



William "Billy" Hardin Milburn

Sept. 16, 1844- Jan. 20, 1927

William Hardin Milburn was born in the hilly area of Marion County, between Logan and Gravel Switch, on September 16, 1844. He was the youngest son of Joseph Milburn (1810-1876) and Harriet Nelson Milburn (1811-1886). He was the youngest of five children. His brothers and sisters were: James F. Milburn (b. 1834), John Milburn (b. 1838), Eliza Jane "Lizzie" Milburn Boswell (b. 1851) and Susan Milburn (b. 1843). His family lived in Marion County until they moved to Pottsville, Kentucky in 1851. William Hardin, called "Billy" attended the public and "subscription" schools of Washington County. Records in the Washington County Courthouse bore his signature, indicating he could read and write. His father, Joseph, taught him to be a farmer, but at the age of twenty, he went into the carpenter's trade and continued in this business until he was age thirty five.

His father died in 1876, and Billy lived with his widowed mother, Harriet, until he was 36. No explanation is known why he waited so late to get married. Family tradition states that he visited his neighbors, the Kimberlins, and bounced their baby, Susan Sidney, on his knee, and exclaimed, "This pretty one is mine." This he could well have done because he was 17 years older than she was. Truth or not, he met and married Susan Sidney Kimberlin, daughter of George T. and Merinda Yankey Kimberlin, on December 9, 1880. They were married in his bride's home by Rev. R. L. Purdom. His best men were his brother-in-law, John Russell, and his friend, J. M. Burns. The bride was 19 and the groom was 36. Family tradition holds that the Kimberlins, at first, did not approve of the marriage because of the great age difference. The groom was but ten years younger than his new father-in-law. This could be the basis for the family tale that Grandpaw Kimberlin "hated" to give "Sudie" away, and would not come out of the house to see the newly weds off, but remained in the house and watched the couple depart, while wiping his tears on the window curtains.

Billy bought a small farm from his father-in-law, G. T. Kimberlin, and he and Sudie made their home there throughout their marriage. Through the years, he bought more land, and soon he owned a farm of 180 acres on the Logan Road, near Pottsville, Kentucky.

His farmstead was the birth place of his and Sudie's eleven children:

10. Elizabeth Milburn (b. 1904)
11. Haldeen Milburn (b. 1905)

Elizabeth was born when Billy Milburn was 60 years old, and Haldeen was born when he was 61.

Billy Milburn raised corn, wheat, tobacco, and owned herds of cattle and sheep. His daughter, Lillie Elliott, said he was more of a farm manager than a farmer. She states she couldn't remember ever seeing him do a day's work, but saw to it that the boys, his sons, did the work.

Billy Milburn was a Baptist and was very active in the Beech Grove Church where he led the singing and was a deacon of their church for over forty years. He and the children would walk every Sunday from the Logan Road to "The Grove", a round trip of at least five miles. This habit he continued well into his seventh decade of life.

He was also a Democrat and for 15 years represented his section of Washington County as a Democratic Committeeman. Also, he was a constable of Washington County. Lillie Elliott recalls that, as a constable, Billy Milburn was called over in Logan to help break up a mob who were planning to lynch a negro. What the negro did, she does not recall, but Constable Milburn must have failed in his mission, because the mob "hung" the negro man.

Sudie died of tuberculosis on April 14, 1911, and Billy buried her with her people in the Bethlehem Cemetery, near Texas, Kentucky. They had been married 31 years. He was left with four children at home - Oscar, Lillie, Pete, and Haldeen.

Revolutionary War Soldier

History of Kentucky Illustrated, Edition 4, by Perrin, Battle and Kniffin gives an interview on page 942 of Richard C. Milburn. Here is a portion of that interview:

"Richard C. Milburn was born on January 28, 1830. His father, Israel Milburn, was born in Marion County in 1801. He married Miss Margaret Thurman in 1822, and to them were born five sons and three daughters: William, John H., Israel, Thomas C., Richard C., Cevilla (Curtsinger), Mary A. and Elizabeth. Israel Milburn died in 1831 and his widow subsequently married Shadrick Inman, she died in 1855, leaving by her second marriage three sons and one daughter. Israel Milburn was a stone-mason, and one of the best of his craft. He was a member of the Baptist Church, and a man of strict business principles and unbending integrity. He was a soldier in the War of 1812 and participated in the Battle of New Orleans. His father, Robert Milburn, was a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and proclaimed the gospel throughout Kentucky at a day when the Indians were numerous and troublesome, and when settlers took firearms to church. Rev. Robert Milburn died sometime in the first decade of the present century; his father, Hobard Milburn, was a native of Virginia and came to Kentucky prior to the war of the Revolution, in which he engaged."

