Deducting former payment at the rate of \$255 dollars per annum.

The Deposition of George Edilint. taken at his residence in Washington County Kentucky on the 1st day of August 1860, to be read as evidence on behalf of John P. Reeds Adm^r in two Consolidated suits now pending in the Washington Circuit Court, in which Mrs. Julia Reeds Adm^r of John P. Reeds dec^d is Plaintiff & Sincinda & others of color, are Defendants and also of Mary Miles Slave Plaintiff and John P. Reeds, Adm^r Defendants. Deposition being of lawful age and first duly sworn

Examination by M. R. Hardin Atty for Reeds adm^r -

Q. What is your age and did you know Mary Miles sometimes called Molly Miles and how far did you live from her during your acquaintance with her.
Answer - I am going on 50 years of age, I knew Mary Miles, I was raised within a mile & a half of where she lived. -

Q. How long have you known her?

A. Since we have frequent dealings

and I did -

Q. Just by name?

A. What and when was the first business or trade you had with her?

Answer - The first dealing I ever had with her was in the year after the Cholera in 1833, I rented some land from her and done her blacksmiths work -

Q. Just by name?

A. When you living with my father we were adjoining farms near that time if so what name you engaged at that time often did you see Molly Miles often about the time?

Answer - I was living with my brother Edward Edilint - the farms did not quite join, but were not far apart - I was engaged working on the farm, I would see Molly Miles sometimes three times a day, and sometimes not more than once a week - Sometimes she would send for me -

Q. Just by name?

A. And after I had further live on land.

acquaintance Mrs Miles if so did you at
one time oversee for him - if so how
long & did you send or exchange
any land with the old lady during
that time?

Answer - My Grand father did live on an adjoining
farm to Mrs Molly Miles. & I did at one time oversee
for him about 3 years & 9 months, & I swapped her a
piece of land with Mrs Miles during that time - that is
my Grand father made the swap & I was along when
the trade was made -

or 1850 if so tell me about it?

Answer - I was most always renting land from her &
doing her blacksmiths work for her & have for years -
and in the years 1849 & 1850, I rented land from her &
did her blacksmiths work - I also at that time sold her

on a settlement - If so what year
was that in? How much was
the note for? How did you
collect it and when?

Answer - I did take her note on a Settlement, we had
I don't recollect the year, but I think it was 14 or 15
years ago, the note was when settled off amounted to
about \$100.00 I don't recollect what the original
amount was - I sued on it in the Washington Circuit
Court, about 13 or 14 years ago - I don't remember exactly -

the note did anything occur between
you and her on the subject of
giving you an order to John
P Ruel for your debt if so tell
me she said about it? -
Answer - I asked her to give me an order on John P
Ruel for my money, she said she could not, that she
had already got from him \$1500.00 or \$1600.00.

Did she tell you more than
once that she intended the negroes to

Answer— She has told me so a good many times—
not since I sued her, it was before that time— I was
at her house the last time about a week before I sued
her and I heard her speak of it then— I refer to the
evidence and make it part hereof by reference—

Did she ever talk to
you about freeing the negroes if
so about what time did she talk
about freeing them and when did
she say this?

Answer— I heard her say whilst I was living with my

 Ans. I was a Patcher then & was weakly. She
 would ask me what I intended to do with my negroes,
 and then she would tell me what she intended to do
 with hers - And said she wanted to set them free but
 she had to pay Reed, and had no other way to pay him
 except with the negroes - And some 25 or 26 years ago
 she sent for my father to confer with him to know
 which one of her negroes she could free - and he
 told her she could free all but old Tom, and he
 belonged to the him - My father told me this and all
 I know about this is what I heard my father say -

(Pliff excepts to that part of the foregoing answer
 as states what witness father said)

By Same. Had she not often told you and was
 it not generally known in the neighborhood
 that she had a settled purpose to free all
 her slaves.

Mrs. - She always signified that she intended to free her negroes - And if it had not been for this debt of Reeds she would set them all free but Sam, & she could not as she thought set him free -
By Jane. How much did she say she was owing Reed as reason why she could not carry out her notion of freeing the slaves.

