Thomas was a volunteer worker for many years with the St. Vincent DePaul Society, a Catholic organization that assists low-income people.

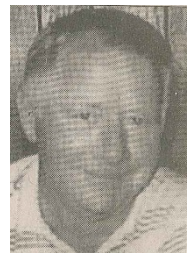
And he took that work seriously, said the Rev. Mark Spalding of St. Augustine Church.

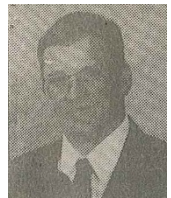

LEBANON MAN FATALLY SHOT – A.C. Thornton Fired Upon While Allegedly Robbing Store Near Bardstown – BURIAL HERE TUESDAY

A.C. Thornton, 39 years old, former dairyman of this city, was fatally shot about 8:20 o'clock Sunday evening by J. Porter Stoner, owner of a general store and filling station about five and a half miles from Bardstown near Cox's Creek. Thornton was alleged to have been in the process of robbing the store of merchandise and was said to have been carrying a large sack of sugar when the shot was fired. Nine other sacks were reported to have already been removed from the building and were setting just outside the door.

Stoner used a shotgun, three of the pellets taking effect; one in Thornton's chest, one in his abdomen and one in his left leg. He was rushed back to Bardstown where he died shortly after having been attended by Dr. R.H. Greenwell, Nelson County physician. The local man refused to give his name or to make any statement and it was only through papers in his clothing that his identity and his address were learned. Nelson County officers called authorities here who in turn notified the slain man's father, Dr. G.G. Thornton. Dr. Thornton immediately went to Bardstown and identified the body as that of his son.

Stoner surrendered to Morgan Yewell, County Judge of Nelson County, Monday and was released on his own bond of \$100. His examining trial was set for tomorrow. The store owner claimed that his place of business had been robbed four times within the past six months and stated that since he had been particularly on guard. He said that when he heard a noise in the store Sunday evening when he went to his garden fence armed with a shotgun and his daughter, Miss Alice Stoner, turned on a light in front of the store from a switch within his home nearby. He stated that he commanded the man, then on the porch of the store, to hold up his hands and when the order was not obeyed he fired one charge of buckshot.

Deputy Sheriffs Joe Claybrook and R.W. Haviland of Bardstown were reached by phone upon and arriving at the scene found Thornton on the porch. His car was parked on the side of the road a short distance away. Other than the sugar, several other articles had also been taken from the store and were found just outside. Entrance had been gained by prying the door open with a tire tool. Thornton was alleged to have been armed.

The body was brought back to this city Sunday evening and after preparation for burial at Bosley's Funeral Home was removed to the Thornton home on Forest Street Monday morning.

Surviving the deceased are his wife, who before her marriage sixteen years ago was Miss Mabel Hoskins of Hardinsburg, and five children, George, Susan, A.C., Jr., Lucien and Helen Hoskins Thornton. Twins, a son and daughter, Robert Peake and Ollie Peake, born to Mr. and Mrs. Thornton about three years ago, died in infancy. He is also survived by his parents, two brothers, Jesse Thornton of this city and A.H. Thornton of Louisville, and two sisters, Mrs. N.V. McCorkhill and Mrs. C.A. Combs, both of Louisville. Two brothers preceded him to the grave.

Mr. Thornton was born at Gravel Switch on November 7, 1894, a son of Dr. G.G. Thornton and Mrs. Bettie Purdy Thornton. He first attended school at Gravel Switch and several years later, having moved with the

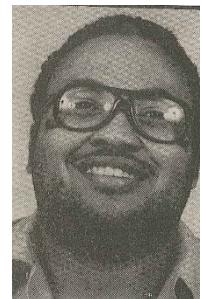

Driver charged with murder following wreck

A Lebanon woman was arrested Sunday on a murder charge in connection with a highway fatality in Marion County last Wednesday night.

Forty-year-old Deborah K. Wilson, who has lived in Marion County only a short time, is charged with the murder of 22-year old Wendy Kay Tucker of Lebanon.

Tucker was a passenger on a motorcycle driven by her fiancé, Joseph Bert Jones, 30, of Lebanon.

The crash occurred between 11:30 and 11:50 at the intersection of Ky. 426 (Miller Pike) and Ky. 84, four miles southwest of Lebanon, state police said.

It was Marion County's fifth highway fatality this year.

Jones, operating a 1970 Harley-Davidson motorcycle, was stopped at the intersection, waiting to turn left onto Ky. 84, state police said.

Wilson was driving a 1987 Pontiac car, which struck the motorcycle in the rear, state police said.

Tucker and Jones were thrown off the motorcycle and they landed in the road, said State Trooper Jacky Hunt, who investigated. The motorcycle went off the road, over a concrete culvert and landed in a ditch, Hunt said.

After hitting the motorcycle, Wilson continued on without stopping, state police said.

Around 4 a.m. Thursday, Hunt arrested Wilson in a Raywick parking lot on a charge of alcohol intoxication.

"The alcohol intoxication charge wasn't in connection with the wreck," Hunt said.

Sunday at 6:37 p.m. in the Casey County Sheriff's Office in Liberty, Hunt served arrest warrants on Wilson.

The Marion County arrest warrants charged her with murder, first-degree wanton endangerment, a third offense of driving on a DUI-suspended license, leaving the scene of an accident and no insurance.

Wilson had lived in Russell County and Casey County before coming to Lebanon to reside, Hunt said.

Wilson was taken to the Nelson County Jail in Bardstown. Her bond for the felony charges was set at \$50,000 all cash. Her bond for the earlier alcohol intoxication charge was set at \$5,000, 10 percent cash.

Tucker and Jones were transported by ambulance to Columbia Spring View Hospital in Lebanon.

Tucker was pronounced dead by Dr. Walter Montgomery in the Spring View emergency room at 1:18 a.m., Thursday, July 24.

She suffered multiple injuries including severe head injuries, state police said.

An autopsy was performed at the Kentucky Medical Examiner's Office in Louisville. The preliminary report revealed that she suffered a skull fracture, Marion County Deputy Coroner Dick Moraja said.

She was wearing a helmet, which only covered her head above her ears, Moraja said.

Jones sustained multiple abrasions and bruises and was treated and released, state police said. He was also wearing a helmet, state police said.