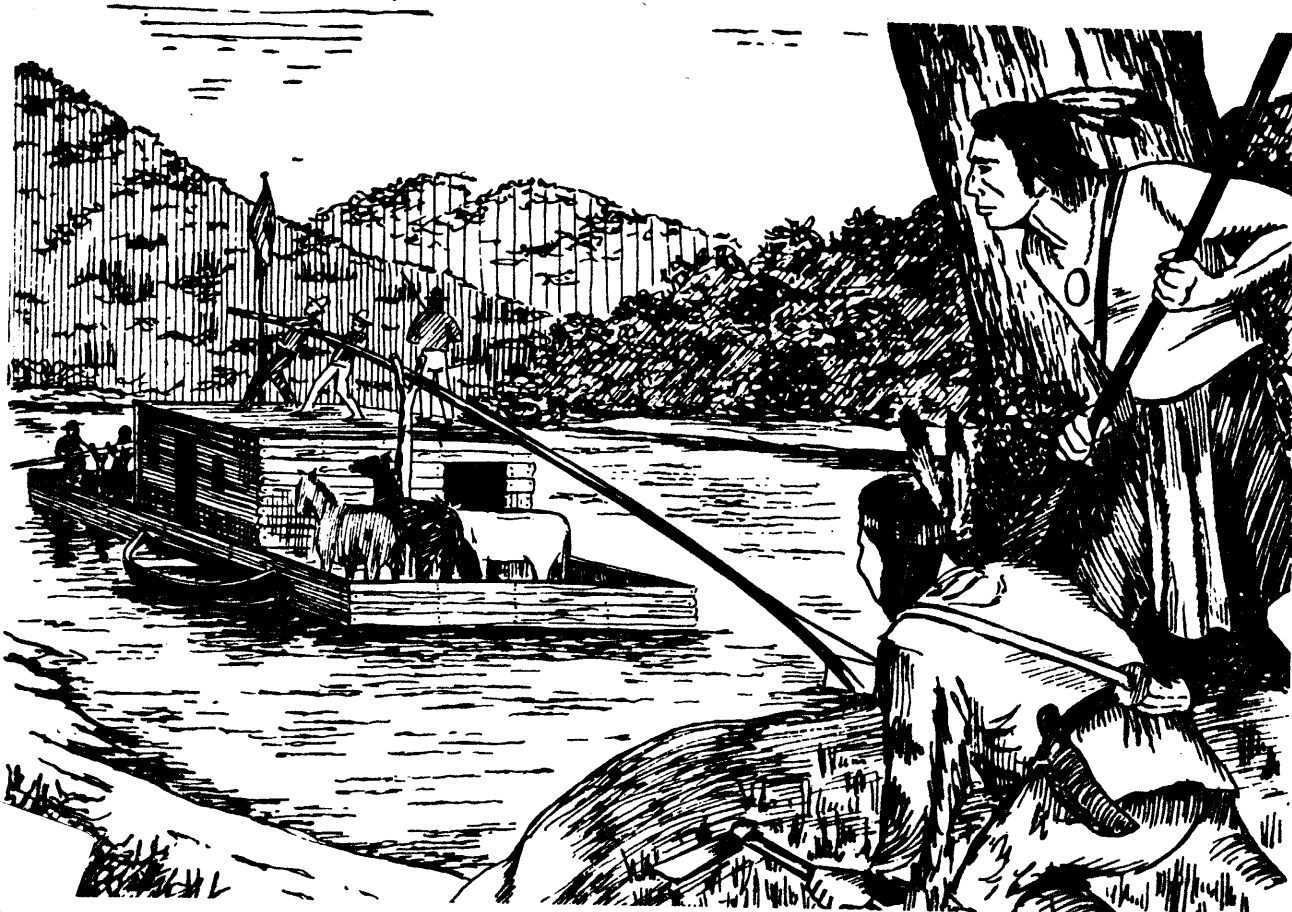
William Hardin Milburn gave an interview in "A History of Kentucky and Kentuckians", by E. Polk Johnson. He states (p. 1698)

"William Hardin Milburn was born September 16, 1844 in Marion County, Kentucky, being the scene of his nativity. There, likewise, occurred the birth of his father, Joseph Milburn, who was born about the year 1807, and maintained his residence in that locality until about the year 1851, when he removed with his family to Washington County. He continued in this favored portion of the state until his demise, which occurred in 1876, at the age of sixty-nine years. The subject's grandfather, Robert Milburn, was a native of Virginia, who settled in Kentucky previous to the year 1800. He operated the first old water mill and distillery in the locality. The great-grandfather, who founded the family in America, came from Scotland."

These two references give us some credible information about HOBARD MILBURN:

1. He came from Scotland.
2. He founded our Milburn line in America.
3. He settled in Virginia first.
4. He came to Kentucky before the Revolutionary War (1775).
5. He went back and fought in the Revolutionary War.
6. He was the father of Robert Milburn and grandfather of Israel Milburn.
7. Israel Milburn and Joseph Milburn were brothers.
8. Joseph Milburn was the father of William Hardin Milburn, the subject of this book.

More research needs to be done on HOBART MILBURN, probably in Virginia military and court records. Nevertheless, I think it is safe to suppose that the first Milburn of our line who came to America, and then migrated to Kentucky, was HOBART MILBURN. He was the author's great-great-grandfather.

ROBERT MILBURN

Robert Milburn, son of Hobart, also came from Frederick County, Virginia. Born about 1760, he was married in Virginia, and he and his first wife came to Kentucky between 1795 to 1800. He does not appear on the 1795 Washington County, Kentucky tax list, but he does appear on the 1800 Washington County tax list. Robert and his first wife bring two sons with them from Virginia.

1. John Milburn born Virginia about 1780, married Mary Fowler (Washington County, Kentucky), September 4, 1803.
2. William Milburn born Virginia (about 1790-95) married Cupy Glasscocke in Washington County, Kentucky, May 19, 1820.
3. Israel Milburn born in Virginia or soon after they arrived in Kentucky (1801-1831), married Margaret Thurman, Washington County, Kentucky October 23, 1815.
4. A daughter, Polly Milburn, was born about 1800. She later married Shadrick Inman. Polly Milburn and Israel Milburn both died very young and Polly's husband, Shadrick Inman, married Israel Milburn's widow, Margaret Thurman, and had five children.

It could be that Robert Milburn's first wife died at the birth of Polly or soon afterward because the Washington County records establish that Robert Milburn married Margaret Grimes on July 25, 1803, by Rev. Jessie Head. This same minister married Nancy Hanks and Thomas Lincoln three years later in 1806 in a part of Washington County less than 20 miles from where Margaret Grimes and Robert Milburn were married. Seven years after their marriage, the 1810 census of Washington County shows Robert to be over 45, and Margaret Grimes Milburn to be between 26 - 45. Therefore, there could have been quite a bit of difference in the bride's and groom's ages. In fact, Robert's oldest son, John, is around 23 years old at the time of his father's wedding, and well could have been older than his new stepmother.

By profession, Robert Milburn was a preacher, farmer, miller and distiller. This may seem an odd combination, but not for pioneer Kentucky in 1803. Robert Milburn was a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and proclaimed the gospel throughout Kentucky at a day when the Indians were numerous and troublesome and when the settlers took firearms to church.

The 1810 Washington County census shows Robert and Margaret Milburn living in the area of Washington County that is now included in present-day Marion County, on the waters of Pleasant Run. Robert Milburn held title to over 900 acres of land, owned no slaves and had three sons from 10 to 16 years of age, five sons under 10 years of age and four daughters under 10 years. Using a bit of simple subtraction, it would be safe to guess that the three older sons and one older daughter belonged to his first wife, and the last nine belonged to his last wife, Margaret Grimes. Marriage license and property sales reported in Washington County courthouse indicate that there could have been a thirteenth child, Andrew Jackson Milburn.

