Maria Mauser born 1921 married 1946 Paul Rempfer. They live in the 1780 Mauser house at the West edge of Oschingen Germany. Partial list of their

children: Christa born 1947

Marie-Luise (called Marlies) born 1949. (I believe Art said their children totaled four daughters and one son; I do not have the other three listed.)

Art also enclosed the receipt for Maultaschen. He said they served it during the 3 or 4 hour visit he has with them. Said it was very good, made with scraps of meat in dollups of dumplings. Originally designed to serve meat, on the sly, during Lent. All in German, will need translation. I only read "salz, pfeffer, appetit".

It has been a rough Summer, weather-wise, around here. Our farms are above flood level, except for about ten acres. However the wet weather has prevented us from planting some fields, will cut our crop to about one third of normal.

We went back to Branson MO mid-July. Had to go 100 miles out of our way, East to Macon, South to Columbia and back West to Marshall Junction. It was the only road open, from here. A small town of Sumner about eight miles South of us was completely cut off, except by boat. For a time they took mail & milk in by three wheelers along the railroad, until it washed out.

The town of Carrollton was cut off on four sides, only land route out of town was via some country roads to the North-West in the hills. Many hiways are still washed out in this area. U.S. 65 south of Carrollton, U.S. 24 East of Carrollton. Hiway 36 is still closed at Hanibal MO, may take another month to rebuild & open.

They say the MO River was flowing at twice normal speed, so much current did much damage when it broke thru levies.

We went to Branson again last week. Were able to take a shorter route via blacktop 139 thru Sumner to Bosworth and cross Mo. River on hiway 41 at Miami. It had two areas where they had built the road back with gravel but with so much traffic on it is was planty rough. Only road that crosses Mo. River from Kansas City to Boonville near Columbia. At one time I-70 was the only bridge across MO open and they sand bagged the westbound lane to keep it open.

The weather has hurt tourist traffic, even Branson has lower numbers. Still they are building more theatres; I would guess there are more motel rooms in Branson, than there are in the whole state of Iowa. Rooms advertised at \$25. to \$29. in brand new motels as they have a price war going. Also non-country shows like Smothers Brothers, Phyllis Diller, Bill Crosby. Talk the Lennin Sisters from old Welke show may move to Branson, Welke's son is building a theatre. We spent three days in Branson and saw eight shows and Silver Dollar quilt festival. Saw Wayne Newton, George Jones, Jannie Fricke, Sawyer Brown, Louise Mandrell, Eddie Rabbitt, Barbara Fairchild, Moe Bandy.

Better wind this up and get it in the mail before the creek gets out, again. Iowa had 14 inches of rain last week, some rivers out again. Mo. River at St. Joe is above bank full, with all levies broken it gets out as soon as it reaches bank-level. It cut a new channel on oppisite side of bottom for 23 miles just below Kansas City. They will have to put it back in old channel or will need to build new bridges. Is a mess!

Dear Mr. Hays,

I have not forgotten you, have been doing too much running around. My wife's brother is in Wichita KS hospital awaiting a heart transplant, not doing too well so we went down to visit him. *(He received a 19 year old heart, doing OK.)*
There was a train swap last Saturday at Springdale Ark so we went to it and saw a few shows at Branson MO on our way home. Still very wet here with little planted. The soil was dryer in middle Missouri. *(Got some corn planted)*

I have not found the notebook I wrote in when we visited Marion county KY. I will keep looking for it but I doubt if I made notes on the Hays cem. since it was raining when I looked at it.

I would have thought a few of the stones might be near the fence, if the fence is still there. It was a barb wire fence, some stones on ground under and on the West side of the fence, more stones in grass among large trees on the East side of the fence. The concrete cave shell was in the East side of the cem., should be visible if grass/brush is not too high, from the road.

Hermon B. Fagley, 2679 State Route 125, Bethel Ohio 45106 is the penpal I told you about. He has a computer hooked to Prodigy Network so he can pull data on queries on many names.

Hermon follows all Bethel OH families, many came up from KY and he knows a lot about early Washington (the town) and Maysville KY people. He has some data on Simon Kenton because we believe one of Kenton's relatives, perhaps a nephew married one of my Edmund Collins's family.

Edmund Collins's dau. Catharine (1775--1849) married Yelventon Bredwell. We think Edmund's wife was named Elizabeth.

Catharine's dau. Elizabeth Bredwell m. Thomas Hunt near Bethel Ohio. Their dau. Agness Hunt m. George Anderson in Peoria Ill and came to Linn county MO. Agness & George are my great grandparents.

