current Marion Co map. I have highlighted Ways Chapel - this road is less than 2 miles long. Highlighted the area known as Haysville and found on the 1870 map of Marion County a P. Catlin on Lick Run & have highlighted.

For additional information check the deeds at Marion Co Courthouse. Catlin married into Hagan's & Skinner family. There are no Catlins (by that last name) in this county.

Hope this has been helpful.

Do you have any information on her and her family?

In the Circuit Court Suits at the Washington County Courthouse the following information was obtained about the Catlins. There was a disagreement between James Curry and his father and Seth and his son James Catlin. This disagreement was over slaves and went on for several years. The following is abstracted from James Curry , James and Seth Catlin's deposition. These depositions were made 5-11-1792.

James Curry's deposition: In the spring 4-12-1789, James Curry, followed Seth and James Catlin to Kentucky, from Kent County, Delaware. In Delaware Curry had mortgaged to James Catline, five Negroes slaves, a man named Hersy, a woman named Grace, and 3 children, Hersy, Charles and Alice, all of whom had belonged to Curry's father, for the sum of 51 pounds, 2 shillings and 3 pence. James Curry and his father went to the home of Seth Catline, father of James Catlin in August 1790 to demand possession of the Negroes. Mr. Curry wanted to repay the debt to the Catlins although

his property had been mortgaged without his consent. Seth declared he would not part with the Negroes, but James agreed to settle and said he would be in Fayette county in a month or two and that they would then settle it. However before Curry left Seth proposed to keep the 3 children and Curry agreed. But Seth Catline's wife stated she must have the negro wench. Mr. Curry agreed to let them have Dinah about 15 years old and he was to take the children. Curry over the course of the fall and spring obtained possession of the negro man Hersy and woman Grace and the child Alice. The other two boys ages 10 and 9 were kept by Seth. The following spring Curry again went to James and Seth and it was agreed that Curry should have the 2 Negroes boys and leave Dinah with the Catlins.

Seth and James Catlin's response: After the Catlins had proceeded about 70 miles they were overtaken by James Curry. Curry stated he was waiting for the sheriff's sale of John Banning's Negroes and since it would be a useless consumption of time and money, proposed to assign to James Catline a bill of sale for the Negroes. Catlin paid Curry and brought the Negroes at his expense to this country. The boy Kerse being then 5 or 6, the boy Charles being 4 or 5, and the girl Alice being then in her mother's arms. Sometime after he arrived in Kentucky, about the month of July 1789, Curry came Catlin's house and after expressing his satisfaction and thanks for what this Catlin had done for him told him that he wished to settle that business and proposed to give Catlin L120 for the slaves. Catlin refused, saying by the contract he was entitled to a part of the Negroes, that they were what he wanted and that he had been prevented from buying and bringing with him other Negroes. Curry stated that he would deliver to Catlin, a girl about 12 or 13 years of age and let him keep the two boys Kerse and Charles, in return for the man Kerse, his wife Grace and the girl Alice. Catlin refused and it was agreed to refer the matter to Anthony Sadowsky. Sadowsky refused to decide but gave as his opinion, that the proposition was reasonable and just. *MEG's note: Evidently this division of the slaves was made. For in 1799 Curry was in possession of Kerse, Grace and Alice while Catlin had Dinah and the boys Kerse and Charles.* Curry came to Catlin a second time in June 1799 and stated he wished to give Catlin satisfaction and at the same time preserve some part of his property in the slaves. Finally the Catlins agreed to give Curry the young woman Dinah and the two boys Kerse and Charles in return for Herse, Grace and Alice. James Catlin returned home taking with him Grace and Alice. Curry was to deliver Herse to James after he got to his house, but Curry absolutely refused to do. Kerse ran away in June, and Curry believed Kerse to be living with the Catlins.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky to the sheriff of Washington County greeting, you are hereby commanded to summon Theodore Catlin to appear before the Judges of our Circuit Court for the Washington Circuit at the courthouse on the first Monday in October to answer a presentment of the grand jury exhibited against him for not clearing and keeping the road from Castleman's run to William Hays's in repair according to law of which he is appointed and this he shall in no wise omit under the penalty of 100 pounds and have that in there this writ. Witness John Reed Clerk of our said court at the courthouse aforesaid the 1st day of July 1803.

to send Dinah by him at his return; which promise the Compt repeated after he got to his house, but finally refused to comply with as this Deft believ from the persuasions of his wife, and this Deft was obliged to return without the said Dinah.

The Deft denies all unlawful combinations ^{without} that that be, and prays to be hence dismissed with his costs and charges in this behalf expensable.

That he discharged the said execution with the money and property of the other Deft Seth Catline, which the said James Curry knew to be the case. That the receipt which he took for the amount of the said execution from John Banning, in whose name the said bill had been issued, he kept in his possession, until after the Compt had executed the bill for the three negroes in the bill mentioned, when he delivered the same to him with the consent of the other Deft Seth Catline. This Deft further saith, that he was present at no conversation what papers respecting this business between the Compt and the Deft Seth Catline from the June 1790. That the Compt then agreed to give to this Deft full satisfaction for his demands upon him, the negroes, Daniel and the boys Luce and Charles, and this Deft at the request of the Compt drew the bill of sale for the said three negroes, which after having first read to the Compt, he delivered to him, by whom it was again read; and then executed and delivered to the Deft Seth by the Compt having also been witnessed by this Deft.