Ans \$1500.00 or \$1600.00 - I suppose the By Jane. included the debt to me, but don't know. By Jane. How many negroes did she then have reared then Mrs. - Samy - Lucinda - Bill, Polly, John, Sim, ~~Lucy Child about 3 or 4 years old~~; Lucinda's Child - All Sam, -

By Jane. Now give as near as you can the value of the slaves at that time commencing with old Bob - Sam - Mrs. - Negroes were very cheap then - Sam I would say \$100, Lucinda \$200, Polly \$250 - Bill \$550 - Samy \$400 or 450, - Sim \$300 - John \$300 - Lucinda's child \$100 -

By Jane. Give the ages of these several slaves at that time =

Mrs. The best judgment I can form is Sam was about 45 years - Lucinda 25 or 30, Polly 16 or 17 - Bill 18 or 19 Samy 15 or 16, Sim 11 - John 13 - Lucinda's child an infant -

By Jane. Now from their ages at that time as you have given them say if on reflection you have not valued them at an extravagantly low rate.

Ans - My father at that time bought a likely negro ^{man} for \$550 - I did not trade in negroes at that time, & I might have put them too low, I was not a good judge - I bought a negro man a blacksmith soon after that time for \$750 - he was about 21 years old -

By Jane. Did not Mrs. Niles think a great deal of her negroes and do you think that any body for any price could have purchased any of them from her.

Ans - She thought ~~very~~ too much of them & would not

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hire any of them out, — and I don't think she would have sold any of them for any price — money could not have bought them; If any one would whip any of them it would make her very mad —

By Samr. — Have you seen a copy of a deposition you gave for John Reed in a suit he brought against Mary Miles for these slaves before she died? If so state where you saw that copy, where it and state if you read it over this morning and where the copy now is.

Ans. — I have seen a copy of my deposition referred to and had it read to me this morning, I can't read or write — Mr W. H. Stapp attorney for Reed has it now — but it has not done me any good; I cannot read or write and I can recollect things that happened 10 or 15 years ago, better than I can things that happened later, from the fact that since I have been married my wife sets down all my transactions and I do not charge my memory with them — Mr W. H. Stapp is now present representing Reed, Adm'r —

By Samr. — Were you Cross examined by any one opposed to Reed when you gave that deposition and are your answers to the Cross examination true —

Ans. — Mr Riley Cross examined me when that deposition was taken, & my answers on Cross examination are true —

By Samr. — Did or not Mrs Miles have the utmost confidence and reliance in Reed during the time you have spoken of.

Ans. — She had a great deal of confidence in Reed from the way she spoke, I never saw them together —

By Samr. — Did you know or hear the old Lady say anything about Reed having drawn several thousand dollars of pension money of her during the time he was making these advances and payments for her.

Ans. — I never did —

By Samr. — Did the slaves always treat the old Lady kindly and abediently — if they treated her otherwise than kindly tell which one of them it was and when.

Answer - When I would be present they seemed to be as fond of her and treated her as well as they could do - I never saw any of them mistreat her - Lucinda was better to her than any negro I ever saw to her mistress, she was good to Mrs Miles herself and made the children mind her - Mrs Miles would not have got hardly any thing to eat if it had not been for Lucinda -

By Sam - Have you not had and manifested considerable interest in all these controversies in behalf of John R. Reed - and did you or not offer to bet \$5. with Henry Brown that Reed will wait to be established.

Ans - I never manifested any interest in this suit, I never saw Reed until after I had sent for the money, I ~~and~~ have no more interest for Reed than I have for Mrs Reed - If I ever agreed to bet with Henry Brown I have no recollection about it, I am ~~subject to fainting spells~~ ^{trappings} and sometimes before these spells comes on I am not conscious of what I do say - or directly afterwards -

Question for Reed's Advers - How long has it been since the last time you heard Mally Miles speak of freeing her Negroes

