The Springfield Sun, Wednesday, May 5, 1915.
After a protracted illness from cancer of the stomach, Mr. Emanuel Moraja died at his home on the Springfield and Lebanon Pike last Monday night, at 11:30 o'clock. After funeral services at St. Rose this morning, the body was buried in the cemetery at that place. Mr. Moraja was born in La Iglesias del Cid, Spain, sixty years ago. Twenty-two years ago he immigrated to this country, coming direct to Washington County. He had since that time lived here where he successfully engaged in farming. Mr. Moraja married Pasquala Fortinand, a niece of Marie Attentia, better known as "Old Fine Times" a Spaniard who amassed a fortune by mending watches and clocks and peddling. Both Mr. and Mrs. Moraja were frugal, thrifty and industrious, and by their frugality and good management were enabled to accumulate a goodly portion of this world's goods. Mrs. Moraja is still living, as are the following children: Stanislaus, Roman, Mary, Joseph, Agnes and Louise.

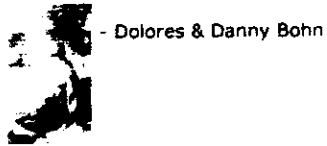

percent of the Barley crop planted and 88 percent of the Dark Tobacco. The condition of the Barley tobacco beds is 67 per cent, and the beds in the Dark district 62 per cent. The drought has damaged the tobacco beds very materially, and cut worms and other insects have worked upon the plants until some of the beds are completely gone.

Taken as a whole the reports would indicate there is no reason to believe the crop of 1915 will fall short of an average crop in any particular. There is a note of optimism in most of the reports, which show that the Kentucky farmers have reason to believe that the coming year will bring to them good returns as the prices of all grain crops are unusually high. Quarantine regulations are being rapidly removed, and the prices for animals are beginning to advance once more.

Winfield Shreve, Sr., was born June 20th, 1832, in Marion County, Ky., and died Feb. 11, 1915.

He was twice married, the first time to Amanda Wizer in 1855 to which union two children were born. October 3rd, 1867, after the death of his first wife, he took for a help-mate Susan Coppage who was faithful to the last moments of his life here upon earth and was willing to do all that the loving hands of a faithful wife could accomplish. Two children were born to this union.

Mr. Shreve, measured by his accomplishments in life, ranked high. Whether as a husband, father, friend or citizen, his was a rounded out life. He left his impress upon the generation to which he belonged. Kind as a woman, unselfish to a fault, brave and unflinching to the discharge of his duty. His hand was as open as the day to those in destitute circumstances and his heart was a great temple in which thronged all the kindly emotions of a noble soul. It was the simplicity and generosity of his character and the nobility of his nature that rendered him most rich in the capacity of his friendship. It was in the social circle by the hearthstone that we learned to esteem him most and love him best.

He was a child among children, and a man among men. His life was valuable because of its example. The world is better for his having lived in it, and manhood is elevated by the record he has left for its guidance, while the public mind of his community can but be exalted by his earthly sojourn.

But wholly apart from its relation to public activities, the life which we honor wrought out its riches and its best. In gentle graces that do not bring men to the foreground, this man of God did his greatest work. What shall one say of a husband who, through years of sacrifice, was always steady, happy, helpful and strong, a husband with ever intent upon God while hands heroically ministered to the wants of a family and guided the feet of youth? There is only one thing to say of such, and that is the word of the "abundant entrance" into the city of the King.

His death was as gentle as the falling asleep of a tired child with the face bearing the imprint of happy thoughts of a wonderful tomorrow. Awakening as it were, to behold the matchless beauties of a perfect day in the glory world of the mysterious beyond.

(1) The mileage of the proposed route is twenty-five miles, one and one-half miles of which is in the City of Lebanon. Total mileage of improved, hard surfaced road in the county, commonly called macadam, one hundred and fifty miles.

(2) Condition of proposed road is good.
(a) Well improved with hard surface.
(b) Macadam about twenty (20) miles, and gravel about five (5) miles.

(c) No earth or dirt road on route.

(d) Generally level and good drainage.

(e) Six bridges.

(a) No concrete.

(b) Five steel.

(c) One of wood.

(d) All are free and in good condition.

(e) No streams without bridges.

