

JAMES PROCTOR KNOTT

(b. Aug. 29, 1830 - d. June 18, 1911)

Democrat

A native Kentuckian who removed to Missouri at the beginning of his career, James P. Knott was active in state politics there until he was removed from office and disbarred because of his Southern sympathies.

Upon returning to Kentucky he experienced even greater political ambitions and gained national fame.

He was born near Raywick in Marion County, the son of Joseph Percy and Maria McElroy Knott. He received basic education in Marion and Shelby counties, and in 1846 began the study of law. Knott moved to Missouri in 1850 and, in the spring of 1851, was admitted to the bar at Memphis, Scotland County, Mo.

On Nov. 17, 1852, he married Mary E. Forman of Missouri; she died in August 1853.

Knott served in the circuit and county clerk's offices and in 1857 was elected to the Missouri legislature to represent Scotland County. In the legislature he served as chairman of the Judiciary Committee and conducted the impeachment of Judge Albert Jackson.

He married the second time on Jan. 14, 1858, to Sarah R. McElroy, a daughter of Philip and Lydia Gibbs McElroy of Bowling Green, Ky.

The following year Gov. Robert M. Stewart appointed Knott to be Missouri's attorney general to fill the unexpired term of Ephraim B. Ewing. He was elected to the office in 1860 on the Democratic ticket.

Since Missouri was a pro-slavery state, the legislature called a convention in January 1861 to consider the situation with the Union. The secessionist party was backed by Governor Jackson, but they lost the popular vote by a majority of 80,000 and the convention voted not to secede.

Attorney General Knott sympathized with the South but opposed the extreme measures of the secessionists. After refusing to take the oath of allegiance required by the Federal government, he "resigned" his office, was disbarred from the practice of law in Missouri, and placed in prison for a short time.

James Proctor Knott returned to his native state and opened his office for the practice of law at Lebanon, Ky., in 1863.

In 1867 he was elected as a Democrat to the 40th and 41st U.S. Congresses, serving from March 4, 1867 until March 3, 1871. He was not a candidate for re-election in 1870, but decided to run again in 1874, being elected to serve in the 44th Congress and to the three succeeding Congresses, serving until March 3, 1883.

In 1876 he was appointed by the House as one of the managers to conduct the impeachment of W. W. Belknap, secretary of war. Also during his tenure in Congress he served several times as chairman of the Judiciary Committee, and his oratorical powers secured for him a national reputation. His weapons were often ridicule and humor, and he used them with such skill that he was often quoted years later.

Knott declined to be a candidate for re-election to Congress in 1882 in order that he might run for governor the next year. In 1883 he was elected governor over Thomas Z. Morrow by a vote of 133,615 to 89,181. In 1884 Knott County was formed and named in his honor.

President Cleveland offered him the governorship of Hawaii and later a place on the Interstate Commerce Commission; but he declined both.

Following his term as governor in 1887 he resumed the practice of law, remaining in Frankfort, where he assisted the attorney general in lawsuits. His practice, with T. L. Edelen, continued until 1892, when he accepted the professorship of Civics and Economics at Centre College.

In 1894 he and President William C. Young organized the Law department of Centre College, and Knott became its first dean and professor of Law.

He was forced by ill health to retire in 1901 and returned to his old home in Lebanon, Ky., where he lived until his death. He is buried in the Ryder Cemetery there.

MARION COUNTY ART WORK FOUND IN THE ARCHIVES AT FRANKPORT



common schools of the county, and was also under the charge of Professor W. L. Yerkes of Paris, Kentucky, but owing to bad health was compelled to leave school. He engaged in farming; continued in this occupation until 1890, when he removed from his farm to Paris, and is now engaged in the livery business.

He was married in October, 1887, to Mattie Shipp, only daughter of Edwin T. and Blannie (Williams) Shipp. The Shipp family were formerly of Fauquier County, Virginia, and came to Kentucky in 1795, where they engaged in farming and were large land owners. Edwin T. Shipp was an old and prominent citizen of Bourbon County. The Williams family is of Welsh extraction. Mrs. Talbott was educated in the private schools of Bourbon. They have three children, Dorothy L., Gladys C. and William McMillan Talbott. Mr. and Mrs. Talbott are members of the Christian Church.

WILLIAM T. KNOTT of Lebanon, Kentucky, cultured gentleman and ripe scholar, son of Joseph Percy and Maria Irvine (McElroy) Knott, was born on Cherry Run, Washington (now Marion) County, Kentucky, October 10, 1822.

The genealogy of the Knott family begins with Thomas Percy Knott (great-great-grandfather), who was an Episcopal minister in Derbyshire, England. His only son, Thomas Percy Knott (great-grandfather) was educated for the ministry and had pursued his studies with that intent, until he chanced to meet a young lady named Jane Hart, who was to be sent to Baltimore, Maryland, to school, and the young man changed his purpose, or rather the young lady changed it for him, and after completing his classical course in England he came to America and married the same Jane Hart. The children of this marital relation were: Nancy, who married Anthony Bickett; Joseph Percy, married Frances Ray; Mary, married Richard Ray; Frances, married Stephen Briscoe; Thomas Percy, married Frances Rayne; Samuel, married Elizabeth Ray; Lloyd W., married Martha Allen; Jane Hart and Ellen, who never married.