I made a note of "Justice Hays" when we talked on the phone. Not sure what it means but Hermon has a Justice (surname) line.

I received a call from Arthur Mouser, 5314 Piping Rock Lane, Houston TX 77056; said he was going to visit Germany in June and was to rent a car & driver to visit Oschingen Germany where our Mouser/Mausers came from. Art said he had an invitation to visit the Mauser house.

I will enclose some copies I made of some of my Mouser file. You might wish to copy these and place a copy in the genealogical files in Lebanon so other cousins can study them.

Enclosed: Map of Wuertemberg Germany; shows Oschingen (our Mausers came from there in 1751); Ofterdingen (his wife Agathia, dau. of Hans Jerg Gomminger) lived there.

It is twice the distance between Mossingen & Tübingen; North from Tübingen to Stuttgart; which is the principle city in the area.

It is about five times the Mossingen/Tübingen distance; South to the Swiss border. The site marked "RoB-B" near Oschingen is a hill/small mountain with an observation tower on top. The area looks like a fairly flat valley with old worn down mountains/hills scattered around. It reminds me of the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia except the hills/mountains are here & there, not in a line like VA.

"Barenhohle" is a sink hole/cave tourist site and "Schl. Lichtenstein" is a castle built on a rock spire, very picturesque. The castle is somewhat like the Disney World castle only smaller, connected with a drawbridge to the main cliff.

One of the two Mauser women lives in the old Mauser house at the West edge of Oschingen and her sister lived in Mossingen. Oschingen has been voted into

Pages 944 thru 951 are from a book, "The Cobbler's Children" which has a chapter on a Mouser sideline. This tells of Hans Michael Mauser & wife Agathia and six children who came to Philly PA on the ship "Nancy" and signed the oath 16 Sept. 1751. His land grant was in Northampton county PA but I think his land was very near the present Berks county border.

Hans Michael's father was Casper Mauser. There are records of several Casper & Michael Mausers in early records in Germany. I don't think I made copies of them but will look before I mail this.

I have hilited in yellow the line we believe is our line. Child 3C is listed as Johann Frederick Mauser 26 Sept. 1740.

The gravestone in Old St. Paul's cem at Newton NC reads Jacob Frederick Mauser. I feel certain it is the same man. His stone also seems to read born 26 Sept. 1743 but when you subtract his age (which is listed on the stone) from his day of death 23 April 1799 aged 58y 6m 27d; you get 26 Sept 1740. *Bapt. of 1st child Michael is in*

His wife was Maria/Mary Hauck/Houck. Some records list her as Mary but most seem to use Maria. Her father Peter was dead by 1765 and Thomas Winckler was her step-father. He or his son of the same name also came to NC, settled on adjoining land to Fred Mauser. *Benk P.A.*

Pages 946/947 list the deed we think was signed by our Fred of Marion county KY when he deeded his interest in his father's land to his brother John Mouser.

It is from this John Mouser that Robert Mouser, the present owner of the land, descends. Robert told me the Mousefs had a spring piped into their house and someone poisoned the spring, killed the Mouser wife and perhaps some of the kids but the husband survived. Robert said they believed John was buried on the farm but the graves were lost. There is a chance it was only the wife who died first who is buried on the farm as there are Mouser graves in another cemetery between St. Paul's and the farm, I think it was a Methodist cemetery.

Page: "A brief history of Old St. Paul's Church" is from a small 115 page hardcover book "Tombstone Inscriptions of the Old St. Paul's Church Cemetery 1702--1967" by Neal D. Wilfong (1969) available from the Catawba County (NC) Historical Association. They also have a large rolled map of the county with churches, creeks, and some land owners names from the 1850/1870 era, shows a Mouser, perhaps on the old land grant. *Newton NC ->*

I doubt that the 1702 date on the stone is date of death; might be birth or bapt. No one has decided whom this Abraham Mauser is.

Page 83-84 is from "A Genealogy of the Mouser Ancestry, including the Best and other families" by Lafrona Foshee Mouser (Mrs. Ben Mouser) now living with their daughter Barbara (Mrs. Charles) Nathman, 801 Shady Lane, Keller TX 76248.

This 482 page book has all the Mouser data that Lafrona had located, was published before we had all of the bugs out of the tree, but still makes a good reference. There are a number of typos in the book. The "from Raden/Baden" tradition seems to come from the bio in one of the KY County Histories and not certain how much trust to put in it.

Deeds: From Springfield, Washington KY: 1814 purchase of land on Beech Fork and 1861 deed of Fred Mouser deceased land by Gabriel to John Mouser.

