NOW PRESIDENT
OF TWO BANKSPercy Johnston Becomes Head of
Two Big New York Banking
Institutions.

Percy H. Johnston, formerly of this city, now president of the Chemical National Bank in New York, seems to have carried to the metropolis the practice of merging banks.

Announcement has just been made in New York of the merger of the Chemical National and the Citizens' National under the name of the Chemical National. The combined institution will have a capital of \$4,500,000, surplus of \$13,500,000, undivided profits approximating \$1,000,000, gross deposits of \$140,000,000, and total resources of \$200,000,000.

The Chemical National was formed in 1824 and the Citizens' National in 1851.

Mr. Johnston will continue as president of the merged institutions. He is now ranked as one of the foremost bankers of New York.

CISSELL LOSES CAR.



per case, but mostly I used the low-powered Klenbore No. 5 shot, which cost 21¢ each.

I had a little trick I used when I asked a farmer if we could hunt. I would always check his mailbox, and whatever his last name was, it would be my last name, also. Many times this would rake up some distant relations.

One time on Slate Creek, I asked the farmer if we could hunt, and he told us to go ahead. "If you jump those wild guineas up, kill me some," he said. We did jump them up and killed about 20. On the way back to the car, another car pulled up and stopped. The driver said, "I heard a lot of shooting; you kill a lot of rabbits?" I said, "We were just killing the farmer some guineas." The man said, "The guineas don't belong to that farmer. I am the game warden, and those guineas belong to his neighbor. I am sure he won't care. You got any extra?" We gave him four. I took two home, and the meat was real dark. I didn't care for it, and I never shot any more guineas.

After rabbit season was over, I would go back to the farms where I hunted and help them strip tobacco. In the 1930s, you had to make hands of the tobacco into seven grades. The bottom leaves were flyings, then first was trash, second trash, leaf, lug, long red, and short red. When this was made into a hand, a leaf of short red was used to wrap around the hand of tobacco. Then all of the tobacco was bulked down until market time.

Today, the tobacco is stripped and put in one big bale.

In the early 1930s, we lived on a farm on Little East Fork in Lawrence County. We raised acres of tobacco each year, and it was a 12-month job. We burnt the tobacco bed in February, plowed the fields as soon as possible, and sowed the tobacco bed as soon as the weather permitted. We always had to cover the bed with muslin. Our bed was always nine feet wide and 90 feet long. If we had any tobacco plants leftover after planting, we sold them.

We set out the tobacco plants by hand. Sometimes I would set a row 300 feet long without looking up. My brother would drop the plant, and I would make a hole with my dibble and put the plant into it. Then Dad would pour the water in it, and I would rake the dirt back around the plant and firm it.

I always liked going to the Maysville market, because I knew how to stem the big lug leafs and twist it into a good hard twist. I would have some shoe boxes of tobacco twists that the men liked to chew. I sold enough to buy a good pair of red rubber boots and a knife. Those were the days.

When I was five years old, we moved to Marion County to my grandmother's farm. We all worked in the garden, took care of the cows, and canned vegetables and fruit. The older boys milked the cows, but we all had chores. Soon after we moved there, Mom and my two older brothers went to work for the Sisters at Loretto Academy. Mom worked as a cook, and Jerry and Nathan worked on their farm.

The Sisters were very good to us. At Christmas they sent big boxes of warm clothes, fruit and candy, and a few school supplies. They also sent my first doll and a comb/brush set for my sister. We were thrilled.

Mother remarried when I was eight, and we moved to Papa's farm. Papa had a big farm with cows, horses, hogs, and chickens. We all worked hard at picking blackberries, tending the garden, canning, cooking, cleaning, and loads of ironing.

Two more brothers were added to our household, and most of us graduated from high school. My three older brothers left for the military, shortly after Mom remarried, and served with honors.

We all miss Mom very much. She

My Mother

My mother, Clara Nalley Donahue, was left a widow at 31 years of age. My father was Huber Donahue who died at the age of 33 of a ruptured appendix. Mom told us that he was a farmer and moonshiner. I was born four months later.

There were six of us to feed, and I can only imagine how trying it must have been on Mom. Jerry was ten, Nathan eight, Earl six, Carolyn four, Jim two, and I was a newborn baby.

We moved to New Hope, Nelson County, Kentucky, and Mom took in washing and ironing for the wealthier families in the community. We all went to school, were fed well, and wore home-made clothes.

