I am the great-granddaughter of James P Kearns (1863-1911) and Jane Dant Kearns (1863-1956). As Jane is the daughter of JW Dant that line is fairly known. What I am interested in is James, whose older brother is J H Kearns of Lebanon Sunnyside Saloon notoriety, and his family.

**What I know:**

- His mother Mary Scott Kearns, father Patrick, and Patrick's mother Margaret immigrated from Ireland in time for the 1860 census in Marion Co and the oldest child J H was born in KY in 1858.
- The family name spelling was recorded variously as Cairn (digitized as carin) in the 1860 census, 1870 & 80 as Kerons and the 1887 Marion Co property map as Kearon. Patrick's tombstone in 1886 says Kearns and every family member's records going forward are Kearns.
- The family's property is shown in the Library of Congress 1877 Washington & Marion Co map just east of Dant Station on the L&N line. Interpreting the census history it looks like they lived in the same place throughout.
- Patrick, Mary & Margaret are all buried in St Francis of Assisi and are documented in Find a Grave.
- Patrick's obituary was reported by Martha Thompson in Find a grave as:

THE LEBANON STANDARD & TIMES, page 4, Wednesday, August 11, 1886. LORETTA, KY., August 9, 1886.

Died, at his home near Coon Hollow, Aug. 3, at 7 o'clock p.m., of flux, Patrick Kearns, in his 78th year. He was sick but three days. Mr. Kearns was a native of Ireland, having come to this country about 30 years ago, and was for a number of years employed by the L & N Railroad Company as a section foreman. He was a man of great ability, and was one of our best citizens. He leaves a large family in good circumstances. He leaves a widowed mother now the oldest woman in this county. The family have the sympathy of the entire community.

**What I am interested in:**

- Any information about the family from 1858 (or prior references of course) to about 1896 when Mary died. I believe JH was the last family member to leave Marion Co in 1907 when Lebanon went dry and I have accounted for all Patrick's descendants after that. In particular, we have been unable to find WHERE in Ireland they came from.

**Questions:**

- It is my understanding that the only access to THE LEBANON STANDARD & TIMES is on microfilm at your library. Since Patrick's obituary in 1886 was there I was wondering if we would find obituaries for:

Margaret Kearns d:Nov 12 1886

Mary Scott Kearns d:Mar 19 1896 -Only have 2 issues from this year

Is it likely this publication include other relevant info or stories?

- Can you provide guidance on what records might be available at the library or locally that might be helpful. Would there be church records for St Francis for instance. I think I have exhausted [ancestry.com](http://ancestry.com) and it seems KY did not have much record requirement at this time.

I am most happy to compensate you for your time and I am planning a trip to Marion Co in May to explore the area and track down research if you can advise there might be anything to track down.