Answer - I don't recollect exactly, but I would say 18 or 20 years -

and lived near Mrs Miles ever since 1808

He was the father of Mr Reed and Mrs Elizabeth Reed - Ben Harrison who was never married and died down St. Marys - ~~efficiency~~ ^{efficiency} about the same time her father died - and Harrison lived after her father's death down on the Ohio River. There were all the sons. brothers - then the sisters were Mrs. Frooman, Mrs. Waters - and Mrs. Green and another who witness herself married

a M'Henry - these were all. ~~They lived~~
They died the ~~themselves~~, some years before
Mary Miles - Jacob Froman a son
of the sister Mrs Froman - and the
Harrison and his children were all her
relations that lived near her from some
years before her death. Froman
Witup never saw or saw any of her
relations at her house excepting Jacob

The deposition **George Edelen** taken at his residence in Washington County, Kentucky on the 1st day of August 1860 to be read as evidence on behalf of **John P. Reed** _____ in two consolidated suits now pending in the Washington Circuit Court in which **Mrs. Julia Reed** Adminstratix of **John P. Reed** deceased is plaintiff and **Lucinda** and others of color are defendants and also of **Mary Miles** Slaves Plaintiff and **John P. Reed** _____ defendants. Deponent being of lawful age and first duly sworn.


(meg's note: I have summarized the deposition which was taken August 1st 1860.) **George Edelen** stated he was 50 years old and that he knew **Mary Miles** and had lived within a 1 ½ of her. He stated the first dealings he had with her was the year after the cholera in 1833. He had rented land from

her and had done some blacksmith work for her. **George Edelen** at that time was living with his brother, **Edward**. The farms of **Miles** and **Edelen** did not join but were not far apart. Sometimes he saw "**Molly**" as much as 3 times a day and then he might so a week without seeing her. **George Edelen's** grandfather did live on a farm that adjoined **Mary Miles'** farm. **George Edelen** rented land from **Mary Miles** in 1849 and 50. He also did blacksmith work for her and sold her some pork and bacon. **Mrs. Miles** owed money to **Mr. Edelen** and he took her not for the settlement, something around \$100. This was not the original amount of money owed by **Mrs. Miles**. He asked her to give him an order to give to **John P. Reed** to get the money. She said she could not that she had already got from him \$1500 or \$1600. **George** stated he had asked her one time if she planned to sell her slaves and she had stated that she could not as she had no other way to pay **John P. Reed**. I had heard her previously stated that she planned to free her slaves. About 20 or 25 years ago (around 1830 - 1840) **Mrs. Miles** had conferred with **Mr. Edelen's** father about which slaves she could set free. He told her she could free any that she wanted except old **Tom** who belonged to the heirs. During the time that **Mr. Edelen** knew **Mrs. Miles** he felt she was a capable woman who could not be fooled or cheated by anyone. **Mr. Edelen** was asked to put a value on the slaves: **Tom** \$100, **Lucinda** \$200, **Polly** \$250, **Bill** \$550, **Tansey** \$400 or \$450, **Sim** \$300, **John** \$300 and **Lucinda's** child \$100. The ages of the slaves he guessed to be **Tom** 45 years old, **Lucinda** 25 - 30 years old, **Polly** 16 or 17 year old, **Bill** 18 or 19 years old, **Tansy** 15 or 16 years old, **Sim** 11, **John** 13, and **Lucinda's** son an infant. He stated that **Mary Miles** thought a great deal of her slaves and would not have sold any of them for any price. **Mr. Edelen** goes on to say that he can not read or write so an earlier deposition is read to him. The earlier deposition was taken by **Mr. W. H. Hays** who was **John P. Reed's** attorney. However, **Mr. Edelen's** wife can read and write and keeps a log of all his transactions. There was some questions regarding **Mary Miles's** pension money and whether she had ever gotten this or had it gone to **John P. Reed**. He stated that the slaves treated **Mrs. Miles** kindly and had it not been for **Lucinda**, **Mrs. Miles** would not have gotten anything to eat.

(meg's note: There is several pages of court documents, mostly the summons notices and depositions. Very little is easily read. I did not find a copy of either will nor anything that indicated which will was accepted by the court. I did find amongst the readable parts of the documents the following bits and pieces. The case was still going on, on May 19th 1863.)

