# Bill Glasscock is a Marion County native

A passion project 25 years in the making came to fruition Wednesday night, June 24, for a Lexington-based artist and filmmaker from Marion County.

From a very young age, 61-year-old Bill Glasscock could be found with pencil to paper, scribbling in the margins of his notebook at school.

He was always tasked with creating posters for his third-grade class and drawing the giant Santa Claus come Christmas time.

"I was so bad at music," Glasscock explained, "That my music teacher would say, 'Bill, you can draw, why don't you draw the posters for the music.'"

In his late 20s Glasscock accepted a job at the University of Kentucky, where he stumbled upon a Super 8 Camera (named for its Super 8 mm motion-picture format).

He started fooling around with its stop-motion animation feature and three months later had his first film on his hands.

In the meantime he moved around, worked as a waiter at Alfalfa Restaurant in Lexington and taught art appreciation at three prisons as well as at Lexington Community College.

Glasscock kept his nose in his notebook, though, and continued making paintings and drawings and even presented at a few art shows.

But when a friend of his launched a successful Kickstarter campaign to fund a music album, he decided to brush the leaves off his stalled film project. Three years ago Glasscock started a Kickstarter campaign of his own and began receiving donations immediately. Two from noted figures within the animation community wanting to see his project get off the ground. In just under a month the film is about five minutes long (consisting of about 2,700 original drawings) and was shown after the Marx Brothers' A Night at the Opera, which is showing as part of the Kentucky Theatre's Summer Classics Series. Just Another Planet with Trees has been in the oven and on the backburner for about 25 years. Glasscock began the filmmaking process in the early 1990s while living in Chicago. But after a few personal setbacks including a divorce, the film slipped to the back of his mind. However, he said it was always in the stars to complete and get it seen.

Glasscock said, "I thought to myself, why does all commercial animation have to look the same?" Once the funding goal was reached Glasscock hit the ground running, digitizing his artwork and collaborating with local musicians to find the perfect score to accompany the animations. "Bouncing my ideas off the musicians is something I found really rewarding," Glasscock said. "They seemed to be happy to be

### GLASSCOCK--JUSTICE--NANNEY EXCURSUS

From research by Sallie Glasscock Giberson and many others including the late Kenyon Stevenson, we have been able to locate the Glasscock Coat of Arms and the first home of the family in Richmond Co., Va.

The name Glasscock is derived from various sources: the one having the greatest appeal is that of Glasscote; a house of glass, or a house filled with glass windows.

Peter Glasscock Jr., fought in the Revolutionary War from North Carolina in 1781. His father Peter Glasscock Sr., was a road viewer, equivalent in our present terms to engineer or surveyor, in Virginia during the American Revolution. These services entitle their descendants to membership in DAR.

Thomas Glasscock the emigre m. June 16, 1643 Jean Just (Joust) (Jovett), in London, England, and migrated to Virginia with three sons; Gregory, Thomas and John. Later he bought 200 acres of land for 6,000 pounds of merchantable tobacco. He built a home on his plantation and called it "Indian Banks." The house is believed to have been erected in 1696, as under a window on either side of the main entrance this date has been found. The custom in building in those days was to put the date of construction either in that place or on the chimneys.

Box hedges, a formal English garden, and old trees grace the side of the lawn which is surrounded by the farm which, in turn, is surrounded by water on three sides. The lower part of the exterior walls is 26 inches thick; above they are 18 inches thick. Throughout the timber is hand hewn white oak. It is dove-tailed at all joints and in other places held by blacksmith nails.

Clay packed in open spaces in the interior walls gives excellent insulation and air-conditioning. Planks six inches wide make the floors.

There are numerous decorative features throughout the house, many paneled doors, HL hinges, original locks, a curved chimney in the main living room, built in window seats. Eighteen pane windows, five sided dining and living room and attractive mantels in every room, make the place "different."

Of course, the negroes thereabout say, "it's haunted." Strange sights and

sounds are rumored. Footsteps ascend the stairs then descend and are heard no more.

A pistol shot that goes off in a certain corner, once a year. The ghost legend? Yes, it is a lovely young woman in white who returns to a special bedroom.

Foundations of the original kitchen, the ice-house and the well remain. A tunnel leading from the house to the nearby Lancaster Creek is believed to exist. Here a boat could have been hidden, giving the people a chance to escape Indians and enable them to get to the larger settlements down the river. One fact leading to the belief that this tunnel exists, is that traffic passing a certain point where the tunnel is supposed to have been, causes hollow vibrations to resound in a living room fireplace. This fireplace is suspect, for there is a good sized space in it that is unaccounted for.