My family story by my great Aunt Hettie Mouser Weaver (who died age 98 in 1984) was that Gabriel Mouser (a different Gabriel who was John's son) had a large family of children so Aunt Hettie kept the picture of his family turned down so no one would see how many cousins she had.

I made copies of many different Mouser & Donan charts; some I received from cousins and some of my own. Please note that some contain errors of early searches.

I did not have charts for the first two or three generations. You can list some of the names from those listed in the book pages, enclosed.

Charts 3 & 3A, 3B are for Fred & Betsy (Donan) Mouser. Art Mouser said our lawyer Donan, I think lived Greenville KY; William Page Donan, had recently died. There were still copies of the Donan Book available, a few years ago.

* D. C. Donnan came from Wales to America prior to 1772. They think he was from Scotland and had been in Wales for a short period of time.

"Surnames of Scotland" by George F. Black: Adam de Donan/Douan of Lankarshire & Arthur de Donon of Ayrshire rendered homage in 1296 (RR).

These counties are south of Eilean (Island) Donan and north of Wigtownshire, opposite Ireland.

Donnan is a Wigtownshire surname, from Ir. "O'Donnain, descendant of Donnan, diminutive of Donn, Brown (i.e. Brownie).

Under spellings of Donnan, Donan, Donane, Donnand, Donnane in the 1684 lists for Wigtownshire & Minnigoff they found nine Johns, one William & two Alexanders.

An 1689 letter to London from VA planter William Fitzhugh refers to "shipped tobacco by Donnan" believed to be a ship captain.

25 Nov 1774 Dhesterfield county VA, James Donnan chosen Committeeman

* David Cox Donnan was a resident of adjoining Dinwiddie county.

The Schenectady Donans were from Whiteburn, Gallowayshire, Scotland and Kerkiner Shire, Wigtown, Wigtownshire, Scotland.

The five generation chart of Art Mouser leads back to George Mouser born 28 Dec 1797 (according to Art's Bible), there is an error in the date listed in the Mouser Book. We believe George was the eldest child of Fred & Betsy Mouser.

There is perhaps a story in the marriages of Betsy Donan. She m. 30 Aug 1795 Greene County KY to Andrew Kelly. Betsey m.(2) 25 June 1797 Lincoln County KY to Frederick Mouser. In both cases her mother Amy Donan signed consent. ~ After 1795

Andrew Kelly seems to have lived for some years in the Houk/Donan neighborhood. The Indiana Mouser cousins say Betsy said her husband was mean & cussed alot. I wonder if this might have been Andrew Kelly and was the reason she left him?

The 18 March 1989 letter from Libby Britton (enclosed) included the old letter from Mary Bowman of Indianapolis Ind. It has errors in that it calls Betsy the wife of Col. Donan when she was nee Donan.

Charts of the two families of George Mouser 1797 and of his son Fred Mouser with obit and map of Mouser cemetery in Hart county KY.

Chart of my Edward Green Mouser. Have never learned where the "Green" name came from. His son Thomas Donan Mouser was my grandfather.

Charts from Maurine Huffstetter contain early data, some has proved wrong. I enclose them as they mention some of the names you spoke of on the phone.

As far as I can tell these Shucks were of a different line from my Shucks who married Parra Tharp and lived on Rolling Fork near Bradfordsville KY. These Shucks came to KY at a different time, may or may not have had connections back East, perhaps in PA. I know little about my Andrew Shuck before he joined the Low Dutch group.

Maps of Hart KY & Metcalf KY. I have not visited this area but believe the Hawk cem. is near Shady Grove/Peggyville in Metcalf county.

Pages 129 and 85 give more info on the Hart county Mousers. Two pages of my notes on our 1981 visit to Marion county KY.

Three pages: Edwards Cem, letter from Martha Lankford of Perryville KY and typed list of John H. Mouser. (He could be a son of Gabriel Mouser who was a grandson (not son) of Fred & Betsy Mouser.)

Pages 307--310 I found in Topeka Kansas State Historical Library, the list some Mousers who came over ca1832 (Jacob Mouser) who had a sister Anna Mauser who married a Rein of Oeschingen Germany. They must be some kin to our tribe.

A typed page of my notes on D.C. Donnan & descendants. You will note I list on chart D-2 that Sallie Donan m. William Dodson Givens while my notes say she m. his son Sanford Givens. Need to double check this.

The Givens name sometimes comes up Guin and other spellings.