Mary Miles's father , **Thomas Harrison** died about 35 years ago. The court case began in 1855 and was still going in 1860 so this would put her father's death @ 1820-25. She lived on the farm with her slaves and no other white person around. She had several brothers and sisters. **William Harrison** lived in Virginia. **Thomas G. Harrison** lived in Marion County about 3 miles from **Mary Miles**. **Thomas G. Harrison** was the father of **Julia Reed**, **Elizabeth Creel** and **Ben Harrison**. **Ben Harrison** never married and died in Mississippi. Her sisters were **Mrs. Froman**, **Mrs. Waters**, **Mrs. G_____** deceased, another who witness _____ married a **M'Murry**. **Jacob Froman** a son of the sister. **Jacob Froman** and **John P. Reed** appear to be the only relatives that kept in touch with **Mrs. Miles**. **Jacob Froman** died 14 or 15 years before this deposition was taken.

In pursuance of a Decree of the Nelson Circuit Court,
pronounced at February Term 1835, for the benefit of the
heirs of John Miles dec'd. "On petition" - the undersigned,
Commissioner, after advertising in the Bardonia Herald,
and at the Court-house in Bardonia, the Court-house
in Lebanon, and other notorious places in the Counties
of Nelson and Marion, did, on Monday April 13th
1835, expose to public sale, on a credit of one year,
at the Court-house in Bardonia, the two tracts of
Land in the petition mentioned, to wit: one tract
lying in the County of Nelson, on the Beech-fork,
containing 186 acres - the other tract, lying in the
Counties of Nelson and Marion, containing 20½ acres.
Philip E. Miles became purchaser of the tract first
named at his bid of sixteen hundred dollars,
(exceeding the valuation made by Commissioners) - Charles
Miles became purchaser of the last named tract
at his bid of fifteen hundred dollars, which is
\$246.00 over and above the valuation of Commissioners.
Purchaser Bonds returned and made part hereof.

Each book bears a label which is entered the name of the child to whom it is issued, the title of the book, the county to which it is assigned and the date of issue. A form in duplicate is issued the teacher who fills in the information and who turns it to the child's parents one of the copies as a receipt at the end of the year when the book is returned to the school. She files the duplicate. The return of the book when returned is so recorded.

A considerable number of the books received are now in service and others will be distributed shortly. The texts which have already arrived are: 400 spellers, 400 arithmetics, 100 primers, 500 first readers, 500 second readers and 400 third readers. None of the books for use in the fourth grades have been received.

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MILES FAMILY

Attempting to unravel the tangled threads of the history of the Miles family in Maryland and Kentucky is an exercise which has been attempted by others before, and this effort has not met with much more success. The first of the family to settle in Maryland was Nicholas Miles who transported himself and his two sons, John and Peter, into the province in 1651. (Ref: Md. Land Records, Liber ABH, folio 230). Nicholas Miles located on Britain's or Bretton's Bay in St. Mary's county. A number of the descendants of both sons adopted the spelling Mills with the result that in many cases it is difficult to prove relationships in the colonial period. Up to the time of the Revolution, the descendants of Nicholas Miles frequently intermarried with the most prominent families of southern Maryland, including the Beckwiths, Boarmans, Fenwicks, Gardiners and Keys. The Miles family enjoyed a reasonable amount of affluence during the colonial period. It has been noted that John Miles, who died in St. Mary's county in 1726, owned at least eight slaves at the time of his death.

Even before the American Revolution, various members of the Miles family began to move northward from St. Mary's county into the counties of Charles and Prince Georges. A Nicholas Miles, born ca 1741, already resided in Prince Georges county by 1776. He and his wife, Ann Blacklock, were the parents of Richard Pius Miles, who became the first Catholic bishop of Tennessee. Those members of the Miles family who eventually settled in Perry county, Missouri are thought to have removed from Charles county, Md., when they first headed west to their first stop in Kentucky.

The 1790 census of Charles co., Md. lists Walter, Edward, Nicholas, Eleanor, Joseph and Barton Miles, all of them names which will figure in the cast of characters as the progressive move is made westward.

