CALVARY GIRL WINNER OF PRIZE IN NATIONAL CONTEST

Gladys Lyons, pupil of the Calvary school, was the winner of one of the State prizes in the National "Our Presidents Contest" conducted by Current Events, the National school newspaper. In addition to four grand National prizes, prizes were awarded for each State, the District of Columbia, and the Territories and Possessions of the United States.

Nearly 20,000 pupils took part in the contest for the more than 150 cash prizes.

The contestants were required to name pictures of all the Presidents correctly, to give the State in which each President was born and the State from which he was chosen, and to state the period that each served as President. Each contestant was also required to write an essay on the subject, "Why I Think the Thirty-first President Will Make a Good President."

The prize winning essay by Gladys Lyons follows:

In my estimation, Mr. Hoover will make a good President because he has promised to enforce the Prohibition Law, which forbids the manufacture or sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes.

He favors a high protective tariff, which I think is a good thing, because it encourages home manufacture.

I agree with him in opposing an increase in immigration, because there would be many people coming to this country seeking relief from the poverty of Europe, and this would create a horde of job hunters around every employment office and every industrial gate in the United States. The pressure of this flood

would break our wages toward the level of Europe.

Mr. Hoover is qualified to lead agriculture into a more prosperous condition, because of his great work for the farming interests during the war.

He has been Secretary of Commerce, and his job has been to assist the farmer from a commercial side. At the age of twenty-four he was sent on an official expedition in China and the Orient. His broad experience has taught him the problems of the world.

The prominent part he played during the World War no doubt pressages his popularity and efficiency as President.