The owner of Indian Banks, in 1957, Brigadier General Philip C. Wehle, gave us permission to visit the place; therefore, our good friend Lt. Col. Lee Snapp drove there from Washington, D.C. to make pictures.

The handsome old brass door knocker and handle are in good working condition, as is the house.

## Glascocke--Glasscock-Glasscock.

The Branch of the Glasscock family presented in this manuscript, is a direct line,--descending from Thomas Glasscock and his wife Jane or Jean Joust, or Jovett through their eldest son, Gregory Glasscock.

One Thomas Glascock married in London, England, June 17, 1634, Jane or Jean Just or Jovett. This was probably of the Essex County, England, Glascock family.

Thomas and Jane Glascock with their three young sons,--Gregory, Thomas, and John,--arrived from England about 1613. They settled in Rappahannock county, Virginia. Thomas received two land patents,--one on Aug. 30, 1638, for transplanting four persons from England to America (Virginia.); they were himself, his wife Jane; William Charles and James Allen.

Later, Thomas Glascock transplanted eight persons into the colony, and was granted on July 29, 1632, a 600 acre land grant in Lancaster Co., Va.

The Glascocks settled first in the Northern Neck of Va. Old Rappahannock county was organized in 1656; it was abolished in 1692, when it became Essex and Richmond counties. Essex was called South Farnham Parish and Richmond was called North Farnham Parish.

Prince William county was formed in 1720, and included Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudoun and Arlington counties. Fauquier county was formed from Prince William in 1759. The Glascocks were among the first settlers in Fauquier Co., frontiers having reached their location from nearer tidewater counties of the east Virginia, through "Thorofare Gap to Bull Run Mountain," settling in Fauquier Co., Va. between White Plains and Rectorville.

In 1732, Peter Glascock, (4) (Thomas, Gregory, Thomas) with his 2nd wife, Mary and family moved south to Rowan County, N. C. It appears that a rather large group of Fauquier county families, migrated at the same time--including the Dulins, Rectors, the Hendrens, and the Terleys. They settled on Dutchman's Creek.

Around 1800 when the Mid-western lands were opened to settlers, Glascocks of the 5th generation, especially those who had served in the American Revolutionary War "crossed the Mountains", and received grants of land in Tennessee, Kentucky, and Missouri. Later, a number of families located in Arkansas, Alabama, Texas and other states.

The old Rappahannock records are preserved. But as new counties were organized and families moved from one to another it has been difficult to locate records necessary for full information. In some incidences where full dates and other information were lacking, approximate dates were arrived at by using a census, a will, a deed, a marriage bond, a tax list, etcetera.

Even though there have been losses by deterioration, fires, wars and changes, many valuable records exist today.

In 1759 Fauquier Co., was cut off from Prince Wm. Co., Va. Peter moved to Fauquier Co., about this date. His wife, Jane died and Peter married Mary by 1760. Seven children were born to this couple. Their oldest son, Spencer, was born 1760 to 1763. The Tax List of 1782-3 shows Peter living in Fauquier Co., Va. John mentioned in a letter that "Some of the relatives were moving to Rowan Co., N. C. Will:—After moving to this county, Peter wrote his Will, dated Oct., 24, 1783—Probated 1784. In this Will, he mentions his wife, Mary, and all of the 16 children; by both wives. Death—Shortly after writing his Will, Peter died in 1783 in Rowan Co., N. Carolina aged 69 years. Court Minutes:—Salisbury, Rowan Co., N. C. Beginning with Peter Glascock Jr., the writers of this book have assembled the following from information supplied by the late Kenyon Stevenson census records of N. C., Tenn., and Kentucky (and V. H. Ms.)

Peter Glascock Jr., b. about 1750 in Va. was in Rowan Co., N. C. 1778, returned to Va. and later was again in Rowan Co., N. C. where he probably died. He was the 9th son of Peter Glascock Sr., and first wife, Jane. Peter Jr. probably died between 1810 and 1820. The 1800 Census records of Rowan Co., N. C. show him as head of a family of 6 m. himself over 45. b. Before 1755; 1 m. 16 to 20; 2 females 16-26; and one female 10-26. (This suggests that his wife is dead) The 1790 census of N. C. shows him with 6 sons and four daughters.