It is when we arrive in Kentucky and find several individuals with the same Christian names that some confusion begins. Thomas Hill and Philip Miles, brothers-in-law, moved from St. Mary's co., Md. to Nelson co., Ky. in 1787, settling near the present site of New Hope. Thomas Hill and the widower of Rebecca Miles, the daughter of John Barton Miles and Elizabeth Gardiner. The party had travelled down the Ohio River on flatboats and had been fired upon by Indians a few miles above Louisville. At least one slave was killed and Thomas Hill was wounded, but later recovered. This Philip Miles probably died shortly after his arrival in Kentucky, for on 10 Feb 1789 in Nelson county Eleanor Miles, relict and widow of Philip Miles, relinquished her right to administer the estate of Philip Miles, decd. Her securities were Robert Abell (whose wife was Margaret Mills, a descendant of the original Miles ancestor), Henry Miles and Athanasius Thompson. Those appointed to survey the estate were Basil Hayden, Philip Lee, Samuel Pottinger and Samuel Willett.

It is quite likely that Eleanor Miles returned to Charles co., Md., where she appeared in the 1790 census. A problem occurs when one checks the will books in Nelson co., Ky., and finds that another Philip Miles made his will 8 Feb 1800 and it was probated 10 May 1802. In it he named his wife Eleanor. When one notes that the Eleanor Miles who is definitely known to be the ancestress of the Miles descendants of Perry county, Missouri made her will in July of 1802 and it was probated 23 Jan 1806, the fact that confusion exists can be understood. The will of 1806 was probated in Washington co., Ky., and it was from this county that Joseph and Edward Miles moved to Perry co., Mo.

Mary Jane (Lancaster) Spalding, writing in 1889 maintained that her grandfather was the Philip Miles who moved to Kentucky with Thomas Hill. She may have been off by one generation for the man whom she claimed as her grandfather would have been more the age of a son of the earlier Philip Miles. (Ref: Filson Club Library, Louisville, Ky.)

One record tending to support the contention that there was a gap in the time in which members of the Philip Miles family resided in Kentucky was found in Deed Book 4 in Nelson co., Ky., as follows: "I do hereby certify that Phill Miles has complied with an act of Assembly provided to prohibit the importation of slaves into the State of Virginia (of which Kentucky was then a part). Given under my hand this 15th day of June 1788. James Baird. ... At a court held for Nelson county on Tuesday the 12th day of June 1792, this certificate was produced in court and ordered to be recorded. Test. Ben Grayson, Cl(erk) of this C(our)t."

According to Mary Jane (Lancaster) Spalding, the children of her grandparents Philip and Eleanor (O'Bryan) Miles were: Harry/Henry, who married Ann Lancaster and Nancy McAtee; Monica, who married Basil Mattingly; Catherine, her mother, who married John Lancaster; Jack, who married Sally Howard; John, who never married; and Dorothy, who married John Johnson. These children and their families continued to live around New Hope, where their descendants founded the E. L. Miles and Belle of Nelson Distillers.

According to the will of Eleanor Miles, probated in Washington co., Ky. in 1806, her children were: Audrey, wife of William Vain; Priscilla, wife of Thomas Osborne; Sarah, wife of ----- Montgomery; William; Barton Elexius; Joseph and Edward Francis Elexious. A deceased daughter Henrietta had married John Mudd.

A further notation found at the Newberry Library in Chicago, stated that at the end of her will, Eleanor Miles stipulated that "none other of my children or grandchildren are to have a part of my estate." She expressed the wish to be buried in the graveyard of the Hardin's Creek settlement. It tempts the imagination to assume that the Philip Miles of whom Mary Jane (Lancaster) Spalding writes was one of the children unmentioned in the will.

Her will was witnessed by John Lancaster, Matthew Cissell and Ignatius Mattingly and the executors were William Miles, Priscilla Osborne and her husband Thomas Osborne.

Eleanor Miles was a shrewd manipulator of property. A deed written 25 Jun 1803 and recorded in Washington co., Ky., 5 Nov 1803 between Eleanor Miles and her son Edward Francis Elixious Miles, stated that "in return for no other claim than what she devises, he receives several slaves, Samuel, husband of Rachel and John, Mary, William and Samuel. Rachel's oldest, Clare, to belong to Eleanor." The deed was witnessed by John Lancaster and Charles Russell.