Thomas Percy Knott (grandfather) was a teacher in Maryland before coming to Kentucky, and followed that profession in Marion (then Washington) County. Among his pupils were Ben Hardin, Colonel C. A. Wickliffe, Martin Ewing and others, whose names illumine the pages of Kentucky history. He continued to teach—being especially devoted to the languages and to surveying—until the time of his death in 1826. His remains were interred at Raywick, Marion County.

Joseph Percy Knott (father) was born in Maryland, near Elicott's Mills, March 31, 1794; came to Kentucky an infant, was educated by his father and was a teacher in Washington (now Marion) County, in the vicinity of Lebanon, and was also a teacher in Columbia Seminary, and on Cherry Run, near the place where he settled after his marriage. He was one of the contractors who constructed the famous turnpike over Muldraugh's Hill, one of the first improvements of that kind in the state; resumed teaching in Shelbyville in 1846 and 1847, and later at West Point, where he died in 1851. He served as magistrate in Washington County (now Marion) for some years; was a member of the Legislature from Washington County in the years 1833-34, when Marion County was cut off from Washington, and an active, public-spirited and scholarly gentleman. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and an exemplary Christian. He married Maria Irvine McElroy, and the names of their children were: William T. Knott, the subject of this sketch; Samuel Cleland, who married Sarah Gates; Margaret Marion, married Robert T. Nesbitt; James Proctor, ex-governor, married Sarah R. McElroy; Edward Whitfield, married Mattie McCoy, now living in Kirkwood, Missouri; Anna Maria, married Randolph Hudnall, and Joanna, who married Reverend Marcellus C. Gorin, a Presbyterian minister of St. Louis, Missouri.

Anna Maria Hudnall died in 1859, leaving a daughter, Anna Hudnall, who is the editor of a newspaper in Carson City, Nevada.

William T. Knott attended the schools in the county and in Lebanon; and is a graduate of Center College, in which institution he never spent

a day or recited a lesson. He was teaching school in Lebanon and from some of his young friends who were attending Center College he obtained the curriculum, purchased the books and studied the full course at home. When the commencement was held and the graduates received their diplomas, Mr. Knott, who was in the audience, was called up by the faculty and presented with a diploma, and was thus placed on an equal footing with other graduates. The college conferred upon him the degree of Ph. D. in 1894, being the third person to receive that honor from old Center College.

He had charge of the Lebanon Seminary for ten years, losing but two days' time in all those years. In 1852 he became interested in promoting and building the Lebanon branch of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, and when, after much diligent labor on his part, the road was completed to Lebanon, he was made general agent of the branch and located at Lebanon, and it was his duty to appoint and superintend local agents. He was connected with the Louisville & Nashville Railroad in one capacity or another from 1858 to 1890, when he resigned his position to accept an appointment as superintendent of county schools, an office to which he has since been elected and re-elected, and is now serving his third term, and in which he is deeply interested, having a fondness for children and being enthusiastically devoted to the cause of education. His qualifications for this work are unusual. Having been a professional teacher for ten years and a lifetime student, few men in the state are better prepared to direct the education of the rising generation than is Mr. Knott.

During the term of his brother, J. Proctor Knott, as governor of Kentucky, he was assistant state geologist under John R. Proctor, who was director of the geological survey of Kentucky. This line of study has always been of the deepest interest to him, and as a result of his researches he has one of the finest collections of geological specimens, outside of the large institutions, in the United States. He has made several trips to the Rocky Mountains, and his collection of specimens of the minerals and geological formations of that sec-

tion of the country is one of great interest and value. His library embraces the largest private collection of scientific works in the country. At odd times he has made a careful study of the botany of Marion County, and knows every plant scientifically in that section. Has made a careful study of the archaeology of the county and has worked up the conchology of the state, the greater part of the land and fresh water shells and has them named and classified in his cabinet.

Mr. W. T. Knott was married (first) July 11, 1847, to Marion B. McElroy, by whom he has four children living: Joseph McElroy Knott, cashier of the Marion National Bank of Lebanon, married Mattie Ruble; William Sneed Knott, attorney at law of Los Angeles, California, married Lulie Pierce of Springfield, Illinois, a sister of William Pierce, ex-consul to Cuba; Kate Grundy Knott and Jennie Marion, who are at home.

Mrs. Knott died May, 1865, and Mr. Knott was married (second) January, 1867, to Mrs. Lydia McElroy, widow of Hugh Sneed McElroy, who was a brother of Mr. Knott's first wife. Her maiden name was Lydia Harrison, daughter of George S. Harrison. She is a native of England. She had two children by her first husband: Rosa, wife of James B. Shepard of Denver, Colorado, and George S. McElroy, now of San Antonio, Texas, whose wife was Louise Phillips.