Israel Milburn, Robert's oldest son, fought in the Battle of New Orleans during the War of 1812 under the command of General Andrew Jackson. He was one of the Kentucky long rifle sharp shooters with which "Old Hickory" surprised the British and turned the war in favor of the Americans. It was probably while Israel Milburn was in the War of 1812, or shortly after his return, that his baby brother was born and named for the famous Andrew Jackson. Other children of Robert Milburn and Margaret Grimes were:

1. George Milburn, born about 1804, married Celeia Dawes 1823
2. Wilson Milburn, born about 1805-6, married Susanna Morgan Mar. 18, 1823
3. Frances Milburn, born about 1805-06, married Polly Inman (sister to Shadrick Inman) 1826
4. Elexius Milburn, born about 1806-07, married Hannah Jeffries 1826
5. Catherine Milburn, born about 1807-08, married Ben Burton in 1824.
6. Nancy Milburn, born about 1808-09, married George Stumpff, 1825.
7. Jane Milburn, born about 1809-10, married Noel Edwards, 1833.
8. Joseph Milburn, born about 1810-11, married Harriet Nelson, 1830.
9. Andrew Jackson Milburn, born about 1815, married Chloe Inman (sister of Shadrick Inman) 1831.

Two sources, E. Pope Johnson, "A History of Kentucky and Kentuckians", and the court records of Washington County, Kentucky, support the fact that Robert Milburn was a miller and distiller. He did live on a flowing stream and the practice of "liquid-fying" the corn crop was not unusual during that period. Whiskey was used as money on the Kentucky frontier, and barrels or jugs of whiskey were easier to ship on flat boats down the Mississippi River to the port of New Orleans, than would a large crop of corn have been. Robert probably ground corn for his distillery and ground corn and wheat for his neighbors "table needs". The court records of Washington County, Kentucky, of January 5, 1827, plainly read that, when settling Robert Milburn's estate, Frances Milburn bought one half of the distillery for \$70, and widow Milburn (Margaret Grimes) retained ownership of the other half. This was taken from the Washington County court records: "Personally came Theodore Cullin, John T. Cullen and Joseph Cullen before me a justice of the peace for said county and made oath that they had appraised the estate of Robert Milburn as the law requires.

"At a county Court begun and held for Washington County at the courthouse in Springfield on Monday the 22nd day of January 1827. This inventory, appraisal and sale of the Estate of Robert Milburn deceased was exhibited in court and ordered to be recorded which is done accordingly. signed John Hughes Jr. (Washington County Clerk)."

The following facts were learned by the author by a close reading of this court record.

1. Robert Milburn probably died in December of 1826.
2. He is survived by widow (Margaret Grimes) Milburn.
3. He did not leave a will, thus requiring an appraisal.
4. The early Milburn did not read and write. All Court Records bore the (X) mark.
5. No land was sold at the 1827 estate sale.
6. No slaves were sold at 1827 estate sale.
7. Widow (Margaret Grimes) was "sold out" of everything but the cabin and one-half of the distillery.
8. All livestock (sheep, hogs, horses, cows, steers, ducks, oxen, and geese) were sold.
9. All farm tools (shovels, picks, wagons, sickles, saws, chisels, horse shoes, drawing knife, saddles) were sold.
10. All household utensils (skillets, loom, spinning wheel, knives, oven, flax break, wheat cradle) were sold.
11. All distillery equipment (barrels, barrels of wheat and corn, tubs, hand mill, inch auger, grinding stones, mash tubs, empty barrels, kegs) were sold.
12. Robert had loaned money to his son, George Milburn; George Stumpff; and Thomas Thurman. These men bought their notes back at the sale.
13. Farm produce, fodder, corn, hemp, flax and whiskey were sold.
14. The last fact ascertained is that Robert Milburn surely had accumulated a lot of earthly possessions, three pages of double columed listings in the book.

Widow Milburn was probably as young as her oldest step-son at the time of her husband's death. It is certain, by reading marriage bond dates, that her children, Jane, Joseph and Andrew, were still at home. Her children, Elexius and Francis, had married the year "Old Robert" died.

By the recorded purchases Widow Milburn made, at her late husband's estate sale, it is clear that she intended to maintain a household in her widowhood. Sale records show that she purchased:

Widow Milburn - 8 sheep for \$4.00
Widow Milburn - 1 narrow ax for \$2.00
Widow Milburn - 1 "waggon" for \$46.00
Widow Milburn - 1 yoke of steers \$20.62½
Widow Milburn - 1 horse \$7.12½
Widow Milburn - 1 fodder shock .50
Widow Milburn - 4 geese .50
Widow Milburn - 21 ducks 1.50
Widow Milburn - 1 half-bushel .50
Widow Milburn - 1 loom 1.00

After Robert Milburn's death in December 1826, and sale of personal property on January 5, 1827 her older Milburn step-sons lost no time in selling off her late husband's track of 900 acres.

Recorded in The Washington County court on October 27, 1829. A transaction is recorded between John Milburn and Francis Milburn. The records state that John Milburn is selling to Francis Milburn a track of 150 acres of land for \$784. But this is part of the "original claim of Robert Milburn, and John Milburn's step-mother, Margaret Milburn, is to have use of the place where she now lives for her life time provided that she treats and uses the land and timber as it requires (The Dower Law) be it known that the said John Milburn made her to enjoy the place for her life time.

John Milburn is not to be understood to be a generous man, as he states in his court record, he knows the Dower Law requires the widow to get one third of her late husband's estate, but simple division cannot make 150 acres anywhere near one third of 900 acres.

Margaret probably remained at the old home place for the rest of her life. Court marriage records indicate that she never remarried. She probably made her home with her son, Francis Milburn, seeings as he owned the home place and she only had use of it for her life time. The date of her death is not recorded. She and Robert Milburn are probably buried in a long forgotten grave yard on the bank of the Beech Fork river in the northwestern section of Marion County, Kentucky, in land that at this time was Washington , County.

MARRIAGE BOND OF JOSEPH MILBURN AND HARRIET NELSON DEC. 29, 1830

JOSEPH MILBURN 1810(?) - 1876

William Hardin Milburn states, in E. Polk Johnson's History of Kentucky and Kentuckians, that his father was Joseph Milburn, and that he was born in Marion County in about 1807. This would have then been Washington County, because Marion County was not formed out of part of Washington County until 1834. More reliable evidence of the birthdate of Joseph Milburn can be found in the 1850 U. S. Census of Marion County, Kentucky. In this census, Joseph Milburn is listed as forty years old and his wife, Harriet, as 39 years old. If the census is accurate, then Joseph Milburn was born in 1810, and Harriet Nelson was born in 1811.