HISTORY

STATISTICS

This ancient and distinguished surname, borne by the Earls of Salisbury and Exeter, the Barons Burghley, and the Viscounts Wimbledon, is of Old Welsh origin, and derives from the Old Welsh male given name "Seisyll(t)", apparently ultimately from the Latin "sextilius", a derivative of "sextus", "sixth(-born)". This name was borne by various saints and popes in the early centuries of the Christian era, and subsequently adopted in their honour. Early bearers of the Welsh form of the name were Seisyll ap Clydog (flourished 730), first King of joint Ceredigion and Ystrad Tywi, and Seisyllt ap Clydog (flourished 925), Lord of Gwynedd.

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The name is well recorded in the Welsh border counties, appearing as "Saissil" and "Seisil" respectively in the Domesday Book of 1086 for Herefordshire, and the 1188 Pipe Rolls of Shropshire. The Cecils were originally Welsh gentry, and David Cecil, grandfather of Lord Burghley, who had espoused the cause of Henry Tudor, came to court in London after the latter became king in 1485. William Cecil, Lord Burghley (1520 - 1598), was lord high treasurer 1572 - 1598, and chief adviser to Elizabeth 1. His eldest son, Thomas, became first Earl of Exeter, and Robert, another son, was created Earl of Salisbury in 1605. A Coat of Arms held by the Cecil family is a shield divided per barry of ten silver and azure, over all six black escutcheons, three, two, and one, each charged with a lion rampant of the first. The first recorded spelling of the family name is shown to be that of William Seisil, which was dated 1205, in the "Pipe

Rolls of Herefordshire", during the reign of King John, known as "Lackland", 1199 - 1216. Surnames became necessary when governments introduced personal taxation. In England this was known as Poll Tax. Throughout the centuries, surnames in every country have continued to "develop" often leading to astonishing variants of the original spelling.


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
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THE DATABASE

CECIL, THOMAS HARRISON, 1825-1908, was born on a farm on the Bardstown-Frankfort Turnpike near Little Mount, Spencer County, KY to Robert Aaron, c1793-1854, and Ann "Nancy" (NEWMAN) CECIL, c1799-1844. His grandparents were Augustine C., 17xx-1833 and Frances (HAMMETT) CISSELL, 1773-184x and Henry, 1759-1835, and Ann (_____) NEWMAN. The Cecil's and Hammetts were from St. Mary's County, MD. Augustine died in the terrible Asiatic Cholera epidemic of 1833 on July 5th. His tombstone is still standing in Holy Cross Cemetery in extreme western Marion Co., KY. Henry Newman's broken tombstone is lying in Abandoned St. Benedict's Cemetery, near Little Mount, Spencer Co., KY on property once owned by Henry NEWMAN. Nancy (NEWMAN) CECIL's nephew Judge John Ezekiel NEWMAN, of Bardstown, was a legal scholar and author of national note. The tombstones of Robert Aaron and Nancy (NEWMAN) CECIL, who were married in Shelby Co., KY on Nov. 27. 1815, are both in Holy Cross Cemetery. Robert Aaron married secondly to Sarah BROWN and if they had issue, I am not aware of it.

Thomas Harrison CECIL's siblings were: William Henry CISSELL, 1819-1900; Andrew CISSELL; James CISSELL, c1826-xxxx; John H. CECIL, c1833-xxxx; William Matthew Cissell; Susan (CISSELL) PHILLIPS; Rachel (CECIL) MARADRES; Elizabeth (CECIL) CLEMENTS, 181x-184x; Martha Jane (CISSELL) PAYNE, c1832-xxxx; Robert Aaron CECIL, Jr., c1834-1876, and Frances Ann (CISSELL) BURNES, c.1819-1857.