The genealogy of the McElroy family is meager but interesting. The first now known of the name were contemporaneous with John Knox of Scotland, and they were the ancestors of the McElroys of Marion and Washington Counties. They have kept the tradition that their ancestors were active participants in the establishment of the "Solemn League and Covenant" of 1636. Being opposed in their desire to worship God according to the dictates of their consciences and being denied all offices of trust and all privileges, they became very bitter in their opposition to the British government. Consequently, early in the eighteenth century, they sought homes in the American colonies, settling for the most part in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Virginia and the Carolinas.

From the best information at hand, it was about 1730 when James McElroy and Sarah McCue (or McHugh), his wife, first located in New Jersey.

They afterward removed to Pennsylvania and finally to Virginia, locating in (now) Campbell County, in 1760. All of their children were boys: John, Archy, Hugh, Samuel and James. The father was a farmer, whose principal crop was tobacco, which, for the want of money, was common currency in Virginia in those days. The father and his sons were ever ready to respond to frequent calls to arms on account of the French and Indian wars and the greater war of the Revolution. They were in many battles in Virginia and campaigns on the Pennsylvania border. Samuel and several of his brothers were present at the surrender of Lord Cornwallis.

John and Archy, sons of James McElroy, removed to South Carolina, and were the progenitors of the McElroys in the Carolinas, Georgia, Tennessee and some of the southern counties of Kentucky. Three of the sons of James married three sisters, who were daughters of John Irvine. Hugh married Esther, Samuel married Mary, and James married Margaret Irvine. These women were daughters of a Scotch-Irish Presbyterian minister.

Hugh McElroy and John Irvine, his brother-in-law, with their families, removed from Campbell County, Virginia, to Kentucky in 1787. McElroy settled in Nelson (now Washington) County, and Irvine in Lincoln (now Boyle) County, near Danville. In 1789, September 4, Samuel and James, with their wives, followed Hugh to the "wilderness of Kentucky," and settled in Nelson (now Marion) County, near Lebanon.

Of these Samuel (the great-grandfather of William T. Knott) and his wife, Mary Irvine, had issue as follows: Sarah, born 1767, married Alexander Handley; John, born 1769, married (first) Miss Copeland (second), Mrs. Simpson; James, born 1770, died young; Hugh, born 1772, married Miss Gilkie; Margaret, born 1773, married James Wilson; Abram, born 1774, died young; William, born 1776, married (first) Keturah Cleland, (second) Mary Kirk; Samuel, born 1777, married (first) Mary Briggs, (second) Jane B. Grundy; Mary, born 1778, married William McColgan; James, born 1780, married Esther Simpson; Abram, born 1780, married Miss Redford (James and Abram were twins); Elizabeth, born

178—, married George Wilson, and Nancy, born 178—.

The children of William McElroy (1776) and Keturah Cleland, his wife, were: Maria Irvine McElroy, born 1805, who married Joseph P. Knott, October 10, 1822 (parents of William T. Knott); Eliza, born 1807, married (first) Isaac Everhart, (second) T. P. Gibbs, (third) Isaac Withrow; Philip E., born 1809, married Lydia Gibbs; Harriet Paulina, born 1811, married A. S. Mays; Margaret, born 1814, married Samuel T. Ray. The children of William McElroy and his second wife, Mary Kirk, were: Paul Irvine, married Sue McElroy; Robert Lapsley, married Lizzie Hughes; Cecil Scott, married Fannie Brown; Lucy Ann, married Samuel T. Ray (after the death of his first wife, who was her half sister); William T., married Eliza Cassidy; James Franklin, married Mary Chapman; Samuel Rice, married Belle Reed; Keturah, married Dr. George Hubbard, and Sarah, who died young.

James Proctor Knott, son of Joseph Percy and Maria (Irvine) Knott and brother of William T. Knott—the principal subject of the foregoing sketch—was born in Marion County, Kentucky, August 28, 1830. After receiving a common school education, he was professor of natural science in the Lebanon Seminary; practiced law in Lebanon; removed to Missouri, where he practiced law; was a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1860; was elected to the Missouri Legislature; was attorney-general of that state during the Civil war; returned to Lebanon and was a member of Congress from that district for twelve years, 1867-71 and 1875-83; was governor of Kentucky, 1883 to 1887; and is now dean of the faculty of the law department of Center College at Danville, Kentucky.




Where is Cherry Run?

Bet a dozen dimes against a dozen doughnuts that the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph Gettelfinger, pastor of Saint Augustine's Church in Lebanon, Kentucky and valedictorian of the 1917 graduating class of St. Mary's College, or Mr. Sam B. Spalding, president of the Marion National Bank in Lebanon and vice-president of the College Alumni Association, or Mr. George Trotter, editor of The Lebanon

Enterprise, does not know where Cherry Run is. And yet, the late Hon. J. Proctor Knott, Governor of Kentucky from 1883 to 1887, who was a student at St. Mary's College in the 1840's and who was a very prominent citizen of Lebanon, Kentucky, for many years, was born in Cherry Run. I would not dare bet Col. W.B. Timmons, the oldest living graduate of St. Mary's College who lived in the home on the right near the college entrance for almost twenty years and who was a well known banker in Lebanon for forty years before moving to Miami, Florida, where he now resides, or I would not bet Mr. Edwin Carlile Litsey, the 92-year-old Kentucky poet laureate who has lived in Lebanon for almost 85 years, or Mr. John C. Peterson, the father of three priests and one nun and a very progressive farmer in Marion County for many years, because I know they know where Cherry Run is. To be very candid, I hope that Monsignor Gettelfinger knows where Cherry Run is because it would do my humility much good to lose a bet to Monsignor Gettelfinger, that is, provided the Monsignor is willing to "take on" the bet, which I doubt very much, knowing the Monsignor as I do.

