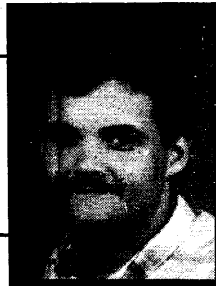
## Douglas Troy Coffey, 26