Joseph Milburn was the son of Robert Milburn and his second wife, Margaret Grimes Milburn. He is probably the 7th or 8th child out of their nine children. His father was a preacher, farmer, miller and distiller. Knowing pioneer households, it is quite likely that young Joseph worked on the farm, in the mill and distillery

as a boy. He did not go to school. This is evidenced by his mark (X) on his marriage bond, and a deed to his Pottsville home. Joseph was only 16 years old when his father, Robert Milburn, died in 1826. His older half-brothers very quickly sold off his father's household and farm possessions in January of 1827, and sold off the land in May of 1829. This left Joseph, age 18, living with his widowed mother, Margaret Grimes Milburn, on land owned by his older brother, Francis Milburn. It is very likely that Margaret Grimes Milburn and her younger children, Joseph and Andrew, made their home with this Francis Milburn, and he acted as Joseph Milburn's guardian. This is indicated by Joseph Milburn and Harriet Nelson's marriage bond of 1830. Joseph is under legal age and the marriage bond is signed and witnessed by Francis Milburn.

Joseph Milburn married Harriet Nelson, also of Washington County, on December 30, 1830. Joseph was 20 and Harriet was 19. They probably started housekeeping on land owned by Francis Milburn. The U. S. Census of Marion County reports Joseph and Harriet Nelson Milburn as citizens in both 1840 and 1850. The 1850 census was the first to report names. This information was taken from the microfilm of the Marion County Census of 1850.

William Hardin Milburn, Joseph's son, states in E. Polk Johnson's History of Kentucky and Kentuckians that the family moved from Marion County to Washington County in about 1851. The deed books record that Joseph and Harriet Milburn bought a lot from John and Mary E. McCord, for the sum of \$40.00, in the town of Pottsville, Kentucky. Joseph and Harriet probably built a house on this lot, because when they sold the property to Jackson Bottoms, on February 13, 1858, the price was \$125.00. Evidently Joseph Milburn could not give to Jackson Bottoms a "clear deed" to the property; thus making it necessary to record a late deed (1857) in the Washington County Courthouse.

It is not clear where Joseph and Harriet lived after the sale of the Pottsville property, but it is certain that they remained in Washington County. The U. S. Census of Washington County of 1860 listed Joseph Milburn as 51 and the census of 1870 listed him as 58. He also maintained his membership in the Beech Grove Baptist Church according to the old church records now found in the vault of the "Old Bank of Perryville, Kentucky".

Joseph Milburn never owned much land or accumulated very much earthly possessions. This could be attributed to the fact that his older brothers sold all of his father's land and possessions before he became of age, and he received very little or no inheritance from his father.

At the time of his death (1876) he lived with his wife, Harriet, in or near the settlement of Pottsville, Kentucky. In his household also lived his bachelor son, William Hardin Milburn, age 32. His daughter may have been living with him also. William Hardin Milburn states, in the aforementioned interview, that his father, Joseph, was in his sixty-ninth year. It is believed that he is buried in the old "Isham-Milburn Cemetery" on the farm of Robert Harmon. This is the second farm on the left, back from Beech Grove Baptist Church, on the Perryville-Pottsville (U. S. 150) Road. The cemetery is on a hill about 200 yards from the house. The author visited the

cemetery twice, in an effort to find Joseph Milburn's grave. He found many hand-chiseled, home-made tombstones, and many graves merely marked with large field stones. The newer gravestones were "store bought" and bore the names of Milburn and Ishams. The author did find the grave of Joseph's son, James F. Milburn, but the grave of Joseph Milburn was not located.

Harriet Nelson survived her husband by ten years. She lived with her son, William Hardin Milburn, until he married in 1880. It is not clear where she lived her last six years, probably with one of her children. Lillie Elliott states that her father, William Hardin Milburn, told the story many times that "In her older years his mother, Harriet Nelson's mind went bad." One summer when she was staying with him, at his farm on the hill in Logan, "mad-dogs" were numerous in the community. One day "Old Harriet Milburn" was out in William Hardin Milburn's yard, when she was attacked and cornered up next to the house by a "mad dog". William Hardin recalls that when he went to his mother, the gallant old lady was "shooing" the mad dog off with her apron. Harriet Nelson Milburn died in 1886 at the age of 73. She is also probably buried in the "Old Isham-Milburn Cemetery".

The descendants of Joseph and Harriet Nelson Milburn are as follows:

I. James F. Milburn born 1834

In 1850 Marion County Census, he is 16 years.

In 1870 Washington County Census, he is 35 years and is listed as a farmer.

His wife is listed as Hannah (1837), she is listed as 32 and as "keeping house".

II. John Milburn born 1837

In the 1850 Marion County Census, he is 12 years.

In the 1860 Washington County Census, he is in Pottsville area living with parents. He is listed as John Milburn, 22 (farm laborer, below Nancy Milburn 20 (F)). He married Nancy Ann Isham on December 26, 1859, by preacher William May, in the house of William Campbell, witnessed by William Campbell and Harvey Key.

In the Washington County Census of 1870, John is 33, male, and is a house carpenter, Nancy Ann, his wife, is listed at 31 and keeping house. His children are:

4. Maggie Milburn (b. 1867)

It was nice of you to contact me regarding William Milburn and Keziah Glasscock Milburn. I so enjoyed your letter . It was immensely helpful in getting information for you. I am afraid I have done some duplication but even that helped me get a feel for your family. Enclosed please find the following:

I have found there are two William Milburn in early Washington later Marion Co. William Milburn son of Robert Milburn who was born around 1790's and William Milburn born in 1817. The second William (1817) lived in Eastern Marion County and was the jailor. It was reported in one of the biographical sketches that he was marshal but in the tax records it was recorded he was the jailor.

In the Washington County Tax list of 1830 William (1790) lived on Beech Fork and had a 32 acres farm. In 1837 he is paying taxes on property in the same area but owns 168 acres. In 1842 there is no William Milburn paying taxes in then Marion Co. (Marion Co separated from Washington Co in 1834)

In the 1840 census in Marion County, William Milburn is listed as the head of

household with 2 males between 5 -10, 1 male between 30 -40 and 2 females under 5 and 1 female between 30- 40.