Where is Cherry Run?

Bet a case of Eleven Up (a pint of Seven Up blended with four gills of Halcyon Hills Cordial flavored with euphilia--my own concoction) against a tall tumbler of mint julep a la Lavinia that the Rev. Theodore Hesburgh, C.S.C., president of the University of Notre Dame, or Doctor Clarence Manion, nationally known as Dean Manion, a native Kentuckian who was a student at St. Mary's from 1911 to 1915 and who was the Dean of

His brother, the late Col. Lawrence Timmons, was also a member of the class. We regret that we do not have a recent picture or Colonel Timmons in our files.

the Notre Dame University Law School from 1940 to 1953, does not know where Cherry Run is. And we might add that we are willing to make the same bet that no professor and not one of the 7000 students at Notre Dame ever heard of Cherry Run in Kentucky or know where it is. And yet, the late Rev. J. Leonard Carrico, C.S.C., who was a very prominent priest on the university campus for thirty-five years, was born in Cherry Run. Father Carrico was a student at St. Mary's from 1896 to 1902 and was valedictorian of the famous 1902 class; all the members of this class became prominent in their professions. Incidentally where are the Halcyon Hills? Bet a hundred Kennedy half dollars against an 1800 silver dollar that Miss Florence Amelia Edmonds and Mr. John Dahringer, authorities on the history of Marion County, do not know where the Halcyon Hills are. But back to the big question.

Where is Cherry Run?

Bet a two pound box of Hershey Kisses against a giant jar of Ann Page strawberry preserves that the Reverend Fabian Dietrich, C.R., a member of St. Mary's College faculty for thirty-three years and Spiritual Director for many years, or Dr. Dan Walsh, who teaches a philosophy course at the college and who played an important role in the life of Father Thomas Merton, O.C.S.O., when he was a student at Columbia University in New York City, or Mrs. Wallace (Florence) Mattingly, who has rendered very faithful service in the domestic department of St. Mary's College since 1929, does not know where Cherry Run is. Of course, not one of the 325 students at the college knows where Cherry Run is and probably never heard of the place. And yet, the Very Reverend James Thompson, C.R.,

president of the college, was born in Cherry Run. Father Thompson was a student at St. Mary's from 1932 to 1936 and he is the first person from Marion County to serve as president of the college.

Where is Cherry Run? Surely Cherry Run is "some place," as the saying is, or should be since three prominent persons, all alumni of St. Mary's College, were born in Cherry Run. Surely it is a historic place that should be easy to locate on the map of Marion County or on the map of Kentucky or even on the map of the United States since an outstanding University of Notre Dame professor and Dean of Studies and a president of a college and a Governor of Kentucky were born in Cherry Run. Surely, if we were to visit Cherry Run, we would find a large marker erected by the State Highway Department. Surely the place is better known in 1966 than Duluth, Minnesota, was in 1871 when Governor Knott, at that time the United States Representative from the Fourth District in Kentucky, delivered what was probably the wittiest and most ironical speech ever delivered in the House of Representatives. But, believe it or not, we cannot find Cherry Run on a map of the United States or even on a map of Kentucky and, much to our distinct disappointment, we can not find Cherry Run on a map of Marion County. Now we wonder just how many people in Lebanon and Marion County know where Cherry Run is. And, on a recent visit to Cherry Run with Col. Richard Green and Mr. Robert Lee Spalding, we could not find any kind of a sign or marker in Cherry Run to let travelers know that Cherry Run is a historic hamlet.







Dr. J. P. Knott Recalls Five Eminent County Natives

Below is printed the text of Dr. Joseph P. Knott's address made at the Marion County Centennial Celebration Monday evening. Dr. Knott is one of the faculty of Centre College, Danville:

"The great men of Marion County's early days; they were a noble and inspiring band! Born of sturdy pioneer stock, reared in a Spartan environment which developed in them the qualities of self-reliance and courage, they possessed that stamina which faces obstacles only to overcome them, and that idealism which counts not the cost if the goal for which it strives be high. To the men and women who helped to carve a Commonwealth out of a wilderness and then sent forth their sons and daughters to carry the torch of progress to other and unenlightened communities, we, their descendants, pay admiring homage. Them we can honor only collectively, they are too numerous for individual mention, and we can select but a representative few for more detailed consideration.