Listed in 1820 Census with family of 10. In the 1840 census was of Davie Co.; 7th. William went to Overton Co., Tenn. (grandson Henry.) was born 1798 in Rowan Co., N. C. m. 1st Margaret Hicks, 2nd. Catherine Garner. (1850 Census of N. C.) 8th. Madden Glascock. 1790 Census of Pendleton District, S. C. shows him with one son over 16 and two females over 16. Wife unknown.

Issue of Madden Glascock — only three known to us: 1st. Walter Wesley Glascock b. July 1, 1803, Pendleton District, S. C.; 2nd. Elizabeth Glascock m. Harmon she was born in 1813, and died in 1863 in Warren Co., Ky.; 3d. Duckam Madden Glascock b. 1818, m. dau. of Downey Lightfoot and d. Feb., 27, 1899 in Warren Co., Ky.

Madden Glascock and son, Walter Wesley Glascock, walked from Tenn into Kentucky, while women folk rode in ox-wagons, in the year of 1821. Madden Glascock lived in Warren Co., Ky., but went back to Tenn. \* See affidavit of Virgil Glascock, (1850 census of Warren Co., Ky.) Other children have not been located by us.



Walter Wesley Glasscock b. July 1, 1803 in Pendleton District, S. C. married Dec. 8, 1824 in Warren Co., Kentucky, 1st. child Mary M. Justice b. 1805 in Robertson Co., Tenn. My father, Athelda Glasscock was son of Walter Wesley Glasscock b. July 1, 1803, in S. C. and his 2nd wife, Mary "Polly" Louni Justice, b. in Robertson Co., Tenn. Sister of his first wife, Mary M. Justice. My grandfather, Walter Wesley Glasscock, was the son of Madden Glasscock, who was born in Pendleton County, S. C. Walter Wesley Glasscock and his father, Madden Glasscock, walked into Kentucky when Walter Wesley was 18 years of age, (that being 1821) from Tenn. and the women rode in ox-wagons. I remember my father talking about his grandfather, Madden Glasscock, who, he said, went back to Tennessee. My father Athelda Glasscock died Sept. 26, 1928, at age of 80 years. 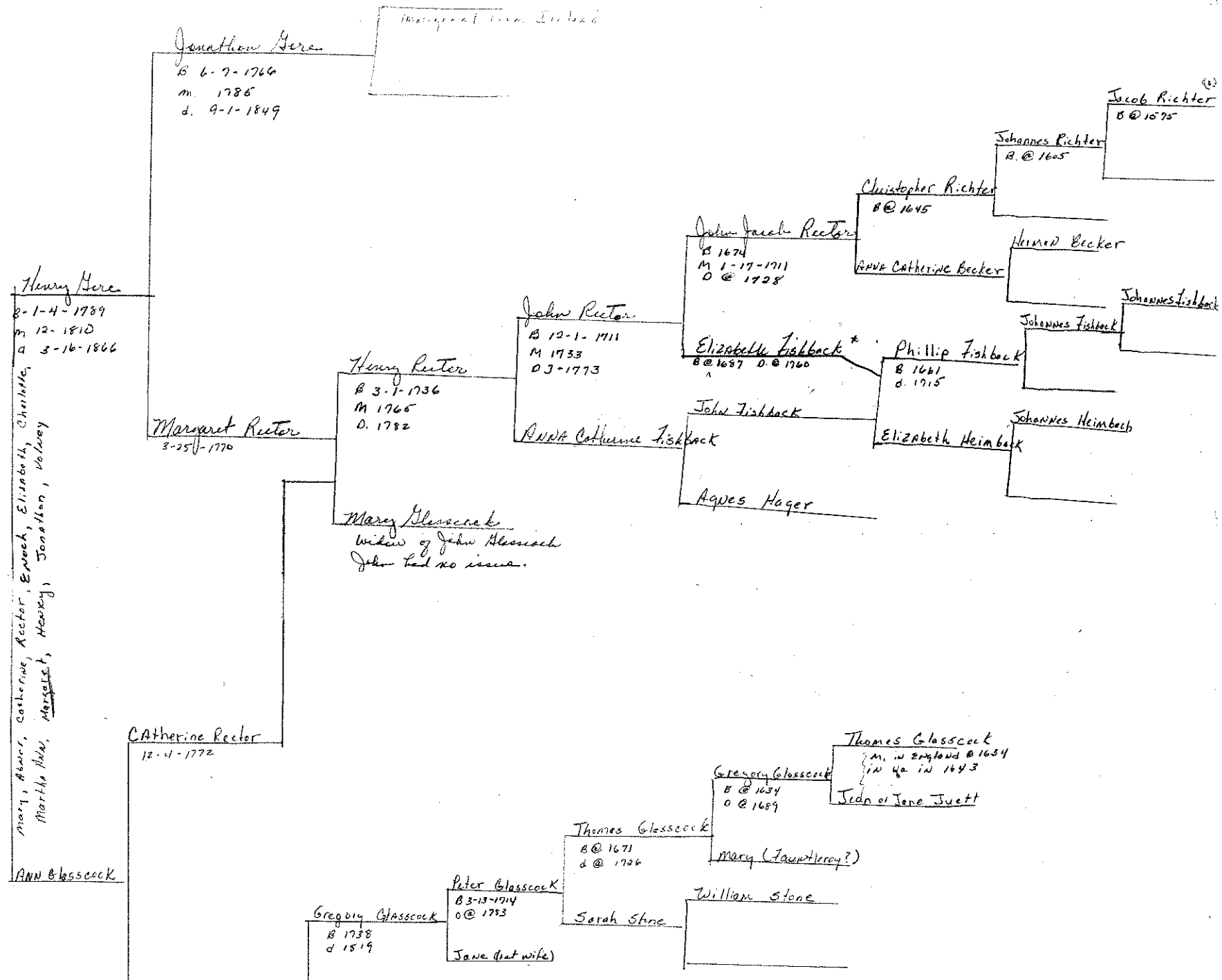

