

Heart Attack Is Fatal To Oscar Kemp

Oscar Thomas Kemp, senior member of the Kemp-Raley Motor Company, who for 45 years had engaged in the automotive business here, died at 6:45 p.m. last Thursday at Mary Immaculate Hospital only a few hours after suffering a heart attack at his home. He had been under treatment for a heart ailment. He was 72.

A Bradfordville native, son of J. T. and Melissa Martin Kemp, he had lived in Marion County all his life. He came to Lebanon in 1918, and for eight years was with the Lewis & Drye Motor Company. He and his partner, Bernard Raley, had been in the garage business together for 25 years.

He was a member of the Methodist Church and an honorary member of its official board. He also was a member of the local Masonic Lodge. He served for 12 years on the board of directors of the Lebanon Water Works Company, and for a number of years was an active member of the Lebanon Fire Department.

Mr. Kemp was married to Miss Frances Kemp in 1918. The couple had four children: Robert, Jr., a student at the University of Kentucky Medical School; Robert, Sr.; and two daughters, Mrs. Mary Kemp and Mrs. Frances Kemp.

Legislation Is Topic At Meet Of Farm Bureau

Farm Bureau met at the high school in Lebanon last night. Carl Holler, former president of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, at the annual meeting Monday night of the Marion County Farm Bureau at Glasscock Elementary School.

Approximately 150 persons attended the meeting. Carl Holler, president of the local farm organization, presided.

Directors were elected from districts 1, 3, 4 and 5.

Marvin Reller was re-elected in District 1, with Marvin Sharp as alternate. In District 3, Marvin Reller was re-elected, and Richard Reller was chosen as his alternate. William C. Mattingly was re-elected a director in District 4, with Lester Bland as alternate. Dennis Raley was chosen from District 4, Garland Lunsford as alternate.

Mr. Reller, who presently is a director of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, talked of the legislative issues that the people are facing, both on a national and state level. He also discussed the success that the Farm Bureau has had in the way of cooperative marketing during the past few years, and said it was in expanding its efforts.

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Bloodmobile Here Will 137 Pints Blood Are

Marion County Red Cross Blood Program 137 pints of blood when the Bloodmobile was at the School gym next Wednesday, October 21, from Eugene Lancaster, chairman of the Blood Program. "I plead with the people of Marion County to seriously... more so than in the past few years, as well as those who have been so faithful through the years. There are some few donors who give each time the mobile is in Lebanon.

"Last year Marion County fell short of its quota of 500 pints by 163 pints. This amounted to only 70% of total quota. To remain in the blood program, we must have a minimum of 40% of quota. Unless we had more our quota this year, the county will lose the bloodmobile. Last year, St. Mary's College contributed 150 pints, Loretto Motherhouse 80 pints, leaving a total of only 137 pints donated by the people of Marion County—and the county has a potential of over 5,000 donors.

Help So Many "The blood program has become a way of life in Marion County, and we cannot afford to turn our backs on the program, which every week helps so many. To continue to have a healthy program we must have new donors. Every person in this county who is physically able should feel it his responsibility to give a pint of blood at least once or twice each year.

"We have so many people who have been given blood at a crucial time and yet so many make an attempt to return the blood as that someone else may have benefit of it in the time of great need. Last year Marion County received over 500 pints of blood from the Blood Bank.

"We know of very few families in this county that have been able to get along without the use of blood in some form from the Blood Bank. We need to remember that whole blood is not the only way we receive blood.

"I earnestly request Marion County to consider it a privilege to give a pint of blood and come on Wednesday prepared to give, provided the local doctors permit it."

The following doctors will staff the Bloodmobile: Salesman George N. D. Wither, Robert H. Wither, T. I. Campbell and Robert D. Knudsen. The ladies of the Mary Immaculate Hospital Auxiliary also will assist in the operation.