"Nothing steals the human soul to

endurance more effectively than the rigors of religious persecution, and many of our forebears had suffered in the Old World for loyalty to their faith and had emigrated to the New in the hope of being able to worship there without external interference. This was true both of the English Catholics and the Scotch-Irish Presbyterians who were among the founders of Marion County. In the former group was a family from Lincolnshire which had remained true to its creed throughout those tragic times when Henry VIII and Elizabeth were seeking to crush Catholicism in England and which, still loyal to its beliefs, had come to America with Lord Baltimore in 1634 to help establish the Colony of Maryland. To that family belonged two of Marion County's most illustrious sons, Archbishop Martin John Spalding and Bishop John Lancaster Spalding. The elder of the two was a man whose nobility of character was enhanced by intellectual gifts of surpassing brilliance. Genius had marked him from his birth. At the age of fourteen he was filling with distinction the chair of mathematics at St. Mary's College. From this institution he was graduated when only sixteen, and from there went to the theological seminary at Bardstown where his exceptional ability was immediately recognized. He was later sent to Rome to complete his ecclesiastical studies at the Urban College.

"In the Eternal City the young Kentuckian made a record which had never been equalled by any other American student, and the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him after he had for seven hours defended in Latin 256 propositions selected from universal theology, church history and canonical law; defended them against some of the ablest theologians in the Church.

"Upon his return to America Dr. Spalding entered upon a career which was to be notable for its contributions to education, church administration, religious statesmanship and historical polemic literature. He was a college president at the age of twenty-eight, and was ever untiring in his efforts to build up schools and encourage scholarship. The crowning glory of this phase of his activity was his founding of the American College at Louvain where hundreds of churchmen from this country have subsequently been trained.

"No less notable was the record of his achievements as preacher and church administrator, first in the diocese of Kentucky and later in the Archepiscopal See of Baltimore. He presided over the largest assembly which the Church had held since the Council of Trent in 1545. He played a major part in the Oecumenical

Jessie A. Graves (the writer's grandfather then living on the McElroy pike about 3½ miles from Lebanon) learning one of his nephews had been stricken and was then at the residence of Mathew Cissell, hitched up his wagon and went to Mr. Cissell's, returning with the young man to his own residence, where he attempted to nurse him back to health. In a few days he himself contracted the disease. A day or two later both died.

"Then came a Good Samaritan in the person of a colored man, Alex Graves, who made two crude boxes, placed their remains in them, hauled them to St. Charles and buried them. In the meantime my grandmother and all the children, then young, my father, George W., being an infant only six months old had become infected. Old Alex returned from St. Charles and nursed, fed and looked after them until they recovered. Every effort was made afterwards to locate the graves, but there were so many newly made ones, it was impossible to locate them.

"The Civil War came on, Alex drifted away, and today no doubt lies in an unmarked grave, as do the two members of my family.

"It has been said by someone 'Peace hath her heroes, none the less Peace hath her victories, none the less renowned than war,' but permit me to say, beautiful and true as it is, I would change it to read, 'Peace hath her heroes none the less renowned than war.' Alex Graves, it is true, was given by his Creator a black skin, but who has the courage to deny that Nature's God did not place within his bosom a white heart. Yes,

James Proctor Knott
b. 8-29-1830 - d. 6-18-1911

He was born near Raywick in Marion County, the son of Joseph Percy and Maria McElroy Knott. He received basic education in Marion and Shelby counties, and in 1846 began the study of law. Knott moved to Missouri in 1850 and in the spring of 1851, was admitted to the bar at Memphis, Scotland County, Mo.

On Nov. 17, 1952, he married Mary E. Forman of Missouri; she died in August 1853.

He served in the circuit and county clerk's offices and in 1857 was elected to the Missouri legislature. While serving in this capacity he was chairman of the Judiciary Committee and conducted the impeachment of Judge Albert Jackson.

He married the second time on Jan. 14, 1858, to Sarah R. McElroy, daughter of Philip and Lydia Gibbs McElroy of Bowling Green, Ky.


In 1859 Knott was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Ephraim B. Ewing, Missouri's attorney General.

Missouri was a pro-slavery state and in 1861 the legislature called a convention in 1861 to consider the situation. The convention voted no to secede. Knott was a southern sympathizer but opposed the extreme measures of the secessionists. After refusing to take the oath of allegiance required by the Federal government, he resigned his office, was disbarred and placed in prison for a short time.

Knott returned to his native state and opened his law office in Lebanon, Ky. in 1863. From 1867 until 1871 he served in the 40th and 41st U.S. Congress. Later he would serve in the 44th, 45th, 46th, and 47th Congress. He served on the panel to impeach W. W. Belknap, secretary of war. His oratorical powers secured for him a national reputation. His weapons were often ridicule and humor, and he used them with such skill that he was often quoted years later. He was elected governor in 1883. In 1884 Knott County was formed and named in his honor.

Pres. Cleveland offered him the governorship of Hawaii and later a place on the Interstate Commerce Commission, but he declined both. Following his term as governor in 1887 he resumed the practice of law, in Frankfort. In 1892 he accepted the professorship of Civics and Economics at Centre College. In 1894 he and Pres. William C. Young organized the law department of Centre College and Knott became its first dean and professor.