Art Mouser's dau.-in-law (born & raised Germany, I think Heidelberg area) brought a small booklet of Oschingen Germany home from her 1992 visit. Maps and books in Germany spell it with one "e" but you find it Oeschingen in American books.

If I have room, will enclose photoes taken Newton NC of Mauser stones in Old St. Paul cemetery and just East of Hickory NC where the Mouser Sale Barn and Flea Market sits on the old Fred Mauser land grant on Clark's Creek. Robert Mouser owned the Sale Barn when we visited in the early 1980's.

The little book on Oschingen Germany is titled, "Oschingen in alten Ansichten" (1988) by Hans Martin Schneider. It is a picture book, mostly b&w 1900 to 1930's era, has a 1927 air view that shows the town being much smaller than today.

Schneider's married with Mausers, the pictures were probably collected from relatives, so several shots show Mausers or in-laws. The 1780 Mauser house is shown with the grandmother Katharina (Schneider) Mauser; I think she m. 1886 to Johannes Mauser. Their son Martin had children, the picture shows three children with their grandmother, one child is Marie Mauser who is married to Paul Rempfer and lives in the house, today.

Several pictures show Reins (remember the sister of the Ohio/Ind Mauser married a Rein. Several show Bucks (I think some Bucks were in Berks PA about the time the Mausers came); Wagner, Eibler are other names.

The Parra Tharp's lived on Rolling Fork. His Shuck in-laws lived in Kentucky, where at the time were some went at Pleasantville on the Shelby-Henry & line. Parra served as witness on the Low Dutch paper.

John H. Mouser born January 31, 1827, died February 21, 1900 at the age of 73 yrs. and 21 days.

United in marriage to Esther Ann Catlin on December 16, 1852. Esther Ann was born August 10, 1827 and died October 30, 1890, age 63 yrs. To this union was born:

Susan Ann Mouser, born May 7, 1859 and died July 13, 1882.

Little Brother Mouser, born June 27, 1860 and died July 16, 1860, age 20 days.

John W. Mouser born February 17, 1862, died Sept. 19, 1928

Susan Ann married John G. Martin on November 9, 1875. To this union was born: Netty Blanche Martin, born August 28, 1876, died Sept. 8, 1876 (10 days); Walter W. Martin, born Sept. 4, 1877; Thomas W. Martin, born Sept. 18, 1879. Susan Ann Mouser is buried at Hannibah, Missouri at Mount Olive burying grounds.

John H. Mouser was married the second time to Mary A. Overstreet. They were joined in matrimony on October 6, 1891 at the Methodist Church by Dr. J. S. Sigler at Lebanon, Ky. Mary A. Mouser died Jan. 23, 1892, age 57 yrs. Bv. Ryder C., Lebanon Ky.

John W. Mouser was married to Georgie Ervin Bagwell, a daughter of Casey James (born December 16, 1841 and died September 29, 1931) and Henderson O. Bagwell (born February 8, 1842 and died June 16, 1909).

John will Mouser born 2/17/1862 - D 9/19/1928
Georgie Ervin Bagwell Mouser was born April 19, 1864 and died Feb. 20, 1940 at the age of 76 yrs. She was born in Georgia and came in a covered wagon to Kentucky at a early age. not sure
The Bagwells were believed to have been from Dalton, Georgia.

John W. and Georgie Ervin Mouser are buried at Ryder Cemetary in Lebanon, Ky. Evidently they were able to hire themselves out for so many years to work so many acres of land in America until they were able to purchase some of their own.

The sister brewed some coffee & had a braided cake & we all sat in the shade of an old tall pine, there said our farewells. We returned with Marie to the Mauser House where she presented us with a current air view of Oschingen, as it is today, as a present to you.

I have to say "Dad" Mouser --- you came from a wonderful caring, congenial bunch of folks.

Doris, Peter & I left with a renewed feeling about Love Thy Neighbor --- even those from far, far away. I wrote all this on the flight back home.

Info from 11 August 1992 letter from Libby Britton: Charlottenhof: Hof means large large farm/ranch. Book picture #5: 1938 picture of entry into town. Reason for Kuppler to take picture was a motorcycle accident and the man landed on pile of manure (arrow). Two houses built 1867-8 by Fredrick Schneider and son Karl Schneider. Fredrick's grandfather was Casper Schneider. Fredrick married Margaret Brenner-Kirle - Brenner is Kirle (carl) nickname-Brenner-Kirle. (Ned is not certain he understands this)

Libby had her German friend look at the hand written page of notes by Mr. Eugen Hatus. Her friend states "Lagerbook" means "recorded at the court house" (this refers to the last note on the page: "Michael Mauser _____ ? ; 1580 in Lagerbook under Hans Kippler").

