Married Lydia Craig, daughter of Rev. Elijah Craig of Scott Co., Ky.

Samuel Grant was killed by Indians on Grant's Lick Creek in Indiana, at the same time that his brother Moses was. He was thought, by his nephew, Col. Samuel Moseby Grant, to have been a Captain under Col. Robert Johnson who led the expedition over the Ohio, which ended disastrously for Moses and Samuel Grant.

102. SUSANNAH BOONE (*Daniel^h; Squire^t; George^d*), born 2 Nov., 1760; died 19 Oct. 1800, aged 39 yrs., 11 mos. and 17 days, in what is now St. Charles Co., Mo. (d)

Married in March, 1775, at Blackmore's Station on the Clinch river in Va., William Hays (d. 13 Dec., 1804). (a)

Of the ancestry of William Hays little is known except that he was of Irish descent. (b) He was a weaver by trade, and probably had a better education than most of his associates, for we are told that while

on the Clinch River, he taught Daniel Boone "some in writing and ved hand," and kept Boone's accounts. (c) They were married just before Susannah's father, Daniel Boone, set on his expedition for the Henderson Company to mark and cut out ad into Kentucky. Some accounts say that William Hays was a er of this party. In Kentucky Daniel Boone and his party put up cabins which were the foundation of Fort Boonesborough, after Boone returned to Virginia for his family. On April 30, 1776, took his family and started again over the new road to Kentucky he planned to make his future home. In the party were his daugh- usannah and her husband William Hays. Probably about 1785, William and Susannah Hays came into posses- sion of Daniel Boone's Marble Creek farm, five miles west of Boone's Station, and remained there until the fall of 1799, when they moved with Daniel Boone's party to Missouri. Hays and his son, William Hays, Jr., joined that section of the party which went overland from Limestone or some point below, adding their livestock to the rest. Their route was through Lexington, Louisville, Vincennes, and St. Louis. (c) The Hays family settled in St. Charles Co., Missouri.

Captain Hays was a man of high temper, and was killed in a quarrel with his son-in-law, James Davis. He had forbidden Davis to come on his place, but his order was disobeyed. When he threatened to shoot, Davis fired first, and after several hours suffering Hays died. (b) This occurred at Femme Osage, in the district of St. Charles, in the Territory of Louisiana (now Mo.).

THE SCHOLL FAMILY

WILLIAM SCHOLL of England and wife Leah Morgan were the parents of two brothers who married into the Boone family. The ancestry of William Scholl remains wrapped in obscurity, as careful investigation fails to reveal any definite information concerning it. The ancestry of his wife, Leah Morgan, seems just as difficult to trace.

There is a theory that William Scholl's parents were Peter Scholl and wife Sarah Colyer. Peter Scholl lived in the Raritan district of New Jersey from 1714 to 1731, and then disappeared from that region leaving no trace. Sarah Colyer was a Scotch woman and apparently his second wife. To them were born two children, Deborah, in 1728, and William, in 1731. The family tradition is that William married Leah Morgan. In Virginia also, appears some record of a Scholl family. From records it is found that as early as 1742, and perhaps as early as 1738, Jaist (or Joist) Hite and a Peter Scholl were associated with each other in the Shenandoah Valley. Hite recruited in New York, New Jersey, and eastern Pennsylvania for his southern colonies, and hence may have induced Peter Scholl to leave New Jersey and settle in the Shenandoah Valley. (a)