He was forced by ill health to retire in 1901 and returned to his old home in Lebanon, Ky., where he lived until his death. He is buried in Ryder's Cemetery.



settlers in Breckinridge County were the Coomes, Elders, Beavens, John Cassidy and Mudd. This would seem to be the same John Cassidy who married Elizabeth Mudd, and the Mudd mentioned may have been her brother or sister. We checked the Breckinridge County census records for the years 1810 to 1850 inclusive but found no Mudds. Descendants of John Cassidy stated that he and his family resided in Breckinridge Co., Ky. in 1805 but later moved to Perry Co., Ind. where John Cassidy was a surveyor. Thos. J. de La Hunt in his History of Perry Co., Ind. states (on p. 19), "At the house of Daniel Purcell on August 7, 1820, those voting were (amongst others) John Cassidy, Thos. Fitzgerald, Daniel Hendricks, James Hendricks, John Jarboe" and (on P. 81), "On 11-4-1835 John Cassidy who conducted a store at the mouth of Oil Creek (he having been County Surveyor in 1819), laid out a town site for Wm. Mitchell."

1810 census Breckinridge Co., Ky. p. 320, John CASADY, males under 10, 3; 26 to 45, 1; females under 10, 1; 16 to 26, 1. There were no Cassidys in the 1820 census of that County.

In the 1820 census of Perry Co., Ind. (Vol. 4, p. 229), John Cassidy was listed with males under 10, 3; 10 to 16, 3; 26 to 45, 1; females under 10, 2; 10 to 16, 1; and 26 to 45, 1.

In the 1830 census of Perry Co., Ind. (Anderson Twp., Vol. 11, p. 602), John Cassidy was listed with males under 5, 1; 5 to 10, 2; 10 to 15, 2; 15 to 20, 3; 20 to 30, 2; 50 to 60, 1; females 10 to 15, 2; 15 to 20, 1; and 40 to 50, 2.

In the 1830 census of Hendricks Co., Ind., a John Casida (possibly Abacg 4) age 20 to 30 was listed with his wife age 20 to 30 and one male under 5 (see Unplaced Family #5). A John Casady family was also listed in the 1830 census of Henry Co., Ind.

Thomas F. Cassidy of New Rochelle, N.Y. wrote us that "Lt. Patrick Cassidy (d. 1-17-1829) of Newry, Pa. married Mary Mooney (b. 1746; d. 1837) and that they had ten children. Their first child, viz. John, married Elizabeth Mudd in 1804".

We had a thorough check made of the records of Wash. Co., Pa. and, to a lesser extent, of Green and Lancaster Counties; some Cassidy and Lincoln records were found but no Mudd records were located (see Pa. file).

Patrick Cassidy plotted and surveyed Williamsburg, Pa. and Hollidaysburg, Pa. and also surveyed Carlisle, Pa. He founded and named the town of Newry, Pa. which was called "Cassidys" in 1790 when the first census was taken.

Peter and Henry Cassidy, brothers of John Cassidy who married Elizabeth Mudd (Abacg), surveyed the State of Arkansas. For making the survey, they were allowed a grant of land which was not taken up. The site of Little Rock, Ark. is said to be located on the grant.

See "Pioneers and Makers of Arkansas" by Josiah H. Shinn which refers to the Cassidys as follows: Henry Cassidy candidate in first territorial election for delegate to Congress (on p. 54); Cassidy was fourth in the election (on p. 55); Henry Cassidy surveyed for Winters in 1802 (on p. 97); at the mouth of the St. Francis lived Patrick Cassidy and Henry Cassidy (on p. 120).

Ellen Buckman (Abach 3), dau of Martha Mudd and Clement Buckman and cousin of Sr. M. Clare Cassidy (Abacg 2), became Sr. Melania.

i. **Rebecca²⁸** m. by Fr. M. Fournier, Wash. Co., Ky. 7-5-1799 Joseph Knott.

As proof that Rebeccah Mudd was a daughter of Luke Mudd (Abac), a marriage bond was located in Wash. Co., Ky. wherein Joseph Mudd (probably Abcc) and Joseph Knott supplied a bond of £50 on 7-5-1799 that there was no lawful cause to obstruct the marriage of Rebeccah Mudd and Joseph Knott. On this same day, Luke Mudd (Abac) requested the County Clerk to "grant Joseph Knott lisons for entering into matrimony with my daughter Rebeccah Mudd"; the request was witnessed by Joseph Mudd (probably Abcc) and Henry Mudd (probably Abcb or Abacc).

A Joseph Knott, along with the Haydens, Thomas Mudd, the Sansburys, the Clements etc., was one of the early settlers of Cartwrights Creek in Kentucky (Ref. 65, p. 80).

ISSUE: The family of Luke Mudd (Abac) has been one of our greatest problems. A deed that shows the obvious relationship of Eleanor, Elizabeth, Henrietta and Francis Mudd to the family of Luke Mudd (Abac) is as follows: On 3-29-1816 Francis Mudd (Abagb) and his wife Eleanor (late Eleanor Mudd, Abacf) of Jefferson Co., Ky., John Cassidy and his wife Elizabeth (late Elizabeth Mudd, Abacg) of Perry Co., Ind., and Thomas Alvey and his wife Henrietta (late Henrietta Mudd, Abace) of Breckinridge Co., Ky., sold to Francis Mudd (Abaca) of Wash. Co., Ky. certain tracts or parcels of land situated in Wash. Co., Ky. on the Eastern Branch of Cartwright Creek for the consideration of 5 shillings. Thus it appears that these sisters, i.e. daughters of Luke Mudd, for a nominal sum (5 shillings) sold land to their brother. Corroborating this, the reader will note that on 10-7-1793 Luke Mudd (Abac) had purchased land of this same description from Matthew Walton and his wife; and that on 6-2-1803 Luke Mudd (Abac) transferred personal property to Eleanor, Elizabeth and Henrietta Mudd.