She states the hard to read word that follows Masper/Casper Mauser * 1630 and also follows the entry: "Casper * 13.9.1669 (13 Sep 1669) is immigrant and means Casper left the area.

She is not certain what the "Richter Berger" on the middle of the page after Michael Mauser, means, as it is used here. Richter means someone who has a title. Berger means citizen.

I had asked what the word "Obiger" & "des Obiger" means. She said "Obinger" is a word that means "equal or same as above."

She says "VOL" means "or" in this case, "before." This is found fifth line up from the bottom: "Michael Mauser VOL 1616". (wife + mother The SAME AGE ????)

Book picture #62: This photo allows us a glance into a classroom ca. early 1930. Head teacher Paul Eisele (his back to wall) has taught from 1925 to 1948 in the Oschingen School. With chalk and blackboard we recognize from left to right in the first row: Hilde Salaw, Rosa Schneider, Ruth Kern born Diether and Anna Rempfer. Second row: Martha Rudolf, Maria Haug, Liesel Strohmaier and Rosa Buck. Third row: Karl Haubler, Gotthilf Rempfer, Theo Schneider and Ernst Eibler. Fourth row: Gottlieb Hagenbach, Martha Schneider, Erich Mauser, and Wilhelm Hagele. Fifth row: Katharina Kuppler, Maria Gronwald and Liese Schneider. Sixth row: Klara Mauser and Bertha Bader. A sign on the door reads: "Do not spit on the floor". Were these well behaved ABC guardian angels meant?

Notes from Art Mouser's daughter-in-law, who lives in CA but was visiting her family in Germany (she was born & raised in Germany) and made a trip down to Oschingen Germany.

"Took off 7:30 for Heiddsburg towards Stuttgart -- Tübingen -- Oschingen. A lovely charming village settled in a lush green rolling hills. We entered the little town from the East end -- never knowing how close we were to the source.

Our first stop was the cemetery, looking for some Mauser tombstones. I was surprised to find it close to the only church in town (Protestant) surrounded by a 30" high old stone wall. (that was the only thing left from the Past.) All grave sites were relatively new, with impressive beautiful modern tombstones. The graves were planted with lovely flowering plant. * See pictures. Found (5 or 6) gravesites. We met an old woman with sprinkling can in hand & I stopped to ask her for the old part of the cemetery -- I told her what we were looking for. She took a little time -- sat down under an old willow tree and started talking.

She told us of a couple of Mausers that she personally knew -- but these ladys were married but their maiden name was Mauser.

A younger woman stopped. We also asked her a couple of questions. She offered to drive us to the so called "Mauser House".

I knocked on the door -- told the woman who answered, who I was & what I was looking for. To my surprise I found a delightfully friendly, older woman and her husband who were equally interested in knowing our (your) story as I was in knowing hers. For one hour we shared information, she brought out a 200 year old family Bible and a so-called housebook. (~~the 1988 book~~) As you can see the part pages of the Bible are falling apart but the most important thing was still ledgable & in fact. I asked if we could copy that three _____ pages & they agreed. My brother Peter & sister-in-law Doris went to the only place in town (an attorney's office). My mother later translated!

As they turned the Bible, a picture fell out * which showed the two Mauser women as little girls, with the Mom & Dad, in the field. The attorney saw the picture & said he remembered an interesting article about the Mauser House. As Doris came back she questioned the lady & she presented a little book * which showed all the beautiful old homes in the village & the stories of the people who lived in them.

Needless to say I asked where I could buy one. They gave me the name of the man who created that book -- and we instantly drove to his house -- were able to find his wife who sold us one. (only 8 left).

We took time off to have lunch & returned to the house where the woman made arrangements for us to go with her to meet her sister & husband, in the next village. (Mössingen) He supposed to have a family tree. He did a great deal of talking in the dialect of that area & even though it was German, ~~he~~ was very hard to understand. Spread out on the kitchen table he had the so called Mauser tree. (He was very very surprised at the Mauser history you had) Unfortunately I only had the first page with me.

He copied part of the tree by hand & insisted of doing it himself, since he was the one who had gotten that information some time ago from the church archives, (where the "Then ???" Pastor allowed him to spend 4 hours in the cellar searching through some old documents.) He said a young pastor has taken over & does not allow this type of search anymore (since in the past few years there has been such an overwhelming request from tourists, about their ancestors.) One thing was _____ that we had the right Mauser dau. -- that (as is written in the part of the book) knew that famine had come over the little town & many people had to leave - (Not because of religious persecution - but because they had lost everything & could not feed their families.

