

MRS. HEAD DIES SUDDENLY.

Mrs. Lou Head, aged 76 years, died suddenly early yesterday morning at the home of Dr. A. O. Mitchell, near Raywick, where she was visiting. She was ill only one day. Death resulted from a complication of troubles.

The funeral services will be held this morning at 9 o'clock at the Catholic church at Raywick, conducted by Rev. A. C. Zoeller, and the burial will be in St. Francis' cemetery.

Mr. Head was the widow of the late H. Head, who for many years was President of the W. H. Head Distilling Co. at Newark. She was a most excellent Christian woman and was very kindly and greatly admired for many commendable traits of character. Mrs. Head was a life-long resident of the country, having been born and spent her life in the country where she died.

Lebanon, Ky., Sept. 22.—Mrs. Irene Brussell Head, 59, Lebanon was killed at 1:30 a.m. today when she fell from the cab of a truck and the rear wheel passed over her head.

Driver of the truck was James Thomas, 43, Louisville. The accident occurred on KY 150 near Loretto, Marion County. Thomas was not held.

Coroner John Hickey said Mrs. Head died instantly.

Survivors include her mother, Mrs. Edda Walston Brussell, Lebanon; two daughters, Mrs. Bernice Steins, Cincinnati, and Miss Pauline Head, Lebanon; five brothers, Leonard Brussell, Springfield; Charles Brussell, Calvary; James Brussell, Lebanon; Thomas Brussell, Barlow, and Raymond Brussell, Raywick, and four sisters, Mrs. George Hickman, Dayton, Ohio; Mrs. William Myers, Cincinnati, and Mrs. Ernest Williams and Miss Louise Brussell, both of Lebanon.

The funeral will be at Trout-Hickey Funeral Home at 9 a.m. Monday. Burial will be in St. Augustine Cemetery. The body is at the funeral home.

The children of Joseph and Rebecca were Thomas Foreman, married Patsy Ewell; William, married Ruth Chenoweth; Joseph, Jr., married Elizabeth Glasscock; Rebecca, married Thomas Shadburn; Kitty, married Dr. David Cox; Christine, married Robert McGhee; Elizabeth, married Abraham Birkhead; and Nancy, married Martin Yewell.

Palmer

Two cousins, both named William, came into Kentucky from Virginia in 1816. One settled in Scott County (the father of Gen. John M. Palmer); the other went into Nelson County. They came from Loudon County, Virginia, near the Fairfax County line.

Dougail of Port Gibson, Mississippi. 2. Sarah, married John Pyles; issue: George, John, William, Conrad, Willie, Samuel, Sarah, and Eliza. Eliza married Dr. Sam Duke of Paducah, Kentucky.

Steele

Brice Steele lived five miles from Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky, on the Versailles Pike. His children were Elder O. C. Steele, the pioneer Christian preacher of Missouri; William; Thomas; James; Mrs. Mary

Richardson; Mrs. Eliza Porter; Mrs. Jane Reynolds; and Mrs. Kate Bashford. Brice Steele was born in Londonberry County, Ireland, in 1772 and came to America in 1794.

Johnson-Grubbs

Leroy Johnson, M. D. and Elizabeth G. Grubbs were married in Virginia and emigrated to Franklin, Tennessee, thence to Lexington, Kentucky, where he died in 1843, aged 77 years. She died in Louisville, Kentucky, and is buried at Cave Hill. There were eight children. One son, Nelson Cole Johnson, married Fannie Pollard Smith. Their son, William B. Johnson, now lives in Missouri.

Head

Rev. Jesse Head was born in either Virginia or Pennsylvania in 1788 and moved to Washington County, Kentucky, in the latter part of the century and later moved to Mercer County, dying in Harrodsburg, Kentucky, in 1812.