For arguments as to the parentage of Francis Mudd (Abaca) and Thomas Mudd (Abacb), see their accounts under "Identity."

Since a Thomas Mudd (possibly the Thomas Mudd who was the son of Luke Mudd, Abac) witnessed Henry Mudd's marriage bond in 1808, it appeared possible that Henry and Thomas Mudd were brothers. This appears to have been the case (see account of Henry Mudd, Abacc).

For many years Henrietta Mudd (Abace), Ellen Mudd (Abacf) and Elizabeth Mudd (Abacg), were placed as daughters of Thomas Mudd (Aba) because they, according to Isabelle Cassidy, had three brothers, viz. Joseph, Thomas and Luke Mudd. These three men, viz. Joseph, Thomas and Luke on 10-23-1801 (date not certain) gave a note to Samuel Grundy, but these three were not the same as Joseph, Thomas and Luke Mudd sons of Thomas Mudd (Aba).

About 1797/8 the names of Francis Mudd (Abaca) and Thomas Mudd (Abacb) appear along with Mordecai Lincoln (husband of Mary Mudd, Abacd) and others, on a petition for a road from Ferguson's Mill to the Mercer County Line (Ref. 137). The petition was also signed by Francis and Richard Berry, Bigger Head, Samuel D. Ware and others. Note under "Court Records" that Bigger Head and Luke Mudd were associated together in a legal case in Frederick Co., Md., in 1783.

There is a remote possibility that Luke Mudd had a "set" of children prior to 1772 by Jennett Gardiner (see account of Richard Mudd Abab).

It is possible that Luke Mudd had a son named Joseph. See account of Joseph Mudd (Abcc) wherein we report and discuss the possibility that there were two Joseph Mudds.

It is possible that Luke Mudd (Abac) had a son also named Luke; if so, he probably died prior to age 21 as no Luke Mudd Jr. appeared in the tax records.

Hon. Ben J. Webb reported that Luke, Joseph and Ignatius Mudd were at Hardin Creek, Ky. with the Berrys, Hardestys, Haydens and Simms.²⁹ We found nothing which proved that an Ignatius Mudd was in Kentucky in the early period that Hon. Ben Webb refers to, but if he was right, then Ignatius may have been a son of Luke Mudd but if so he probably died young. We did not find him in the tax records.

Rev. Fr. Victor O'Daniel stated that Francis, Luke and Richard Mudd were brothers. In making this statement, he may have been referring to the sons of Thomas Mudd (Aba); however, it is possible that Luke Mudd (Abac) did have sons so named but, if so, Luke and Richard must have died very young.

It is a remote possibility that the Mary Ann Mudd who married Joseph Blacklock in Wash. Co., Ky. on 11-2-1807 may have been a daughter of Luke Mudd (Abac) (see account of Mary Ann Mudd, Aadaf).

MIGRATIONS: Luke Mudd moved to Frederick Co., Md. sometime after 1765 at which date he was still residing in Chas. Co., Md. The earliest reference to him in Frederick County was Jan. 17, 1769 (see court records below).

Luke Mudd's family was undoubtedly one of the sixty families who in 1785 pledged themselves to emigrate to Kentucky and to settle in adjacent communities for protection against the Indians. One group of these people called the "Cartwrights Creek Settlement" was situated on a tributary of Beech Fork which

was then in Nelson County (later Wash. Co.). Luke Mudd was intimately associated with the Elders and possibly he moved to Kentucky with them.

It is assumed that Luke Mudd and his family moved to Kentucky between 1788 and 1790; he was not listed in the 1790 census of Frederick Co., Md. The fact that Luke Mudd appears to have left no children in Frederick Co. might indicate that none of them were old enough to be settled on their own farms at that time. This may serve to show that he married about 1768 at the age of about 31 or so. All this is conjectural as we have no record of his death or any record of his wife.

CENSUS': In the 1810 census of Wash. Co., Ky., a Luke Mudd over 45 years of age was listed with females 16 to 26, 1; and 26 to 45, 1. The female "16 to 26" is unaccounted for, but the author suspects she was either Eleanor (Abacf) or Henrietta (Abace). In the 1810 census report for Henry Mudd (Abacc), another female age 16 to 26 is unaccounted for; the author suspects she was the other daughter (of Luke Mudd) who was not resident in Luke's home.