Thomas H. was married to the widow Rose Aletha (SPALDING) MILLER, 1829-1915 at St. Catharine Church, New Haven, Nelson Co., KY by Rev. Robert Abner Abell on November 26, 1849. Rose Aletha, who was born June 16, 1819, the second child of Michael SPALDING, (14 July 1802 - 4 April 1860) who married on 15 July 1826 to Nancy WILLETT (27 July 1804 -19 November 1846). Rose Aletha's father married secondly to Thomas Harrison's paternal widowed aunt, Mahala (CISSELL) CAMBRON, 1806-1872. Michael and Mahala had no issue. She was the granddaughter of John Aaron "Aaron", 1752-1825, the Revolutionary War hero, and Eleanor "Nelly (MATTINGLY) SPALDING, 17xx-1803, and Thomas, 1773-1838, & Sarah (BRYAN) WILLETT, 17xx-182x. Rose Aletha's siblings were: Sarah Ellen, c1828-1829; Sarah Ann GIBBONS, 1831-xxxx; Thomas, 1833-1845; Mary Elizabeth "Bet" THOMAS ANDERSON, 1835-1920; William T., 1837-1878; Philip A. 1839-1941; James Henry, 1841-1877; Benjamin Walter, 1843-1877; and Robert Logan, 1846-19xx. Michael and Nancy lived on Howardstown-New Haven Turnpike about a mile and a half north of Howardstown and they and several of their children are buried at St. Catherine Cemetery, New Haven, Nelson Co., KY, near the outdoor altar. Michael Sapling's Spalding, Mattingly, and CLARK roots are in St. Mary's County, MD. Nancy's Willets ancestors came to KY with the Pottingers, who were relatives, and were among the first inhabitants of Pattinger's Station near New Hope.

CECIL, Thomas Harrison, 1825-1908 *(continued)*

Rose Aletha's first husband, William P. MILLER, 18xx-184x, who died when a boiler exploded on a train, left her with one daughter, Louisa Ann (MILLER) ROBERTS, 1847-1915, who lived at Holy Cross, KY. She and Thomas H. had these 14 children: James Achilles "Jim", 1850-1917, married Mary Catherine "Kate" THOMPSON, sister of Joe L. THOMPSON, a Frederictown merchant is buried in Holy Trinity Cemetery near Fredericktown; Robert Michael 1853-1853; Helena, 1854-1856; William H., 1856-1856, Nancy Newman "Nannie" COOK, 1858-1926, was the second wife of William T. "Blunderbuss" COOK, and is buried near her parents at St. Francis Xavier Cemetery, Raywick, KY; John Gore, 1860-1943, a Raywick merchant, married Sallie LOGSDON and is buried at St. Dominic Cemetery, Springfield, KY; Thomas Jefferson "Jeff", 1863-1958, married Henrietta HOWARD, farmed near Trappist, KY and is buried in the secular cemetery at the Archabbey of Our Lady of Gethsemani at Trappist, KY; Robert Logan "Logue", 1865-1936, married Dorothea "Dora" GRIFFITH, was a Vine Grove merchant, and is buried at St. Brigid Cemetery, Vine Grove, KY; Mary Delphina, 1868-1868; Elizabeth Humbelina, 1868-1868; Rose Aletha "Allie" THOMPSON, 1869-1933, *(my ancestress, for more on her and her descendants see the entry in this book titled THOMPSON, Joseph Lloyd "Joe L.", 1864-1944)*; Joseph 1872-1872; Mary, 1872-1872; and Margaret, 1874-1874. The eight infants have tombstones at St. Vincent de Paul Cemetery, New Hope, Nelson Co., KY. The home where Rose Aletha (CECIL) THOMPSON, 1869-1933 was born, on the left of KY Highway 84 as you are headed west toward and about one mile before the Rolling Fork bridge, just before the highway bends south to approach this river bridge. Thomas Harrison and Rose Aletha (SPALDING) CECIL moved to Raywick about 1900 and are buried side by side in St. Francis Xavier Cemetery at Raywick. I descend from Thomas Harrison CECIL through his grandson who was named for him, Thomas Cecil "Cecil" THOMPSON, 1897-1964, my dad. —submitted by Gerald Thompson.

CISSELL, Francis Marion, 1846-1892 was born February 16, 1846 on the Plantation Licks farm at the headwaters of Slate Creek, a tributary of Prather's Creek, about three miles northwest of Raywick, KY to Martin V., c1807-1881, and Mary Catherine "Kitty" (MARTIN) CISSELL, c.1809-1881. His grandparents were Jeremiah CISSELL, 1773-184x, and Mary (VESSELS) CISSELL, 17xx-18xx and Samuel Lee MARTIN, 17xx-1838, & Mary (LEAKE) DARNELL MARTIN, c1775-185x. Jeremiah was the son of the KY pioneer, John Baptist CISSELL, 17xx-1799 and his first wife, Rebecca. Jeremiah's birth is registered in the St. Andrew's Episcopal Parish Register, near Leonardtown, St. Mary's County, MD. Marion was baptized on September 18, 1850 at St. Francis Xavier Church by the Rev. James Ward who said the infant was about five years of age. His sponsors were Mary NALLY and Mahala Jane NALLY, Parish Register I, Page 30, recipient #246. His son, Ed, my great uncle, shared his father's birthday and gave me this date at his hotel in Lebanon, KY.