Also shows she came to town from the West.

Further radical changes are to be expected for the newly planned town center. Since the village is threatened to lose more of its identity so it is important to capture the old picture material which shows the change over the years of the community. The on hand picture story shall serve the older residents with memories and the younger and newly arrived residents shall have a picture of the old Oschingen from which the older generation speaks. But mostly it is meant for reflection of past history.

All towns people who contributed photos and information to the success of the picture tape, a very sincere Thank You!

Book picture #2: Environment conscious street building was practiced in Oschingen at least 60 years ago. Our picture proves it, less countryside wear, no asphalt, instead many shade giving trees. This picture was taken in 1926 between the Talheimer Straße and Mossinger Bruck. At this time the entire street corner from Mossingen to the Gonniger border was repaired. Most was manual labor. At that time the only technical helper available was a steamroller and their shovels on which they are leaning. From left we recognize: Friedrich Schneider (Banholz-Beck), Georg Rilling, two out of town roadworker, Karl Bihler (line master since 1927) civil servant Johannes Mauser, Karl Haußler and Gustav Scheurer.

Book picture #4: The first house at the entrance of the village (of Oschingen) on the Mossingen (side) was the Mauser-house build in 1780. Paul Rempfer (cabinet maker) married in to the house in 1946. In 1964 he enlarged the living area. His wife Marie, former Mauser, belonged to the at least fifth generation who resided in this house. Our picture shows her standing left next to her grandmother. Her father Martin Mauser was known as an hourkeeper. The pictured grandmother Katharina born Schneider, was reluctant after her marriage in 1886 to Johannes Mauser, to move in to the house. She feared that the French would come to the village and plunder the house since it was the first at the entrance of town. Her fears became reality on April 22, 1945.

Book picture #36: One of the oldest families in Oschingen was the Buck family. Already in 1522 is the family name evident. Our picture in 1871 shows the 13 member family of Johannes Buck (1824-1894). He probably did not always have it easy to feed his large brood. He at one time had said he never turned his back to look out of the window when sitting at the dinnertable in fear that his ~~back~~ glass would be empty, when he turned back around. Backrow standing from left: Johannes (Lammwirt), Martin (Tanzgraben), Ursula Brabara married Schneider (ancestor of the author), and Wilhelm (Gonningen). Front: Katharina married Mauser, Jakob (Bronnweiler), August (Muller in Gonningen), Gottlieb (Oberkasse), Mother Maria Katharina born Eißler, Father Johannes (Buck), Gottliebin (Bronnweiler), Matthias and Christoph.

Book picture #46: "In the Brook" it was called early on, the Reutlinger Street from the Oschenbach Bridge toward the village's exit. Corresponding and appropriate the grounds across the Oschenbach was named as "Bachosch". Our picture shows the street across from the butchers shop Buck. In the foreground we recognize what used to be the "Waag" Haus. Beyond stood a giant poplar tree. The barn used to belong to the restaurant "Fur-Rose". The little property in the background was jokingly called "The Little Castle". It was torn down in 1971. At one time Jacob Mauser and his family lived there. The last one was his daughter Marie, married Hummel. The oldest residents remember Anna-Barbele, a born Kuppler, who from 1891-1913 had a small shop in the Castle.

Book picture #54: The house of Johannes Mauser (formerly on the Bolbergstreet) is pictured here around 1926, with its simple framework construction. Johannes Mauser 1889-1960 used to be a civil servant and a village policeman and because of that, a respected person. His former property was torn down in 1985. We already saw him in picture #2. His mother Katharine born Buck, is shown in the family picture number 36, also her brother Martin Buck whose house we see partial in the background. The wife of Johannes Mauser, Margarete, born Wagner, is shown in the foreground with her children:

From left: Karl Mauser (missing in 1942), Fritz Mauser (village chief 1971-1975), Emma married Schneider, and child in arm, Albert Mauser, who was last to live in the family home.

∞ = marriage, * = birth, + = death. Mauser/Mouser page from Mossengen-Oschingen phone directory. Albert Mauser 8928 might have had charge of the church records at one time. He was not home when Art's daughter-in-law visited. She called him later and he may send more info. The following is the translation of the introduction to the 1988 book, "Oschingen in alten Ansichten" by Hans Martin Schneider.

Introduction: The village "Oschingen" with it's name ending of "ingen" is one of the oldest settlements in Germany. This is confirmed by the findings of grave sites on the western outskirts of the village, dating to the 7th century.

