

S. T. MAYES, 89, IS TAKEN BY DEATH

Long Illness Fatal Sunday To Retired New Market Farmer.

Stith Thomas Mayes, 89, widely
known retired farmer of the New
Market community, died at his home
there Sunday evening at 7:45 o'clock
following a lingering illness of heart
dropsy and other complicated troubles.
Although he was confined to bed
only a few days, he had long been in
failing health and had not been
actively engaged in farming for nearly
six years.

About eighteen months ago, he
suffered a slight paralytic stroke
but, in spite of his advanced age re-
covered promptly. His sturdy con-
stitution also enabled him to with-
stand several subsequent strokes,
and until a few weeks ago he seemed

to be in good condition. It was
evident that his death was
imminent.

Lived At New Market 23 Years.

Mr. Mayes was a son of the late
S. T. and Amy Hilton Mayes and was
born June 1, 1860 in Washington
County where he spent his youth. He
came to this county as a young man
and until his retirement followed the
vocation of agriculture. He had lived
at New Market the past twenty-
three years.

Twice married, his first wife pre-
ceded him to the grave many years ago.
On October 29, 1891, he was
wed to Miss Carolina Howard
Barker, who survives him. Also sur-
viving are two sons and five daugh-

Margaret Davis Sparrow married ~~to~~ John Sparrow & one of their children was William Davis Sparrow. He is my grandparent. John Sparrow abandoned his family of Margaret & they lived with the Crews family. John was killed in a buggy accident but I can't find when or where he was buried.

I have a lot of information about the Crews family which I got from a second Cousin of mine - Ruby Crew Lee. I've seen her bible so most of the info I have is correct. What you sent me about the Little Berry Crews genealogy agrees with mine & fills in some of my blanks. I'm glad you sent it.