Marion, the third child in this family, had these brothers and sisters: 1) Celia Ann FENWICK, c.1832-1892; 2) William John, c.1843-1899; and 4) Christopher Columbus, 1850-185x. From Martin V.'s will #231, at the Marion County Clerk's Office in Lebanon, we learn that the neighbors of the buffalo salt lick farm were: Thomas Pike, Frank Carrico, Joseph McCauley, Mike Costello, Mrs. Susan J. Kelly, Mr. Smock and R. W. Ray. This will was witnessed by Joseph McCauley and Alexander Alvey.

Marion married Mary E. "Molly" DANT, June 27, 1849 - January 12, 1941, the oldest child of James, 1831-1899 & Elizabeth Ann "Eliza" (BLAIR) DANT, 1830-1910, at St. Francis Xavier Church, Raywick, KY. This wedding was witnessed by Father Joseph Elder on May 1, 1866 in the presence of Wilford BLAIR, Jr. and Harriet Carrico. Molly's grandparents were: John Baptist, 1799-1881, and Mary Jane (SMITH) DANT, xxxx-184x, and Wilford, Sr., 1794-1851, and Mary Jane (WATHEN) BLAIR, 1805-1864. They lived on a farm that was a part of the original Plantation Licks farm and raised these 13 children: 1) Mary Alice MATTINGLY, 1867-1944; 2) Anna Belle, 1867-1868; 3) Frances Apolonia McCUALEY, 1870-1894, 4) Mary Katherine "Kate" LEAKE, 1872-1952; 5) James Magnificus, 1874-1901; 6) Margaret E. "Maggie", 1876-1892; 7) John DeHahn, 1878-1910; 8) Charles Leo, 1880-1927; 9) Joseph Bernard, 1882-1940; 10) Mary Belle HUGHES, 1884-1957, (*my maternal grandmother, for more on her, see the article titled, HUGHES, George Edward, 1882-1958, Mary Belle's tombstone incorrectly gives her birth year as 1883*); 11) Mary Emma, 1886-1903; 12) Leonard Monroe, 1888-1970, and 13) Edward Dant, 1891-1976.

Marion died January 4, 1892 of influenza, aged 45 years, ten months, and 19 days. At the time of his death, his wife and all of his children but two were sick, in bed, with flu, some near death. Only Len and Ed, from his immediate family, were able to attend his funeral. He was buried the day of his death in St. Francis Xavier Cemetery. The tombstone, erected in the late 1960's by his sons Len and Ed, for his wife and him is beneath the crucifix near the center of the old part of the cemetery, spells his surname CECIL, even though he used CISSELL. Len and Ed changed the spelling of their surname to CECIL at the insistence of the Trappist monks at the school conducted at the Archabbey of Gethsemani.

CISSELL, Francis Marion, 1846-1891, (continued)

Molly, a widow for 49 years and eight days, was quite a colorful character. She was a very determined and resourceful person and reared the six children younger than 17, when her husband died young. She faced her blindness, which afflicted her from about 1916 to 1936, with great courage and did not let it make a recluse of her. She wore one glass eye, had cataract surgery and saw all her grandchildren and great grandchildren, which were born between c1916-1936. She outlived and buried seven of her 13 children. She was sixteen the year the Civil War ended and held me in her 91st year, in the summer of 1940, when I was a baby. I have a copy of a newspaper picture of her receiving an old age assistance check from Governor Albert B. "Happy" Chandler, in 1936. She was 87 and the lady with her was Mrs. Phoebe A. Moore, 97, of Winchester, KY. They were the oldest applicants in KY for old age assistance to that time. She was the niece of J. W. DANT who founded the Dant Distilling Company. She lived to see two of her daughters celebrate their golden wedding anniversaries and to see descendants to the fifth generation. My childhood was enhanced with many stories about her. She died at seven o'clock Sunday morning, January 12, 1941, at the home of her son, Len CECIL. Molly's siblings were: 2) James Rowan, 1851-1930; 3) Charles H., 1853-1927; 4) Margaret Ann WIMSATT, 1856-1899; 5) Elizabeth Emma, 1859-1877; and 6) Frances Jane "Fannie" MITCHELL, 1861-1953. My mother, Mary Jeanette (HUGHES) THOMPSON, 1906-1965, was her granddaughter and as a teenager led her to the communion rail many times at Sunday masses. She rests beside her husband at St. Francis Xavier Cemetery, Raywick, KY. *(submitted by Gerald Thompson)*
