Genealogy From The Long Ago

(OLD SCRAPBOOK - 1890)

Editor's Note: We have come across an interesting collection of old clippings dealing with Kentucky family history. Since these clippings are over 100 years old, your editor feels they will be of interest to many of our readers. We will continue this column each month until the supply is gone.

The following is the continuation of the old genealogy concerning the Peters family from the September 2019 Kentucky Explorer.

Athenia, the fifth child of Mountford and Elizabeth Peter was married on March 18, 1869, in Washington County, Kentucky, by Rev. William F. Vaughn, to Thomas M. Flournoy. Her husband was born on January 10, 1827, and is living with his wife in the house where he was born, on the edge of Mackville, Washington County, Kentucky. He never lived at any other place. He was the youngest son of James and Martha O. Flournoy, and a grandson of Samuel Flournoy, one of the early-day settlers from Virginia. He is a farmer and a Methodist. He has been in feeble health for two years, in consequence of an enlargement of the spleen. They have never had any children.

Athenia is an intellectual woman of great activity and large executive ability. She is the leader of church and Sunday School organizations, and a constant worker in all educational and religious movements. Like most of Mountford's children she has, as an added accomplishment, a fine ear for music, and sings easily and correctly.

Orceneth, the sixth and last child of Mountford and Elizabeth Peter, married Kate Turner, who was born in Washington County, Kentucky, on February 10, 1870, with Rev. William F. Vaughn officiating. Her parents were Harrison and Eliza Turner. Orceneth is a farmer and schoolteacher. They have no children and are Methodists.

Descendants of Jordan Peter

Jordan, the second child of Jesse and Milly Peter, was one of the most pure-hearted, earnest and powerful

Christians that the author has ever known. These may seem strong terms, but they are not even striking enough to characterize this truly remarkable man. He seemed to inherit the piety, eloquence, musical talent, and deep religious fervor of his father, and his whole life was wrapped up in working for the salvation of souls. One who knew him well, and who is an excellent judge of character, thus writes incidentally of him: "Jordan Peter was one of the noblest, and certainly the most truly pious, men I ever saw. Of all the Peter name, not excepting the preachers, William and Simon Peter, distant cousins of this branch of the family, he seemed to me to be the most beautiful and attractive type. In my exchanges with him for years I cannot recall a single word or deed, which was not in harmony with a noble, Christ-like soul. 'He was in the world, and yet was not of the world,' and in fact, he seemed too good for such a worldly world. He was charitable to a fault. With his numerous other powers, that of a peculiarly stirring, deep, rich, melodious, plaintive voice makes an ineffaceable impression on my mind. His thoughts and actions were always in the spirit of the guiding words, 'Thus saith the Lord.'"

It is to be regretted that the records we have to submit of the descendants of Jordan Peter are so imperfect, but the family has wandered off from the other branches, and its members have failed to keep up correspondence with their kinsmen, so that we have not been able to reach the various lines in time to secure full returns. The records, such as we have them, are as follows:

Jordan married twice. First, on March 21, 1822, to Elizabeth Hans-

braugh, born February 28, 1805, and died in childbirth February 7, 1834, in Sullivan, Indiana. Their religious belief was Methodist, although Miss Hansbraugh had been raised a Baptist. The children by this first marriage were:

contacted at the time of this genealogy, but is living ca. 1880.

Emily, the third child of Jordan and Elizabeth Peter, was married on March 24, 1846, in Sullivan, Indiana, by Rev. Lealdus Forbs, to LaFayette Stewart. He was born on April 12, 1826, in Greenville, Floyd County, Indiana. His father's name was Isaac Stewart, his mother's Susan C. Redman. Isaac Stewart was born April 3, 1792, in Jefferson County, Kentucky, seven miles from Louisville, and died August 13, 1863, in Sullivan, Indiana. Miss Redman was born in Clark County, Indiana, on March 8, 1795, and died October 14, 1832, in New Albany, Indiana.

The children of LaFayette and Emily Stewart are:

Martha Shepard, named after her uncle, Shepard Sweeney, the fourth child and oldest daughter of Jesse Peter and Milly Sweeney, was married to Col. James McDonald, near Mackville, Washington County, Kentucky. His fa-

ther was Maj. Richard McDonald, who had come with his twin brother, Alexander, in early times from Virginia, and settled on Long Lick, near Mackville. Until she was 10 years of age, her life was spent in Mercer County, Kentucky, where her parents lived. Her mother was the daughter of Moses Sweeney, a Scottish man. Colonel James, her husband, was a man of prominence in that portion of his state. He served in various public positions, and was in the House of Representatives of Kentucky in 1828, 1829, and 1832, as well as in the Senate from 1833-1837. The McDonalds to whom he belongs landed in Delaware in 1689, migrated in part from there to Virginia, and have since scattered all over the United States. Colonel James died March 16, 1865, and is now buried in the Masonic Cemetery, San Francisco, California. His widow lives with her only surviving daughter, Mrs. Elliott, at the corner of Bush and Seventh Streets, Oakland, California. Col. James McDonald and Martha Shepard Peter were married September 29, 1819, at the Jesse Peter home, three miles from Mackville, Kentucky. Rev. Nathan Hall, a Presbyterian, a particular friend of the family, officiated. From this union, the following children were born.

1. Dr. Richard Hays, the "pioneer" spirit of the family, born June 21, 1820, near what the post office guide now calls Mackville, though it should be Macksville, Washington County, Kentucky. (1880)

and were not subject to induction. A new regulation abolishes this class and also affects registrants exceeding 28 who are "conscientious objectors." The latter will be subject to immediate induction to perform "duties of National importance," provided they qualify otherwise.

Meager Instruction Received.

The local board has received meager instruction in regard to the registration of prospective soldiers 20 and 21 years old and from 20 to 44 years old, who, under a new law, will also be subject to army duty. The only official message tells the board to be prepared for the new registration but sets no date. It also gives board members the right to designate where in the county the registration shall be held and suggests that men of various age groups be registered on separate days to facilitate the job.

According to Col. Frank D. Rash, State Director of Selective Service, every registrant slated for admission to the armed forces will be issued a booklet telling him exactly what the army expects of him and what it offers him. Titled "The Army and You," the fourteen-page pamphlet has been prepared by the War Department with the cooperation of National Selective Service Headquarters, and contains such sub-titles as "Teamwork Is Essential," "In the American Spirit," and "Military Courtesy." The booklet, in sample quantity, has been received at the local Draft Board office.

Deserters Lose Citizenship.

Another announcement made this week points out that with America at war all deserters from the armed

relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship as well as their right to become citizens. Such deserters "are forever incapable of holding any office of trust or profit under the United States, or of exercising any rights of citizens thereof."

A reversion to the original procedure followed by the local board in its preparation of men for army induction, has been authorized. Under this ruling, all men registered are required to undergo a physical examination here and those who pass the tests are classified and mailed notices of the classification to which they have been assigned. They are then granted ten days to appeal if they so desire. Those who do not make an appeal and those denied deferment go to Louisville where they submit to