The last tax record I found on William in Marion Co was 1841. The first tax record that I found on William in Graves Co. was in 1847. He and John Milburn both showed up in the same year. John does not indicate that he has any children between the ages of 5-16. William is listed as having 4 children between the ages of 5-16. This last information is consistent with the information on William in the Washington Co census of 1840. From 1830 until 1847 there are no Milburns in the tax records for Graves County.

I also found this, in a summary of Graves Co newspaper: died in Graves Co. Wednesday, 8-19-1876 4 year old Charles T. Milburn, son of Rev. J. H. Milburn.

Then in the Graves Co Court Records: E. Lynne guardian for J. T. Milburn 5-1883, and E. E. Inman guardian for W. J. Milburn 6-6-1883.

In the Washington County courthouse in the deeds, the land that Robert and Margaret Milburn owned was located in the Pleasant Run area of now Marion County. This area is also know as the Beech, Landers Creek and more commonly Haysville. This is a big area. Three water ways cut through this area: Pleasant Run, Landers Creek and Beechfork Creek. The last is not to be confused with the Beechfork that runs through parts of Nelson and northern Washington County. Some of the early settlers in this area where the Milburns, Glasscock, Hourigan, Hays, Inman, Browns. and Skinner. From the late 1790's up to the late 1880's these families intermarried. Even in the present day the Glasscocks, Hourigans, and Hays are still closely connected with distant cousins marrying. Most of the Milburns now live in Washington County. The families are well established and influential.

In all my research on the Glasscocks, there has been only one Keziah "Cussy" or "Cuppy" Glasscock in Marion Co. and she did marry a William Milburn and move from the County and by family information moved to Hickman Co. Keziah's younger sister Lucinda married Richard Skinner and moved to Oklahoma. Keziah's niece, Pearl Glasscock married an Inman and moved to Champayne Illinois. Most of this information is not relevant to you but add this show how much and far the Glasscock women move!

I have also included a page from the book "Glassco (Glasscock) Saga" written by Mr. Lawrence Glassco in 1964. I believe he has since died as I have been unable to locate him. He lists Keziah; and indicates she marries a "Milborn" from Hickman Co. After completing my research on the Glasscocks am convinced that William and Keziah moved to Graves not Hickman County.

I spoke to his wife on the phone 2-18-1992. She stated she thought they still had some copies of the book and that they sold them for \$15 each. I saw the book at the Historical Society. Its about 60 pages, nicely done and contains much information. Mr. Milburn is associated with the Nelson Co Schools as his wife told me he would be unavailable to talk with me yesterday due to school business. I would have copied the book at the library but it is copyrighted so just copied the page with the family tree. As you can see, he includes a William Milburn who married Keziah "Cupy" Glasscocke. I don't know if he has any other infomation.

There is a William Milbourne listed in the 1840 census of Hickman County and a William Milburn listed in the 1830 census of the Jackson Purchase. The "Purchase" is what we call that tip end of Ky and would enclude those counties. Marriage records for that area show a William Milburn marrying Elizabeth Edrington 8-14-1832. In addition I found no William Milburn in the Tax records of Hickman County for 1822, 1823, and 1824. There is no William Milburn in Hickman County census for 1850 and 1860.

HALDEEN AND GERTRUDE MILBURN, Haldeen Milburn was born at the old Milburn homestead on the Stone Lick or Logan Road near Texas, KY, on Oct. 23, 1905. He was the eleventh child of William Hardin Milburn and Susan Sidney Kimberlin Milburn. His father was 61 years old when he was born and his mother died of tuberculosis when Haldeen was six years old. He was raised by his 12 year old sister Lillie Milburn Elliott. When he was 17, he met and married Gertrude Pendergraft Logue, daughter of Lydie Camden and Harrison Logue. Gertrude was born on April 17, 1907, in Casey Co., KY, and grew up in the Deep Creek area of Washington County. They started housekeeping in a small two room house on the farm of Elver and Leana Graves near Perryville, KY. Here on Aug. 5, 1924, their first child, a son, Morris Donald Milburn, was born. Next they moved to Louisville where Haldeen worked for a company that molded concrete flower boxes and bird baths. Here on Jan. 20, 1926, their second son, H.T. Milburn was born. Next Haldeen and Gertrude moved to Elizabethtown, KY. Here Haldeen learned the shoe repair trade from his older brother Prentice Milburn. Here on Nov. 11, 1927, their third son, Garnett Earl Milburn was born. Haldeen opened up his first shoe shop in Westpoint, KY, in 1928. Here Haldeen began using the initials W.H. Milburn. In 1929, W.H. and Gertrude moved back to Springfield, where they operated their second shoe shop in the basement of the Walton Hotel. The Great Depression came and the new business failed. During this time, their fourth son William Kenneth Milburn, was born on Feb. 19, 1930, at their residence on Cemetery Hill.

In 1930, W.H. and Gertrude bought a small farm at a tax commissioner's sale at the Washington County courthouse. It was located on the Peterson Lane, just off the Mackville Pike, near Texas, KY. This farm was the birthplace of their last five children: Iona Paige Milburn, Jan. 19, 1932; Nellie Annettia Milburn, Nov. 13, 1933; Mary Lovella Milburn, April 25, 1935; and twin sons, Gilbert Leon Milburn and Delbert Calvin Milburn, April 4, 1938. While living on the Texas farm, W.H. supplemented his income by shearing sheep, working at the stockyard and tobacco warehouse and renting large tobacco crops from Charlie Hatchett.

In 1944, W.H. and Gertrude moved from Texas, KY, back to Springfield, KY, where they built a new shoe shop. They lived next door to the shoe shop for five years, until 1950, when they moved to a farm about three miles from Springfield on the Jintown Road. Here they lived until all the children were grown and married. In 1957, W.H. sold his shoe shop

to his son William "Billy" Milburn, but missing the shoe business, he opened a new shoe shop in Harrodsburg, KY, in 1960. W.H. and Gertrude lived in Harrodsburg until 1967, when he sold this shoe shop to his son, H.T. Milburn in 1968. They lived there until Gertrude died of a stroke on Dec. 31, 1981.

