Was mustered into the First Kentucky (Woolford's) Cavalry as Second Lieutenant of Company B. July 21st, 1891; was mustered into Washington Harlan Post No. 76, G. A. R., March 3rd, 1900; was elected Post Commander of said Post December 19th, 1902. He was one of the most zealous and useful members of the Post and will be sadly missed by his comrades.-- Danville Advocate.