Proof that the Joseph Miles who migrated to Perry co., Mo., was the same individual who appeared in the will of Eleanor Miles, was found in a power-of-attorney made in the District of Ste. Genevieve, Territory of Louisiana by Joseph Miles in which he appointed his son Nicholas to be his attorney in business in Washington co., Ky., to bring a Negro man, Harry, or sell or swap him and to recover a sum from Leonard Mattingly for Harry's labor. Nicholas was also to obtain from William Miles and Thomas Osbin Joseph's interest in the will of his mother. The document was signed by Joseph and Ann Miles before Isidore Moore, J.P., 12 Sep 1807 with Phl. Elliott as a witness and was recorded 15 Oct 1807 in Washington co., Ky.

Very Rev. V. F. O'Daniel, in his book, The Father of the Church in Tennessee, says that Nicholas Miles, father of Bishop Richard Pius Miles, was a close relative of Philip Miles of New Hope, Ky., and that Bishop Miles always visited at the home of Henry Miles, son of Philip. O'Daniel also says that Brother George Miles, S.J., the second candidate received into the Jesuit novitiate at Florissant, Mo., was born in Kentucky in 1802 and immigrated with his parents to Spanish Lake in St. Louis county, Mo., and then to Florissant. O'Daniel claims a relationship between Brother George Miles, Bishop Miles and Rev. Thomas H. Miles, S.J., the latter a son of Henry Miles and grandson of Philip Miles of New Hope, Ky. Whether Brother George Miles could have been identical with the son of William Miles (AE) of the same name is uncertain.

Eleanor Miles (AFE) consistently stated in three census records, 1850, 1860 and 1870, that she was born in Maryland. This would tend to confirm that the Joseph Miles found in Charles co., Md. in the census of 1790, the year of Eleanor's birth, was her father. It was in that same county that Miles families were headed by individuals named Walter, William, Edward, Nicholas, Barton, Henry and Eleanor, all of whom were later found in Washington co., Ky., and some of whom moved to Missouri.

The full listing of the dates of birth of the children of Joseph Miles and Anne Wathen was taken from a journal kept by Francis Miles (AFF) and now in the possession of Richard Crofton, St. Ann, Mo.

Joseph Miles settled on a Spanish land grant in what is now Perry co., Mo. in 1803. From 1804 through 1806 he possessed, inhabited and cultivated the land, built a house and made honey. His land was surveyed 30 Dec 1805 in the amount of 1200 arpents, or 1024 A., and he was eventually confirmed as the owner of 640 A. His original survey, located in Jefferson City, Mo., refers to him as "James Mills" in the text, which may account for Houck, in his History of Missouri, referring to a James Miles as a settler at The Barrens. At the top of the page on which Joseph Miles' survey appears, he is referred to as "Jos. Miles".

Joseph Miles made his will 4 Mar 1821 and it was probated 24 Nov 1821 in Perry co., Mo. His death occurred shortly before the commencement of record-keeping at the St. Mary's of The Barrens Seminary church. Their records usually cited the age of the deceased, but since Joseph Miles does not appear in their pages an estimate of his age at death must be conjectural. The eldest child was born in 1780, so the birthdate of Joseph Miles can be placed in 1758 or before. The age of his wife at her death in 1834 was given as 82, which would place her birth in 1752. This seems unlikely for she would then have been 28 at the birth of her first child and 48 at the birth of her last child.

WATHEN FAMILY: The Wathens are traced to Flanders at the time of the Battle of Crecy, 1346, where they aided the Black Prince of England, and were knighted and moved to England. John Wathen, born about 1625, came to St. Mary's co., Md. before 1647 as a trader and shipper. He married Mary Mullett. John Wathen later returned to England and died there. Anne Wathen, wife of Joseph Miles, descended probably from John Wathen Jr. (ca 1662--1705), who married Susannah Hudson, who tradition says was a descendant of Henry Hudson, the explorer. John Wathen, Jr. was the father of Henry Hudson Wathen (1695--1760), who married Sarah Mudd, dau of Thomas Mudd and Sarah Boarman. A full treatment of the Mudd family will be found in The History of the Mudd Family in the U.S. by Dr. Richard Dyer Mudd. One son of Henry Hudson Wathen was a state senator in Maryland and another founded the Old Granddad distillery in Kentucky.