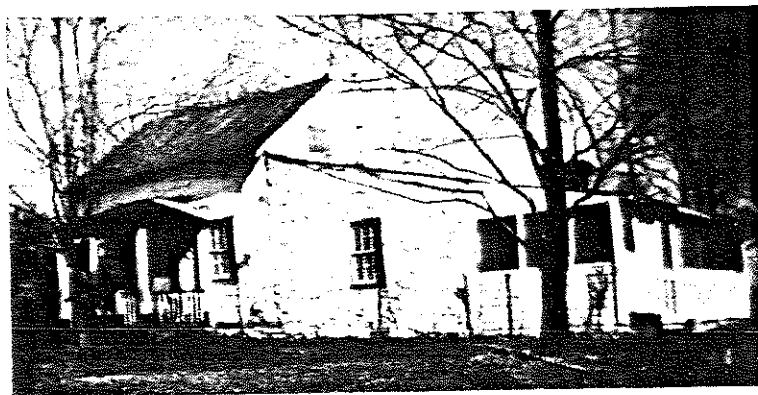

OLD LOG HOUSE, RECTORTOWN

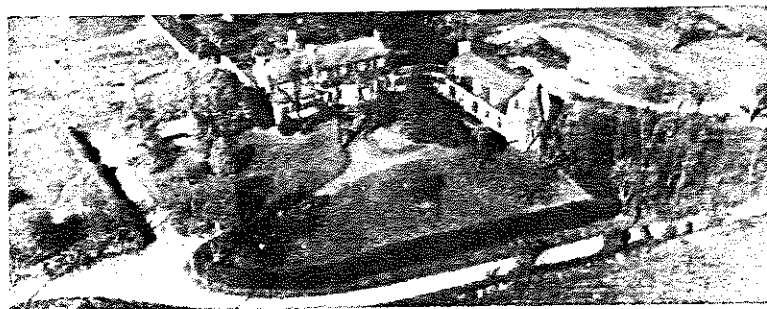
small-paned windows. Preacher Hitt was living here and was host to Bishop Asbury when he rode horse-back from Leesburg in 1781 to hold services at The Rectortown Methodist Church which was already established and held their services in the old Meeting House, that served as a hospital during the Civil War.

The house is now owned by the Slack family.

### ROCKBURN

Route 624, near Rectortown

In 1728 John Glascock took up a grant of 633 acres and built a frame house consisting of four rooms and a cellar. The walls were decorated with a stencil design, traces of which

could be seen two hundred years later. Only the cellar of this pioneer house remains now as a haw-haw wall at the end of the garden built by the present owner, Hubert Phipps. John Glascock named the place Rockburn because it was his custom to burn brush on the rock on the land, then slack the rock with water which made it easier to quarry the rock to use in the buildings and fences on the farm.

