Death was due to apoplexy which came unexpectedly at a time when she was recovering from a long illness. She suffered the stroke on Monday morning just twenty-four hours before the end came. Her illness extended over a period of several weeks.

Miss Kelly was a daughter of Judge O. G. Kelly and Mrs. Kelly. She was born in Lebanon, where practically all of her life was spent. She died at the age of 40, on August 20, 1886. She was the possessor of a brilliant intellect, completing the course in the schools of Lebanon attended in the near Louisville and at Columbia, South Carolina.

I am researching the **Durham Family** of Green and Hart County, Kentucky. My first Durham was Jane (or Jincy) Durham born ca 1792 in Virginia and died ca 1860 in Larue County, Kentucky. On 30 July 1812 she married Fauntleroy Dye in Green County, Kentucky. The marriage bond was signed by Samuel Durham who stated that she was his orphaned niece and that she had lived with him for several years. I believe that Jane Durham may have been the daughter of a John Durham. She named her first son John Durham Dye. I am desperately trying to find the parents of my Jane Durham. At any rate the marriage bond proves she belongs to the same line of Samuel Durham whose lineage follows.

Samuel Durham

Samuel Durham was born in 1752 in Fauquier County, Virginia and died in 1838 in Green County, Kentucky. He first came to Kentucky in the late 1780s and settled in Boyle County and in 1795 moved to Green County. A descendant of his in a family history lists him as the son of William Durham and Margaret Colclough. He is the uncle of my Jane Durham. Samuel Durham was the father of 8 children who settled in Green and surrounding counties of Kentucky. His descendants are listed in the family history mentioned above.

John Durham

John Durham married Martha Bug(g) and moved to Mercer (now Boyle) Co, Ky. about 1783 from Mecklenberg Co, Va. with a group including the Rev. Francis Clark. They are credited with starting the first Methodist Church in Kentucky. He raised a large family, many of whom remained in that area of Kentucky. His will on file in the Boyle Co courthouse lists all of his children. Some researchers lists this John Durham as the son of William Durham and brother of Samuel listed above. I have at least one account that lists him as the son of a John Durham who emigrated from Yeastewater, England. I can not accept him as the brother of Samuel. I believe my Jane Durham named her first son for her deceased father, John Durham. It is evident she is the niece of Samuel Durham and Ashby Holloway Durham. John Durham of Boyle County did not die until after date of his will in 1817. My Jane Durham could not have been an orphan in 1812 if she were his daughter. John Durham's will does not include a daughter Jane. She could not be a granddaughter for Jacob was the first of John's sons to marry and he did not marry until 1796. Census dates place Jane's birth about 1792.

A query in the Kentucky Genealogist from a Mrs. Ethel Graff of Palmdale, Ca. sought information on John Durham, born 1761 Halifax Co, Va. and lived in Allen Co, Ky., Martin Durham born 1755 in Hanover Co, Va and lived in Wayne Co, Ky., James Durham (wife Delphi) born 1755 Hanover Co, Va lived in Lincoln Co, KY with children: James, Jacob, Rebecca, Patsy, Polly, and John. (I have no idea who these people are)