On June 26, 1984, W.H. married Virginia "Bird" Barnes, widow of Dewey Barnes. He then sold the Jintown Road farm to his daughter and son-in-law, Nellie and Ben Haydon, and he and Miss Bird moved to Springfield where they reside on East Main Street. W.H. and Gertrude Milburn's family is: Morris Donald Milburn, Aug. 5, 1924, married Frances Bottoms, July 19, 1922. Their children are Janet Milburn Seesengood, Oct. 1, 1944; Donna Milburn Roach, Aug. 14, 1948; and Terry Morris Milburn, March 24, 1954.

Buster was raised at the old Kimberlin Homestead, by his great-uncle Sam Kimberlin and his wife Pattie (Campbell) after the divorce of his parents. Both parents remarried and had other children. He had one sister Jessie (McAdams), two half sisters Georgie Hudson (Case), Beatrice Yankey (Head), three half brothers, Herbert and Joe Hudson and James Yankey.

Cathryn was raised by her father and stepmother Sid and (Ivy Young, Elliott) Milburn in the old Milburn Homestead in Logan. Her mother died when she was five years old. December, 1877, at the age of seventy-two years. Patsey (Bradshaw) Todd was born in the above county, and died in February, 1882, aged seventy-two years. Mr. and Mrs. Merritt are both active members of the Christian Church.

DR. JOHN M. MEYER was born December 1, 1817, in Barnwell District, South Carolina, where he was reared to manhood. In 1835 he entered Centre College, Danville, Ky., where he graduated in the regular course in 1840. He then commenced the study of medicine at Lexington with Dr. Benjamin W. Dudley, and graduated from the medical department of Transylvania University in 1843. He located in Boyle County, on the Perryville pike four miles west of Danville, where he has since enjoyed an extensive and lucrative practice. His father, Michael Meyer, was born in 1780, in Barnwell District, South Carolina, was a planter and slave-holder, and died about 1836, at the age of fifty-six years. His brothers were Jonathan and David. Their father was Davis Meyer, born in Pennsylvania and died at the age of ninety years. Michael married Miss Rebecca Jackson (thought to be related to Gen. Andrew Jackson), and from their union sprang Anslem D., James J., Dr. John M., Elizabeth (Marshall), Rebecca (Love), and Martha (Stallings). December 12, 1844, the Doctor was married to Miss Mary R., daughter of Samuel and Maria (Ball) McDowell, of Boyle County (born July 18, 1823, died July 1, 1885), and to them were born Joseph, Maria Ball (McGoodwin), Florence, Mary (Lyne), Oscar, Thornwell and Carolina. The Doctor owns and resides on a farm of 200 acres of well improved and productive land. He has a fine herd of thirty registered Jersey cattle, among them one that is classed as a twenty-pound cow. Dr. Meyer is an Ancient Odd Fellow. He has for thirty years been elder in the Presbyterian Church. He lost thirty-five slaves as a result of the late war. In politics he is a Democrat.

RICHARD C. MILBURN was born January 28, 1830. His father, Israel Milburn, was born in Marion County in 1801. He married Miss Margaret Thurman in 1822, and to them were born five sons and three daughters: William, John H., Israel, Thomas C., Richard C., Civilla (Curtsinger), Mary A. and Elizabeth. Israel Milburn died in 1831, and his widow subsequently married Shadrack Iaman; she died in 1855, leaving by her second marriage three sons and one daughter. Israel Milburn was a stone-mason, and one of the best of his craft. He was a mem-

ber of the Baptist Church, and a man of strict business principles and unbending integrity. He was a soldier in the war of 1812, and participated in the battle of New Orleans. His father, Robert Milburn, was a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and proclaimed the gospel throughout Kentucky at a day when the Indians were numerous and troublesome, and when the settlers took firearms to church. Rev. Robert Milburn died some time in the first decade of the present century; his father, Hobart Milburn, was a native of Virginia and came to Kentucky prior to the war of the Revolution, in which he engaged. Richard C. Milburn received a common-school education in his native county of Marion, and remained on the home farm until he attained his majority. Having learned the blacksmith's trade, he carried on that business in Kentucky and later in Dallas, Tex., after which, in 1861, he returned to Kentucky and located at Haysville, in Marion County, where he remained for a few years, then removed to Springfield, and after three years returned to his present location in Precinct No. 2, where he purchased land in 1867 and carried on farming in connection with blacksmithing. His farm of 170 acres is well kept and improved and very productive. He was married, February 25, 1852, to Miss Elizabeth Brown. They are the parents of four sons and two daughters: Thomas, Frederick, Henry, William B., Sallie, wife of John Ware of Bradfordsville, and Minnie. Elizabeth (Brown) Milburn was born December 29, 1829. She is a daughter of Alexander and Margaret (Mouser) Brown, both natives of Kentucky. Mr. and Mrs. Milburn and all their family are consistent members of the Baptist Church in which Mr. Milburn has for thirty years held the office of deacon. He is a member of the Masonic fraternity, which he joined in 1854. His political views are Democratic.

WILLIAM B. MILBURN was born November 25, 1858, and is the youngest of four sons and two daughters born to the union of Richard C. and Elizabeth (Brown) Milburn. William B. Milburn received a good education in the schools of his native county of Marion, and in 1879 took up the profession of teaching, which he soon after abandoned as uncongenial with his tastes; he then returned to the trade of blacksmith, which trade he had learned with his father previous to his career as a teacher. He is yet in partnership with his brothers, and doing a successful and lucrative trade in blacksmithing and wagon and carriage making at Bradfordsville. February 28, 1883, he was

united in marriage with Miss Celesta F. Ware. They are the parents of one daughter, Myrtie M., born January 5, 1884, and one son, Wm. R. R., born April 20, 1886. Celesta (Ware) Milburn was born September 2, 1861. She is a native of Pulaski County, Ky., and a daughter of Rice Ware and Sarah (Cooper) Ware, of English lineage and natives of Pulaski County. Rice Ware is yet living, aged forty-four years; the mother died January 26, 1883, aged thirty-seven years. She was a daughter of Levi Cooper, whose father, Malachi Cooper, was a Baptist minister who came to Kentucky in 1796. He was pastor of the church at Somerset for many years and was much devoted to his religious duties, and highly esteemed by his people. He was a persistent worker in the temperance cause, and was one of the strongest pro-slavery men of his day. He reared a family of three sons and five daughters, of whom was Sarah, the mother of Celesta (Ware) Milburn. Sarah was also the name of the grandmother of Malachi Cooper. Mr. and Mrs. Milburn are members of the Baptist Church. He is a member of the I. O. G. T. and a worker in the temperance cause. His political views are Democratic, and he takes an interest in political affairs. In 1883 he was elected marshal of the village of Bradfordsville, and in that capacity served one year.