The long stone house was built by Aquilla Glascock in 1828. The date is in the center of the old mill stone used as a front door-step. The house is one room deep with the dining room in the wing on a lower level. Opposite the front door is a door opening on the back porch which overlooks the old stone dairy, the garden and the site of the original house. During the War Between the States the house was burned when a chimney caught fire but was rebuilt soon afterwards. The family moved temporarily to a house in the woods near Goose Creek and it was to this house that Colonel John S. Mosby was carried in an ox-cart after he was severely wounded at Lakeland, near Atoka. The present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Phipps, have built quite an addition to the house and a lovely garden back of the house.

### ESHTON (RAWLINGSDALE, or FLINT HILL)

Route 713, near Rectortown

In 1775 Bryan Fairfax sold George Washington a tract of land which Washington willed to his nephew, Lawrence Lewis. It was part of this land that was deeded to John Douglas Rawlings in 1856 and inherited by John Will Rawlings. Part of the house had been built, before the Rawlings purchase, on a lovely site with a commanding view of the surrounding countryside. The house was on several levels, part of stone and part of log, plastered and stuccoed. Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Wilson, the present owners, have added two large wings and made extensive improvements. The trees and shrubbery are lovely, especially a beautiful planting of box along the walk leading to the door of the old part of the house, and some magnolia trees at the front entrance.

On the third floor of the old part of the house is the window from which Mrs. Rawlings watched the first train which came up the Manassas Gap Railroad, now the Southern.

as board and batten, is in the little village known as Scuffleburg. Martin was the last surviving member of the jury at John Brown's trial at Charles Town in 1859. He was a cabinet maker by trade and was well thought of by his neighbors. It is the home of Hester Stribling.

### INGLEWOOD

Route 623, near Scuffleburg

On a beautiful site on a hill-top is the frame house that was heired and owned by Josiah Adams, a son of John Adams of Pleasant Vale. The back of the house is of logs and there is an old stone dairy in the yard which is filled with lovely trees and shrubs. Later it was owned by the Fergusons, Ogilvies and in 1878 it was bought by Robert Marshall, son of John R., and is now the home of his daughters, Misses Fanny and Anna Marshall. Also in the boundary, heired by Josiah Adams, is the Wirt Triplett farm but the old house there has burned and been rebuilt. It was for many years the home of the Herndons. Miss Fanny Marshall's great-grandmother was Judith Gibson who married a Kemper and their daughter married a Herndon.

### JOSIAH MURRAY HOUSE

U. S. Route 50, at Paris

On the west side of Main Street is an interesting old log house, built about 1820, with a sloping roof in the rear made by simply bending the beams, a type of house known as a salt-box house. There is nice woodwork and a beautiful stairway. It is now owned by Mrs. Gladys Lindsey Lloyd.

### LaGRANGE

U. S. Route 50, at Paris

On the side of the mountain overlooking the village of Paris, Peter Glascock built a brick house at the head of Main Street on his own land bought in 1786 from Hicks, Kimble and Martin. Glascock was the founder of Paris and one of the original trustees when the town was established in 1810. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and named the town

Paris because of his admiration for the famous General Lafayette. Later it was the home of James W. Marshall, for many years a professor of ancient languages at Dickinson College. He also served briefly as Postmaster General during the second administration of General U. S. Grant. It is now the property of Reed Thomas.

The center hall is panelled, with wide boards, and on either side of the hall is a large room with deep windows.

### GENTLE SHADE

U. S. Route 50, at Paris

This house was built on land bought in 1800 by Isaac Settle, who also built Belle Grove. Later his grandson, Dr. Thomas Lee Settle, tore down some of the original house but incorporated part of it in a substantial dwelling where his daughter is now living. Dr. Settle served in the 7th Virginia Cavalry of the Confederate Army as Major and Surgeon of his regiment and then returned to Paris where he served his community for many years as a physician of unusual talent. Just below this house is a long frame house, in very good condition, that was used by Isaac Settle as a tavern and post office.

### ASHBY'S TAVERN (or PARIS INN)

U. S. Routes 50 and 17, at Paris

At the junction of Frederick and Federal Streets, on land that Peter C. Rust purchased from Peter Glascock, who had bought a 14 acre tract from Kimball Hicks in 1786, was built the old inn about 1775. It was part frame and part stone with eight rooms. The bar had one window opening into the hall, just off the "Dog's Alley" (well barred), the hall leading to the dining room. George Washington stopped here a number of times; he had been traveling this road from Dumfries to Greenway Court, the home of Lord Fairfax, since he was a lad of sixteen surveying Lord Fairfax's property.

