Hugh Newcome Fatally Hurt – Unexpected Explosion Of Heavy Charge Placed Under Tree Brings Death – Body Is Badly Mangled

One man was fatally injured and at least two others had narrow escapes when a charge of dynamite placed under a large sycamore tree by a crew of men engaged in clearing the turnpike right of way exploded unexpectedly on the Bradfordsville road several miles south of town late Wednesday afternoon.

Hugh Newcome of this city was the one who lost his life. He was standing over the hole where nine sticks of dynamite had been placed some time previous when the explosion occurred. He was hurled between twenty and thirty feet in the air, falling to the ground only a short distance from the blast. A dozen or more men witnessed the accident. W.O. Blandford, the well known traveling salesman of this city, who happened to be

passing on the road in his car, and George Kirkland, Bradfordsville farmer, were within fifteen feet of the tree when the dynamite let go. Mr. Blandford was knocked down and stunned so badly he was unconscious for some time. Examination at McChord's Hospital, where he was brought by John Beard immediately after the accident, disclosed that he was not seriously hurt and that he was suffering principally from shock. He remained in a dazed condition for several hours. Mr. Kirkland, who was standing close to Mr. Blandford, was not hurt.

Mr. Newcome was placed in a car and brought to town by Mr. Kirkland. He was taken to Boldrick's Infirmary. His right leg was crushed, one of his eyes blown out, a part of his chin was torn away and one side of his face lacerated. He was otherwise badly bruised, and it was realized at once that death was but a matter of hours. He died at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday night.

A crew of men has been employed for some time removing trees, stumps and other obstacles from the right of way at the turnpike which is under reconstruction by the State Highway Department. The old right of way is being widened to sixty feet and is being cleared of all obstacles. The men have been using a tractor and also dynamite in doing this work. Wednesday afternoon they placed nine sticks of dynamite under a large sycamore tree on the road side. The charge failed to explode when set off. A light charge was placed in the same hold, near the heavy charge, workmen expecting it to set off the heavier one. However, the lighter charge did not set it off, and after waiting for some time Mr. Newcome went to the hole. He is said to have been kneeling on one knee using an iron bar in the hole when the dynamite let go.

The tree was not moved by the explosion of the nine sticks of dynamite, and it is believed the force of the shot went in the wrong direction. Mr. Blandford happened to be passing on the road, and remained to watch the tree removed. There were a number of other spectators at the scene, but they kept at a safe distance and were uninjured. A telephone lineman on a pole only a short distance away from the blast said Newcome's body was thrown in the air considerably higher than the pole on which he was at work.

Newcome was a son of Matthew and Amanda Sapp Newcome, both deceased, and was born and reared in the New Market section of the county. He was about 39 years old. Several years ago he moved to Lebanon and had since made his home in this city. He was a member of the Baptist church, of Marion Commandery, Knights Templar, and of the Lebanon Masonic Lodge. Surviving him are his widow, who was Miss Hattie Burress, daughter of William Burress, and two children, both boys. He is also survived by two brothers, Charlie Newcome of Campbellsville and Hall Newcome of this city.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Baptist church and will be in charge of Marion Commandery, Knights Templar. Burial will be in Ryder cemetery.

Man Killed by Lightning

Last Saturday, shortly after noon, Sam Nichols, a negro man in the employ of Mr. M.C. Mackin, went with a team of mules to plow in a field belonging to the estate of the late Felix Mercer. About four o'clock there came up a shower of rain, accompanied with some vivid lightning and heavy peals of thunder. Late in the afternoon attention was called to the fact that the mules had been seen standing in one spot for an hour or two, and a boy was sent out to see what was the matter. The boy found Sam Nichols lying upon his face some seventy-five yards from the plow and team, evidently quite dead. The mules had been unhitched and tied to the plow with the line.

It is conjectured that when the rain came up Nichols unhitched his mules and went after his coat, which he had hung upon a small tree about a hundred and fifty yards from where he was at work. Having put on his coat he had gone about half the distance back to his team when the fatal bolt struck him and must have killed him instantly. The lightning struck him on the left side of the head near the top, burning a round hole in his hat about large enough to admit the passage of an ordinary turkey-shot. The lining of the hat near this hole was considerably torn in several places. The beard upon the chin was also slightly singed. The shirt was set on fire at the throat, and the upper part of the bosom had been consumed. His falling upon his face doubtless served to extinguish this fire and prevent the rest of his clothing from being consumed. The electric current then pursued its way downward along the middle line of the body, in front, slightly lacerating the skin at the lower part of the breast and breaking loose the strings from one of the shoes.