EDWARD L. MILES, born August 15, 1825, is a son of Henry and Ann (McAtee) Miles. Henry Miles was born in Maryland, came to Nelson County, Ky., with the earliest Catholic settlers, and was wounded in a fight with the Indians in coming down the Ohio River. He was not a wealthy man at the start but left an estate of 1,000 acres at his death in 1830 at the age of sixty-nine years. His father, Philip Miles, was a native of Maryland, of Scotch-Irish descent, and married a Miss O'Brian. Mrs. Ann Miles was a daughter of George McAtee, who married a Miss Hamilton of Maryland, and both came to Nelson County, Ky., at an early day. Edward L. Miles was born where he still resides in Nelson County, was educated at St. Joseph's College, Bardstown, and graduated in 1846. In May, 1848, he married Anna Bradford, daughter of David and Amanda (Davis) Bradford. David Bradford was an attorney and for many years was superintendent of the mint at New Orleans. After his marriage Mr. Miles purchased a farm near Bardstown, but five years later removed to the old homestead; about 1857 he went to Louisiana and purchased an interest in a sugar plantation of 1,000 acres; at the close

of the late war he sold his interest in the land and returned to New Hope, Ky., and in the winter of 1867-68 built a distillery, starting with a capacity of 200 bushels, which had been increased in 1881 to 1,000 bushels. In 1871, however, he sold out to Tom Shirley. At present he owns 1,000 acres of farming land, and his residence is a fine brick erected by his father over seventy years ago, but recently remodeled and enlarged. Mr. and Mrs. Miles are members of the church of *Retham.*

THOMAS W. MILLER was born December 3, 1811, in Madison County, Ky., and is a son of Daniel Miller and Susana Miller, nee Woods. These parents removed from Virginia to Kentucky near the close of the last century, the former being a native of Albemarle County, where he was born in 1774, and the latter a native of Nelson County, Va. They settled on a farm eight miles from Richmond, Ky., where their lives were passed. Daniel Miller was a Jeffersonian Democrat. He was long known as Maj. Miller, a title derived from his official commission as a major of Kentucky militia. He served three terms in the Kentucky Legislature, from Madison County, and died in that county in 1841. They had ten children: Mary, Robert, John (who was killed at the battle of Richmond, Ky.), James, Elizabeth, Susan (Hume), Margaret (Shackelford), Malinda (Shackelford), Thomas W. and Christopher Miller. Thomas W. Miller, of Shackelford, is the only surviving member of this family. He was married in Madison County, in 1841, to Miss Mary J. Hocker, a daughter of Col. Nicholas Hocker, and they were residents of Madison County until 1874, when they removed to Lincoln County. They reared but one child, S. Malinda, the wife of J. S. Owsley, of Lincoln County.

ROBERT MILLER was born November 7, 1823, two miles east of Richmond, and is a son of Robert and Sallie (Estill) Miller, to whom four sons and three daughters were born, five of whom were reared, Robert being the sixth in order of birth. Robert Miller, the father, was born March 1, 1775, in Albemarle County, Va., and was brought to Madison County, Ky., by his parents in 1804, and settled at Oldtown, four miles south of Richmond. He became an active and leading farmer, conducted a hotel in Richmond in early life and served in the Kentucky Senate two terms; in politics he was a Whig and in religion was originally a Baptist, but later united with the Christian Church. He died June 21, 1861. He was a son of John and Jane (Delaney) Miller,

Thank you for your information. I have the biographical sketches of Richard C. Milburn and William B. Milburn. These are not mine. The town of Milburn I have. Of course, I had the Census of 1850 and 1860 ^{Green Co., Ky.}

I bought a book of William Harden Milburn several years ago, and talked to the author. I believe Robert to be the father of my William, but still need proof of Cuffy being Fizzie. I also had the marriage of Sarah J. Francis and Mary Milburn are not mine at this time. William, ^{who m Cuffy} and Francis may have been brothers or half brothers.

After beginning to write all I have, I decided it would be easier to write what I did not already have in relation to the material you sent. You will have this list on the next page.

I rechecked the "Family of William Harden Milburn." Francis Milburn who married "Polly" Sumner would have been a 1/2 brother of my William. Both were sons of Robert Milburn, but different mothers.

Things I did not have:

1. A listing of willburas compiled by Gene Willburas of Tennessee.
2. Copy of the additional sales of the estate of Robert Willburas.
3. Copy of the 1870 map of eastern Marion Co., Ky.
4. 48 Orders - Fiscal Court 1803 Washington Co., Ky. Robert & John Willburas marriages.

You said you enclosed the following, but I can't not find in the information you sent:

1. Copy of marriage bond of William and Kezzie
2. Copy of marriage record of William and Kezzie
3. "I have also included a page from the book "Glassco (Glasscock Saga" written by Mrs. Lawrence Glassco in 1964." ^{MEH} This is not in the packet.

You did included 2 sheets that I am

returning to you. I really have no
idea what they are supposed to be.

You worked very hard on this I am very
sure, but almost all of the things you sent
I already had and was work I had already
done. I still do not have any firm
proof as to the fact that William and
Kizzie in the 1850 Census in Graves Co.
Ky. are indeed the William who married
"Cuppy" Glascocks. I do feel they are.

When you were proving work for your
Glascocks Book did you have a will
or estate papers for Whorton Glascocks
and his wife Minnie Chapin who would
have listed Cuppy - Cuzzey Cussy - Kizzie
as being their daughters? The marriage

said you would send. If there is any
further money involved to get any thing,
I'll need to know the cost before I have
any thing else done.

