PARKING ORDINANCE PASSED

The City Council at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening passed an ordinance that prohibits parking automobiles on Main street between Spalding avenue and Depot street, and also on Proctor Knott avenue between Main and Mulberry streets. Machines may be stopped on the blocks mentioned only long enough to permit a person to alight or to get into a machine. A person who leaves his auto on the blocks mentioned for even so long as five minutes violates the law and is liable to a fine of from \$5 to \$50. The ordinance appears in full elsewhere in this issue, and should be read by every car owner.

The only other business transacted Tuesday evening was the passage of an ordinance forbidding the burning of leaves either on the streets or on one's premises. The City and County Boards of Health asked the passage of the ordinance, stating that burning leaves was a menace to the health of the community and almost criminal at this time in account of the scarcity of water. Mayor Spalding presided at the meeting and Councilmen Lee Adams, C. C. Watson, G. B. Edelen and Ed Abell were present. The absent members were Councilmen Maurice Doody and R. Vanmeter.

William Thomas Davis, 82-year-old retired farmer of the Loretta section, who for the past few years had resided at St. Mary, died at 5:45 a.m. last Wednesday at Marian Manor after a long illness. He had been a patient at the nursing home the past three months.

He was a Marion County native, son of William T. and Maria Williams Davis. He was twice married. His first wife, Mrs. Cynthia Goober Davis, died 27 years ago. He later was wed to Miss Gertrude Buckman, who died three years ago. He was a member of St. Charles Church and the Holy Name Society.

Four sons and three daughters survive. They are Robert Wallace and J. D. Davis, both of Lebanon, and Bill Davis, DeBary, all sons; Mrs. Myrtle DeBary, Mrs. Edna Meredith, Louisville, and Miss Cynthia Davis, St. Mary, also a sister, Mrs. Loretta Rydbeck, Louisville, are grandchildren, and 41 great-grandchildren.

He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Lebanon. The funeral service will be held at 2 p.m. today at the St. Charles Church, the pastor, Rev. George W. Smith, officiating. Burial will be in the Lebanon cemetery.
