Funeral services were held Oct. 3 at Magoffin County Funeral Home with burial in Brushy Fork Family Cemetery.

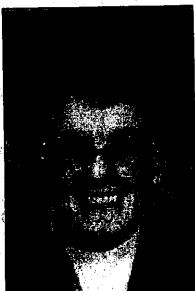
Minister Paul Hiner officiated.

Great Water Control Project To Open Everglades Land

The United States' semi-tropical show case — the 'rich and lushly vegetated Florida Everglades — is scheduled for some new decorating effects at the hand of man.

Presently under construction is the first phase of \$208,000,000 master plan to tame the 'Glades—a plan that reaches into an area larger than Connecticut, Delaware, and New Jersey combined, including a third of Florida's people and nearly half of its wealth.

Projected by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, the massive water-control scheme calls for drainage of swamps, control of floods, and reclamation for agriculture and cattle of extensive reaches of grass lands.

Although the plan encompasses the eastern part of Florida from Orlando south, first-phase work is primarily concerned with the Lake Okeechobee region, the lower east coast and the Everglades proper, often called America's "last frontier."

For well over a century Floridians have been stirred to action by dreams of making productive a part of all of the 4½-million-acre Everglades area which lies south of Lake Okeechobee. Although dominated by nearly flat and usually flooded grass marshes, much of the area's soil is rich, organic muck capable of producing a crop in 60 days.

U.S. Church Membership Is Up 51.5 Per Cent Since 1926

The rate of increase in American church membership since 1926 has been more than 20 per cent greater than population growth, a recent survey made by the National Council of Churches revealed.

The survey showed church membership increased 51.5 per cent while population grew by an estimated 30 per cent.

Described as the first of its kind in a number of years, the survey tabulated the membership of 54 bodies, all with membership over 50,000. Combined, these groups account for about 97 per cent of church membership, it is reported.

Of the three major faiths, Protestantism showed the largest percentage gain adding 16,954,322 new members for a 55 per cent increase.

Stevenson Wins Kentucky By Margin Of 700 Votes

Figures approved this week at Frankfort by the State Election Commission show that President-elect Eisenhower missed carrying traditionally Democratic Kentucky by a margin of only 700 votes.

Final tally of the State's popular vote in the November 4 election gave Democratic Candidate Adlai E. Stevenson a total of 495,729 votes to 495,029 for Eisenhower. The margin, though small, will keep Kentucky in the Democratic column when the Electoral College is convened early next month. The State has gone Republican only three times in presidential elections since being admitted to the Union in 1792.

Other figures approved by the Commission showed an official margin for Senator-elect John Sherman Cooper of 28,924 votes over the defeated Democratic incumbent, Thomas Underwood. The Somerset Republican polled 494,576 to his opponent's 465,652.