The village is mentioned as "Eskingen" for the first time in the year 1110 according to documents from the cloister "Hirsau".

Documents from the parish appear for the first time in 1275 that name the village as "Eschingen".

The first secure Messers (Mr., perhaps i.e. Master) of the grounds are the Stoffeln, Albrecht von Stoffeln in 1348 calls Oschingen, his own village.

Burkard von Stoffeln sold the village in 1381 to Count Fritz, the oldest von Zollern. Von Zollern sold Oschingen to Wurttemberg in 1415. (1415).

For the first time in 1477 do we find out anything about the size of the village. One counted 24 households and 6 singles dwellings. Oschingen in 1559 was one of the first villages in Wurttemberg to have a German school. The plague raged in Oschingen in 1566. During the 30 year war the entire village was burned to the ground. Besides the church only 3 other buildings were left standing. The war destroyed 78 buildings. 54 less men were counted after the war. The castle belonging to the Messers (Mr.) von First, which was located near Firstberg (mountain) was mentioned in a document for the first time in 1092. The castle was thought to be demolished by the former Elder Wagner and 11 townsmen in 1756. The silver rafter ?? (cafter ??) from the coat of arms belonging to the gentlemen von First were taken over by the municipality from Oschingen and Nehren. Mainly during Napoleon times did Oschingen suffer from troop passages and requisition of quarters. Russians had also taken up Quarters in 1813/14. The Martinschurch replaced a small dilapidated cemetery church also in 1814. The cemetery was also moved at the same time to it's present location. A bad harvest in 1816 was followed by a horrible famine and inflation.

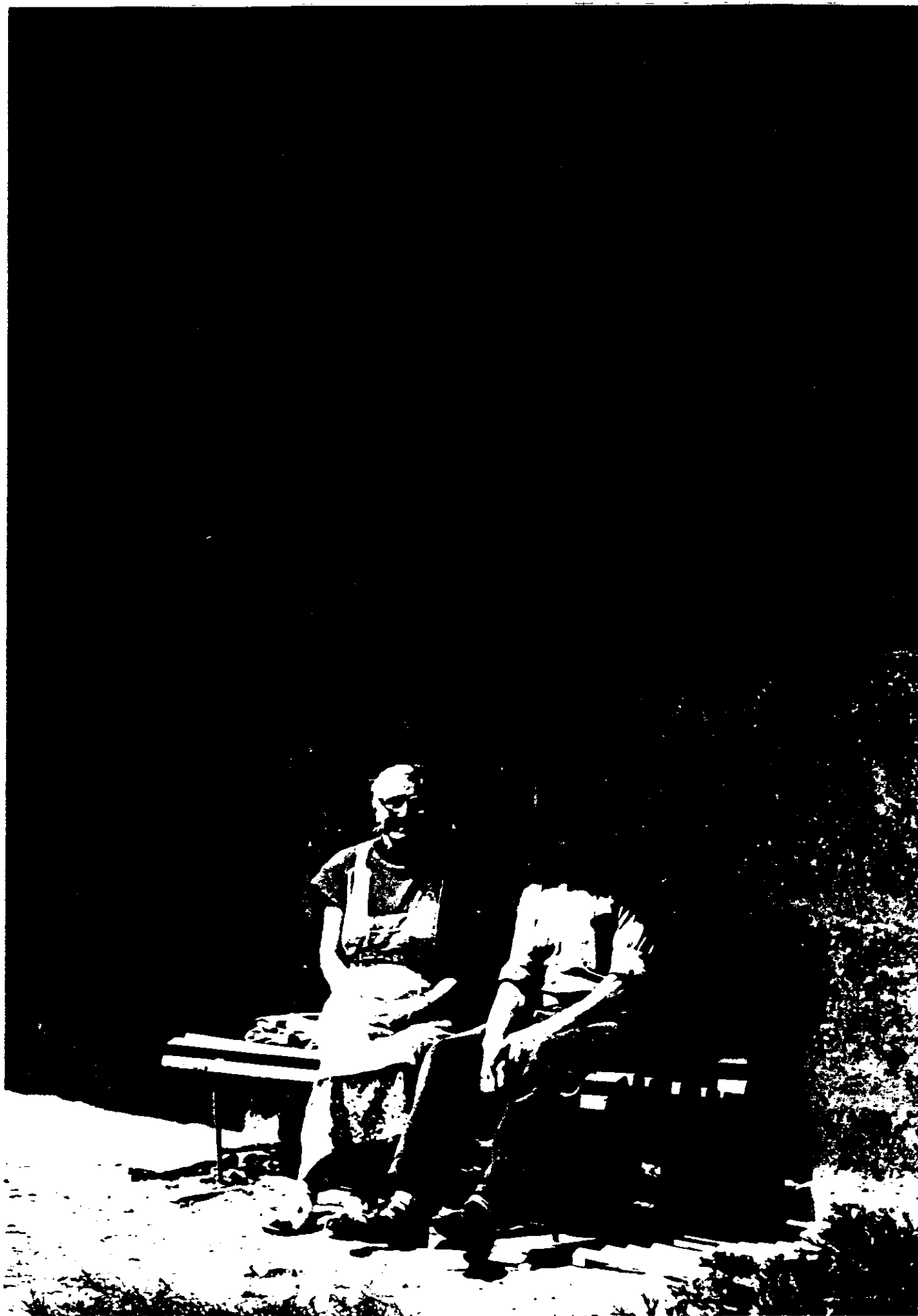
The years between 1828 and 1896 brought many hailstorms. The worst occurred in 1882/84/89. On the 18 July 1880 due to lightning, 4 family homes and 9 barns on the Obergasse (Street) were burned to the ground. Due to the heavy hailstorms between 1846 and 1896 about 185 persons migrated, mainly to America. That was about 20% of the 900 residents. Despite the unpleasant circumstance, things became better in the second half of the last Century and improved living condition. To break away from only agriculture, tools and hardware were introduced to the population and crafts were taught to promote trade.