TAX RECORDS: The fact that Luke Mudd was taxed only in Wash. Co., Ky. (we found no tax record for him elsewhere in Kentucky), indicates that from the time he moved to Kentucky he resided only in Washington County. The following are Wash. Co., Ky. tax records for Luke Mudd (tax for 1792 dated 8-17-1792; 1798 and 1810 missing; 1801 too faded to read; 1807, 1808 and 1815 name listed but no tax recorded):

A study of the 1799 and 1800 tax lists show that only one Mudd name was added to the list of Mudd taxables in 1800. This cannot be accounted for in any other way than that he came from one of the households listed in the 1799 tax list or had just moved to the county. This man appears to have been Henry Mudd. See the following table:

A Man of Books

Professor Knott of Centre owns 7,000 volumes, and what's more remarkable, he has read most of them

CENTRE COLLEGE of course has a large library of its own. But Prof. J. Proctor Knott, who has just finished his 25th consecutive year on the faculty there, has quite a library of his own. Some say that its 7,000 volumes make it one of the biggest private libraries in the state, but it would be even larger if Dr. Knott hadn't given away at least 1,000 volumes.

What's more, Dr. Knott can say without bragging that he has read most of the books in his library.

The 1,000 or so books he has given away went to individuals whom he wanted to have one of his books, and to institutions, such as Centre's own library, and to high school libraries such as Bradfordsville, St. Augustine, St. Charles and Lebanon.

Dr. Knott is head of Centre's modern languages department.

The Centre professor often reads four or five books a week and estimates that he has averaged reading at least two books a week since his youth. His library is in his home in

Lebanon, occupying an entire room, and includes fiction, biographies, social studies and religious books. He has studied most of the world's religions and is especially interested in books on the origins of Christianity.

The library has a number of rare items. There are several novels by English novelist George Gissing that have been out of print for many years. Other rarities include the first collected works of Lord Byron, published by John Murray, the original Chapman and Hall collection of Charles Dickens, and the first American edition of Boswell's *Life of Johnson*.

Much of Dr. Knott's library originally belonged to his great-uncle, Proctor Knott, who was Governor of Kentucky, congressman, founder of the Centre Law School and its first dean.

Governor Knott was a close friend of Adlai Stevenson, Centre graduate who became Vice-President of the United States and has a famous grandson with the same name. A prized possession of Dr. Knott's library is

an autographed copy of the memoirs of Vice-President Stevenson presented by Stevenson to Governor Knott.

When the present Adlai Stevenson spoke at Centre in 1950, Dr. Knott asked him if he had ever heard his grandfather talk about Governor Knott.

"Why I never heard him talk about any one else!" Stevenson said.

Dr. Knott is remembered by hundreds of former Centre students both for his vast scope of knowledge and his teaching ability. He is exciting, meticulous and intense. But they also remember equally well his wit, humor and hearty laugh.

Dr. Knott remarked that there are fewer and fewer alert, interested and intellectually curious students.

"The public schools have too many extracurricular activities nowadays and send too many students to college who don't know how to study," he said.

Dr. Knott taught at University of Wisconsin, Northwestern and Washington State before joining Centre in 1933. He said he likes teaching in a small college like Centre better "because it is a fine opportunity to get to know each of my students personally." Incidentally, he said he found that "girls seem to have more pride and study harder than boys are a rule."

Dr. Knott first became interested in French at Princeton studying under Dean Christian Gauss. He has taught German frequently at Centre in addition to French.

He earned both his bachelor of arts and master's degrees at Princeton and his doctor of philosophy degree at University of Wisconsin. He has also studied at three universities in France.

The Centre professor is a member of a pioneer Kentucky family. His great-grandfather Joseph Percy Knott, came to Kentucky from Maryland in 1793. He was an engineer and laid out the first Dixie Highway from Louisville to Nashville in 1840.

Dr. Knott's grandfather was a noted geologist, Dr. William T. Knott, a graduate of Centre despite the fact that he never at-

tended Centre as a student. Too poor to go to college, he studied at his home, came to Centre before commencement exercises, took the final exams and was awarded a diploma. Dr. Knott was delighted several years ago to find some of his grandfather's geological specimens at Harvard and Princeton.

Although books and teaching are his first loves, Dr. Knott is enthusiastic about the theater, movies, classical music, politics and world affairs. He played a large part in developing and maintaining the Danville Community Concert Association.

In addition to his teaching load, Dr. Knott has written for *The Modern Language Journal*, and assisted in the publication of a collection of 18th Century French plays. He has been one of those invited to address the Northwestern Modern Language Association, and often speaks before both clubs and various groups, particularly those interested in education.

Dr. Knott has toured Europe several times. In 1950, while traveling with Mark Adams of Stanford who had just graduated from Centre, the two men became separated at Bregenz, Austria, when the train left for Innsbruck while Adams was still on the platform.

It took two weeks of anxiety and worry for both men before they finally met together again, thanks to radio broadcasts, newspaper stories, and help of the European police. Unfortunately, radio and newspaper reports gave the impression that Dr. Knott was lost and perhaps abducted behind the Iron Curtain, which involved the U. S. State Department in the search.

Dr. Knott lives in Danville during the week but goes to his home in Lebanon every week-end to be with his sister, Katherine Knott. She teaches at Bradfordville.

Old Acquaintance

Both R. F. "Bob" Ensminger, who is director of Centre's alumni and publicity offices, and Pete Janicki, now a graduate student at Princeton University, who took the photograph of Dr. Knott's library, studied under Dr. Knott at Centre College.