Shortly after the War of 1812 the tavern was purchased by Captain Thomson Ashby, an uncle of the renowned General Turner Ashby, and he and his wife operated it until their deaths. The Bayne family ran the tavern next and the Carters

# EAST VIEW (PIERCE) — c. 1800

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest R. Underwood

East View is located off Rt. 611 about 2 miles from Rixeyville on land that was part of the extensive Freeman estate prior to 1800.

An original 2-story log house is incorporated in the present structure, as the ell with stone chimneys, placing one chimney in the center of the house. The present house is T-shaped, with the newer portion across the front and the log part as the stem of the T. A smaller extension of the log house at the other end is now a large modern kitchen.

Rooms have 8-foot ceilings. The walnut stairway has turned newel post and balusters. A 2-room cellar has stone walls and wooden floors.

A building in the yard was used as an icehouse on the lower level and a meat storage base above. Sills and timbers are hand-hewn, and nails are shop-made.

# KAVANAUGH — c. 1781

Mrs. E. T. Willis  
Mrs. John Ballard

Located 2.3 miles north of Culpeper, on the east side of Rt. 229, this property, part of the Charles Kavanaugh grant of 40,000 acres in 1710, was owned by the Yancey family from 1781 until 1950.

The house, partly log with two stone chimneys and a gabled roof, is now in poor condition. It was probably used as a tenant house by the Yanceys.

# MAPLE SPRINGS — c. 1815

Mr. and Mrs. George McDonald

Located 1.1 miles west of Lakota, on Rt. 710, this long, low house is built of logs covered with pit-sawn lumber. One of its original rock chimneys is standing. There are only four windows in the entire house; one has original glass. The interior has not been changed. Logs are overhead; doors are battened; attic stairs are steep and narrow.

The original owner is not known, but the place was acquired in 1815 by Thomas McDonald. It is one of the few places in the county which has been continuously in the same family, bearing the same name, for a comparable length of time. From 1815 to 1937, the owners had the same given name as well as surname.

# GREENFIELDS SITE — Colonial

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Garrison

The original house at Greenfields is gone. Records show that the land was transferred from Thomas, Lord Fairfax, to Richard Young in 1754; to Young's adopted son, John Young, alias John Wigginton, in 1769. Later it was included in the holdings of Dr. George Ross.

A Wigginton graveyard here is one of the oldest in the county; stones remain to John (1741-1825) and his wife, Elizabeth Botts Wigginton (1741-1824). It is on Rt. 621, near Lakota.

# MONUMENTAL MILL

c. 1800

The foundation is all that remains of the original mill, a 7-story frame structure which was torn down and replaced by a 3½-story frame building prior to the Civil War. The mill was used to grind flour and meal, using water power from the Hazel River. The locality, 2½ miles northwest of Rixeyville on Rt. 640, is still referred to as Monumental Mills.

# Toward the Blue Ridge



MOUNTAIN VIEW (LEWIS PLACE)—c. 1839

Mrs. John M. Lewis

Located off Rt. 522 west and right on Rt. 633, this 2-story stone house has stone chimneys and gables. It contains wide floorboards, chairrail molding, old door knobs and locks, and double-cross pine doors, deeply recessed. Each room has a fireplace and a hand-carved reeded mantel.

Built in 1839 by James A. Glascock, entirely of materials from the farm, the house is said to have cost \$100, the contract price of labor outside of slave labor provided by the owner. The timbers and rafters are pegged, the laths hand-riven, and the few nails shop-made.

The property came into the Lewis family through the marriage of Thelbert Lewis to Felicia, daughter of James Glascock.

# COATES RANCH — c. 1850

Oscar Coates Estate

Three miles west of Culpeper off Rt. 522 is this rectangular frame house with gabled roof. Unspoiled by remodeling, it was built about 1850 by William Rixey; it is now occupied by Mrs. Lena Legge, who has life-time tenancy.

# CHERRY HILL — c. 1840

Butler Estate

Located 4 miles west of Culpeper on south side of Rt. 522 is Cherry Hill built on land owned by John Grimsley prior to 1870. Since this date the Butler family have owned the frame house built with gabled roof, stone chimneys, enclosed stairway, battened doors, and plain mantels with beaded supports.

# OLD FREEMAN PLACE — c. 1806

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wagner

Located 4 miles west of Culpeper off Rt. 522 and on 633, this frame house was originally 2-storied with three brick chimneys and a full basement. A rear wing was added in 1900, and the house stuccoed in 1941. The interior has the original pine floors and individually designed mantels.

Robert Garnett is said to have been the owner about 1806. For many years it was owned by the Huffman family.