1870 Oschingen became a market spot. The cattle market in "The Tanzgraben" (dancing grove) began to be filled with 300-500 heads of cattle. A new school house was built and finished in 1881. Added was a fire station in 1886 and an Savings and loan building in 1891. The most significant upswing for the village came in the year 1911 when the industrial company named Scholler moved to town. The same year also saw the building of a water supply pipe. More progress came with the connection of electricity in 1921.

An economics crisis came after World War I, which was long lasting. Inflation and high unemployment in 1923 contributed to further emigration. An upward development came about after World War II. The growing number of residents made it necessary to build. The local industrie was able to strongly develop and created new jobs. Which resulted in pushing agriculture in to the background.

The sudden growth made it necessary to build public establishments. 1961 saw the opening of a new kindergarden. In 1967 followed a school with a gymnastic and festival hall. And in 1971 saw the building of a mortuary. On the 1 December '71 the community Oschingen lost it's independence. Against the vote from the majority of the population the village was annexed to the village of Mossingen. It followed a frenzie of building and widening of the village. Strong changes were visible in the village in 1986 with the broadning of the village thoroughfare.

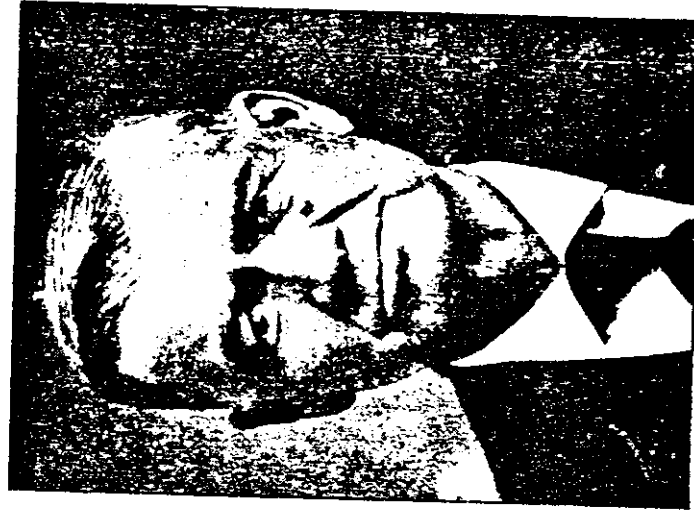

After his return, he spent his life in farming, at which he made good. He served his County for a time as Justice of the Peace. He is as hale, and hearty a gentleman as may be seen at this stage of life.

Norwood, Robert M., enlisted March 13th, 1862. He was promoted Corporal. He is still living.

Poovey, Silas B., enlisted March 14th, 1862. He died after the war.

Parker, Charles, enlisted March 13th, 1862. He is still living. Parker, John, enlisted March 13th, 1862. He was wounded at Fredericksburg, and is now dead.

Propst, William, enlisted March 13, '62; he died since the war, in Haywood County, N. C.

Parker, Samuel, enlisted March 13, '62; he received a wound from which he died, January 15, '63.

C. R. Rink, a member of Co. K, 46 North Carolina Regiment, enlisted March 20th, 1862.