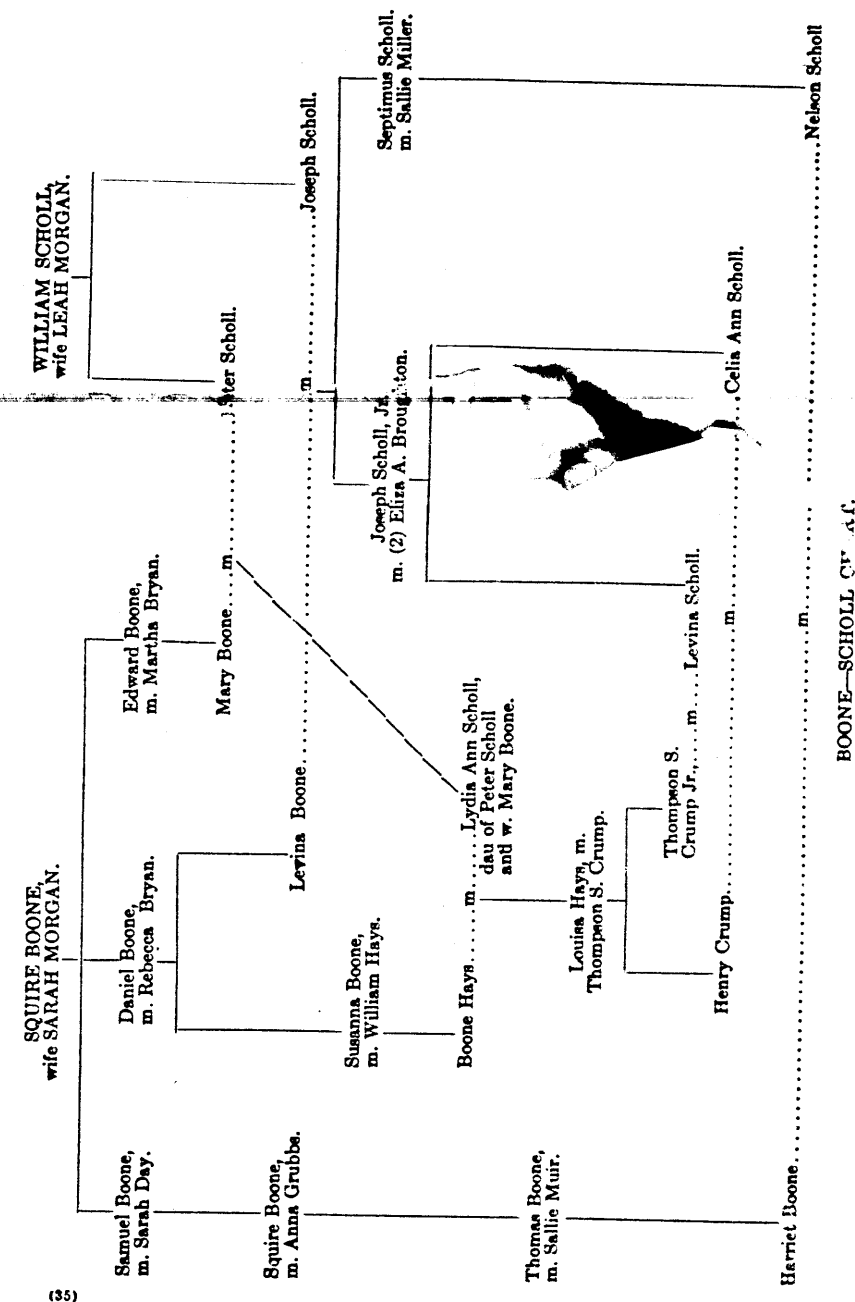
There is, however, no definite record to connect this Peter Scholl with the family that we know. It is only the result of an investigation which may prove of interest to Scholl descendants.

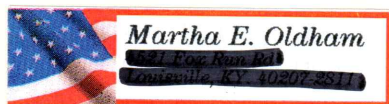
To return to William Scholl and wife Leah Morgan, it has been learned that they had several children, who were:— (b)

Death of Farmer, Wife Still Shrouded In Mystery

The deaths of a Marion County farm couple whose badly burned bodies were found Tuesday in and near the ruins of their flame-leveled home near Riley remained shrouded in mystery yesterday. At first believed victims of the fire, 51-year-old Wilson Hays and his wife, Mrs. Lucille Evans Hays, 47, may have died of other causes, officials say.

Hays, whose charred body was found near the house about an hour after the blaze started, apparently died of a shotgun wound over the head, according to an autopsy report issued yesterday by Coroner Robert Borders.

State Police detectives are continuing their investigation of the case, Borders said, and it may be several days before full circumstances of the twin deaths are determined. The investigators, who have not entirely ruled out the possibility of suicide for Hays, have offered no theory, other than accidental burning, for Hays' death.

The two victims apparently were alone at the time of the 2 p.m. blaze, which leveled a six-room, two-story frame house, about two miles from Lebanon and a mile off the Lebanon Highway.

Hays' body was found about 3 p.m. just outside the house, between the demolished residence and a burning storage shed. The remains of Mrs. Hays were found about 8:30 p.m. on a cot bed in the ruins of the home.

Borders said State Police found a 12-gauge double-barrel shotgun—its wooden stock burned—in the debris.

Neighbors theorized that Hays either jumped or fell from a second-story window. At the point where it was found, his body would have been subjected to intense heat from the house and the storage shed. Physicians stated that he could have lived not more than three minutes after suffering the shotgun wound.

From the position in which her body was found, Mrs. Hays apparently was lying on a cot when the blazing house fell in around her. Crumpled pieces of the metal roof and burning debris prevented members of the Lebanon Fire Department and others from finding her remains until about six hours after the fire started.

A teen-age daughter of the farm couple was in class at Lebanon High School at the time of the blaze and another daughter was

working in Lebanon.