HALDEEN AND GERTRUDE MILBURN, Haldeen Milburn was born at the old Milburn homestead on the Stone Lick or Logan Road near Texas, KY, on Oct. 23, 1905. He was the eleventh child of William Hardin Milburn and Susan Sidney Kimberlin Milburn. His father was 61 years old when he was born and his mother died of tuberculosis when Haldeen was six years old. He was raised by his 12 year old sister Lillie Milburn Elliott. When he was 17, he met and married Gertrude Pendergraft Logue, daughter of Lydie Camden and Harrison Logue. Gertrude was born on April 17, 1907, in Casey Co., KY, and grew up in the Deep Creek area of Washington County. They started housekeeping in a small two room house on the farm of Elver and Leana Graves near Perryville, KY. Here on Aug. 5, 1924, their first child, a son, Morris Donald Milburn, was born. Next they moved to Louisville where Haldeen worked for a company that molded concrete flower boxes and bird baths. Here on Jan. 20, 1926, their second son, H.T. Milburn was born. Next Haldeen and Gertrude moved to Elizabethtown, KY. Here Haldeen learned the shoe repair trade from his older brother Prentice Milburn. Here on Nov. 11, 1927 their third son, Garnett Earl Milburn was born. Haldeen opened up his first shoe shop in Westpoint, KY, in 1928. Here Haldeen began using the initials W.H. Milburn. In 1929, W.H. and Gertrude moved back to Springfield, where they operated their second shoe shop in the basement of the Walton Hotel. The Great Depression came and the new business failed. During this time, their fourth son William Kenneth Milburn, was born on Feb. 19, 1930, at their residence on Cemetery Hill.

In 1930, W.H. and Gertrude bought a small farm at a tax commissioner's sale at the Washington County courthouse. It was located on the Peterson Lane, just off the Mackville Pike, near Texas, KY. This farm was the birthplace of their last five children: Iona Paige Milburn, Jan. 19, 1932; Nellie Annetta Milburn, Nov. 13, 1933; Mary Lovella Milburn, April 25, 1935; and twin sons, Gilbert Leon Milburn and Delbert Calvin Milburn, April 4, 1938. While living on the Texas farm, W.H. supplemented his income by shearing sheep, working at the stockyard and tobacco warehouse and renting large tobacco crops from Charlie Hatchett.

In 1944, W.H. and Gertrude moved from Texas, KY, back to Springfield, KY, where they built a new shoe shop. They lived next door to the shoe shop for five years, until 1950, when they moved to a farm about three miles from Springfield on the Jimtown Road. Here they lived until all the children were grown and married. In 1957, W.H. sold his shoe shop

to his son William "Billy" Milburn, but missing the shoe business, he opened a new shoe shop in Harrodsburg, KY, in 1960. W.H. and Gertrude lived in Harrodsburg until 1967, when he sold this shoe shop to his son, H.T. Milburn in 1968. They lived there until Gertrude died of a stroke on Dec. 31, 1981.

On June 26, 1984, W.H. married Virginia "Bird" Barnes, widow of Dewey Barnes. He then sold the Jimtown Road farm to his daughter and son-in-law, Nellie and Ben Haydon, and he and Miss Bird moved to Springfield where they reside on East Main Street. W.H. and Gertrude Milburn's family is: Morris Donald Milburn, Aug. 5, 1924, married Frances Bottoms, July 19, 1922. Their children are Janet Milburn Seesengood, Oct. 1, 1944; Donna Milburn Roach, Aug. 14, 1948; and Terry Morris Milburn, March 24, 1954.

H.T. Milburn, Jan. 20, 1926, married Laura Royalty, June 23, 1928. Their children are Rex Milburn, June 12, 1948; Charlotte Milburn Brady, Nov. 8, 1949; Sharon Milburn Thompson, Dec. 17, 1952; Len Travis Milburn, June 6, 1963; and Donald Bruce Milburn, Aug. 15, 1964.

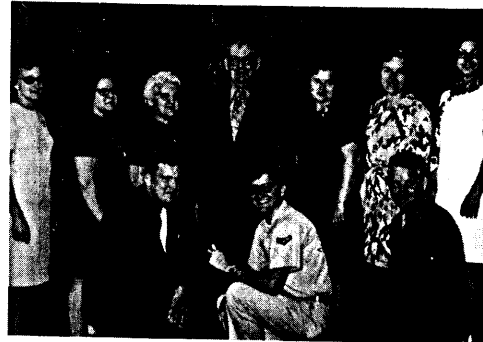

Buster was raised at the old Kimberlin Homestead, by his great-uncle Sam Kimberlin and his wife Pattie (Campbell) after the divorce of his parents. Both parents remarried and had other children. He had one sister Jessie (McAdams), two half sisters Georgie Hudson (Case), Beatrice Yankey (Head), three half brothers, Herbert and Joe Hudson and James Yankey.

Cathryn was raised by her father and stepmother Sid and (Ivy Young, Elliott) Milburn in the old Milburn Homestead in Logan. Her mother died when she was five years old. Cathryn had two sisters, Florence (Henry), Hallie (Whitehouse), three brothers, John, Marcus and Sidney; two half-sisters, Hazel (Tillotson), Sophia (Irwin); three half-brothers, C.A., Prentice and Robert; two step-sisters Nancy Elliott (Goode), Petra Sallee (Green) and five step-brothers, Woodsie, William, Thomas, Rusus Elliott, and Jimmy Sallee.

Buster was a tenant farmer, truck driver, worked at the Redryer the W.P.A. and served in the National Guards. He served 14-1/2 in the United States Army. In 1947 he began working at Armour Creameries (now Armour Food Plant) in Springfield. He retired from there in the mid seventies.

Cathryn was a homemaker, helped her husband in farming and reared eight children. She raised a large garden, canned and froze food for her family. In 1947 she went to work at a sewing factory. She also worked at the Redryer and a nursing home until bad health forced her to retire. After retirement she and Buster joined the senior citizens and enjoyed many trips together. They also enjoyed fishing and gardening.

Both were life long Baptists and were members of the Springfield Baptist Church. Cathryn died Nov. 23, 1977 and Buster died Sept. 18, 1982. Both were buried on Cemetery Hill in Springfield.

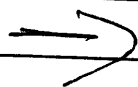

She stated in her letter which was written from Arkansas that her "husband, R.F. Milburn (now deceased). Therefore, Robert F. Milburn died some time after 10 Dec 1890 and 30 March 1895. We believe, Amanda Milburn was visiting, if not making her home with, her daughter, Ruth Milburn Cole in Arkansas at the time. Probably she had gone to Arkansas after her husband died.

Amanda Hamlet Milburn died 16 May 1924 in Hopkinsville, Christian Co KY and was buried 18 May 1924 in Maplewood Cemetery, Mayfield Graves Co KY. Her obituary appeared on the front page of Mayfield Messenger (newspaper) 16 May 1924.