(5) The entire route is in fair condition now, but the entire route will be re-surfaced and put in first class condition during 1915 and 1916, work to begin within the next thirty days. The entire route is included in the Inter-County Seat System of State roads, namely, one-half of expense borne by the county and one-half by the State, and the work done under State supervision.

(6) The necessary money has already been appropriated to put this road in the best condition.

(7) This route is ready for present use.
(8) At Lebanon this route has tributaries coming in from all adjoining counties and county seats, and all along this route are first class rock quarries and large quantities of gravel. Six miles of this route through Marion county was constructed by the State many years ago and is a model of road construction, and the view from it, as it winds over Muldraugh's Hill, is not surpassed this side of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Plant the Dixie Highway through old Marion and, when after awhile you pass this way, you will find the latch string hanging out and our gates ajar.

Admission: Adults two for twenty-five cents. Children fifty cents apiece. This picnic is given in honor of Miss U.

Miss Louise Cox and James May, residents of Perryville, were united in marriage at the Baptist parsonage in Danville, Rev. Eberhardt officiating. The groom is a prominent horseman and is well known all over Central Kentucky.

As a result of an explosion of a can of powder poured on a rock and touched off by a match, Chester Reynolds and Frank Triplett, small boys of Adair county, were the victims of severe burns, the former being badly burned about the face.

While engaged in cutting logs on his farm near Greensburg, P. F. Marshall, a former clerk of the Green County Court, was painfully injured. An ax in the hands of a workman slipped off the handle striking Mr. Marshall on the knee and severing the knee cap.

Mrs. Nancy Acre, living in Adair county, recently celebrated her 100th birthday. Another Adair county lady who is nearing the century mark is Mrs. Easter Dohoney, she having reached her 97th year a few days ago. Both are said to be active in mind and enjoying good health.

Johnson Watson, the 19-year-old son of Richard Watson of the Gethsemane section, died at a hospital at Galesburg, Ill., as a result of being kicked by a mule. Young Watson had left home about a month ago to work on a farm. His remains were brought to New Haven and interred in St. Catherine's cemetery.

After an illness of only a few days of Bright's disease, Judge James L. Hamilton, aged 73 years, died at his home near Greensburg. He was well known as a public official, having served Green county four years as Magistrate, sixteen years as Jailer and four years as County Judge. He leaves a wife and two children.

In a difficulty at Fairfield in Nelson county between Dade Hoskins and John Stephenson, the latter was shot in the back by the former. The shooting occurred in the rear of the grocery of G. T. Woodson. Stephenson's wounds are of a minor nature. Hoskins was arrested and taken to the Bardonia jail where he was later released under bond.

Manuel Moraja, aged about 70 years, died at his home near Springfield after a long illness of stomach trouble. He was a native of Spain, having come to this country some twenty-five years ago. He came in possession of a considerable sum of money, which he increased by hard work and thrifty management. Surviving him are his wife and several children.

John Mattingly, the 15-year-old son of B. J. Mattingly of Holy Cross, while on his way to New Hope with his father with a load of tan bark, met with a serious accident which will in all probability result fatally. In going down a hill the boy attempted to apply the brakes when he lost his balance and fell to the ground two wheels of the wagon passing over his body. He was taken to his home, a distance of four miles, where he is said to be in a precarious condition.

Louis Yankey and Miss Mary Birch, residents of Washington county, figured in what came very near being a most serious accident recently, says the Springfield Sun. They were in a buggy on their way from Texas to Springfield when the horse they were driving became frightened at an automobile and plunged against the railing of a bridge which they were crossing. The railing gave way and they were precipitated down a forty-foot embankment. Mr. Yankey suffered several painful bruises. Fortunately Miss Birch escaped without injury.

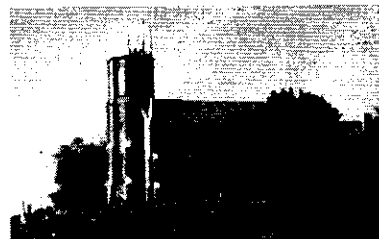

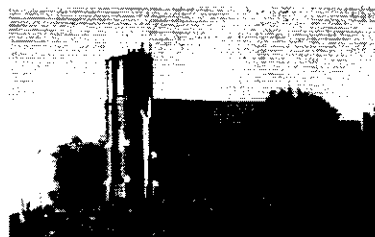

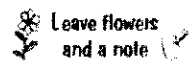