Fire Chief Robert Bland and other members of the Fire Department answered a 3:30 p.m. call to the blazing home, but the structure was demolished when they arrived.

Wallace Smothers, Riley, one of the first persons to arrive at the scene of the blaze, gave this account:

"Henry Burchett and I were going to the Blue Star Grocery (a county polling place) to vote when we saw smoke coming from the Hays house. We rushed over there and discovered the outside of the house still intact but smoke billowing from the front of the home. We heard no shouts and didn't know anyone was inside the house.

"We moved the Hays car, which was parked at the side of the house, and sent another man to the barn to see if anyone was there. About 30 minutes after we arrived, we heard Hays shout from inside the house, so we went around to the side and kicked out a couple of windows.

"The entire house was ablaze by that time and we couldn't get in. The storage shed at the rear of the house hadn't caught fire when we arrived but it soon was ignited by the blazing house and also was demolished. We found his body between the house and the storage shed. He must have jumped or fell from an upstairs window."

Surviving the tragedy victims are four daughters, Miss Betty Hays, the high-school student; Miss Wilma Hays, employed as a waitress at Louis & Dick's Restaurant; Mrs. David Lynch, Route 3, Lebanon, and Mrs. Lonnie Foster, Bardstown; Mrs. Hays' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Evans, Bradfordsville; her brother, William Evans, Lebanon; her sister, Mrs. Richard Browning, Raywick; Hays' mother, Mrs. Della Hays, and his sister, Mrs. Basil Nelson, both of Danville, and his brother, James Hays, Route 2, Lebanon.

Funeral services for both victims were held at 2 p.m. yesterday at Bosley Funeral Home under direction of the Rev. Robert Hill, Louisville, former pastor of Beech Fork Baptist Church, of which the couple were members. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Pallbearers for Hays were Earl Stumph, Foster Naylor, Crosby Lynch, Kenneth Nelson, W. O. Nelson and J. T. Hays. Pallbearers for Mrs. Hays were Clifton Lynch, Lucian Smith, George Evans, Charles Browning, Roy Helm and I. W. Evans.

Marketing of the 1959 burley tobacco crop will begin November 23, and local warehousemen estimate that 90 per cent of Marion County's leaf offering will be sold before the suspension of sales for the Christmas holidays.

Sales will be held three and a half hours daily.

Gas Company Asks Approval Of Rate Hike

Western Kentucky Gas Company last Friday filed application with the Public Service Commission for permission to pass on to customers a major portion of increases in the cost of natural gas imposed by its suppliers.

Increases in cost of gas to Western within the last two years have amounted to \$423,785 annually, the company says.

A 1957 P.S.C. rate order to the company authorized it to apply for increased rates to consumers in the amount that its rates were increased by pipeline suppliers.

Firm Would Absorb Part

The application filed last Friday asks the Commission's approval of a proposal to collect \$306,639 per year—about three-fourths of the suppliers' increase—from consumers. The company would absorb the remainder of the cost increase.

The P.S.C. is requested to make the rate increase effective December 1.

In a statement accompanying the company's petition to the P.S.C., Western President G. J. Tankersley said the firm has absorbed inflationary increases in the cost of materials and labor experienced in recent years.

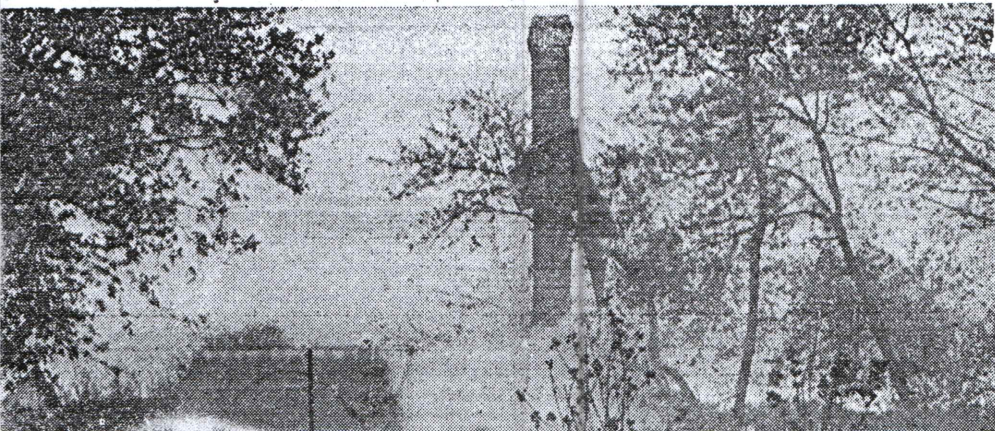
